

Mitchell commits to Kentucky Christian

Petrea Mitchell will not have to go far to continue her basketball career, but the Nicholas County senior standout will have to change her position.

Mitchell signed a National Letter-of-Intent with Kentucky Christian University of Grayson on Monday morning in a ceremony held at the Nicholas County High School Library. A 5-foot-9 center that averaged 12 points and 6.6 rebounds per game while shooting 66 percent from the field this past season for the 11-16 Lady Jackets, Mitchell will move out to the wing to play in college.

"She played post in high school, but she is too small for that position in college," KCU coach Ron Arnett said. "She has good strength to be a small forward. She can play with her back to the basket, and has good hands and footwork to be a crossover player. She won't have to guard six-foot post players, but has the size and strength to go inside, and is versatile and athletic enough to play on the wing."

"My role at KCU will be as a '3' (small forward)," Mitchell said. "So I will have to get in shape, work on my dribble and take care of the ball. I have always been a post (player), but with prac-

tice I think I can handle (the change). I am worried some. I will have to move my shooting (range) out and learn to shoot with someone in my face."

A four-year starter, Mitchell helped the LadyJackets post their most wins this past winter than at any time in the last decade.

"Petrea is very dependable and has a good work ethic," Nicholas County girls' basketball coach Jennifer Cornett said. "She has the ability to adjust. She will be behind early, because she will be playing out of position for her, but she is not the type to sit on the bench and be content. She is one of the best kids I have ever coached. She is good natured and does the right thing all the time."

Coach Cornett said the signing was bittersweet for her to witness.

"It makes me want to cry," she said. "Petrea is the kind of player and student that you hate to lose. She is a very honest, very dedicated person. She was always the first person in the gym for practice and the last to leave. She deserves to go to the next level. I'm very happy for her."

NCHS Softball Coach Barry Bretz also spoke Mitchell, who is a fierce competitor on the softball field. Bretz, a kindergarten teacher remembered Mitchell in her first days of school.

"She had a lot of character then and even more now," he said. "She has certainly grown into a fine young lady."

Mitchell chose KCU after also considering Asbury, Berea, Lindsey Wilson, Midway and Union College (Ky.).

"I like small schools and the fact that it was close to home," Mitchell said. "It is a small community and I seemed to fit in real well. I played with (KCU freshman) Brittanie Sosby in high school and I feel comfortable with her."

Kentucky Christian won its fourth consecutive National Christian College Athletic Association Division II title this past winter with a 21-7 record.

"She doesn't shy away from contact and can get to the free-throw line," Arnett said. "We have 11 kids returning and will be more guard-heavy, so it is a great time to come in as a post player. She is not ready to play college basketball right now, but she will get better. How much better is up to her. The more dedicated she is to developing, the more progress she will make. She has the ability to improve and work hard."

The Lady Knights are expected to bring in several newcomers, including local players Jessica Marshall of East Carter, Monica Stevens

of West Carter and Katie Jo Thompson of Montgomery County. The latter two are transfers.

"Coach Cornett played college basketball and is a good coach. She knows what it takes to be a college basketball player and has instilled that in her kids," Arnett said. "We are graduating five kids and four starters so it will be a rebuilding year for us. We will have a lot of young kids and the competition will be wide open. There will be lots of opportunities. I don't usually start freshmen, but you never know."

"She will need to develop a 10-12-foot jumper and learn to play facing the basket, but she has no trouble getting to

the basket (off the dribble) from 10-12 feet," Cornett said.

This past season Mitchell was named third-team all-region. As a junior she was an honorable mention all-region choice, an All-Bluegrass Conference selection and was recognized on the 10th Region All "A" Tournament team. In addition in 2006-07, she earned 10th Region Freshman All-Tournament team honors. For her career she averaged 7.6 points and 5.9 rebounds per game, while shooting 44.8 percent from the field.

Mitchell also has been a member of the Lady Jacket softball team for the past four seasons. Although she has

had a successful softball career, Mitchell wanted to focus on playing just basketball in college.

"I didn't want to get hurt and not be able to play basketball," she said of her decision to stick with one sport.

Academically, Mitchell plans on majoring in elementary education.

"Coach Arnett makes sure that school comes first and that we focus on getting through college and succeeding (academically)," Mitchell said.

Mitchell is the daughter of Darvin and Melissa Mitchell of Carlisle.

Campbell looks to be two-sport star at Berea

Signs Letter-of-Intent to play baseball for the Mountaineers

Kyle Campbell took the first step toward becoming a two-sport athlete in college on Friday when the Nicholas County senior signed a National Letter-of-Intent to play baseball at Berea College in a ceremony held in the library of his high school.

Campbell, who set the school single-season batting average record last year at Nicholas County, also is interested in playing basketball for the Mountaineers, but the team is in the process of looking for a new head coach. Once that individual is hired, Campbell would like to walk on to the squad.

