Carlisle woman charged with raping schoolboy

A Carlisle woman has been charged with rape and custodial interference after allegedly engaging in sexual activity with a 15-year-old male and

allegedly helping hide the boy from the boys' mother.

Police Officer Benny Buckler arrested Ashley Nicole Pettitt, 26, of Carlisle, on Aug. 9 on the charges of rape, 3rd degree and custodial interference.

"The subject (Pettitt) has engaged in sexual conduct with a minor male, 15-year-old," Buckler wrote on Pettitt's arrest citation. "She (Pettitt) told the male 15-year-old that she was pregnant and he was the father."

Buckler's citation in-

dicates the police became involved when the mother of the juvenile male tried to locate her son so he could take tests to enroll in an out of county school.

"The above subject (Pettitt) assisted the boy in hiding from his mother," Officer

Buckler penned on Pettitt's citation, indicating that the boy's mother had attempted to get him to come home one night in order to be well rested to study for the test.

All persons are innocent until proven guilty or pleading guilty.

Nicholas World War Two veterans to be honored Saturday

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Nicholas County World War II veterans will be honored during a special program at the Neal Building in downtown Carlisle Saturday and event organizers are asking for your attendance in honoring these great

Americans.

"I'd like to see as many folks as possible stop in and just tell these men 'thank you' for the sacrifices they made," said Nicholas County Judge-Executive elect Kenny Lyons. "The event is free and we've sent out 28 invitations for all the WW II veterans from Nicholas County."

Lyons helped organize the event along with officers and members of the local American Legion. The ladies auxiliary of the American Legion will be providing refreshments for all who attend.

The event will be held beginning at 1 p.m., and will conclude at 5 p.m., with veterans being asked to stop in early at

noon, in preparation for the program.

According to Lyons, Nicholas County provided 837 young men who served during World War II, with 34 of those men being killed in combat.

Several of the surviving WW II veterans who are expected to attend Saturday's events represent the last of a breed

of what many call simply "the greatest generation."

"We've lost so many of our World War Two veterans," Lyons said. "Several of those who are expected to attend lied about their enlistment ages and enlisted when they were very young."

Lyons helped honor several of those men during the Blackberry

Festival this year with the WW II veterans acting as grand marshals in the festival's parade.

"We were very happy to do that," Lyons said. "And we have plans of having special events in the future to honor other veterans of other foreign wars. We hope to pay special tribute to Korean War veterans next year."

Second arrest made in Shepherd's Place Apartment theft

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Carlisle Police Officers have made a second arrest into the July 25 theft of a 42-inch screen TV from Shepherd's Apartment.

Other arrests may follow, according to investigators.

Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler arrested Betty Jo Gibbs, 38, of Carlisle, on Aug. 6. Gibbs is the second person arrested in connection with the crime.

Carlisle Police Officer Mark Snedegar arrested Eric Fulton, 28, of Carlisle, last week in connection with the crime, charging Fulton with receiving stolen property.

Gibbs was charged

with two class D felony charges: Receiving stolen property, under \$10,000 and tampering with physical evidence.

"The above subject (Gibbs) purchased a stolen TV," Officer Buckler wrote on Gibbs' arrest citation. "The TV was stolen from Shepherd's Place, an elderly retirement apartment house."

Buckler, Snedegar and Officer Guy Turner, also of the Carlisle Police Force, are conducting the investigation and working closely together to solve the crime and bring those responsible to justice. Buckler told The Mercury he had questioned Gibbs about the crime. That questioning led to a second charge against Gibbs.

"After officers from

this department questioned the subject (Gibbs) she took the TV to the old Blue Licks Bridge and threw it into the Licking River. The TV was destroyed."

That alleged action led to the charge of 'tampering with physical evidence' being leveled against Gibbs.

Gibbs faces a total of 10 years imprisonment if found guilty of both charges and given the maximum sentence running consecutive to one another.

All persons are innocent until proven guilty or pleading guilty.

The investigation continues with other suspects believed to be involved facing questioning and possible charges, according to police.

'Bad drug deal leads to arrest

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A "bad drug deal" led to a physical altercation, which in turn led to charges being brought against a Carlisle man Friday evening.

Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler arrested Wesley "Wes" Boone, 28, of Carlisle after

an incident at Halls Apartment Building in downtown Carlisle Friday evening.

Boone was charged with criminal trespass and possession of a controlled substance.

"Subject (Boone) entered Hall's Apartment. He has no legitimate purpose for being there. While inside, he got into a physical altercation and pushed a resi-

dent down the step. He stated it was due to "a bad drug deal," Buckler wrote on Boone's arrest citation.

Boone also allegedly had seven zanax pills, a schedule four narcotic, in his possession that belonged to another individual, according to the arrest citation. All persons are innocent until proven guilty or pleading guilty.

