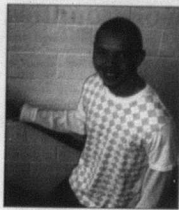

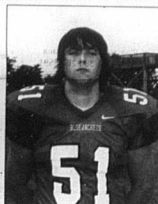

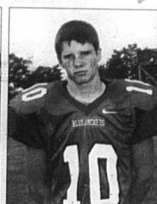

Campbellsville ends Bluejackets' season in playoffs

Nicholas County's return trip to the KHSAA Class A football playoffs did not go as well as they were any better than its last one. The Bluejackets, which last participated in the 2007 playoffs when they fell on the road to state power Lexington Christian 62-19, could not contain the athleticism of District 6 champion Campbellsville as the Eagles claimed a 47-0 first-round home victory on Friday.

It was the fifth victory in the last six games for Campbellsville and its third straight at Dave Fryar Field. They just were a quicker and faster off the ball than we were," Nicholas County coach Robert Hopkins said. "Their defensive line was able to penetrate and their speed and our offensive line wasn't able to recover. Our backs just didn't have any opportunities to work. They kept getting hit in the backfield."

Turnovers were another problem that plagued Nicholas County (4-7). Bluejackets committed four, which led to two of the first three Eagle scores. The Blue and White also had a punt blocked that was returned for a touchdown in the second half.

Campbellsville (7-4) scored on its first series on an Aaron Taylor 20-yard touchdown pass. It was the first of four touchdowns in the opening period for the hosts. After Nicholas County fumbled the ball on its second possession of the game, Thomas Downs extended the hosts' lead with a 12-yard touchdown run. out the half with the hosts' holding a 40-0 edge. Campbellsville tacked on a final touchdown in the third quarter after Brunelle scooped up the ball on a blocked punt and ran it 18 yards for an Eagle score. Brunelle then capped off the day by kicking the extra point.

Nicholas County had a chance to get on the board late in the game, but the Bluejackets were stopped four times on running plays from the 2-yard line as the Eagles preserved the shutout. The Bluejackets finished with 126 yards of total offense, nearly all of which came through their running game. Raymond Shroat led the way with three carries for 56 yards, while Caleb Pope had 10 rushes for 28 yards. Shroat also had an interception.

Nicholas County was without starting quarterback Zach Lemona for the second straight week. Geoffrey Culbertson handled the play-calling duties and finished 3-10 for seven yards. Charles Washington had one reception for 10 yards to lead the team. Defensively, Sebastian Culbertson led the squad with seven sacks and five tackles, while Ben Layne added four.

Pittman led the rushing attack with two carries for 80 yards, while Nicky Sebastian Culbertson. Yet, Hopkins is excited about the team's future. "We had a lot of young kids who got play-off experience and I hope they liked the taste (of it) and want to go back and show people we can go back and play a lot better than we did in this football game," he said.

Campbellsville advanced on to the second-round of the playoffs and will face Raceland on Friday at Anthony Kiskaden, home.