"Berea is a small community with nice facilities. It

was quiet there when I went to visit," Campbell said. "I wanted somewhere with a rich baseball tradition and Berea has that and I want to continue that. I got the clearance from (baseball) coach (Ryan) Hess to play basketball there, too. I just want to see who's going to be the coach and then try to walk on."

A six-year member of the Nicholas County varsity baseball team, Campbell has been a starter at short-stop and pitcher for the Blue Jackets since his freshman season.

"He hit over .500 last year, but as a senior he doesn't see the same pitches he did as a junior," Nicholas County coach Travis Sims said. "But when he gets them, he's got to get hits.

Early on he was getting hits, but his production is not the same this year."

Campbell received honorable mention all-state honors as a junior and was an All-10th Region selection, as well as earning a spot on the 10th Region All "A" Tournament team, in each of the last three years.

"The first thing I noticed about him was his athleticism," Berea's coach Hess said. "Berea is real good about making sure that a student fits in with us academically first, and Kyle

Carlisle has been blessed with many heroes throughout its noteworthy history and the newest hometown hero is six-year-old Christopher Rathbone of 495 East Main Street.

Young Mr. Rathbone awoke early Tuesday morning at approximately 5:45 a.m., to notice that his aunt, Jennifer Rathbone, was acting strangely in her sleep; not breathing correctly and having seizures.

Without hesitation,

Christopher sprang into action. He awoke his father and together they rolled Jennifer onto her side to help her breathing and immediately awoke the rest of the family, according to Christopher's grandfather.

"We called 911 immediately," said John Rathbone, Christopher's grandfather. "I think it's amazing that Christopher acted so quickly and helped save his aunt."

According to John Rathbone, Jennifer Rathbone remains hospitalized in Bourbon Community Hospital and has suffered a second seizure.

"This has never hap-

pened to her before," Rathbone said. "We're very concerned for her but we're also extremely proud of Christopher for his quick actions. He acted like he didn't do anything special but we're proud of him."

Christopher, a student at Nicholas County Elementary, is the son of Jason Rathbone and Donna Williams.

THE PAINT CREEK INCIDENT



Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

"My father, Michael Cassidy was in 43 battles, 21 with the British and 22 with the Indians."

Michael Cassidy Jr., interview, Draper Manuscripts, volume 2 BB pages 49-51.

April 4, 1793, along Paint Creek, near the present-day site of Bainbridge, Ohio.

The lone Shawnee female walked toward the blazing fire and cupped her hands against her eyes, peering intently out into the darkness where 33 Kentucky frontiersmen lay in ambush.

She patted the camp dog on the head, but the mongrel continued to bark loudly at the smell of danger and fear, coming from the hidden militia soldiers.

Captain James Ward raised his flintlock rifle to his cheek, squinted in the darkness down the long barrel until his sights were on the figure and began

to gently squeeze the trigger.

He paused slightly when he felt a hand on his shoulder.

"It's a woman, Captain," Moses Fowler, his Lieutenant, said in a tight whisper.

Captain Ward squinted, and as the figure turned he noticed the unmistakable female silhouette near the fire, "So it is Mose, so it is," Captain Ward said as he lowered his weapon.

The female returned to the shadows and lay back down when the dog quieted.

Many of the frontiersmen believed that the group they were now surrounding were part of the renegade warriors who had attacked Ralph Morgan's Station, along Slate Creek, at the beginning of April 1793, but it was, in fact, a separate group of

Shawnee warriors who had ravaged the northern stations and stole horses during a simultaneous, diversionary raid.

Captain Michael Cassidy joined Captain Simon Kenton in pursuing the group of Shawnee warriors, who were led by the Shawnee War Captain, Tecumseh, or The Crouching Panther.

Kenton divided his group of 33 men into three groups.

He led one, Captain James Ward led another and Cassidy and Capt. Isaac Baker led another.

Baker and Cassidy's men were in the process of encircling the Shawnee camp to have it completely surrounded.

Kenton's orders were firm in that under no circumstances was anyone to fire a weapon until sunrise. Baker and Cassidy had assured Kenton that he and his men would be in position by sunrise and they would join together for a three-prong attack at Kenton's sig-

nal fire.

It was still another hour or two before daylight when a Shawnee warrior arose from where he lay when the agitated camp dog began barking again.

Capt. Ward, Fowler, Captain Charles Marshall and others, held their breath as the dog continued to bark and a second, lone Shawnee figure walked from the camp directly at them.

He did not stop but continued walking deliberately at them.

12 rifles were raised and pointed in the direction of the lone figure, and as one the men realized their ambush would soon be blown wide open.

The rifles fired as one and the single figure fell face-first, into the fire.

Soon the Shawnee camp erupted in shouts and a flurry of activity.

Tecumseh rallied his warriors and they broke the scattered defenses of the frontiersmen.