Strong winds strike Myer's Station area

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Strong winds blew over crops, damaged at least one home and downed trees and tree limbs, which closed sections of Myer's Road on Aug. 4.

Wind gusts reaching over 60 mph damaged a 1/8 square mile section of the county near Myer's Station, according to Nicholas County Management Director Calvin Denton.

Denton said the area of damage was small but in-

tense in spots, moving a mobile home entirely off of its foundation.

Luckily there have been no reported injuries related to the strong winds.

Denton credited county and state employees with acting quickly with

Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

"At length Blue Jacket rose and made his speech. (Simon) Girty interpreted. Blue Jacket said that they were determined to make the Ohio River the line. And after this to burn every prisoner they caught on this side of the river. That they had been driven farther and farther back and that they would all die before they would give up an inch more of their land."

John Crawford of his experience as a Shawnee prisoner of Mingo Chief Black Wolf in 1785, excerpted from the Draper Manuscripts volume 12 CC page 160.

For several years I have continuously researched a Native American War Chief of the Shawnee Nation, who was known by Kentucky frontiersmen simply as Blue Jacket.

Blue Jacket was probably born in Pennsylvania about 1740, although some argue he was born several years before that. He was originally called Sepettekenathe or "Big Rabbit." Sometime before 1778, in accordance with Shawnee tradition, he adopted the adult name Wayapiersenhwah or "The Whirlpool," according to historians, including Blue Jacket descendant Carlyle Hinshaw.

DNA analysis and extensive historical research by Blue Jacket biographer, Dr. John Sugden, who is a graduate of Leeds, Lancaster and Sheffield Universities in England, with a doctorate in modern history, indicates that famed author Allen Eckert was incorrect in his belief that Chief Blue Jacket was a captured white.

I have found Eckert's works fascinating and filled with vast and accurate historical information, but my research into Blue Jacket revealed a much different insight into the enigmatic Native American warrior and leader than what Eckert perceived.

Most historical researchers either fail to mention or go into very limited de-

tail about Chief Blue Jacket's 1787/1788 capture by men from Capt. John Strode's Station.

The men, all of whom were drinking whiskey at the time of their pursuit of horse thieves, came upon Blue Jacket and at least two other warriors and their stolen horses, on the headwaters of Cabin Creek, just north of the North Fork of the Licking River.

Blue Jacket was already a famous leader among the Shawnee, being responsible for the capture of Daniel Boone in 1778, which led to the surrender of 28 men who were making salt at the Lower Blue Licks.

Though a fierce warrior, Blue Jacket is credited for assisting Simon Kenton, whom he had once

clubbed with a pipe tomahawk, with organizing a Shawnee-Kentucky peace treaty and prisoner exchange near present day Maysville, in 1787.

Although I've found no mention by British Officer and Canadian Ranger leader, Captain William Caldwell, of Blue Jacket, in Caldwell's official reports and letters to his superiors, it seems apparent that the war chief was along in the August 1782 campaign against settlements in Kentucky and was present at the Battle of Blue Licks. Draper notes that it was Blue Jacket who removed half-brothers: Jones Hoy and Jack Calloway, from a watermelon patch near Hoy's Station in present Madison County on about August 10, 1782, and took the boys as prisoners.

I had always believed a Mingo Chief named Black Wolf

was solely responsible for that action and the subsequent ambush at the Upper Blue Licks often called Holders Defeat, or the Battle of Upper Licks. The tactics used in this Native American victory were duplicated one week later at Lower Blue Licks when nearly 80 Kentuckians were slain during the Battle of Blue Licks.

From depositions of brothers William and Isaac Clinkenbeard, as well as John Hawks and Daniel Deron, who were present during Blue Jacket's 1788 capture, and from Christopher Wood, who saw Blue Jacket at Daniel Boone's cabin in Maysville, that same week, there can be little doubt that men from this section of Kentucky were involved in a pivotal incident surrounding the famous Shawnee leader.

Their interviews can be found in the Draper manuscripts

with relevant information primarily to be found in volumes 11 and 12CC and 10BB.

By cunning and athleticism, Blue Jacket was able to escape from his captors as they toured the countryside with their famous prisoner. Blue Jacket escaped late one night from the newly constructed cabin of Robert Sounce, located in present day Bourbon County, very near the present border with Nicholas.

Blue Jacket had his legs tied together and his arms tied behind his back by James Beath, and several men were sleeping inside the Sounce cabin and just outside the door.

Blue Jacket quietly jumped over these men before hopping madly into the dark forest.

He disappeared into the darkness just as the alarm was given. Hounds were put on

his trail, but he was not found.

