Carlisle man charged with attempted murder

A Carlisle man remains in the Bourbon County Detention Center after being arrested for attempted murder.

Kentucky State Police Officer Chris Lairson arrested Christopher Mitchell, 37, of Race Street, Carlisle, on August 11, after signing a criminal complaint against him on

the charge of attempted murder.

Mitchell had been previously arrested on Aug. 2, according to court documents and police sources, after an alleged domestic dispute.

Mitchell attempted to escape after being taken into custody, and was charged with assault, 3rd degree-police/probation officer; escape, 2nd degree and criminal mischief, 2nd degree.

According to the ar-

rest warrant filled out by Trooper Lairson, Mitchell and Tamara Fischer were seated in Fischer's truck after Fischer had drove her-

self and Mitchell to "the church parking lot on Catherine Street" at approximately 11:36 p.m., on Aug. 1. According to the arrest citation, Mitchell allegedly became "aggressive toward victim (Fischer). Mitchell then allegedly struck Fischer in the face, causing serious visible injury to her right orbital area, causing a severe orbital hemorrhage, according to the court documents.

Mitchell then allegedly "proceeded to choke the victim with great force" until she lost consciousness and control of her bodily functions. When she awoke Mitchell was allegedly dragging her across a field in the dark.

Fischer escaped some time immediately after this with the "assistance from passers by," according to the warrant.

Mitchell remains lodged in the Bourbon

County Detention Center on \$150,000 cash bond. He will be arraigned on the charge of attempted murder in Nicholas District Court Aug. 18, according to court documents and sources.

Sgt. Darrell Layne, and his K-9 unit Hancock, of the Carlisle Police Department, assisted Trooper Lairson and Trooper David Holland with the initial arrest of Mitchell, according to police sources.

Thieves remove safe from Concord Road home

of a Concord Road residence over the weekend in which several weapons and a large sum of cash was taken.

Sheriff Garrett responded to a call from Tom Adams of Concord

Road, at approximately 4 p.m., Aug. 14 and began investigating a burglary of the Adams home.

A large safe containing approximately 13 fire arms, cash and

other valuables, was removed from the home sometime during the morning or early afternoon hours, according to Garrett.

Garrett said at least two individuals had to

be involved in the removal of the safe and they were most likely driving a truck.

The burglars gained entry through the rear of the home by prying a

back door open, according to Garrett.

First Offense Ashley Hunt: Criminal Possession of a Forged Instrument in the Second Degree, (5 Counts)

Christy Mullins: Trafficking in a Controlled Substance (Oxycodone) in the First Degree - First Offense; Trafficking in a Controlled Substance (Alprazolam) in the Third

Degree - First Offense, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia

Jeremiah Rose: Marijuana Cultivation of Five (5) or More Plants - First Offense

Mark Withrow: Flagrant Nonsupport

Jason Combs: Possession of a Controlled Substance (Methadone) in the First Degree - First Offense, Possession of Marijuana, Operating

a Motor Vehicle While Under the Influence - First Offense.

Members of the grand jury reported to Nicholas Circuit Court Judge, Honorable Jay Delaney, that they had referred "no" cases to Nicholas District Court and that they investigated no cases during their meeting Monday in which they returned a 'no true bill' finding.

Members of the grand

jury did forward three cases to the next grand jury for investigation.

All persons are innocent until proven guilty or pleading guilty. A grand jury indictment is not an indication of guilt but is a required part of the process in the judicial system, which ensures a particular case is moved from the district court level to the circuit court level.

Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

"I counted 182 of us the night we camped at Ruddle's Station on our way to the Blue Licks,"

George Corn, scout for the militia army that met the enemy at Blue Licks on August 19, 1782. From Corn's deposition in Fleming Land Book C. Corn was shot in the face during the battle, but survived.

"Early in the firing I saw George Corn was shot right in the mouth, taking away all the teeth in the right jaw. I saw him spit the ball into his hand. Jim Hayes said he'd be damned if'n he didn't shoot one, but he got wounded. I fired three times and was priming for the fourth when word of the retreat came. I turned to get my horse and it was gone."