Jacob Jones was killed in the confusion that followed.

At daylight the frontiersmen gathered at the now-empty camp.

The single figure still lay where he fell and upon inspection, it was noted that he was a renegade white man.

The renegade had a single bullet wound and had been struck in the heart.

Moses Fowler told Captain Ward to claim his scalp but Ward was reluctant.

"How can you be sure it was my bullet that took him when a dozen rifles fired?" Ward asked, but when all the men with him agreed that the shot was surely made by Ward, he took the scalp.

And therein lay the hook, dear reader, as the storytellers of old would say.

In 1758 John Ward was taken prisoner from the Ward family home by raiding Shawnee warriors when he was only three-years old.

He was adopted into the tribe and re-

named White Wolf.

And it was he that fell in the fire near the banks of Paint Creek that April morning in 1793, dead and scalped at the hand of his very own brother.

It would be several years before Captain James Ward learned of the identity of the man he killed.

Further, he would also learn that the young female he aimed his rifle at during the darkness was the daughter of White Wolf and therefore his niece.

Kenton, Cassidy, Ward and Tecumseh, would meet again dear reader, and if the Good Lord is willing, we will join them too.

The weather has just been beautiful! I'm sure you all are itching to get out on the trails. Don't forget to schedule your horses for their vaccinations and remember your Coggins paperwork.

You might even want to have a three-ring binder that you put all your Coggins and vaccination paperwork in so that it is easy to take along when you are on the road. This works great for me! If I didn't do the binder, believe me you can ask my dear husband and daughter, I'd lay the Coggins somewhere. You know, out of place - out of mind, and the next thing I know is that I

have forgotten where I put it. Nothing can get my feathers ruffled faster than having to look for something I know I put in a safe place but can't remember where that safe place is. (I'm sure that I'm not the only one out there!)

Worse yet, how about almost getting to your destination and realizing you left the paperwork behind. Oh yes, this happened when I traveled to Ohio for the Equine Affaire and yes, we had them in a notebook. The next phase to make this process work is you just have to remember the notebook. If you can remember the notebook, then you have ALL your papers in

one place and ready to go when you are. In fact, I leave the notebook in my trailer because without my trailer, I won't be taking my horse anywhere!

As far as vaccinations go, these are the vaccinations that I like to see my horses receive: botulism (because I feed hay and grain), rabies (small price to pay for prevention of having your horse put down - no cure), 5 way and West Nile. If you do a lot of showing, you might consider Potomac.

Coming up, the Rocky Mountain Horse Association is having their 1st rated trail obstacle on Saturday, May 8th at 10 am at Shaker Village in

Harrodsburg. You are guaranteed to have a great time not only meeting new people and making new friends but also attempting to maneuver five (5) obstacles all the while enjoying the trails with your favorite horse and trail buddies.

You can check out the obstacles that you may encounter by simply going to the www.rmha.com website, click on events and select rated trail obstacles and you will find a listing of all the obstacles. Enjoy!

Don't forget your paperwork and remember your camera!

Cameras ~ aren't they just great nowadays! You can do so many things with

your pictures with the use of your camera memory card, computer and colored printer; cards, stationary, labels, posters, etc. I have fun making my own custom "horsey" items. The people that receive these items simply enjoy and love them as well. It just makes it a little more personal and gives me the opportunity to show-off my horses as well!

Federal Funds awarded

Nicholas County has been chosen to receive \$5,637.00 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the county.

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the Federal emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and consists of representatives from the Salvation Army, American Red Cross, United Jewish Communities, Catholic Charities, USA, National council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. and United Way of America which will provide the administrative staff function as fiscal agent. The Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high need areas around the country.

A Local Board made up of Community Action Council, Nicholas County Judge Executive, Nicholas County Senior Citizens, Nicholas County Ministerial Association, Department for Community Based services, Shrine of Our Lady Guadalupe, Salvation Army and other Citizens will determine how the funds awarded to Nicholas County are to be distributed amount the emergency food and

shelter programs run by local service organizations in the area. The Local Board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local organizations chosen to receive funds must: 1. be private voluntary nonprofits or units of government 2) have an accounting system. 3. practice nondiscrimination 4. have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, and 5) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying organizations are urged to apply. Nicholas County has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously with Community Action Council participating. These agencies were responsible for providing energy and housing assistance.

Public or private voluntary organizations interested in applying for Emergency Food and Shelter Program funds must contact Angie Schalch for an application at 859-289-7172. The deadline for applications is May 6, 2010.

In 2010 our communities have a deadly enemy lurking among us creating havoc in many of our families: prescription drug abuse. This has been the number one issue in EVERY city and town that I have visited. I don't know of anyone that doesn't know someone that has been affected by this growing problem.

This MUST become our first item of business. My plan will not end the drug problems, but it will slow them down dramatically.

