Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

"Issue the order sir, and I will storm Hell."

General Anthony Wayne in response to General George Washington's order to attack Stony Pointe during the Revolutionary War

I'm fascinated with what Nicholas County native, and Civil War veteran Lt. Lot Young, used to call simply, "the vicissitudes of war." Young understood how luck and chance were often the dominant factors in surviving conflict, often trumping skill, terrain, weaponry and superior forces.

Young was one of the lucky few surviving Confederate Infantry Officers of the Kentucky Orphan Brigade, and was recognized with no small amount of adulation, for his storytelling and oratory skills, as well as his philosophical and wise counsel to his neighbors near and far, following that awful, awful war.

If you visit Lt. Young's grave in the Carlisle Cemetery, as I have often done, and you later travel a few miles toward Millersburg, you'll come upon Miller's Station Road. The road received its name due to its close proximity to two forts, or stations as they were most apt to be called, built around 1780 by two Miller brothers: Major John Miller, who built a fort one mile northeast

of Millersburg, and his brother William, who built a fort one mile farther northeast.

In 1781 a fort named Well's Station, located southwest of the Miller forts and 30 miles east of Louisville, was attacked with founding militia leader Captain Wells being killed and his son William, (a cousin to one of Simon Kenton's scouts also named William Wells) was taken prisoner.

Two young relations of Major John Miller, named Henry Miller and Christopher Miller, were taken prisoner from Kentucky at this same time and knew William Wells, or "Wild Carrot" as his Miami adoptive clan members called him.

Henry Miller and Christopher were adopted into the Shawnee, who were close relations to the Miami River clans.

Following the Blackberry Campaign of 1791 and General Arthur St. Claire's disastrous defeat, Wells and Henry Miller had left their adoptive Native American families and joined the Kentucky forces who later

served in 1793-1795 with General Anthony Wayne. Young Christopher Wells, who had been separated from his older brother Henry, had not been heard from in years.

Wells and Henry Miller joined Robert McClelland as General Wayne's favorite spies.

Simon Kenton, Michael Cassidy, Colonel William Sudduth and other men who lived in northeastern Kentucky, were also among Wayne's favorites.

In mid summer of 1794 General Wayne called upon Captain William Wells to take Henry Miller and Robert McClelland out into the forest and bring him a Native American prisoner for the purpose of interrogation.

Within a week's travel, and several miles from the military encampment, Wells, Miller and McClelland, who was the fleetest soul in Wayne's Army, happened upon a camp occupied by three native males. Captain Wells suggested that he and Miller shoot two of the warriors and McClelland could 'run down' the third.

Two shots fired simultaneously and the warrior on the left crumbled to the ground, as did the one on the right. The warrior in the middle ran into the

woods so quickly it caught them off guard, but soon Robert McClelland was chasing him through the woods as Miller and Wells reloaded and then followed.

For over a mile the warrior ran, with McClelland growing closer. Abruptly the warrior noticed he was coming to a steep bluff overlooking the Miami River

The warrior never broke stride and jumped far into the air and down several dozen feet before landing in a soft mud bank that ran along the side of the river. McClelland was soon jumping down on top of him and there the two remained in shoulder deep mud when Wells and Miller arrived.

With no small effort, McClelland and the prisoner were hauled from the mire. Captain Wells thought it prudent to clean McClelland and the prisoner before beginning the journey back to General Wayne's camp.

After the warrior was cleaned, it came as no small shock to see he was a white renegade. The renegade spoke almost no English.

In his native tongue, Henry Miller asked the prisoner if he knew of the one called "The Wild Carrot" and introduced

Captain Wells. The warrior nodded his understanding and speaking with an Algonquian dialect asked the frontiersmen if they knew Henry Miller.

"Yes" Miller replied. "We were captured together," The warrior explained. "I am his brother Christopher."

Henry Miller embraced his long-lost brother and the trip back to General Wayne's camp was a merry one. The complexity of the situation was overwhelming for all of them. Christopher Miller was 'a man in the middle' as to a great degree was Henry Miller and William Wells. Wayne greeted the prisoner cordially and soon Christopher Miller was one of Wayne's scouts serving on a special mission.

