The victim of Mike Haley, of recent Manning Clery, was completely destroyed due to an early morning fire Sept. 21. Mr. Haley and his two children were alerted to the flames through a smoke detector and narrowly escaped the burning structure with their lives at approximately 4 a.m. Nicholas County Fire Chief Mark Hughes and 11 firefighters contained the blaze. Hughes urges all Nicholas County residents to install smoke detectors in their homes. "They save lives," Hughes said. "I believe they saved the lives of Mr. Haley and his two children." Hughes also cautions against burning trash outdoors as dry conditions may quickly cause the flames to spread uncontrollably.

daycare centers. It is important to note that MRSA transmission can be prevented by simple measures such as hand hygiene and covering infections. The CDC offers these tips: Cover the wound. Keep wounds that are draining or have pus covered with clean, dry bandages until healed. Follow your healthcare provider's instructions on proper care of the wound. Pus from infected wounds can contain staph, including MRSA, so keeping the infection covered will help prevent the spread to others. Bandages and tape can be discarded with the regular trash. Clean your hands frequently. You, your family, and others in close contact should wash their hands frequently with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer, especially after changing the bandage or touching the infected wound. Do not share personal items. Avoid sharing personal items, such as towels, washcloths, razors, clothing, or uniforms, that may have had contact with the infected wound or bandage. Wash sheets, towels, and clothes that become soiled with water and laundry detergent. Use a dryer to dry clothes completely.

Free Hunters Education

from the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources

A free Kentucky Hunter Education course is scheduled for September 25 & 26, 2008, from 6:00 PM until 9:00 PM and September 27, 2008 from 9:00 AM until 12:00 PM at the Nicholas County Health Department, 2320 Concrete Rd., Carlisle. Range Work will be held following the last classroom session on Saturday September 27th at a site to be announced.

The ten-hour course, sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, the Nicholas County Wildlife Club, and Bourbon and Nicholas County 4-H Shooting Sports includes classroom instruction in hunter ethics, wildlife identification, outdoor survival, first aid, firearms, bow hunting and ammunition. The last session includes actual range firing and an examination.

Upon successful completion of the course, a graduate card is issued which is valid in any state, province or territory where such certification is required. Attendance at all sessions is required for certification, unless an alternative method is utilized.

Persons born on or after January 1, 1975, shall carry a valid hunter education course completion card while hunting. Kentucky accepts certification from any state, province or country whose course meets the standards established by the International Hunter Education Association (IHEA). A bow hunter not in possession of a firearm may carry a hunter education or a bow hunter education course completion card from any state, province or country. The course shall meet the standards established by the IHEA. This certification is in addition to appropriate license and permit requirements. Children are not required to complete the course until they turn 12 year old. Children must be 9 years old to take the test. For license requirements check the Kentucky Hunting & Trapping Guide or online at fw.ky.gov.
