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would only result in a two percent drop in the barley market," she said.

Nunley also said that tobacco nicotine was a gateway drug, which led to using other addictive substances.

"Nicotine is more addictive than heroin," Nunley said and added that although 50% of youth smokers reported that they believed they would not be smoking by 19 years in actuality, 79 percent were still smoking after that period of time.

"Smoking kills more people in the US and Kentucky than alcohol, car crashes, illicit drugs, homicides, suicides and AIDS," she said while stating that smoking is responsible for 87% of lung cancer cases and 30 percent of all cancers combined. "Tobacco is the only product that if used as intended will kill half of its consumers."

Nunley said that businesses, especially restaurants, which offer non-smoking sections, are very ineffective as far as providing patron health is concerned.

"Asking for a non-smoking section in a restaurant is like asking for a non-seeing section of the pool."

Nunley outlined the negative effects of second-hand smoke. "Second hand smoke contains over 4,000 chemical compounds and more than 290 chemical poisons with 69 known or suspected carcinogenic agents."

"Even short-term exposure to secondhand smoke can increase the risk for heart attack and stroke," she said. "Employers have a common law responsibility to provide a safe healthful workplace."

Nunley said there are currently 15 smoke-free cities in Kentucky, including Lexington and she said she hopes Carlisle and other cities will soon be numbered among them.

Deputy Buckler receives prestigious award

Deputy Ben Buckler Sr. has been awarded a Kentucky Law Enforcement Investigator certificate from the Kentucky Law Enforcement News Magazine this year marking his 12th year in law enforcement as a career.

Deputy Buckler has been a certified law enforcement officer serving the Nicholas County community since 1996. Buckler started his career with the Carlisle Police Department under then Chief Sam Finch. Deputy Buckler has received several awards and certifications during his 12-year career but none as important as the one he received this year.

Deputy Buckler enrolled in the Kentucky Law Enforcement Academy in 2003. This program takes a lot of commitment from the officer's as well as the department for which the officer works.

Each candidate must attend specific law enforcement classes and pass these classes as well as hours and points to achieve the certification status for their career track. Once the officer completes the requirements...

The Kentucky Law Enforcement Council based out of the Department for Criminal Justice Training in Richmond Kentucky will review the officer's career development track. They will then determine if the officer has met the training, experience and educational requirements needed to receive their certificate.

After all the criteria has been met, the officer will be awarded a certificate and uniform lapel pin. Those officers...

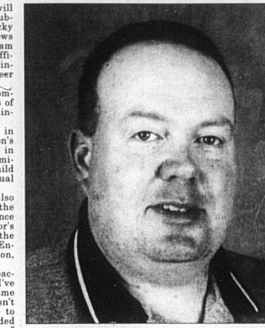
earned their names published in the Kentucky Law Enforcement News Magazine. This year has used these officers in to professional investigators in their career fields.

Deputy Buckler has completed over 1,120 hours of Career Development training. With over 300 hours of specific training in drug investigations, homicide investigations, child abuse and rape and sexual assault.

Deputy Buckler also completed and passed the DEA Basic and Advance Narcotics Investigator's Academy conducted by the United States Drug Enforcement Administration, in 2003.

Deputy Buckler's reaction to this honor: "I've been working a long time on this certificate. It hasn't always been easy, due to the amount of time needed to complete the program. But I stuck it out and I'm proud to be able to use the knowledge and training I have obtained to better serve the citizens of Nicholas County."