- Stop EBT card abuse. Stores caught exchanging cash on returns purchased on EBT cards should be forbidden from accepting them.
- EBT card users should be subject to random drug testing just as the majority of workers that pay the taxes supporting them.
- Give our police officers what is needed to combat this problem, i.e. increased numbers.
- Control pharmaceutical companies' lobbying influence and hold them accountable when proven negligent.
- Not honoring out of state prescriptions; any controlled drug entering the state must be registered with the sheriff.
- Hold out of state doctors liable and subpoena them to Kentucky when not following national prescription guidelines.
- Make Sudafed a prescription only drug.

Our enemy may not be destroyed with this legislation, but its "will to fight" will be greatly diminished. We must be vigilant in this endeavor!

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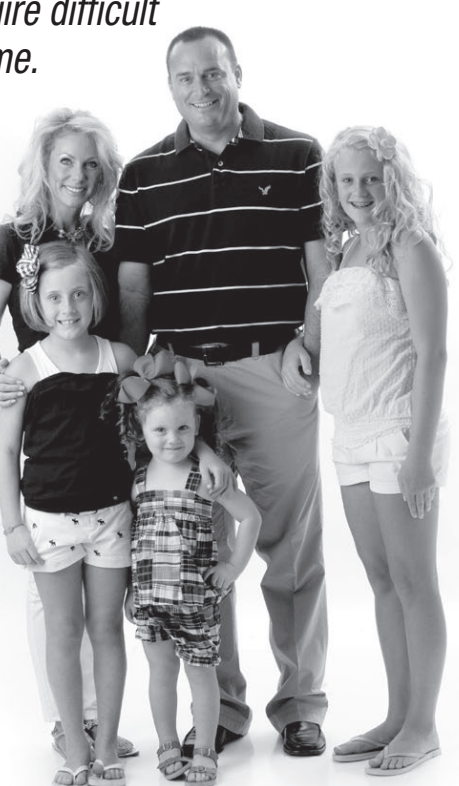

Gatewood Galbraith comments on pending drug trial

A western Fleming County couple, who live very near to the Nicholas County border, and who are facing local and federal drug charges will have a two-day trial in Fleming Circuit Court this week.

Robert and Teresa Silvey, of Fairview, will go to trial on "enhanced" charges of trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree, trafficking

in a controlled substance, second degree, trafficking in a controlled substance, third degree, trafficking in marijuana, eight ounces to five pounds and cultivation of marijuana more than five plants.

Attorney Gatewood Galbraith, a Nicholas County native, who represents the Silveys, commented briefly on the past and pending court appearances and the charges in general against his clients.

"Even your garbage isn't safe anymore,"

Galbraith said with a tone mingled with slight disgust and humor while commenting.

The case against the Silveys began, according to court documents, when an "anonymous caller" contacted members of the Buffalo Trace Narcotics Task Force (BTNTF) with information about hearing automatic weapons fire and rumors of "someone" on US 68 growing and selling marijuana.

As a result of that tip, during Oct. 2008, agents with BTNTF searched through the Silvey's garbage bags along US 68, discovered a small amount of marijuana, described as characteristic of marijuana discarded from plants being "groomed" or grown. They also found a pharmacy receipt with the name Teresa Silvey on it.

A search warrant was issued on that information and agents with BTNTF, Fleming County Sheriff Scotty Royse and several deputies, along with Kentucky State Police Officers conducted a search, with assistance from Mason County Sheriff Pat Boggs.

During the search several weapons, (including one automatic .45 caliber machine gun), an alleged marijuana grow room with nine plants and three pounds of marijuana was discovered.

Besides weapons and marijuana, police also found a variety of pills, including 237 hydrocodone pills, 662 valiums, 195 alprazolam (xanax) and 222 clonazepam.

Federal charges were lodged against the Silveys along with state charges. Galbraith filed two motions to suppress against the charges and Senior Judge Karl Foster "denied" those motions.

Galbraith is appealing that decision on behalf of the Silveys.

He said he is also ready to go to court in Fleming County.

"There is absolutely no record or evidence that I am aware of that these people had any transactions with anyone," he said. "Robert Silvey is a Vietnam veteran who was honorably discharged and is permanently disabled. He admitted growing marijuana for his own use, they say they found

eight or nine plants but I'm not sure they found that many."

Galbraith commented additionally on the "trash search" conducted by BTNTF agents.

"I just wonder how many garbage bags along US 68 they dug through before they eventually found something they were looking for? If an anonymous tip can lead officers of the law digging through someone's garbage at will, well, I believe that's going just a little too far."

Galbraith said he wouldn't characterize the present trend of activity as being that which might

lead to a "Police State" but did say that, "Our loss of privacy is accelerated and the rights of people to invade our privacy has increased."

He also commented on a prior felony conviction Robert Silvey has and how that has effected the weapons charges.