Jacob Stevens Draper Manuscripts volume 12 CC page 135

"I cannot reflect upon this dreadful scene, but sorrow fills my heart. A zeal for the defense of their country led these heroes to the scene of action, though with a few men to attack a powerful army of experienced warriors. When we gave way, they pursued us with the utmost eagerness, and in every quarter spread destruction. The river was difficult to cross, and many were killed in the flight, some just entering the river, some in the water, others after crossing in ascending the cliffs. Some escaped on horse-back, a few on foot; and, being dispersed every where, in a few hours, brought the melancholy news of this unfortunate battle to Lexington. Many widows were now made. The reader may guess what sorrow filled the hearts of the inhabitants, exceeding any thing that I am able to describe. Being reinforced, we returned to bury the dead, and found their bodies strewn every where, cut and mangled in a dreadful manner. This mournful scene exhibited a horror almost unparalleled: Some torn and eaten by wild beasts; those in the river eaten by fishes; all in such a putrefied condition, that no one could be distinguished from another."

These words are taken from Boone's interview with his first biographer John

Filson. The interview appeared in "The discovery, settlement and present state of Kentucky", printed in 1784.

No place holds the venerated and ancient secrets of our Kentucky landscape in quite the same manner as the hills and hollows in and around the Blue Licks Battlefield State Resort Park.

For several generations the ancient and spellbinding beauty and history of the park has enhanced the commerce of the area as well as having provided a unique environment for families to gather together upon sacred ground: Ground sanctified by Native Americans for thousands of years and ground which they guarded ferociously against their enemies, the unwelcome Kentucky frontiers-

men who dared to occupy the forests south of the Ohio River. The "Shemanese" as the Kentuckians were called, or "Long Knives" even defiled the sacred salt springs that sprang forth from along the waters of the Licking River.

Like many of you dear reader, I became familiar with the park at a very early age.

For the past four decades I have continuously searched historical documents to learn more about those who consecrated that hallowed ground with their lives one brutal and sweltering August day in 1782.

After 40 years of research and coming to know the men who fought there that day, men who though enemies, were intimately familiar with one another, I continue to be fascinated with what I have come to understand about these men, and the times they lived in.

The facts that haunt the battlefield are bizarre indeed, and too

numerous to mention within the confines of this column.

But I found it compelling to learn that Joseph Jackson and Micajah Calloway were two Kentuckians that had been among Boone's salt makers captured three years before the battle. They, and several other former Kentuckians, became so immersed into their adoptive Native American (Shawnee) culture that they fought against their former Kentucky family members and friends at Blue Licks and at Bryan's Station and at the Upper Licks.

Many of the Kentucky heroes who fell at the battle had bravely defended Bryan's Station only two days earlier.

Most of the Kentucky prisoners taken during the battle were slowly tortured to death near the Licking River over a period of two days. Others, like James Ledgerwood, Hugh Cunningham and Lewis Rose were adopted into native American Tribes and

returned home after a long year of absence to wives who no longer recognized them.

Andrew Morgan was dreadfully wounded in the battle but survived. I have written of the Morgan family often in the past and Andrew more than once, but it bears noting here once more of the words he spoke to his presumed deceased wife who discovered him on the battle field five days after the battle and one day before Benjamin Logan's recovery force arrived to bury what remains were left.

Morgan had thought his wife had perished during one of the raids around Bryan's Station and was himself near death when she found him and washed the blood and gore from his face with a cool wet rag. Morgan believed he had died and his angelic wife was now tending to him.

Believing he was in Heaven as she gently kissed his forehead he could barely open his

eyes yet as he looked around he uttered a simple phrase, which has become the title of my column for the past 40 months.

"Heaven is a lot like Kentucky," he whispered to his wife as his gaze swept the horizon, before he lost consciousness in the oppressive and unmerciful August sun.

But Andrew Morgan and his wife were survivors, dear reader, as we Kentuckians are. And within this space I seek to continue to honor their memories and our rich and distinct heritage each week.