In early August he was sent alone to the village of Chief Mih-sih-kina-ahk-wa, or Chief Little Turtle as the whites called him, to discuss peace terms between the northern tribes and Wayne's Army.

Little Turtle and Blue Jacket had annihilated US forces under General Josiah Harmer and Arthur St. Clair. The Nov. 1791 defeat of St. Clair was the worst lost ever sustained by US Army forces against Native

Americans, with nearly 700 US casualties.

Christopher Miller knew many of the Native Americans on a very personal level. He explained this and his impending concerns with Captain Wells.

"I know Chief Little Turtle," he told Wells. "How can I face him?" he asked.

Wells exhaled softly, smiled and hugged Christopher Miller closely, understanding all too well his strange predicament as a man caught between two distinct, enemy cultures.

"Do you know Chief Little Turtle's sister?" Wells asked Christopher. "Do you know the one called Sweet Breeze?"

Yes," Christopher said.

"Good," Wells said as he turned and walked away. "Tell her that her husband, William Wells, misses her dearly."

Such was the complexity of the day between many families on both sides of the conflict.

They hoped peace would be struck, but it wasn't, and on August 20, 1794, the Battle of the Fallen Timbers was fought.

Perhaps we will join the Miller brothers, the Wild Carrot, Sweet Breeze and Little Turtle in future columns.

Dale Greer

Dale Greer, age 70, of Morehead, Kentucky, Morehead State University Assistant Professor of Radio-TV, Vietnam War correspondent, television reporter and news anchor, passed away Monday, July 26, 2010, at his residence.

Born March 11, 1940, in Paris, Kentucky, he was the son of George and Doris Thomas Greer. In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by two brothers, James and George Greer, and one sister, Katherine G. "Kitty" Lobo.

He is survived by his wife, Anita Louise Bivens Greer; two daughters, Beth (Donnie) Fultz and Kristi Greer of Louisville, Kentucky; one stepdaughter, Michele (Adam) Fajack of Cincinnati, Ohio; one stepson, Matt York of Texas; one brother, Joe (Patty) Greer of Shelbyville, Kentucky; five grandchildren; several nieces and nephews

Dale's career in journalism was unexpected, out of the ordinary, and gratifying. While working in his hometown as a Disc Jockey at the Paris radio station, Dale was enticed because of his voice to work as a newsman at WLAP in Lexington. There, Dale confessed that he did not know how to write to his supervisor, Nick Clooney. Dale reported, referring to Clooney, "He taught me."

Dale's move from radio to television at Louisville's NBC's affiliate WAVE occurred because his good friend from MSU and famous CBS correspondent, David Henderson, recommended Dale. During his 13 years at WAVE, Dale anchored four newscasts daily and also hosted a one-hour talk show frequented by celebrities.

His varied journalism experiences included covering the Civil Rights movement, serving as an NBC Vietnam War correspondent, interviewing notables such as John Wayne, Muhammad Ali, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Col. Harland Sanders, and covering and commentating the presidential campaigns of George Wallace, Bobby Kennedy and Ronald Regan.

Dale created, wrote and produced award-winning documentaries, commercials, industrial presentations, and nationally syndicated radio programs and appeared in many local and regional radio and television commercials. Among his unforgettable dramatic experiences were his appearances on NBC daytime dramas "Another World" and "The Doctors."

In addition to Nick Clooney, Dale recognized WAVE's famed Livingston Gilbert and NBC Washington correspondent and original "Meet the Press" moderator, Neil Boggs, as mentors and teachers.

A Morehead State University faculty member since 1982, Greer used his first-hand knowledge to inspire more than a thousand students majoring in journalism and electronic media degree programs. Broadway star Steve Kazee; NPR "Morning Edition" voice Steve Inskip; WKYT's anchor Amber Philpott; WSAZ's Meteorologist Chris Bailey; and Sportscaster Kenny Rice are among those he taught. Dale said of his students, "They're my legacy. I taught them," "Or maybe they taught me."

Dale was a dedicated columnist for The Nicholas News, The Carlisle Mercury, The Bath County News-Outlook, The Menifee County News, The Robertson County News and The Beacon of Russell/Flatwoods.

