For several years I have continuously researched a Native American War Chief Shawnee \mathbf{the} Nation, who known by Kentucky frontiersmen simply as Blue Jacket. Blue Jacket was

probably born Pennsylvania about 1740, although some argue he was born several years fore that. He was originally called Sepettekenathe "Big Rabbit." Sometime before 1778, in accordance with Shawnee tradition, \mathbf{he} adopted the adult name Wayapiersenwah or "The Whirlpool," according to historians, including Blue Jacket descendant Carlyle Hinshaw.

DNA analysis and extensive historical research by Blue Jacket biographer, Dr. John Sugden, who is a graduate of Leeds, Lancaster and Sheffield Universities in England, with a doctorate in modern history, indicates that famed author Allen Eckert was incorrect in his belief that Chief Blue Jacket was a

captured white. have found Eckert's works fascinating and filled with accurate vast and historical information, but my research into Blue Jacket revealed a much different insight into the enigmatic Native American warrior and leader than what Eckert perceived.



The Russian word sputnik literally means "cotraveler", "traveling companion" or "satellite", and its R-7 launch vehicle was designed initially to carry nuclear warheads.

Sputnik 1 launched on October 4, 1957. The satellite was 58 cm (about 23 in) in diameter and weighed approximately 83.6 kg (about 183 lb). Each of its 1440 elliptical orbits around the Earth took about 96 minutes. Monitoring of the satellite was done by many amateur radio operators, and the Jodrell Bank Observatory. ticipated in so many activities during her high school years. Each of these girls was truly a queen and I wish all of them the bets.



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Infant murder trial continues

A former employee of the Nicholas County Hospital took the stand Monday afternoon in Fleming Circuit Court where she is standing trial for the murder of her three-month-old infant

Terry Jo Buchanan, 32, and Jessica Marie Allen, 23, both of the western Fleming Community of Ewing are in the midst of a trial after being charged with murder and abuse 1st degree, of her three-month old daughter Kaylee Jo Buchanan.

The trial began last Monday, Aug. 2. in Fleming Circuit Court.

Allen testified Monday Aug. 9, that she worked at Nicholas County hospital in

Kentucky State Police Detective Virgil Rucker has been leading the death investigation of Kaylee Buchanan, the three-month old infant of Buchanan's and Allen who died July 24, 2008 at the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

"Kaylee was killed by her parents," Commonwealth Kathryn Hendrickson told jurors last Tuesday morning as she pointed to the couple. "Those two people killed her."

Buchanan and Allen were indicted by a Fleming County Grand Jury Jan. 16, 2009 on the charges of murder and criminal abuse, first degree.

Hendrickson filed 'Bill of Particulars' in the case several months ago, which stated that Kaylee Jo Buchanan's right femur and fibula were broken on or about July 9-

13, 2009 and Buchanan and the testimony that would fol-Allen allegedly caused the low child's injuries and abused their daughter, or aided and assisted one another in abusing their daughter, according to court documents.

The injuries sustained by Kaylee Jo Buchanan led to the criminal abuse and murder charges.

Count two of the 'Bill of KentuckymedicalExaminer's Particulars' which follows much of the same language of the indictments against the couple, states that Buchanan and Allen committed murder when they struck or aided and abetted one another to strike Kaylee Buchanan's head one or more times, which resulted in her death.

Hendrickson spoke forcefully during her opening arguments, telling jurors she did not know if it was Buchanan or Allen that caused the fatal blow to Kaylee Jo Buchanan's head, which resulted in her death.

"They're protecting each other," Hendrickson said. "Neither one of them protected Kaylee."

Bob Gastine, attorney for Allen painted a much different picture than Hendrickson, speaking of a history of a loving family and refuting allegations of Kaylee Buchanan having a fractured leg.

"That alleged injury did not exist," he told a quieted jury. They jumped to the wrong conclusion." Gastine

Commonwealth had based their conclusion on something "other than fact." Gastine asked members of the jury to find a verdict of

Brian Hewitt, attorney for

Hewitt said a misdiagnosis at UK Medical Center concerning a perceived broken leg of the infant "triggered" a wrong response.

"They were wrong!" Hewitt said. They treated my client like a piece of trash." Dr. Christina Roth of the

Office in Frankfort performed the autopsy on Kaylee Jo Buchanan. She testified for two hours Wednesday morning, fol-

lowing the testimony of

Assistant Fayette County Coroner Larry Owen. Dr. Roth answered questions from Commonwealth Attorney Kathryn Hendrickson and explained diagrams and several graph-

ic photos of the autopsy. Roth testified that she had performed approximately 3,000 autopsies during her career with several hundred, perhaps as many as 1,000 being autopsies of children and infants.

She testified that she performed an autopsy on Kaylee Jo Buchanan on July 25, 2008 at 9 a.m.,

Dr. Roth outlined several injuries that she noted during the autopsy, these included a fracture to the skull, bruising on the back of the head and both sides, primarily from the left side of the head to the front, "abnormal" contusions to the interior skull and brain membrane, hemorrhaging to the orbital nerve just behind the eye and an injury to the back of the right leg.

Court documents indicated that medical reports done at the UK Medical Center stat-Terry Buchanan also asked ed that Kaylee Jo Buchanan

but that was not the case and Dr. Roth found no fractures of breaks in any leg bones during her autopsy. "The infant died of blunt

force trauma to the head and a slight injury to the leg," Dr. Roth said. Under cross-examina-

tion by attorneys Gastine and Hewitt, Dr. Roth confirmed that in all other respects Kaylee Jo Buchanan appeared to have been a healthy normal child, who was well nourished and had no signs of malnourishment or abuse. Dr. Roth explained the in-

juries in detail during her testimony and touched upon the question on everyone's

"How the injuries occurred I do not know."

Allen said the same thing under testimony this week. "I just know," she said to the

question from Hendrickson as she wept softly. "I have no

Hendrickson asked Allen if working at the Nicholas hospital and training to become a nursing professional there at the same time, along with holding a second job as a waitress in Flemingsburg, combined with raising a two-year-old son had been overly stressful when raising a three-month-old daughter was added.

"A child is a gift from God," Allen said quietly. "If you're lucky enough to get one, it's not stressful."

Examiner's office testified earlier in the trial regarding two distinct and separate perceived injuries to the infant's lower leg and knee

Other medical professionals testified about the timing of the injuries and how when inflicted by human hands the child would have suffered immediately.

"This injury was inflicted upon your child and you're telling us you didn't do it?" Hendrickson asked.

"No," Allen said.

"That leaves Terry Jo," Hendrickson said.

"It appears that way," Allen said.

The trial continues as The Carlisle Mercury prepares to go to press.