If you've never visited the Blue Licks Battlefield State Resort Park during the annual battle re-enactment, then do yourself a favor and make a journey to one of our state's best parks this weekend.

Stand on the ground where our ancestors struggled over the right to live in this ancient and sacred land, which we still call home.

Stand on ground consecrated by the blood of heroes.

John Howell Wolf

John Howell Wolf, 92, former publisher of eight community newspapers in the Greater Cincinnati area, died on August 15, 2010 at Carlisle, KY.

Wolf, owner and publisher of Cincinnati Suburban Newspaper, Incorporated since 1946, began his newspaper career in 1926 as an apprentice in the print shop under his father, the late Dale Wolf, and mother, the late Ruth Howell Wolf. In 1979 he purchase Clermont Newspapers Incorporated.

Born in Narbeth, Pennsylvania, Wolf moved to Cincinnati in 1922. He was educated at Norwood High School and DePauw University in Greencastle, Indiana. He was active on the committee of the Northeast Branch YMCA in Cincinnati since 1947, United Appeal, Norwood Chamber of Commerce, Media Advisory Committee of the Cincinnati Police Department and a director of the Advertisers Club of Cincinnati.

On the national level, he was past President, Secretary and Director of Suburban Newspapers of America, a director of Suburban Press Foundation, a director of Accredited Home Newspapers of America and on the advisory board of United States Suburban Press, Incorporated. He also served as chairman of the national Better Newspaper Contests in 1956 and

1957. He was President of the National Newspaper Association (NNA), and twice served terms as a director of NNA and a term as board secretary. In 1981 he received the Outstanding Director award from NNA - the only time it was presented.

He was a member of Delta Upsilon, Sigma Delta Chi professional journalism society, and Kennedy Heights Presbyterian Church in Cincinnati, where he was a Ruling Elder for 14 year before moving to Kentucky in 1983, following the sale of his newspapers. He served in the United States Army as head of the Quartermaster Technical Training Service at Camp Lee, Virginia in World War II.

He is survived by his wife, the former Emily West Asbury, Carisle; a son, John B. Wolf of Cincinnati; a daughter, Dr. Wendy J. Wolf, Booth Bay Harbor, Maine; a brother, Dr. Arthur D. Wolf, Hartford, Connecticut; a sister, Harriet W. Arnold, Cincinnati. He was preceded in death by three sisters, Wynne W. Lyon, Western Springs, Illinois; Marjory W. Smith, Chehalis, Washington; and Enid W. White, San Antonio, Texas.

A memorial service will be conducted at the Carlisle Presbyterian Church at 11:00 AM, Wednesday, August 25, 2010.

If my tears could build a stairway to you, I'd climb it. Not a single day goes by that I don't think about you. Oh, how I miss you.

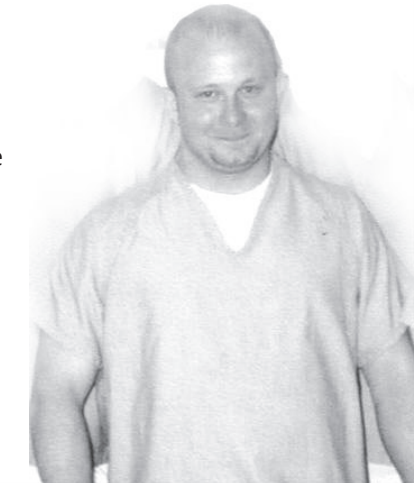

A general surgeon is a specialist prepared to manage a broad spectrum of surgical conditions affecting almost any area of the body. The surgeon establishes the diagnosis and provides the preoperative, operative and post-operative care to surgical patients and is usually responsible for the comprehensive management of the trauma victim and the critically ill.

Q: What is a Hernia and how do you treat it?

A: A hernia, or "rupture" is a weakness or defect in the wall of the abdomen. This weakness may be present at birth, or, it can be caused by the wear and tear of daily living. If left untreated, a hernia can get worse with time and physical stress.

A weak area in the abdominal wall allows the contents of the abdomen to push outward. This often causes a noticeable bulge under the skin. The bulge may get bigger when you stand and go away when you lie down. You may also feel pressure or discomfort when lifting, coughing, urinating, or doing other activities.