"My client had a felony conviction over 25 years ago," Galbraith said. "The were no weapons that played any part in any drug transactions because there were no drug transaction."

The two-day trial of Robert and Teresa Silvey will be in Fleming Circuit Court on April 27 and 28.

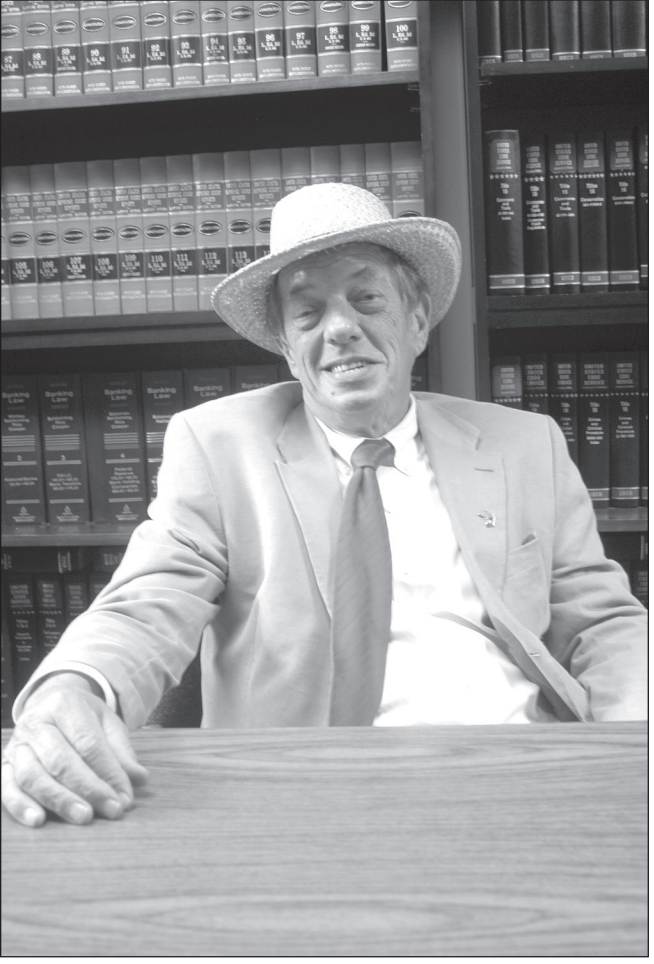

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

Two people were killed and a third person was critically injured following a two-vehicle accident along Interstate 64 in Bath County Sunday.

Tessa Harris, 27, of Ashland, was killed when the 2004 Nissan Maxima she was driving crossed the

centerline and collided with an oncoming vehicle, according to a Kentucky State Press Release issued following the accident.

Bath County Coroner Robert Powell pronounced Harris dead at the scene immediately following the accident, which occurred at approximately 11 a.m., according to police.

The accident occurred near the 119 Mile Marker

on the eastbound lane of Interstate 64.

After crossing the centerline, the Harris vehicle struck a 1999 Ford Taurus, driven by James Samples, 45, of Lexington. Debbie Samples, 45, also of Lexington was a passenger in the Samples vehicle.

James and Debbie Samples were treated at the scene by members of the Bath County EMS and

transported by air to the University of Kentucky Medical Center, where Debbie Samples was pronounced dead upon arrival by medical center staff, according to the KSP News Release.

James Samples remains listed in serious condition at the University of Kentucky Medical Center following the accident.

There were no passengers

in the Harris vehicle. All three accident-victims were wearing seat belts.

Veteran Kentucky State Police Trooper Hector Alcalá continues to investigate the accident. He was assisted at the scene, and continues to be assisted, by KSP Troopers Keith Howard and Scott Ferrell, Vehicle Enforcement Officer Jason Townsend, Bath County Sheriff Tuffy Snedegar

and staff and members of the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office.

According to the KSP News Release, "driver impairment appears to be a factor at this time."

The release also states that Harris was "traveling westbound on I-64 at a high rate of speed, crossed the median and struck (the Samples vehicle) head on in the east bound lane."

Fatality Statistics

Preliminary statistics* indicate that nine people died in eight separate crashes on Kentucky roadways from Monday, April 19 through Sunday, April 25, 2010.

All of the crashes involved motor vehicles and

six of those victims were not wearing seat belts. Single-fatality crashes occurred in Graves, Greenup, Jefferson, Laurel, Morgan, Webster and Woodford counties. The suspected use of alcohol was a factor in the Morgan and Webster

County crashes.

One double-fatality crash occurred in Bath County and both victims were wearing seat belts.

