## VETERANS DAY

### Local hero reflects on service

Years flew by in an instant as SFC Robert Douglas Cooper stood inside Surz's Flower Shop along Main Street and looked intently at the dozens of photos of young Nicholas County men who left their home, as he did and fought in World War Two.

Cooper was looking for a photo of his cousin, Sgt. Cecil Kenneth Jolly, who was killed in action on the Anzio beachhead in Italy on May 23, 1944.

"Me and Kenny enlisted the same day," Cooper said. "We were separated later."

Cooper gained fame as having captured 63 German soldiers, nearly single-handedly while serving in Italy, before perishing at Ajaccio.

Cooper was himself wounded twice during the war during his service in Europe.

Cooper was wounded on the Omaha Beach and later during the German offensive known as The Battle of the Bulge.

Cooper was wearing his uniform which was nearly completely covered with awards, medals and campaign ribbons.

"I'm the same size now as when I went into the Army

"Omaha Beach was bad, but later in the war the Battle of the Bulge was the worst. It lasted so long and that was the worst fighting I believe I saw. Hitler made a big mistake with that battle, but he did gain about 25 miles."

"I was very happy. I'd seen enough," he said. "When asked about the current war on terrorism in Iraq and Afghanistan he was quick to reply."

"I think those soldiers had it might tough. There's no safe place over there really."