He authored four books, served on various univer-

sity committees, and participated in several community organizations. Dale took great interest in volunteering at the People's Clinic, where he served as a member of the Board of Directors, media consultant, fundraiser, and supporter of People 2 People. His humanitarian mission to Ethiopia with Dr Enawgaw Mahari and other People 2 People volunteers was especially gratifying.

Dale earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Morehead State University and was awarded an honorary Ph.D. from the University. He was a past president of the Louisville Chapter of the MSU Alumni Association, was inducted into MSU's Hall of Fame, and was the recipient of MSU's Distinguished Service Award. In 2006, he received the Student Government Association's Flying High Award," an honor which recognizes faculty and staff members who have gone above and beyond the call in their profession.

He received numerous awards for radio and television productions as well as commendations from numerous organizations for charity and civic work.

Dale served two years in the U.S. Army. He has been an Elder in the Faith Presbyterian Church since 2003.

Private services will be conducted on Monday, August 2, 2010, at the Paris Cemetery in Paris, Kentucky, with the Rev. David Chumley officiating.

Visitation will be held Friday July 30, 2010 from 5-8 PM at the funeral home.

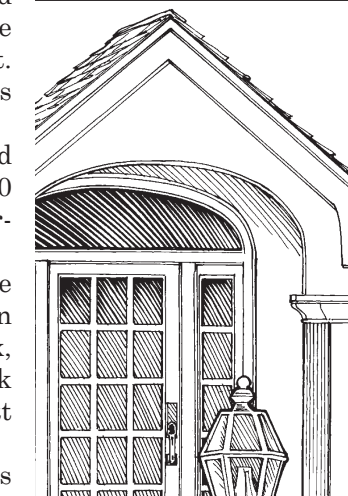
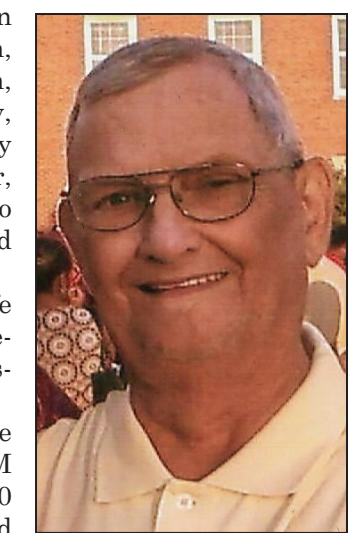

Directions/Details: Reservoir Trail (I'm assuming everyone knows how to get to Cynthia's (especially since I know) From Cynthia's: • West on 62 to Toyota • Right on Cherry Blossom, cross I-75 to end at US 25 • Left on US-25 • About 1/4 mile turn right onto Burton. (*This is a country road...very winding and skinny in places, go slow)

• Several miles down Burton, road forks ~ go Left onto Indian Creek

• Follow Indian Creek to the next intersection and go Left on to Gaines Rd.

• You will be on a winding 1-1/2 lane country road with woods and hills, drive with caution. You will cross a concrete bridge and go around a curve with yellow and black road signs pointing you to curve to the left.

• As you go around this curve, the land opens up on both sides of the road

• Park on LEFT side ONLY due to a ditch on the right side.

• This area is not marked, but the trails are and they are fabulous.

• Shoes are not required.

• During the wet season, it can be muddy and slick but it is 1500 acres of beautiful riding.

• Please make sure you have a copy of your Health Certificate and Coggins!

Another great part about this whole thing is it is close to home and gives you the opportunity of a different place to go with your horse. Easy access and even better yet - "free". Just remember to bring out what you carry in and respect the land. We should consider it a privilege to have places like this to go to spend time with our friends and our favorite equine partners!

I hope you all get the opportunity to venture out to the Reservoir and that you enjoy it as much as we all did.

I'd also like to include an interesting article that I read this week in regards to feeding your horse grass clippings. I guess I should

let you know that if our lawn was a little overgrown, I would actually take the time to rake the clippings in a pile because I could not stand to see all that sweet smelling grass just going to waste laying on our lawn while the horses were salivating at the fence line. (I just know that they were wishing they could be out there just munching away.) So...I would insist that my husband go get his tractor with the bucket and I would put the grass piles in the bucket so that we could easily dump them in the pasture. I want you all to know that I came up with my husband helping me with his tractor after I actually carried bucket after bucket down to our pasture. Whew! I do love my horses but GOLLY!