He went back to Ohio, having stolen George Stockton's prized horse along the way, and continued to wage war against the Kentuckians in the months and years to follow.

He was the primary Native American leader who crushed the armies of Josiah Harmer and General Arthur St. Claire (Nov. 1791).

It was Van Swearingin, a hardy soul of Strode's Station, who perished at Blue Jacket's hand during St. Claire's defeat, and not Blue Jacket's alleged white brother Marmaduke Van Swearingin, as Allen Eckert contends in his famous series of frontier books.

My quest to find out more facts about the famous Shawnee War Chief never ceases dear reader.

I continue to seek The Whirlpool.

What a Year

The times were good, Elvis was in full swing, 1957 was a year of good and bad, I know I was not around during these times, but a lot of historic events went down during this special year.

The year started with incidents of global importance. The Saarland, a smaller state near Germany, joining West Germany, and members of the Irish Republican Army attacked The Brookeborough police barracks, which led to the deaths of Seán South and Fergal O'Hanlon.

And this was all just on the first day of 57?

The rest of the year had a lot in store as well, some major things that happened are.

- The movie Loving You, starring Elvis Presley was released into theaters.

- Elvis purchased Graceland, and he released Jail House

Rock and was steadily continuing his climb upward in the music industry.

- Wham-O creates the Frisbee.

But in my opinion the biggest event of the year was the release of Sputnik into orbit.

The Russian word sputnik literally means "co-traveler", "traveling companion" or "satellite", and its R-7 launch vehicle was designed initially to carry nuclear warheads.

Sputnik 1 launched on October 4, 1957. The satellite was 58 cm (about 23 in) in diameter and weighed approximately 83.6 kg (about 183 lb). Each of its 1440 elliptical orbits around the Earth took about 96 minutes. Monitoring of the satellite was done by many amateur radio operators, and the Jodrell Bank Observatory. Sputnik's R-7 booster had previously proven itself more than one month earlier as the world's first ICBM in the successful long-range test flight of August 21 (with the accomplishment published in Aviation Week). Sputnik 1 was not visible from Earth but the casing of the R-7 booster, traveling behind it, was.

Sputnik 2 was launched on November 3, 1957 and carried the first living passenger into orbit, a dog

named Laika. The mission planners did not provide for the safe return of the spacecraft or its passenger, making Laika the first orbital casualty. This mission was promptly dubbed "Muttnik" by US humorists.

The surprise launch of Sputnik 1, coupled with the spectacular failure of the United States of America's first two Project Vanguard launch attempts, shocked the United States, which responded with a number of early satellite launches, including Explorer 1, Project SCORE, and Courier 1B. The Sputnik crisis also led to the creation of the Advanced Research Projects Agency (renamed the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency in 1972): DARPA, and NASA, and an increase in U.S. government spending on scientific research and education. The launch of Sputnik 1 inspired U.S. writer Herb Caen to coin the term "beatnik" in an article about the Beat Generation in the San Francisco Chronicle on April 2, 1958 (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Sputnik_program)

In my opinion Sputnik is one of the most technological advances ever to happen for this planet, things were realized and I believe that the space program would not be what it is today if it were not for the Sputnik Program in 1957. The United States has released many satellites into orbit. Many have been successful, but many have failed as well. And if it were not for Sputnik we would not have been trying so hard to get something into space to beat Russia at a game they had perfected. Because of them we have had people in space, we have had people walk on the moon and even released robots onto mars, which explored and fed information down to earth. That information has given us a good idea of not only how mars now is, but how it was millions of years ago.

Because of space technology we are able to see over 13 billion light years away, pretty much all of observable space with the Hubble telescope.

So now when you see a satellite or space ship being sent into orbit just remember about Sputnik in 1957 which started it all. And remember a year that will always be remembered for its ups and downs, but overall very historic events.

At this time I set down with my family and started looking at the pros and cons! It was at this point I realized that my family was my most important asset and my first priority was to them!

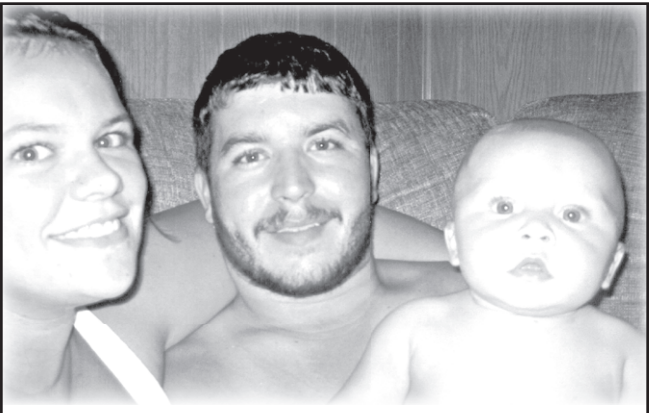

Fall squirrel season looks promising

FRANKFORT — Kentucky's fall squirrel season opens Sat., Aug. 21 and the outlook is similar to last year.

