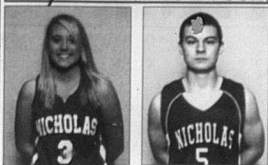

LANCASTER - The Nicholas County Lady Jackets were limited to eight or fewer points in each of the first three quarters Saturday in a road game versus Garrard County, Nicholas County trailed at the end of each quarter in the Valentine's Day contest. Host Garrard County established a double-digit lead for good in the second quarter, outscoring the Lady Jackets 24-8. Garrard County posted the win, defeating Nicholas County 62-31.

Lady Jackets fall to Harrison in district matchup

Nicholas County enjoyed its share of leads before falling for the second straight game. Harrison County made the most of a strong fourth quarter, defeating the Lady Jackets 47-40.

Shelby Sosby was the lone reach double figure. Sosby led the Lady Jackets with 14 points. Beesa Martin followed with five points for the Lady Jackets. Shelby Wade added four points for Nicholas County. The Lady Jackets dropped 7-14 following the loss. Bretz helps lead Union past Covenant

BARBOURVILLE - A trio of Union College players scored in double-digits as the Bulldogs snapped a three-game losing streak Saturday with a convincing 94-70 win over Covenant (Ga.) College. The Bulldogs improved to 9-7 in conference play and 9-7 their overall record to 13-18. The win was the first in the month of February for Union. Union started the game on a 4-0 run over the first three minutes and Covenant's first basket came 3:22 into the game. The Bulldogs scored five straight points before another Covenant, 3-point. Union would extend its lead out to within three points. However the Bulldogs eventually built a double-digit lead, 25-13, behind a Kearney.

Demus (Lexington) posted 14 points. Antonio Murry (Anstoch, Tenn.) gathered seven rebounds, and dished out six assists. Michael Hester (Independence) also was credited with six assists. The Bulldogs contributed 24 assists, the fifth time this season. Union has 20 or more assists. From the field, Union went 33-for-58 (56.9 percent) while Covenant was 25-for-56 (44.6 percent). Of Union's 33 baskets, a dozen were from behind the 3-point line, a season best for the Bulldogs. Deven Eldridge nearly scored half of Covenant's points as he had 11. Reed Crosser chipped in 14 points. Union has scored 90 or more points three times this year and two were against Covenant. Covenant slipped to 1-15 in the AAC with a 2-25 overall record. The Bulldogs swept the season series over the Covenant. Union took a 47-32 lead into the half-time break. The 15-point advantage matches Union's largest half-time lead this season. The 47 Bulldogs points is also the most in the final margin. The second half started with Union pushing the lead to 55-36 only to see Covenant snare with eight straight points. The advantage never slipped below double-digits down the stretch and the largest lead of the

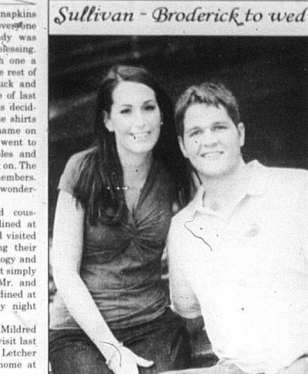
Kentucky Hunter Education Course

A New Kentucky Hunter Education course will be held during the last classroom session on Saturday March 7th & 8, 2009, from 6:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. and March 7, 2009 from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 p.m., in the Nicholas County Health Department, 2220 Concrete Road, Carlisle, Ky. The course, sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, the Nicholas County Wildlife Club, and Bourbon and Nicholas County 4-H Shooting Sports, includes classroom instruction in hunter ethics, wildlife identification, outdoor survival, first aid, firearms, bow hunting and ammunition. The last session includes actual range firing and a test. Upon successful completion of the course, a course completion card is issued which is valid in any state, province or territory where such certification is required. Attendance at all sessions is required for certification, unless an alternative method is utilized. All students must be at least nine years old to take the written examination and receive a course completion card.