Needless to say when they would see that tractor coming with those lawn clippings, it was like Christmas time with all the excitement they showed. They all come running up to see who could get their first bite full. Of course, we all know that the alpha mare "Sweets" reminds them of who is who during all of this. They just gather around the pile and eat, look at me with those beautiful "thank you" eyes and just be as happy as horses can be. So...when I read this article, it did me some things to think about.

This article can be found on www.usef.org - Piles of Grass Clippings are Not Safe to Feed to Horses - Release date: July 22, 2010 by Dr. Juliet Getty. Here is what it read:

"Are you tempted to cut your grass, rake

it into soft, fragrant, tasty piles of clippings for your horse to nibble? According to equine nutrition expert Dr. Juliet Getty, this should be the last thing you encourage your horse to eat. It has to do with that extra step: raking. Grass clippings that stay on the pasture after mowing, where they can dry in small amounts, are generally not a problem. But never gather them into piles to feed them to your horse. It's partly because clippings are too easy to over-consume, and eating large amounts at one time can lead to excess fermentation in the hind

gut, potentially causing colic and laminitis. Piles of clippings can rapidly invite mold to form (especially prevalent in hot, humid environments), which can lead to colic. Finally, because there is no air inside a dense pile, botulism can develop, which turns this "treat" absolutely deadly." So...I guess this sort of means "killing them with kindness". It certainly made me reconsider what I thought was a thoughtful thing to maybe not such a good idea. Go figure! You can take from this article what you will, it certainly did take me by surprise.

Infant murder trial to begin next week

A Fleming County couple charged with abusing and then murdering their infant child are in the midst of a trial this week in Fleming County.

Terry Jo Buchanan, 32, and Jessica Marie Allen, 23, both of the western Fleming Community of Ewing are charged with murder and abuse, 1st degree, in a trial which began Monday.

Kentucky State Police Detective Virgil Rucker has been leading the death investigation of Kaylee Buchanan, the three-month old infant of Buchanan's and Allen who died July 24, 2008 at the University of Kentucky Medical Center. "Kaylee was killed by her

parents," Commonwealth Attorney Kathryn Hendrickson told jurors Tuesday morning as she pointed to the couple. "Those two people killed her."

Buchanan and Allen were indicted by a Fleming County Grand Jury Jan. 16, 2009 on the charges of murder and criminal abuse, first degree.

Hendrickson filed 'Bill of Particulars' in the case several months ago, which stated that Kaylee Jo Buchanan's right femur and fibula were broken on or about July 9-13, 2009 and Buchanan and Allen allegedly caused the child's injuries and abused their daughter, or aided and assisted one another in abusing their daughter, according to court documents.

The injuries sustained by Kaylee Jo Buchanan led to the criminal abuse and murder charges.

Count two of the 'Bill of Particulars' which follows much of the same language of the indictments against the couple, states that Buchanan and Allen committed murder when they struck or aided and abetted one another to strike Kaylee Buchanan's head one or more times, which resulted in her death.

Hendrickson spoke forcefully during her opening arguments, telling jurors she did not know if it was Buchanan or Allen that caused the fatal blow to Kaylee Jo Buchanan's head, which resulted in her death.

"They're protecting each other," Hendrickson said.

"Neither one of them protected Kaylee."

Bob Gastine, attorney for Allen painted a much different picture than Hendrickson, speaking of a history of a loving family and refuting allegations of Kaylee Buchanan having a fractured leg.

"That alleged injury did not exist," he told a quieted jury. "They jumped to the wrong conclusion."

Gastine said the Commonwealth had based their conclusion on something "other than fact." Gastine asked members of the jury to find a verdict of innocent.

Brian Hewitt, attorney for Terry Buchanan also asked the jurors to listen closely to the testimony that would follow

Hewitt said a misdiagnosis at UK Medical Center concerning a perceived broken leg of the infant "triggered" a wrong response.

"They were wrong!" Hewitt said. They treated my client like a piece of trash."

The trial is expected to last all week, perhaps into next week. All persons are innocent until pleading guilty or being found guilty.

