Council members discuss Pit Bull ban

Members of the Carlisle City Council met Oct. 6 and discussed protecting citizens from vicious animals while paying particular attention to Pit Bull dogs. They also took action to help prevent local citizens from identity theft.

"There's not enough here," City Attorney Henry "Skip" Watson said while the council members discussed an ordinance from Mayaville regarding the prohibition of Pit Bull Dogs. "We have to define Pit Bull Dogs and we have to have a way to enforce this."

Watson asked the council members to examine the proposed ordinance closely and said in his opinion the statistics regarding dog attacks made it clear that Pit Bull dogs were a potential threat.

"The problem is once they latch onto you they don't want to let go," he said. Clark said Monday morning that he did not believe the council would pass anything specific regarding a ban to Pit Bull dogs.

"I think this will end up having to do more with controlling barking dogs," he said. Also according to Mayor Clark, the city and county will try to enter into a mutual agreement regarding the issue in the future.

Watson agreed saying "it would be better to get something like this passed county-wide." Councilman Eugene Hall introduced an ordinance to implement an identity theft protection program pursuant to the fair and accurate credit transaction

act of 2003. "This will be something the utility clerks will deal mostly with," Mayor Clark said.

In other business council: *Approved the payroll transfers.

*Set cleanup days for Oct. 24

*Announced that at the end of November the 9311 system will begin testing.

*Mayor Clark announced that city workers would be building a shed to cover salt for this winter's use. The construction will be funded by FEMA money the city was awarded due to damage suffered in spring and summer storms. Clark also said he was paying close attention to natural gas prices and would purchase additional gas for city citizens to keep their costs as low as possible this winter.

*Heard concerns from council members.

*Adjourned

Gavitt High School in Hammond in 1969, I joined the United States Navy. While in the Navy, I visited parts of all throughout the world and was honorably discharged in November 1972.

I made the decision to move to Kentucky after being discharged and attended the University of Kentucky, where I received my Bachelor of Arts degree in Communications in 1977. I then gained admission to the Salmon P. Chase College of Law at Northern Kentucky University and graduated in 1980. While in law school, I was on the school's law review committee and published an article concerning administrative search and seizure, which was cited by the New York Law Forum as being "worth reading."

After successfully passing the bar examination, I began practice in May 1980 in Northern Kentucky. In addition to running my practice working in the areas of family, injury and criminal law, I also functioned as a faculty member at Northern Kentucky University teaching the law of mass communications as part of their evening school from 1982 - 1984. I am admitted to the Kentucky and admitted to both the United States District Court and the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals. I have also been recognized by both the Kentucky House of Representatives and the Senate for doing work for the needy and disadvantaged.

My memberships have been numerous over the years including the Kentucky Bar Association, the Kentucky Justice Association "formerly the Kentucky Academy of Trial Attorneys" the American Bar Association, the National Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers and the National Organization of Social Security Claimants Representatives. I was voted the "Best of the Best Readers Choice Award Attorney" by the Mayvilles Independent in 2007.

On a personal level, I attend the Kentonwood Christian Church with my wife, Stephanie, and live on a small cattle farm in Mount Olivet. We have five sons, three grandsons and a new granddaughter. In Robertson County, my wife and I host a formal pre-prime dinner party for the high school, sponsor activities involving the various athletic teams at the high school, and participate as a sponsorship to the Youth in Christ Convention. These activities have allowed me to nurture my relationship with the youth of the community and through my interaction with them on a one-to-one basis, I have developed a good understanding of the problems that face our youth and believe that I can be instrumental in solving a good bit of their problems in conjunction with their parents.

I believe I would make the best choice for Family Circuit Judge because I have practiced in this area for over 28 years and demonstrated my knowledge and ability in handling all aspects of family law. Furthermore, I have the ability to listen to people and look behind the rhetoric to discover the real facts which are directly impacting upon their lives.
