

LIFESTYLE Community Action Council to begin Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Crisis Program

January 7, 2008 - Community Action Council's Low Income Home Energy Assistance Crisis Program (LHEAP), begins today, Monday, January 7, in an effort to assist low-income residents with high utility bills. LHEAP will provide a one-time benefit to eligible households to be used for energy bills. The amount of the benefit is determined by income, household size, fuel type, geographic location and meeting the following eligibility criteria for a crisis situation.

The household in which the crisis is occurring must be the household in which the crisis is occurring. The household has received a past disconnection notice if natural gas or electric is the heat source or...

1. Proof of income for the previous month for all adults 18 and over in the household.

2. The most recent heating bill or verification from landlord that heating expenses are included in rent.

3. Birth dates of all household members.