"Squirrels are our most stable and abundant small game species," said Ben Robinson, small game biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "Even a poor mast year is not going to be detrimental to squirrel populations."

This year, the 190-day season is split. The first segment of squirrel season opens Aug. 21 and closes for the opening weekend of modern gun deer season Nov. 13-14. Squirrel season opens again Nov. 15 and continues through Feb. 28, 2011. The daily bag limit is six squirrels.

Last year's mast crop, the abundance of nuts and fruits produced by trees and other plants, determines this year's estimate of the number of squirrels available to hunters.

"Last year's mast crop was rated poor to average," said Robinson. "Only 38 percent of white oaks observed had mast, 42 percent of red oaks, 27 percent of hickories, and 38 percent of beech."

Since 1953, wildlife bi-

ologists have conducted a survey of Kentucky's most important producers of wildlife foods, determining the proportion of mast bearing trees. Squirrels rely on the mast from these trees during various times of the fall and winter. "Since we did not experience a failure of any of these important mast crops, at least some food was available to squirrels throughout a majority of the winter months," said Robinson.

Early in the fall season, squirrels feed heavily on hickories. A good hunting strategy is to look for trees with maturing nuts that squirrels are beginning to cut. Often these trees are on dry, upland sites, such as hilltops, or flat benches along the contour of ridges.

Shotguns are a good choice for early-season squirrel hunting since leaves make it difficult to clearly see squirrels.

But, the abundance of leaves also provides hunters with some advantages:

squirrels make a lot of noise when they jump from limb to limb, and rustling leaves help hunters locate squirrels in the crowns of tall trees.

"The leaves also give hunters some cover as they slip around the woods,"

said Robinson.

To help determine the health of Kentucky's squirrel population, the Squirrel Hunting Cooperator Survey was developed in 1995 as a volunteer initiative. Biologists use the collected data to monitor squirrel population trends in Kentucky. Each year, participating hunter co-operators are mailed a new hunting log, the results of the survey and a small gift for participating, such as lapel pin or ball cap.

Hunters simply record the information about their hunts as the season progresses, then mail their survey to the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife when they're finished hunting for the season. The mailing address is: No. 1 Sportsman's Lane, Frankfort, Ky., 40601. Logs must be sent no later than May 31, 2011.

The recently published 2009-10 Squirrel Hunting Cooperator Survey Report, compiled by Robinson, offers some interesting data on Kentucky's squirrel populations and the state's most avid squirrel hunters.

Here are some highlights:

The 109 squirrel hunters who participated in last season's survey averaged about 12 hunting

trips per season. Trips afield lasted an average of 2.6 hours each.

— Data included 1,319 hunts in 91 different counties across Kentucky — Hunters observed an average of nearly five squirrels per hunt and roughly two squirrels per hour. Hunters saw more than three times as many gray squirrels as fox squirrels.

— Robinson predicts hunters should expect to see nearly two squirrels per hour of hunting during the upcoming 2010-11 season.

— Harvest averaged between two and three squirrels per hunt and hunters bagged four gray squirrels for every one fox squirrel. The number of gray squirrels seen and harvested per hour was up slightly from the 2008-09 season. Hunters harvested nearly 51 percent of all squirrels observed.

— Hunting effort was greater toward the beginning of squirrel season, with

53 percent of the hunts taking place in August and September. Overall, 77 percent of all hunts occurred before opening day of modern firearms season for deer last year.

— Statewide, gray squirrels comprised 80 percent of the harvest. More fox squirrels were taken in central Kentucky, 24.5

percent, than any other region. Hunters in western Kentucky accounted for just a little over 10 percent of the fox squirrel harvest.

— September was the most productive month for squirrel hunters last season, with the highest number of squirrels seen and killed per hunt.

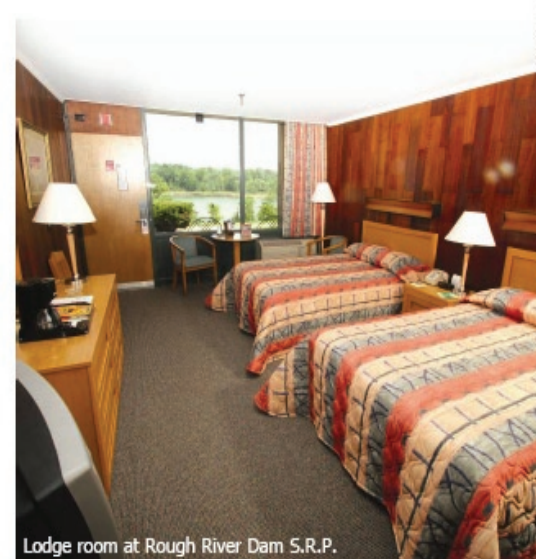

personal property, other than motor vehicles and watercraft, within the taxing jurisdiction of the city of Carlisle shall be at the rate of \$0.45 per one hundred (\$100.00) dollars of assessed valuation.