Through April 25, preliminary statistics* indicate that 203 people have lost their lives on Kentucky roadways during 2010. This is 43 less fatalities than reported for the same time period in

2009. There were 173 motor vehicle fatalities and 89 of those victims were not wearing seat belts. Thirty of those crashes involved a commercial motor vehicle. Nineteen fatal crashes involved a pedestrian and 1 involved a scooter. Seven crashes involved a motorcycle and three of those victims were not wearing helmets. Two crashes in-

involved an ATV and one victim was not wearing a helmet. A total of 43 fatalities have resulted from crashes involving the suspected use of alcohol.

Citizens can contribute to highway safety by reporting erratic drivers to the Kentucky State Police toll-free at 1-800-222-5555. Callers will remain anonymous and should give a description of the vehicle, lo-

cation, direction of travel and license number if possible.

*These statistics are still preliminary as KSP waits for all local law enforcement agencies throughout the state to report any crashes and fatalities that may have occurred in their areas. Crash data for this report is generated from the Kentucky Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS).

Water - Essential for Life

This report is designed to inform the public about the quality of water and services provided on a daily basis. Our commitment is to provide our customers with a safe, clean, and reliable supply of drinking water. We want to assure that we will continue to monitor, improve, and protect the water system and deliver a high quality product. Water is the most indispensable product in every home and we ask everyone to be conservative and help us in our efforts to protect the water source and the water system.

We purchase water from the Western Fleming Water District (WFWD) which purchases from Greater Fleming Regional Water Commission (GRFWC). The sources of water is surface water from the Licking River and Ohio River, respectively. We also purchase our water wholesale from the City of Carlisle and their water source is surface water from the Licking River to the Carlisle Lake. The susceptibility of these sources to contamination is moderate for WFWD and GRFWC Carlisle. The area around the river's are mostly residential but also contains some agricultural, recreational, and light industry activities. Activities and land use within the watershed can pose potential risks to your drinking water. The completed source water assessments for WFWD and GRFWC can be reviewed at the Buffalo Trace Area Development District, and Carlisle's has been completed and is contained in the Bath County Water Supply Plan.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects may be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and may pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include: Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, (sewage plants, septic systems, livestock operations, or wildlife). Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, (naturally occurring or from stormwater runoff, wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming). Pesticides and herbicides, (stormwater runoff, agriculture or residential uses). Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, (by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, or from gas stations, stormwater runoff, or septic systems). Radioactive contaminants, (naturally occurring or from oil and gas production or mining activities). In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water to provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Some or all of these definitions may be found in this report:

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - the level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Below Detection Levels (BDL) - laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.

Not Applicable (N/A) - does not apply.

Parts per million (ppm) - or milligrams per liter, (mg/l). One part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) - or micrograms per liter, (µg/L). One part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.

Parts per trillion (ppt) - one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000,000 years or one penny in \$10,000,000,000,000.

Parts per quadrillion (ppq) - one part per quadrillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000,000,000 years or one penny in \$10,000,000,000,000,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) - a measure of the radioactivity in water.

Millirems per year (mrem/yr) - a measure of radiation absorbed by the body.

Million Fibers per Liter (MFL) - a measure of the presence of asbestos fibers that are longer than 10 micrometers.

Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) - a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity has no health effects. However, turbidity can provide a medium for microbial growth. Turbidity is monitored because it is a good indicator of the effectiveness of the filtration system.

Variance & Exemptions (V&E) - State or EPA permission not to meet an MCL or a treatment technique under certain conditions.

Action Level (AL) - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system shall follow.

Treatment Technique (TT) - a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

The City of Carlisle received a notice of violation for exceeding the MCL in reference to the Total Trihalomethanes and Haloacetic acids parameter during the 3rd and 4th quarters of 2009 for having a quarter average of 81. The standard for Total Trihalomethanes is .080 mg/l and the standard for Haloacetic acids is .060 mg/l. In an effort to resolve this issue numerous operational procedures are being attempted including, but not limited to, reducing disinfectant to the lowest level possible without compromising health and safety, increasing the addition of activated carbon, adjust the tank levels, more frequent flushing to solve the problem. Some people who drink water containing Trihalomethanes in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or Central Nervous System and have an increased risk of getting cancer. Some people who drink water containing Haloacetic Acids in excess of the MCL over many years may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

Greater Fleming County Regional Water Commission received a violation in nitrate in 2008. They have corrected the problem this year. Nitrate in drinking water at levels above 10ppm is a health risk for infants of less than six months of age. High nitrate levels in drinking water can cause blue baby syndrome. Nitrate levels may rise quickly for short periods of time because of rainfall or agricultural activity, if you are caring for an infant you should ask advice from your health care provider.

Last year on or CCR violation of Carlisle TTHM it was published with the health effects language of Haloacetic acids instead of TTHM'S language. The language should have been some people who drink water containing trihalomethanes in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys or central nervous systems and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. During August 2009 we did not complete all monitoring or testing for coliform bacteria and therefore cannot be sure of the Quality of our drinking water. All samples were taken and tested; But were not reported to Division of Water by September 1, 2009.