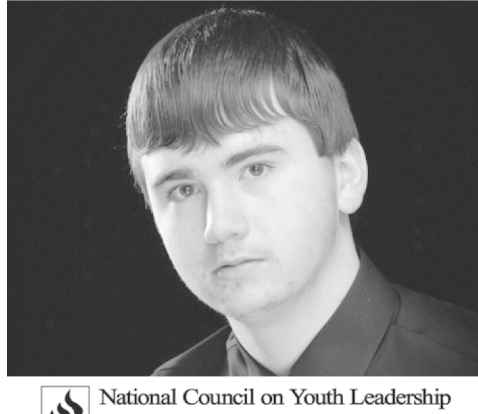

THOUGHTS FROM THE PASTOR

Bread of Life

Bro. Steve Smith, Carlisle Christian Church

A lady by the name of Carolyn Curran wrote this article, forwarded to me by my daughter, Jennifer Perez.

"I never knew anyone disabled until my son was diagnosed six years ago with Autism. When he was just two, I remember asking my husband how kids get to ride the little buses - they seemed so child friendly - I couldn't picture my 'baby' riding the big bus. Talk about living in a vacuum. What a laugh that story's become.

A few years ago, I was picking up my typical son from preschool and another mother complained to me that the boy next door gets a bus, while she has to drive her child back and forth every day. "And he hardly seems disabled," she said. I felt a twisting of my gut and my left eye probably twitched uncontrollably, but I kept my mouth shut. Unfortunately she started to seek me out, two or three times a week for this same discussion. Since I was PTA president then, she believed I could influence the district transportation policy.

Finally, on a day where 11:30 am felt like 10 pm, I looked her in the eye and said, "I know it seems un-

fair, so why don't we trade? I'll take a typical child and drive back and forth and you can have

an autistic child who gets to take the bus." I didn't speak with her much after that. In that short conversation, I couldn't possibly pry open her world to what the little bus really means.

Personally, on the 'down side' that little bus means: watching typical children run and play and laugh while my child floats alone in his own world, spending over 15 hours each spring developing an Individualized Education Plan for each of my three children, meeting every 4-6 weeks with each of those child study teams to exchange notes, support each other and maybe switch strategies, the silence of the phone - no calls for play dates here, huge meltdowns of pure panic because my son can't comprehend that today we are going to stop at Super G before going home, trying to explain to my sobbing 10 year old why he can't go on the big bus with his little brother, because he needs a different

school, Concerta, Prozac, ear tubes, echo-cardiograms, EKGs, blood work, genetics, pediatric: cardiologists, ENTs, and GIs, intestinal biopsies, tonsillectomies, adenoidectomies,

emergency surgery, special diets, picture schedules, sign language, social skills programs, sensory integration, evaluations, ABA, Verbal Behavior, DIR, physical therapy, speech therapy, and occupational therapy and waiting, hoping and praying for the miracle of achieving an ordinary developmental milestone.

On the 'up side' free transportation means a heart that soars each time I hear "Mom" because it took

four years to hear it, always believing in Santa Claus, finding joy in an unexpected kiss from my child who doesn't like to be touched, laughter that is genuine and deep, finding peace, understanding, tolerance and patience where I had none, unbelievable happiness when I hear "I did it" after weeks and months of trying, joy and gratitude for every inch of achievement because no one works

harder than a child learning to walk while his peers run by, a child learning to talk while his peers tell stories and a child learning his ABCs while his peers read books.

I confess to have been ignorant and frightened of disabled people. Would

I trade for the big bus? I don't think so, I'd rather we all ride the same bus - of comprehension of walking in another's shoes. Thank God, the little bus has taught me that.

So, dear mother, whose angst is caused by unfair school transportation. I'm sorry I 'snapped' at you years ago. I wish for you a discovery: that the chambers of the heart become infinite when you know and love someone with special needs and that what matters most is not what you get, but what you give."

My nine year old grandson, Gabriel, rides the "little bus." He is autistic. As a family, we can certainly understand Carolyn's perspective from personal experience. Is there a spiritual lesson here? Yes, most definitely! "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted." (Matt. 5:4) and "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves have received from God." (2 Cor. 1:3-4) as well as "Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." (1Th. 5:18).
God bless!!!