City ordinance NO.9: an ordinance levying city of Carlisle ad valorem taxes for general municipal purposes for the fiscal year of 2010/2011 on real estate within the taxing rate of \$0.175 per one hundred (\$100.00) dollars of assessed valuation.

After all of the ordinances were talked about, the members of the council went around and told what they wanted to say about everything. Most of the members of the

council talked about the blacktopping on Cliffway drive and how nice it was and the gratitude that the community brought up to the council.

The next meeting will be on August 18 at 5:00p.m. for a Neighborhood Watch Meeting.

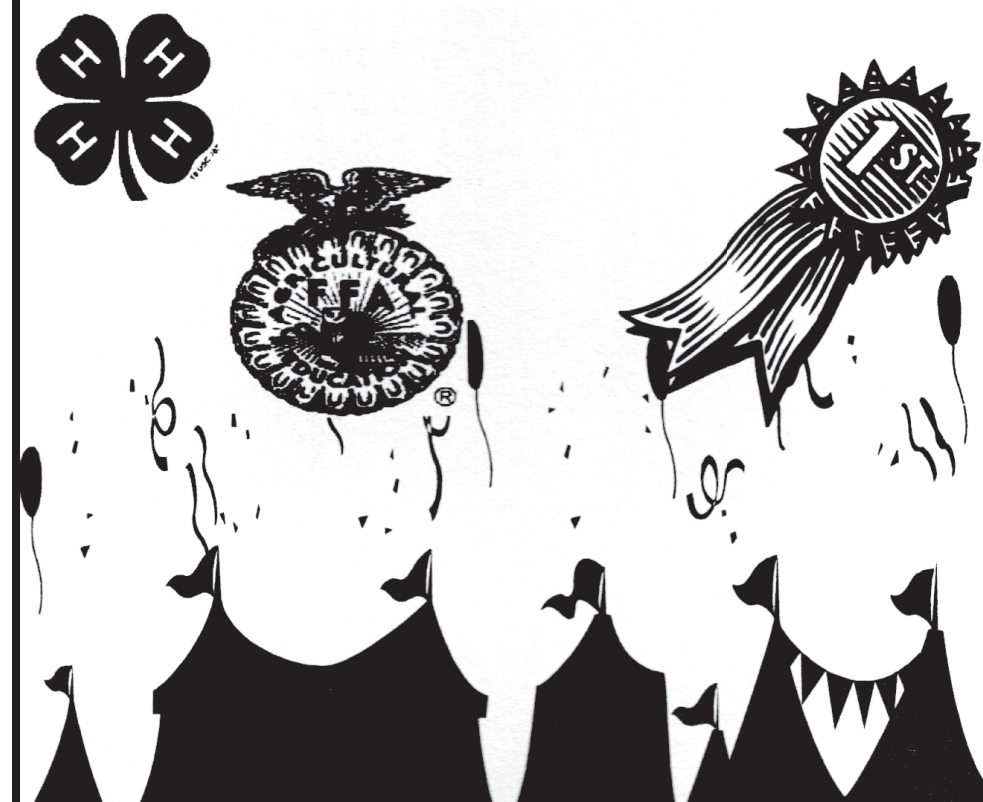

Fondest Memories

With seeing so many farm hands out and about, I recall those years of working on the farm. My grandfather Lyons, raised tobacco and we had to help out with chopping out weeds, topping, and housing it and we also had to help in hay.

I thought one day that I would go and help cut some tobacco. My father and other hands made it look so easy, and I thought I can do this, and the pay was good. I wanted to go and make some easy money. Well, just let me tell you that was not an easy task to do. I didn't know what I was doing, I couldn't spear the stalks they way they were supposed to do. I was leary of grabbing the stalks at the bottom for the fear of a snake being wrapped around it. I think that I ended up cutting about 20 sticks of tobacco, my dad finished out the row for me. He had cut about 150 sticks to my 20 if that tells you how slow I was. The turtle beating the haire would not even hold comparison to me cutting sticks of tobacco.

Not only did I try to cut tobacco but I also tried to help load bales of hay that weighed

around 60-65 pounds. I did throw up 3-4 bales, but decided not for me. I couldn't do it. I remember dad saying, "Melissa, you are causing me more work. Just go sit down and let us do it." And that is exactly what I did. Now the things that I could do was drive a tractor while they loaded the tobacco, pick up leaves, and the biggy stay at home.