We also had a violation of Total Coliform in November 2009, because 50% of our samples tested positive. We did follow up testing and all results were negative. We have properly trained our Operators on sampling.

This is not an emergency. If it had been you would have been notified immediately. Coliform bacteria are generally not harmful themselves. Coliforms are bacteria which are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially harmful, bacteria may be present. Coliforms were found in more samples than allowed and this was a warning of potential problems.

Western Fleming received a monitoring violation for VOC's in Jan. - Dec. 2009. The lab failed to run the tests at that time period. We have since got back on schedule.

A general surgeon is a specialist prepared to manage a broad spectrum of surgical conditions affecting almost any area of the body. The surgeon establishes the diagnosis and provides the preoperative, operative and post-operative care to surgical patients and is usually responsible for the comprehensive management of the trauma victim and the critically ill.

Q: What is a Hernia and how do you treat it?


A: A hernia, or "rupture" is a weakness or defect in the wall of the abdomen. This weakness may be present at birth, or, it can be caused by the wear and tear of daily living. If left untreated, a hernia can get worse with time and physical stress.

A weak area in the abdominal wall allows the contents of the abdomen to push outward. This often causes a noticeable bulge under the skin. The bulge may get bigger when you stand and go away when you lie down. You may also feel pressure or discomfort when lifting, coughing, urinating, or doing other activities.

Types of Hernias - The type of hernia you have depends on its location. Most hernias form in the groin at or near the internal ring. This is the entrance to a canal between the abdomen and groin. Hernias can also occur in the abdomen, thigh, or genitals.

- An **incisional hernia** occurs at the site of a previous surgical incision.
- An **umbilical hernia** occurs at the navel.
- An **indirect inguinal hernia** occurs in the groin at the internal ring.
- A **direct inguinal hernia** occurs in the groin near the internal ring.
- A **femoral hernia** occurs just below the groin.
- An **epigastric hernia** occurs in the upper abdomen at the midline.

A hernia will not heal on its own. Surgery is needed to repair the defect in the abdominal wall. If not treated, a hernia can get larger. It can also lead to serious medical complications. The good news is that hernia surgery can be done quickly and safely. In most cases, you can go home the same day as your surgery.

McKenzie indicted

Members of the Nicholas County Grand Jury returned a single indictment on April 19.

Tony McKenzie, 30, was indicted on the charges of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence, fourth offense; and persistent felony offender, second degree.

According to the indictment issued against McKenzie, members of the grand jury allege that McKenzie committed the offense of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence, fourth offense, on Feb. 5.

Members of the grand jury also allege that McKenzie is a persistent felony offender, second degree, because prior to the 19th day of April, 2010, he had attained twenty-one years of age, had been convicted of a felony, was over the age of eighteen years when he committed that felony, had completed service of the sentence imposed on the previous felony conviction within five (5) years prior to the date of commission of the felony for which he now stands charged, and has not received a pardon for that felony conviction.

Carlisle Police Officer Sgt. Darrell Layne testified

to members of the grand jury just prior to the issuance of the indictments against McKenzie.

An indictment is not to be considered an indication of guilt, but

is merely a procedural step in the judicial system, which moves a case to the circuit court level. All persons are innocent until proven guilty or admitting guilt.

Derrick Millar takes plea deal

Former UK Basketball star Derrick George Millar (Miller), 42, was scheduled to have a jury trial in Fleming Circuit Court on April 26 for two counts of theft by deception, but a plea deal was reached according to Millar's attorney, Honorable Christopher Hunt, on Friday. Members of an Oct. Fleming County Grand indicted Millar charges of theft by deception, after he allegedly accepted money and promised to provide UK Basketball tickets to two Fleming County residents. He never made good on that promise. Hunt says his client is looking forward to an opportunity to reimburse those he took money from. "We've reached a deal with the Commonwealth's Attorneys Office for three years," Hunt said. "With sentencing to run concurrent with charges elsewhere. Derrick wants to get his life back together and pay this money back." Millar is currently incarcerated in the Clark County Jail, according to Hunt, and has pled guilty to charges similar to those lodged against him in Fleming County. Millar is scheduled to be sentenced in Fayette County soon for eight felony charges of theft by deception and has accepted plea deals in several other counties where similar charges against him have been filed. Millar had entered guilty pleas earlier in Fleming Circuit Court, but later withdrew his pleas.

"We are hopeful that Judge (Stockton) Wood will grant Derrick probation," Hunt said. "Derrick sees light at the end of the tunnel and he very much wants to make full restitution to everyone and get his life back together."