Types of Hernias - The type of hernia you have depends on its location. Most hernias form in the groin at or near the internal ring. This is the entrance to a canal between the abdomen and groin. Hernias can also occur in the abdomen, thigh, or genitals.

- An **incisional hernia** occurs at the site of a previous surgical incision.
- An **Umbilical hernia** occurs at the naval.
- An **indirect inguinal hernia** occurs in the groin at the internal ring.
- A **direct inguinal hernia** occurs in the groin near the internal ring.
- A **femoral hernia** occurs just below the groin.
- An **epigastric hernia** occurs in the upper abdomen at the midline.

A hernia will not heal on its own. Surgery is needed to repair the defect in the abdominal wall. If not treated, a hernia can get larger. It can also lead to serious medical complications. The good news is that hernia surgery can be done quickly and safely. In most cases, you can go home the same day as your surgery.

Park to commemorate Battle of Blue Licks this weekend

The 228th anniversary of the Battle of Blue Licks will be commemorated at the Blue Licks Battlefield State Resort Park this weekend with lots of entertainment, including the annual battle re-enactment.

"We're moving the battle re-enactment back to the ridge next to the museum," said Park Manager Mark Schwenau. "And we're going to have plenty of other entertainment."

Park visitors will pay \$5 at the entrance and will have access to all of the park's facilities at no additional charges, according to Schwendau.

The entry fee will include access to the park's pool, miniature golf, museum and several other park features.

Schwendau has been at the helm of the park since June and brings 16 years of experience to the Blue Licks Battlefield State Resort Park.

Captain William Caldwell, and renegade Simon Girty, in an invasion of Kentucky.

The main enemy force laid siege to Bryan's Station for three days near Lexington, with a splinter group of approximately 70 warriors striking Hoy's Station in present Madison County. The splinter group captured two children from Hoy's: Jack Calloway and Jones Hoy, and lured a force of 63 frontiersmen into a trap at Battle Run in present day Fleming County, where five frontiersmen from Capt. John Strode's Station and David McGee's Station (both located near present day Winchester) were killed with Captain John Fleming being seriously wounded.

Similar tactics were used one week later to draw a force of 182 Kentucky militia soldiers from Bryan's Station to an ambush at Lower Blue Licks. The militia force was under the command of Colonel John Todd, Lt. Colonel Stephen Trigg and Lt. Colonel Daniel Boone. The two forces met near the present site of the pioneer Museum inside the park, according to recent historical accounts with enemy forces overrunning the Kentuckians in a matter of minutes.

A retreat to the Licking River ended in a slaughter with approximately 60 Kentuckians, including Col Todd and Lt. Col. Trigg, perishing in the fierce hand-to-hand fighting that followed. Approximately one dozen Kentuckians were captured.

The remains of the fallen Kentuckians were buried in a mass grave inside what is now the park by a recovery force led by Benjamin Logan and Daniel Boone, who returned to the battle six days later. Boone's son, Israel, also perished in the battle. Israel was Daniel Boone's second son to die at the hands of Native American warriors in Kentucky. His eldest son James was killed in 1773 on Walden Ridge near the Cumberland Gap.