If anyone thinks that trying any of those things are easy, they better make sure that they can be done. I thought wow, I can cut tobacco, its just a matter of cutting the stalk and spearing. Yeah, that might be what it really consists of but if you stay bent over for a long period of time, it can get really get to you, especially if you are not

used to it.

I have the utmost respect for the people out there in the tobacco and hay fields. Not only is it hard work but it is hot and in the tobacco patches, not much air stirs around between the tobacco.

I believe that the only thing that I could say that I enjoyed when it came to working in the fields was going to the house at lunch when Mamaw would have a big lunch fixed for all the work hands. Once lunch was over, I didn't return to the fields. I stayed at the house with Mamaw and we sat on the front porch with a glass of ice cold tea, while we watched them work in the fields across the road.

But I do have to say that I do not regret putting forth the ef-

fort of trying to work in the fields. I also know that many people in the past have worked in the fields which I do have complete respect for you. I don't know how you did it. I know my grandmothers, went out and worked in the fields one grandmother had ten children and she still remained working in the crops. My other grandmother had three children, worked in the fields, milked cows, and fixed meals for work hands. My hats off to you for this. Kids today don't realize how fortunate that they have it, but I do think that if we could go back to those days we would not be like they are today with drugs, alcohol, and burglaries.

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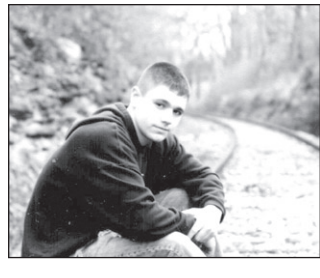
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Art: A Subjective Meaning

Infant murder trial continues

A former employee of the Nicholas County Hospital took the stand Monday afternoon in Fleming Circuit Court where she is standing trial for the murder of her three-month-old infant daughter.

Terry Jo Buchanan, 32, and Jessica Marie Allen, 23, both of the western Fleming Community of Ewing are in the midst of a trial after being charged with murder and abuse 1st degree, of her three-month old daughter Kaylee Jo Buchanan.

The trial began last Monday, Aug. 2, in Fleming Circuit Court.

Allen testified Monday Aug. 9, that she worked at Nicholas County hospital in 2007.

Kentucky State Police Detective Virgil Rucker has been leading the death investigation of Kaylee Buchanan, the three-month old infant of Buchanan's and Allen who died July 24, 2008 at the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

"Kaylee was killed by her parents," Commonwealth Attorney Kathryn Hendrickson told jurors last Tuesday morning as she pointed to the couple. "Those two people killed her."

Buchanan and Allen were indicted by a Fleming County Grand Jury Jan. 16, 2009 on the charges of murder and criminal abuse, first degree.

Hendrickson filed 'Bill of Particulars' in the case several months ago, which stated that Kaylee Jo Buchanan's right femur and fibula were broken on or about July 9-

13, 2009 and Buchanan and Allen allegedly caused the child's injuries and abused their daughter, or aided and assisted one another in abusing their daughter, according to court documents.

The injuries sustained by Kaylee Jo Buchanan led to the criminal abuse and murder charges.

Count two of the 'Bill of Particulars' which follows much of the same language of the indictments against the couple, states that Buchanan and Allen committed murder when they struck or aided and abetted one another to strike Kaylee Buchanan's head one or more times, which resulted in her death.

Hendrickson spoke forcefully during her opening arguments, telling jurors she did not know if it was Buchanan or Allen that caused the fatal blow to Kaylee Jo Buchanan's head, which resulted in her death.

"They're protecting each other," Hendrickson said. "Neither one of them protected Kaylee."

Bob Gastine, attorney for Allen painted a much different picture than Hendrickson, speaking of a history of a loving family and refuting allegations of Kaylee Buchanan having a fractured leg.

"That alleged injury did not exist," he told a quieted jury. "They jumped to the wrong conclusion."

Gastine said the Commonwealth had based their conclusion on something "other than fact." Gastine asked members of the jury to find a verdict of innocent.

Brian Hewitt, attorney for Terry Buchanan also asked the jurors to listen closely to

the testimony that would follow

Hewitt said a misdiagnosis at UK Medical Center concerning a perceived broken leg of the infant "triggered" a wrong response.

"They were wrong!" Hewitt said. They treated my client like a piece of trash."

Dr. Christina Roth of the Kentucky Medical Examiner's Office in Frankfort performed the autopsy on Kaylee Jo Buchanan.

She testified for two hours Wednesday morning, following the testimony of Assistant Fayette County Coroner Larry Owen.