Luke 6:45 A good man out of the good treasure of his heart bringeth forth that which is good; and an evil man out of the evil treasure of his heart bringeth forth that which is evil: for the abundance of the heart his mouth speaketh.

thought. Number three is, you should have your emotions moved to tears, could be happiness or joy. But think about it. If you laugh, you think, and you cry, that's a full day. That's a heck of a day. You do that seven days a week, you're going to have something special." It is important for us to heed this advice, imagine what a passion for life someone would have if we did these three things every day. The world would be a much better place if everybody could be at a state of happiness to where they can laugh every day. A point of happiness in which we are brought to tears at how truly wonderful life can be. And during the time in which we are not in this state we should be in thought. Every second we spend in thought makes us a wiser and more insightful individual.

Coach Valvano was the coach of many college basketball teams including, most notably, the North Carolina State Wolfpack from 1980 to 1990 winning an NCAA Championship in 1983. This speech was given shortly (8 weeks) before his death from bone cancer that had been diagnosed in the summer of 1992. Within the speech he announced the creation of the "Jimmy V Foundation", a group dedicated to raising money and finding a cure for cancer.

Coach Valvano stated within his speech that we should do three things everyday in order to have a good life. "To me, there are three things we all should do every day. We should do this every day of our lives. Number one is laugh. You should laugh every day. Number two is think. You should spend some time in

speech caused him to look towards his idol Vince Lombardi (infamous coach of the Green Bay Packers) for inspiration. Jim stated that he had been reading Lombardi's book "Commitment to Excellence", where Lombardi recalled his first speech. Within the book, it recounted how Lombardi had waited until shortly before kickoff to address his players. Lombardi was said to have slammed open the door and said to his players, "Gentlemen, we'll be successful this year if you can focus on three things, and three things only. Your family, your religion and the Green Bay Packers." In an effort to recreate this, Jimmy V managed to fail at slamming open the door as well as fail to replace Green Bay Packers with Rutgers Basketball as he had intended. These type of events that occur within the life of an individual are those that we should cherish and treasure. These are the times that fuel one's enthusiasm for life.

Coach Valvano talks about knowing where he was in the present

and mostly the importance of his family and how they provide the courage and inspiration to continue to live. The significance of family is unmatched. Family truly is the foundation of an individual - the support, the stability, and the strength. In reference to the future Jim stresses the importance of having dreams and goals for yourself.

In closing, Coach Valvano says, "I urge all of you, all of you, to enjoy your life, the precious moments you have." I feel that a lot of the time we (and I'm guilty of this too) take for granted how wonderful life is. We lose track of it somewhere in the midst of all our problems, anxiety, and unhappiness. It is our duty to overcome this and to fully engage in all of life's beauty. Although I find myself to think pessimistically so often, perhaps it is I that should listen to what Jimmy V would go on to say. Jim then quotes the poet Ralph Waldo Emerson saying that "Nothing great could be accomplished without enthusiasm."

For those in our community who have been affected by cancer, it is a wonderful thing to know that since the night of this speech, the Jimmy V Foundation has raised over \$95 million dollars for nationwide cancer research still running under the motto, "don't give up, don't ever give up."

been afflicted with cancer, or even if you have just run into a bad time in your life to always remember this motto. In Jim's last sentences of the speech he states, "Cancer can take away all my physical abilities. It cannot touch my mind, it cannot touch my heart, and it cannot touch my soul. And those three things are going to carry on forever."

Accident on US 68 claims Mason woman

A fatal, two-vehicle accident, in western Fleming County on US 68 early Monday morning claimed the life of a Mason County woman and closed the highway for approximately five hours.

Fleming Dispatch personnel received a call about the accident at approximately 5:10 a.m., early Monday morning and immediately dispatched emergency responders to the scene.

Police say Mary Nickell, 38, of Mayslick, was traveling east on US 68 in a 1997 SUV when it drifted across the centerline and struck a westbound 2010 Volvo Semi tractor-trailer driven by Timothy Gentry, 54, of Maysville.