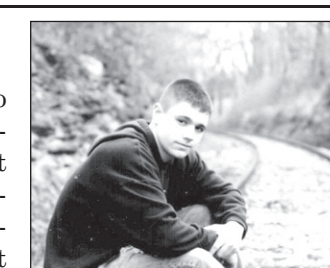

Caleb Sadler wins national award

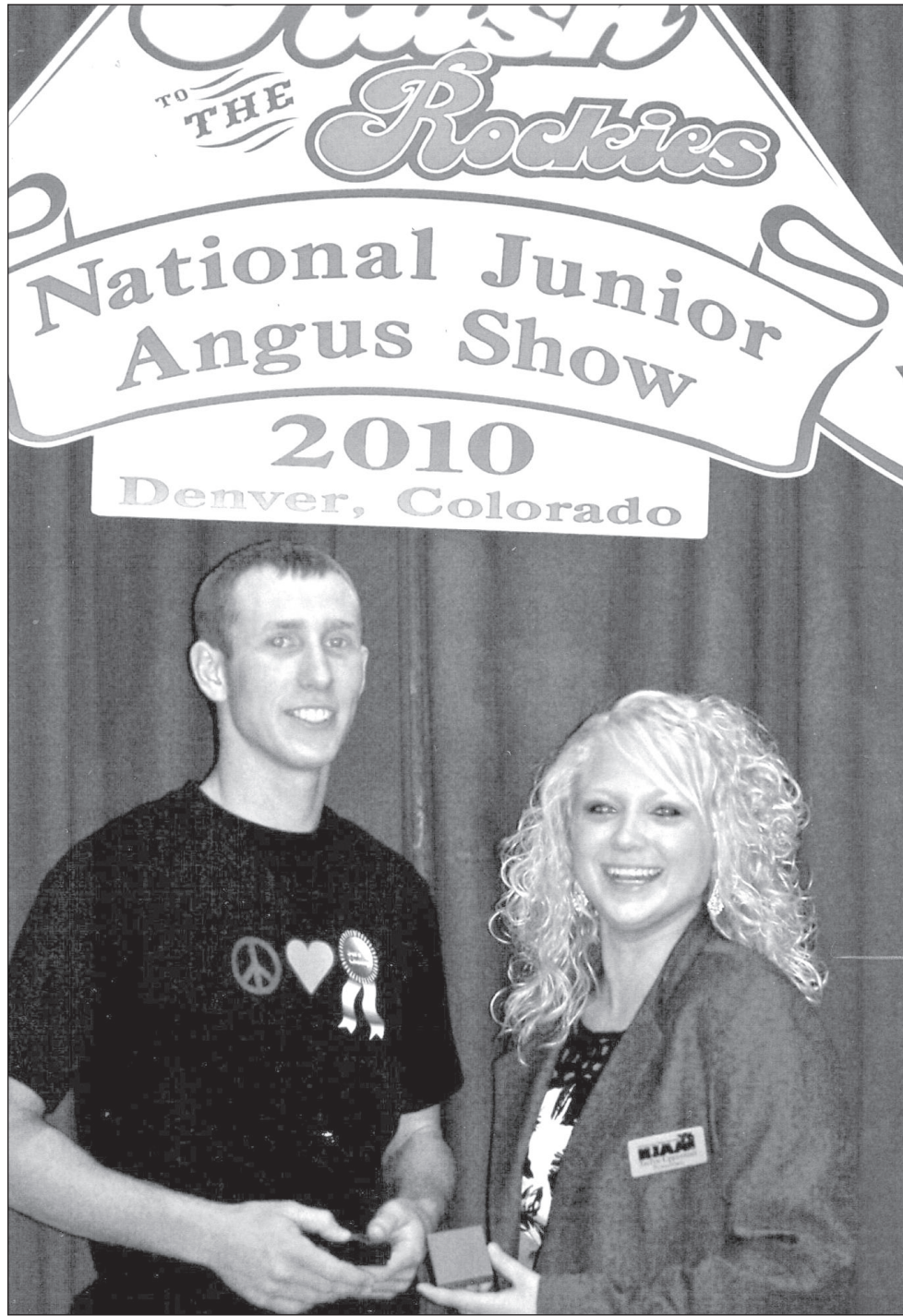

Caleb is the son of Jimmy and Lona Sadler and the grandson of Charles K. Hamilton.



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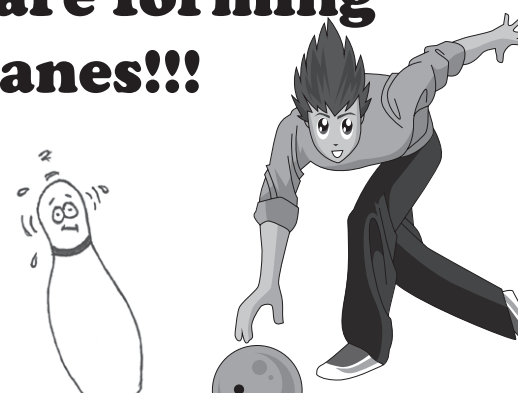

So be sure to let your parents know that you love them for everything they gave you and that you have the utmost respect for them. I know that I do, came to realize this once I came a parent myself.



