ABC welcoming Nicholas County into the organization with assurances that all efforts would be made to help capture needed funding from the ARC by the applying entities of Nicholas County.

Davis and Tincher mentioned Magistrate Jeff Randolph as a strong supporter of joining the ARC, and Davis said he appreciated Randolph's tenacity and interest in helping the county join the Commission.

Tincher and Davis also both mentioned former Magistrate Billy Dixon, who had also lobbied for Nicholas to be included in the ARC for several years.

"Billy's a great American," Davis said of Dixon. "He's been a good friend of mine since before I was even a candidate and he's been a good friend for Nicholas County for many years."

Davis said the funds dished out by the ARC were a good use of federal dollars.

"Those funds allow counties to grow," he said while reminding those present that ARC funds could often times be used as a matching portion to other state and federal grants.

Tincher also credited Don Hassell of the Blue Grass Area Development District within lobbying strongly for Nicholas to be included in the ARC.

"When Jockey left the arena it was devastating to Nicholas County's economy," Hassell said. "It will certainly be nice to get some funding opportunities for Nicholas County that we might not otherwise get."

Everyone present agreed that joining the ARC was a good move in the right direction for the future economic growth of the county.

"The ARC equips people with a different set of economic tools than they would have if they weren't members," Davis said.

Davis joined guests in enjoying the cake and punch after the brief ceremony.

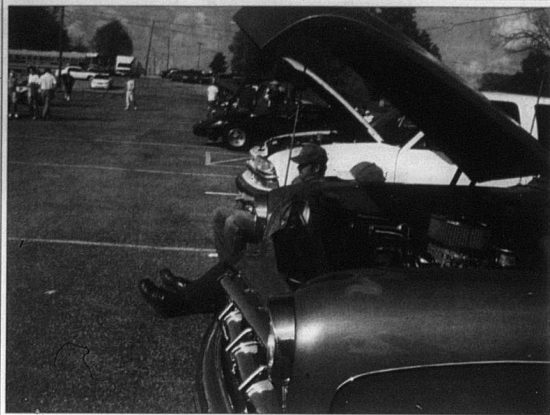