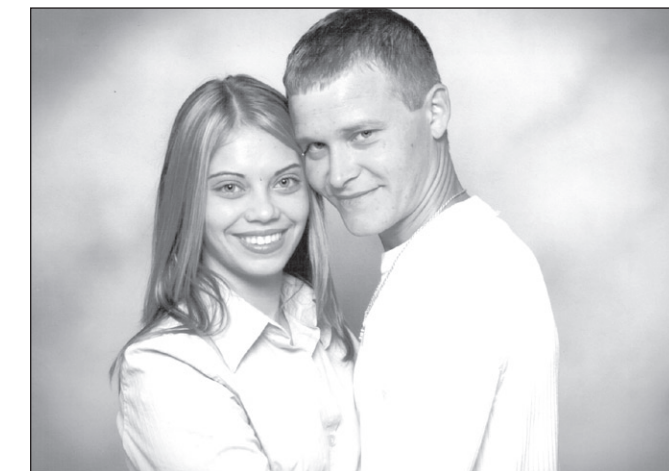

does that. "We have made a transition in our program recently. We are looking for two-way guys, someone who can help us in more than one dimension. Kyle can pitch and can swing the bat," he continued. "Whether he develops as a third baseman or second baseman or as a pitcher, we'll see how his game transitions."

In 2009, the Mountaineers finished 15-28 overall and 3-13 in the NAIA's Kentucky Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. The club has already surpassed those marks this season, sitting at 16-24 overall and 11-9 in the KIAC as of Apr. 25.

Campbell is Hess' eighth signee for 2011. Hess would like to have 10 commitments in this year's class. The Mountaineers will graduate only one senior this season, but be senior heavy next spring.

"We use the fall season to determine our lineup and see how the guys compete against each other," Hess said. "He will probably pitch one day, (serve as a) DH (designated hitter) some and play in the field, and see how he transitions."

If he does well, he will get playing time early (his freshman season)."

Campbell chose Berea after considering Kentucky Christian, Pikeville and Campbellsville, and said that Berea seemed the most interested in him.

"I looked for somewhere where I could play baseball," he said. "I want to get settled in work hard, get a spot and then get some playing time. All the guys on the team treated me real well when I visited and they wanted me to be part of the team. Coach and I talked baseball for about 30 minutes and I could tell he knows the game and he knows how to get the best out of his players. I'll probably start out on second or third base but I'll have an opportunity to do some pitching too."

Campbell, known across the region for his strong arm and wicked slider was quick to comment on his favorite part of the game.

"I love to hit," he said. "Whatever pitch a pitcher's got he's not going to get me out. I've always been very confident about my hitting."

And that confidence is obvious to all who have ever watched the young man play.

Campbell likens himself to former Blue Jacket Daniel Brown, who played baseball at Berea in the early 90s.

"I wanted to follow in his footsteps," Campbell said.

"He has a good glove, good hands and excellent reaction time," Sims said of Campbell. "He is solid all the

way around. Not many guys can do it all. We're definitely going to miss him."

And Campbell said he was going to miss Nicholas County and praised baseball coaches Sims and Josh Earlywine.

"I have a great relationship with them both and I've known them since before I was playing Little League," Campbell said.

Campbell also expressed thanks to math teacher Melanie Sanders.

"I hated math, but she taught me real well and I love her classes and I love math now."

In basketball Campbell finished his Nicholas County career as the school's third all-time leading scorer. He also is the only Blue Jacket to ever earn first-team all-region honors for three consecutive years.

secutive years.

"Kyle is a class individual. I have gotten a chance to watch him grow throughout his career," Nicholas County boys' basketball coach Michael Cofer said. "He has been a great role model. He is committed, dedicated, the first one in and the last one out. It has been a great honor to coach him. I am glad to see him go (to Berea). It should be a great experience for him. We'll miss him, but it is always good to see good kids drive and excel like he has."

An outstanding student Campbell expects to graduate with a 4.0 GPA this spring and intends on continuing those marks in college. He plans on pursuing a degree in physical education at Berea and after graduating he would like to return to

Nicholas County and coach.

"I'm looking to go into physical education," he said.

Campbell is the son of Kevin and Linda Campbell of Carlisle.

"Dad got me started playing when I was about 5-years-old with a wiffle ball and then tee-ball, and I have to say that mom and dad have been there for me since day one. They rarely ever missed a game I've played in and that means a lot." But Campbell said it wasn't all fun and games with his parents.

"They both told me I had to do well academically if I wanted to play sports," he said. "It was important to them and later I realized how important it was for me too."

INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Nicholas County real property tax roll will be open for inspection from May 3 through May 17, 2010. Under the supervision of the PVA or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 2010 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 2010 will be due beginning November 1, 2010.

The tax roll is in the office of the Property Valuation Administrator in the courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8:30 and 4:30 (Monday -Friday) and 9:00 - 11:00 (Saturday).

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on property must first request a conference with the PVA or PVA Deputy. If the taxpayer is still aggrieved after the conference with the PVA/PVA Deputy, he/she may appeal to the county board of tax appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reason for the appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment or failing to appear before the board either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Appeals.