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

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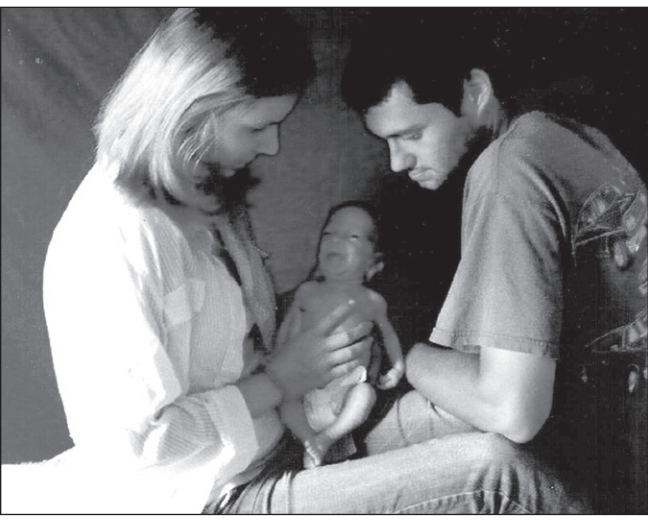

Court votes to keep tax rate same

Members of the Nicholas County fiscal Court split their vote when deciding on the tax rate during last week's fiscal court meeting.

On the recommendation from Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tincher, Magistrate Mike Webb made a motion to keep the compensating tax rate at 13.1 percent, which is the same rate as last year. The motion was seconded by Magistrate Jeff Randolph and passed by a margin during a vote. Magistrate Steve Hamilton voted against

the motion, noting that "at some point" the county would have to do something to increase revenue.

Magistrate Daryl Stacy did not vote.

Stacy noted that a small increase to 13.6 percent would be insignificant to most tax payers but would amount to an increase of \$11,000 in the general fund to be used in the future to maintain and improve current county programs.

Stacy noted that a small increase over time would have a huge positive impact on the county's revenue.

Magistrate Avery Thornsburg was absent.

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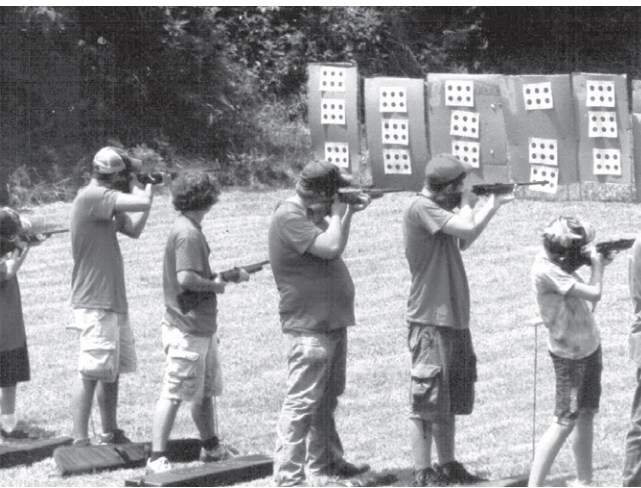