Dr. Roth answered questions from Commonwealth Attorney Kathryn Hendrickson and explained diagrams and several graphic photos of the autopsy.

Roth testified that she had performed approximately 3,000 autopsies during her career with several hundred, perhaps as many as 1,000 being autopsies of children and infants.

She testified that she performed an autopsy on Kaylee Jo Buchanan on July 25, 2008 at 9 a.m.,

Dr. Roth outlined several injuries that she noted during the autopsy, these included a fracture to the skull, bruising on the back of the head and both sides, primarily from the left side of the head to the front, "abnormal" contusions to the interior skull and brain membrane, hemorrhaging to the orbital nerve just behind the eye and an injury to the back of the right leg.

Court documents indicated that medical reports done at the UK Medical Center stated that Kaylee Jo Buchanan had broken bones in her leg,

but that was not the case and Dr. Roth found no fractures of breaks in any leg bones during her autopsy.

"The infant died of blunt force trauma to the head and a slight injury to the leg," Dr. Roth said.

Under cross-examination by attorneys Gastine and Hewitt, Dr. Roth confirmed that in all other respects Kaylee Jo Buchanan appeared to have been a healthy normal child, who was well nourished and had no signs of malnourishment or abuse.

Dr. Roth explained the injuries in detail during her testimony and touched upon the question on everyone's mind.

"How the injuries occurred I do not know."

Allen said the same thing under testimony this week.

"I just know," she said to the question from Hendrickson as she wept softly. "I have no idea."

Hendrickson asked Allen if working at the Nicholas hospital and training to become a nursing professional there at the same time, along with holding a second job as a waitress in Flemingsburg, combined with raising a two-year-old son had been overly stressful when raising a three-month-old daughter was added.

"A child is a gift from God," Allen said quietly. "If you're lucky enough to get one, it's not stressful."

Nationally respected forensic anthropologist, Dr. Emily Craig, also of

the Kentucky Medical Examiner's office testified earlier in the trial regarding two distinct and separate perceived injuries to the infant's lower leg and knee area.

Other medical professionals testified about the timing of the injuries and how when inflicted by human hands the child would have suffered immediately.

"This injury was inflicted upon your child and you're telling us you didn't do it?" Hendrickson asked.

"No," Allen said. "That leaves Terry Jo," Hendrickson said.

"It appears that way," Allen said.

The trial continues as The Carlisle Mercury prepares to go to press.

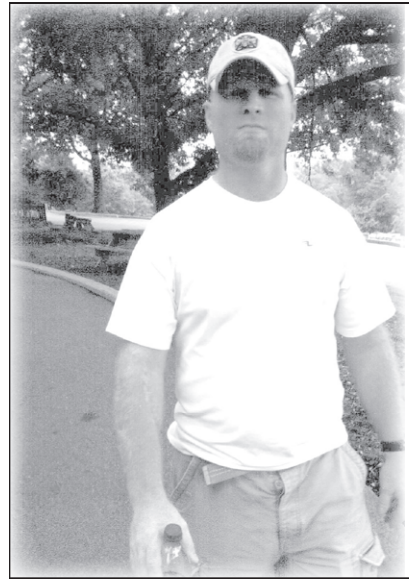

Current mayor Ronnie Clark is seeking re-election and is being opposed by Kevin Booth.

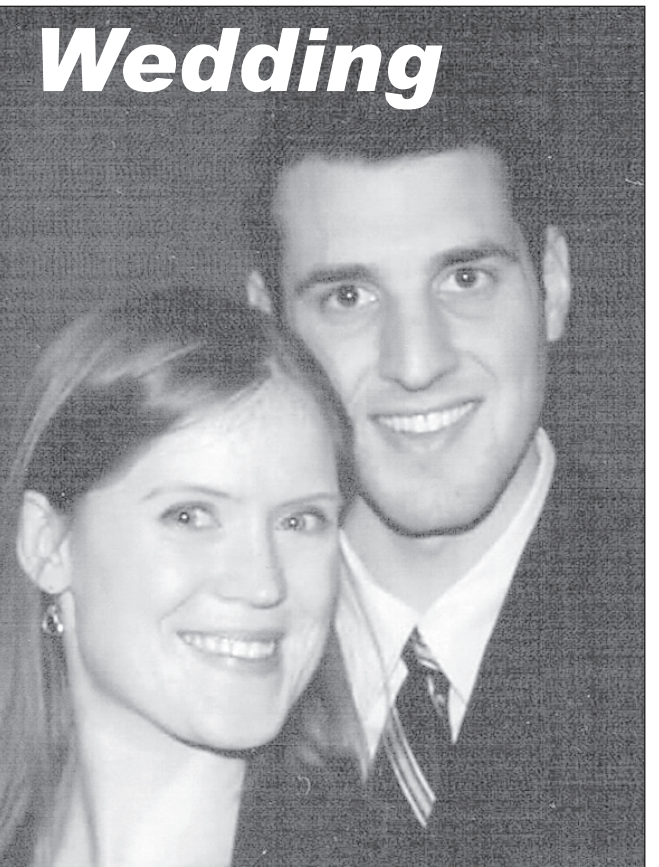
School Board member Chuck Ring of District 4 is seeking re-election and is being opposed by Adam Tubbs.

