University of Kentucky Archaeology Professor William Webb identified one of the first "wolf man" skulls...

Although wolf masks are noted in many Native American cultures it is only in the Licking River Valley and the Ohio River Valley...

Identical wolf "masks" have since been found in other mounds in Kentucky and also in Ohio.

Adena people were among the first to type along the western side of the state...

Webb noted during his excavations at earlier Native American villages...

It appears as if the Native American men who wore these masks would insert the wolf jaw into the gap...

where their front teeth once were and would no doubt have the upper skull and hide of the wolf attached to the mask.

By inserting the wolf teeth and pulling the hide over their heads they took this effectively became wolf men.

The level of commitment for this activity must not be underestimated or underestimated.

Early French explorers recorded legends and folklore around various Native American cultures...

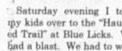
I continue to study the most fascinating Native American artifacts...