Assistant Fleming County Coroner Gary Workman pronounced

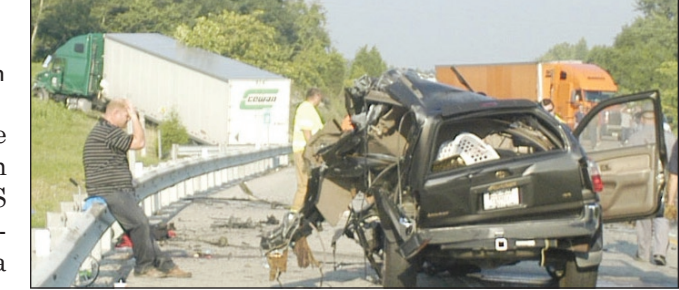

Nickell dead at the scene by at 5:57 a.m.

Gentry had no visible injuries, but was transported to Meadowview Regional Hospital as a precaution, according to officials at the scene.

Kentucky State Police Detective Larry Bowling continues to lead the death investigation and joined KSP Trooper Chad Bowling, who was busy at the scene taking measurements, interviewing witnesses and compiling data throughout the morning as transporta-

tion workers rerouted traffic in both lanes.

Firefighters from Ewing and Mays Lick Fire Department responded to the scene as did officers with the Fleming County Sheriff's Office, Kentucky State Police, Commercial Vehicle Enforcement officers, Department of Transportation workers, and Emergency Management Director Dwayne Price.

Officials at the scene say the preliminary investigation indicates

Child Find for Children with Disabilities in Need of Special Education or 504 Services

The Nicholas County School District keeps educational records in a secure location in each school and Board office.

The Nicholas County School District obtains written consent from a parent or eligible student (age 18 or who is attending a postsecondary institution), before disclosing personally identifiable information to an entity or individual not authorized to receive it under FERPA.

For students who have been determined eligible for Special Education, educational records will be destroyed at the request of the parents when they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. The Nicholas County School District may destroy the educational records of a child without parent request three years after they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. Parents are advised that data contained in the records may later be needed for Social Security benefits or other purposes. The Nicholas County School District may retain, for an indefinite period of time, a record of the student's name, address, telephone number, grades, attendance records, classes attended, grade level completed, and year completed.

Children eligible for Special Education include those children with disabilities who have autism, deaf-blindness, developmental delay, emotional-behavior disability, hearing impairment, mental disability, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, specific learning disability, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, or visual impairment and who because of such an impairment need Special Education services.

Children eligible for 504 services include those children who have a current physical or mental impairment that currently substantially limits some major life activity which causes the student's ability to access the school environment or school activities to be substantially limited.

The Nicholas County School District has an ongoing "Child Find" system, which is designed to locate, identify and evaluate any child residing in a home, facility, or residence within its geographical boundaries, age three (3) to twenty-one (21) years, who may have a disability and be in need of Special Education or 504 services. This includes children who are not in school; those who are in public, private, or home school; those who are highly mobile such as children who are migrant or homeless; and those who are advancing from grade to grade, who may need but are not receiving Special Education or 504 services.

The district's "Child Find" system includes children with disabilities attending private or home schools within the school district boundaries who may need special education services.

The Nicholas County School District will make sure any child enrolled in its district who qualifies for Special Education or 504 services, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided appropriate Special Education or 504 services at no cost to the parents of the child.

Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to help the Nicholas County School District find any child who may have a disability and need Special Education or 504 services. The District needs to know the name and age, or date of birth of the child; the name, address, and phone number(s) of the parents or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if Special Education or 504 services are needed.

Letters and phone calls are some of the ways the Nicholas County School District collects the information needed. The information the school District collects will be used to contact the parents of the child and find out if the child needs to be evaluated or referred for Special Education or 504 services.

