The two spoke briefly, though neither revealed the subject of the conversation while testifying. Kearns then said Brandon Kimes drove away and he moved into a position near his and Willoughby's property and saw someone inside. A short time later the white S-10 came back toward the Willoughby residence as Kearns stood near the side of the road.  
 "The next thing I know I heard it tooting its horn and then it kind of swerved over at me," Kearns said. "I shot at the front tires and the back tires."  
 Kearns said he saw someone run from the back of the Willoughby home at that morning, calling her he had company early in the morning and had asked her to watch his place. When Brown saw someone lurking in the front door, she called Kearns again.  
 "Marion's garage had been broken into that's why my car is in each other's property," Brown testified.

A serrated knife works best.        To dice: Cut tomatoes in half crosswise. Dot them with margarine and sprinkle with an herb mixture. Boil tomatoes until they are tender and topping is lightly browned.        To bake: Cut tomatoes in half crosswise. Dot them with margarine and season as desired. These changes also include numerous additional terms, but all changes to the terms and conditions for providing service to every customer class are listed in the separate schedule among other things, cause certain customers presently served under the General Service, Metering and Public Lighting classes to be assigned to a more appropriate schedule which reflects their load and operating characteristics, nature of the use, quality and quantity of service used, and when such, purpose for which used and other reasonable considerations.

The foregoing rates reflect a proposed annual increase in revenues of approximately 0.2%.

The estimated amount of the annual increase or decrease, per customer class is as follows: Residential: \$17,229,356, 4.2%; General Service: \$44,784, 0.32%; Large Power: \$70,621, 0.02%; LTO: \$22,222, 0.02%; Net Metering: \$17,559, 0.2%; Small Time of Day: \$34,226, 0.19%; Lighting: \$785, 0.22%.

The average monthly bill for each customer class to which the proposed electric rates will apply increase or decrease, approximately as follows: Residential: \$2.30, 4.2%; General Service: \$0.48, 0.32%; Large Power: \$0.02, 0.02%; Large Commercial Industrial Time of Day: \$69.77, 0.02%; Small Time of Day: \$19.48, 0.02%; Meter Power: \$1,387.24, 6.23%; Large Meter: \$233.43, 0.19%; Lighting: \$40.0, 4.2%.

The filing of KU's base rate application will cause the Value Delivery Term ("VDT") Successor Tariff and associated billing credits to be withdrawn from service effective August 1, 2008, pursuant to the Commission's March 24, 2008 Order in Case No. 2006-00351. The VDT Successor is a 24-month successor credit to customers' bills. In its base rate application, KU is proposing to include all savings associated with the VDT in the calculation of its proposed base rates. When the new base rates are in effect, customers should receive the benefit of all, including the shareholders' portion, of these savings through base rates.

The filing of KU's base rate application will also cause the Meter Successor Rider ("MSR") Tariff and associated billing credits to be withdrawn from service effective with the change in base rates pursuant to the Commission, June 26, 2008 Order in Case No. 2007-02663. The MSR Successor is a 36-month successor credit to customer bills. In its base rate application, KU is proposing to include all savings in the calculation of its proposed base rates. When the new base rates become effective, customers should receive the benefit of all, including the shareholders' portion, of these savings through base rates.
