### Tax dollars bypassing county

County officials were quick to clarify last month that the majority of property taxes paid by Nicholas County citizens bypassed the county's general fund and went straight to the taxing district entities instead.

The county has received approximately \$287,711 in taxes this year, which consists of \$280,345 in real estate tax and \$7,366 in "tangible" property

The majority of real estate taxes paid in Nicholas County go to the school. The school's total receipts for taxes are \$836,298.

Even the library takes in more tax dollars that the state. The Nicholas County Library receives a total of \$295,241.

The county employs three office workers, one worker at the land fill and ten employees at the county barn (one of those is off on sick leave) with coun-

ty workers at the county barn being paid through the county's "road fund", financed largely through the gasoline tax, according to Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tincher. The county coroner and staff and county attorney and staff are also paid out of the county's treasury, as are the magistrates.

"Most people think a lot of their tax dollars goes to the county," veteran outgoing Magistrate Daryl Stacy said during the Nov. 9 meeting. "But you can clearly see that just isn't the case."

Judge Tincher agreed as did other county officials.

Judge Tincher noted that other than receiving the taxing rates, which determines the amount of taxes to be paid, from the school and library, the county officials have no authority or legal jurisdiction over those entities, other than the occasional appointment to board members of the both the school and library.

A friend contacted me through facebook and challenged me to list the top 15 characters (book, movie or TV), that had influenced my life. The challenge stated that I shouldn't spend too much time thinking about it.

Well, I haven't posted my answers yet on facebook, and may never get around to it, but I did spend several minutes over the Thanksgiving break thinking about how fictional characters had impacted and influenced my life.

The late 1960s, and the 70s were the golden years for the TV westerns.

Man, oh man, between TV westerns like Gunsmoke, Bonanza, The High Chaparral, The Virginian and Have gun, will travel; there were cowboy characters a plenty.

Movies were also comprised of lots of westerns.