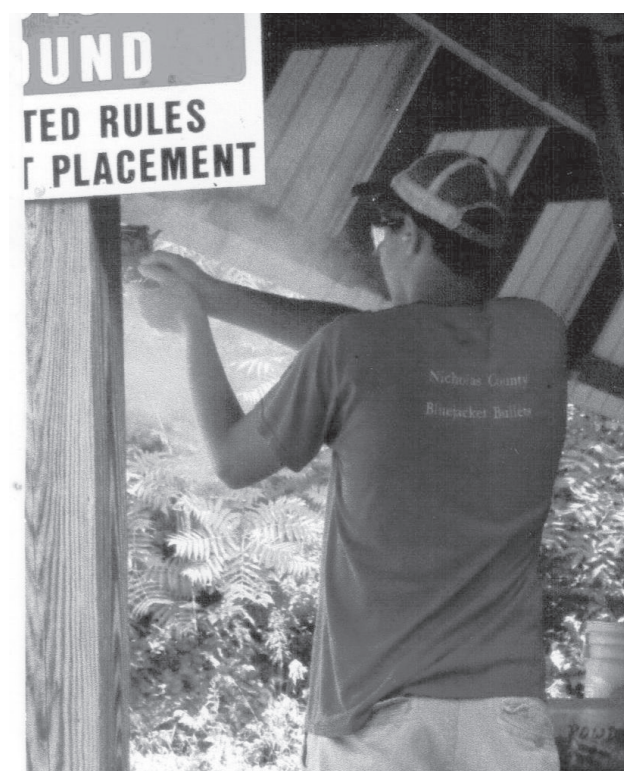

New bridge coming to KY 1285 at Carlisle in Nicholas County

A Kentucky Transportation Cabinet project scheduled to begin next week will replace an aging bridge on East Union Road (KY 1285) in Nicholas County.

The project, on East Union Road just south of KY 36 at Carlisle, will require a temporary one-lane creek crossing so traffic can detour around the work site. Kentucky Department of Highways crews will install the crossing adjacent to

the existing bridge this week.

On Monday, Aug. 23, crews will begin construction of the new bridge – a 24-foot wide, 36-foot long reinforced concrete span, which is wider and longer than the existing bridge.

Bridge construction is expected to take until late September, during which time KY 1285 traffic must use the detour crossing, which will be controlled by temporary traffic signals. Motorists

should expect short delays and should use caution as travel could be on rough surfaces at times. Oversize loads need to detour using either KY 36 or KY 32 and KY 13.

Road work is subject to change depending on weather conditions. Motorists are asked to heed warning signs, "Drive Smart" in work zones and remain aware of workers and construction equipment when traveling.

Nicholas County Conservation District Cost Share Program announced

The Nicholas County Conservation District will be accepting requests for cost share funding under the Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Program beginning September 1 and extending through September 30.

The Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Programs were created to help agricultural operations protect the soil and water resources of

Kentucky. This program is a result of House Bill 377 that was passed in the 1994 General Assembly. This bill established annual cost share funds to be administered by conservation districts with priority given to animal waste related problems and agricultural district participants where pollution problems have been identified. Initial funding for the program will be provided by the Kentucky Department of

Agriculture. Funding for practices will be approved by the Soil and Water Conservation Commission at the Kentucky Division of Conservation, located at Frankfort, as funds are available. Elementary school sees big adjustments

With the new changes to the high school and middle school it seems that at times we are losing sight of the changes going on at the elementary school. Since the 7th and 8th grade made the move to the new Middle school wing of the high school, it opened up eight new classrooms to be used by students ranging from pre-school to 6th grade. In previous years teachers and multiple classes have been required to share classrooms due to space restrictions. After the middle school move, this opened up space for the remaining grades so that they may have a better, more comfortable learning environment.

5th and 6th graders are probably the students most affect-

ed by the move in the elementary school. Classrooms originally occupied by the middle school grades are now used by the two previously mentioned grades. In a brief interview with 5th grader Logan Bechanan stated, "I think it works better for the school because we don't have to share classes." Followed by fellow 5th grader Wilson Switzer, "I like it because of the new lockers and because people that had to share classes can now switch."

The majority of students affected by the changes were extremely excited that they were now allowed to have lockers and a lot more freedom. This change has given young students the chance to see how it feels to be more independent and responsible within school,

helping prepare them for the middle and high school levels of education. The opening of the extra classes have already proved to be significantly better for the school district, especially in terms of the comfort and consolidation of the classes. At one point certain grades of students were required to walk great lengths to various classes and with the open classrooms this is no longer an issue. 5th grade teacher Stephanie Duncan stated that it was a "major adjustment going from the middle school level to an elementary setting. Because we expect a lot in this environment it's going to take some time. Other than that I think it's a great thing. The kids really enjoy that they get lockers."