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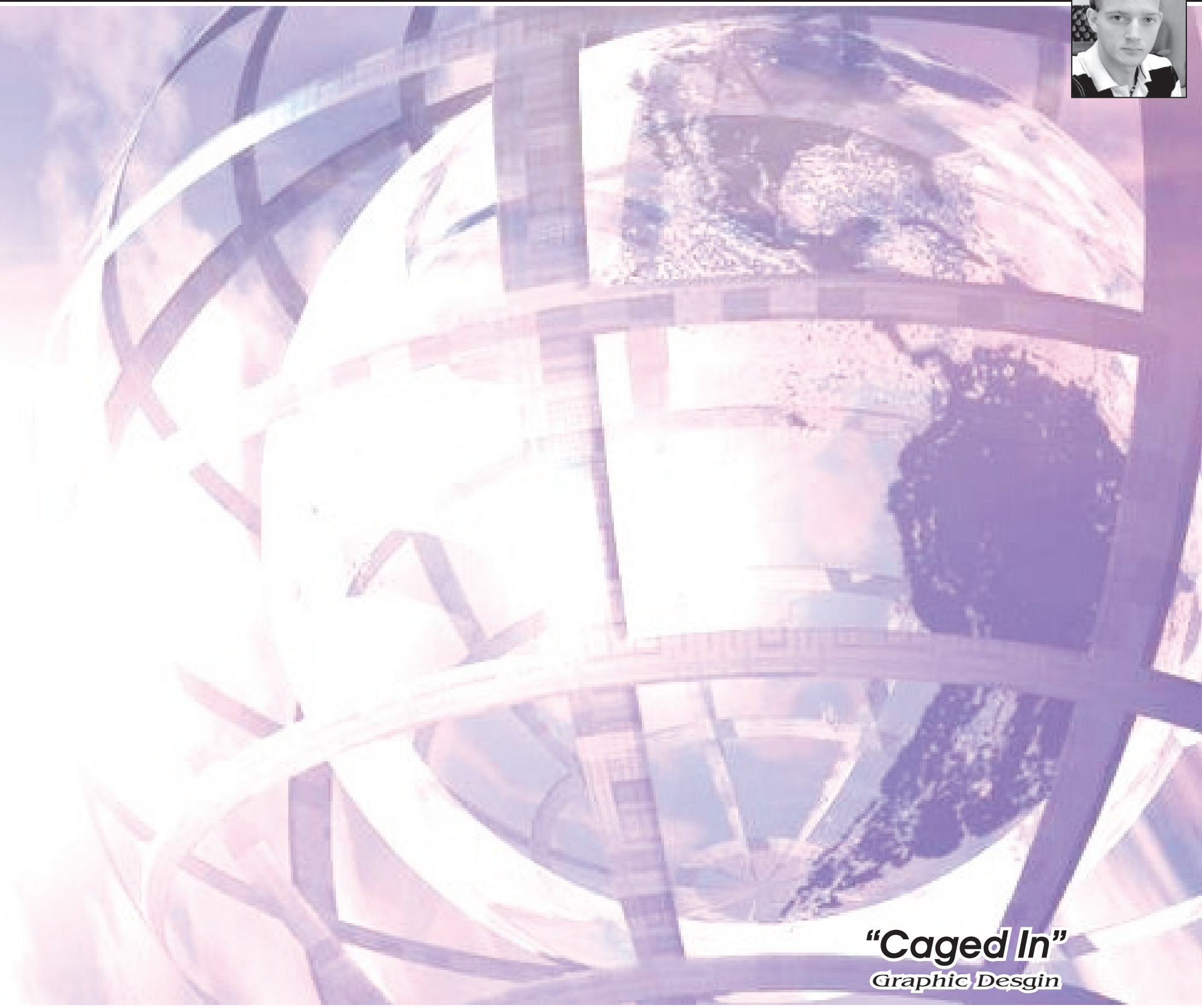

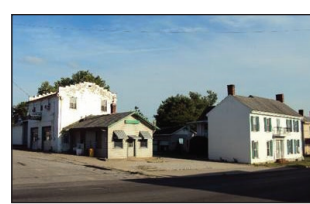