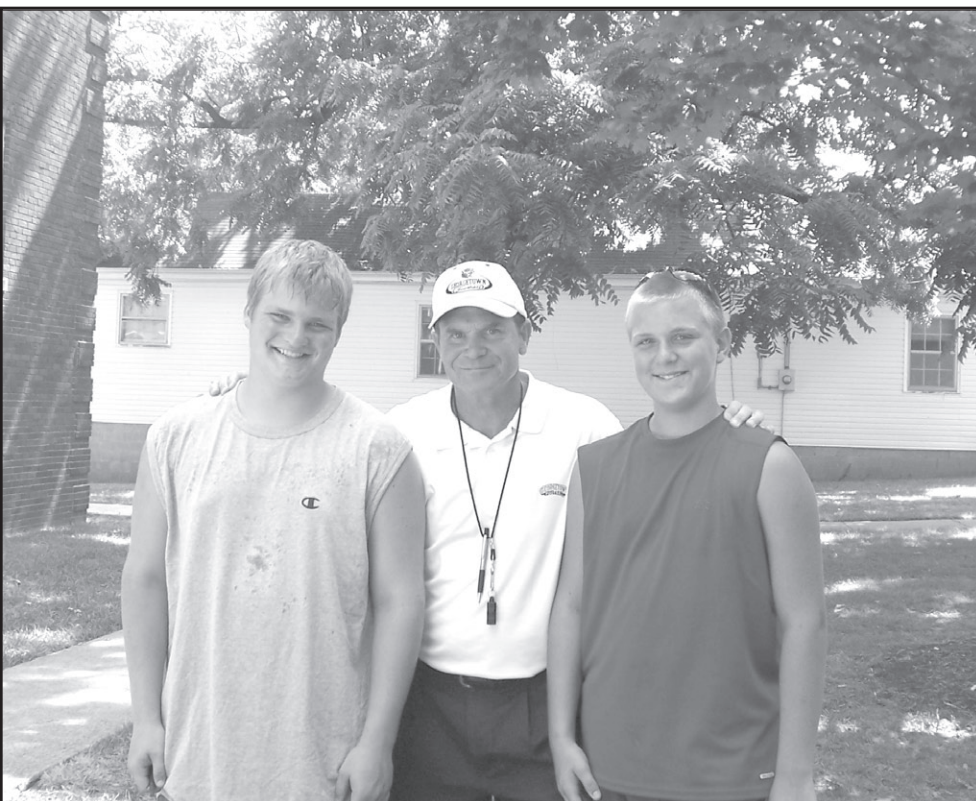

Millersburg Civic Center

Twenty four people gathered at the Millersburg Civic Center on Saturday, July 31, 2010 at 1:30 pm to remember part of the history made on this site.

Thanks to Billy and Nancy Mason and Mary Lou Rankin, the original brass plaques denoting the history of the site and graced the front of old Millersburg Elementary were cleaned, polished and re-hung in the lobby of the Millersburg Civic Center. Nancy Mason welcomed everyone to the ceremony and introduced Charles Tribble, former principal for 16 years at Millersburg Elementary School, who led the group in the pledge to the flag and gave the invocation. Mrs. Mason gave a short history of the site telling that originally it was the site of KY Wesleyan College in 1858. An all girl's college, KY Wesleyan provided living quarters for the students and prospered. KY Wesleyan College moved to Winchester, KY in 1890. Millersburg

Military Institute occupied the site from 1893 until 1920 when it moved across the road to the present location of the USAC National Training Headquarters. The first public high school in Bourbon County was then established at the site. Bourbon County High School was established in 1920 in Millersburg. Students from all over Bourbon County traveled to attend the public school. Some students that lived in other parts of the county traveled to Millersburg on Monday mornings and stayed with Millersburg families during the week, returning on Friday to their homes. One former student remembered riding her pony in to town with her sister and using the barn at the neighboring residence of Mr. and Mrs. Layson as livery. The girls returned home each night aboard their pony!

The Old Bourbon County High School Alumni hold their annual reunion at the site each year in May or June. The class pic-

tures of the senior classes had been taken from the school and stored in boxes at a warehouse on the Bourbon County School campus. At the request of Mrs. Mason, the pictures returned to the school. Mrs. Rankin had the pictures retouched and framed and they are now hung in the hallowed halls of the old campus. Mrs. Rankin thanked Tom Moore and Ronnie Carter for their help in hanging the beautifully restored plaques in lobby. Mrs. Rankin introduced four families of the original five school board members and thanked them for their attendance. The Board members were Frank Shopshire, Theodore Kuster, represented by, Teddy and Betsy

Kuster and Ed and Kay Kuster Thomas, Paris; Norman Judy, represented by Marshall Judy and son Greg Judy, Somerset, and Sara Catherine Judy Bryant, Lexington and son Jeff Bryant, of St Louis, MO; Matthew Faulconer, represented by Joe and Teresa Faulconer, Paris; and Elmer Sparks, Chrm of the Board, represented by Henry and Betty Sparks Steele and Jeff Steele, Winchester.
