## Tax dollars bypassing county

County officials were quick to clarify last month that the majority of property taxes paid by Nicholas County citizens bypassed the county's general fund and went straight to the taxing district entities instead.

The county has received approximately \$287,711 in taxes this year, which consists of \$280,345 in real estate tax and \$7,366 in "tangible" property

The majority of real estate taxes paid in Nicholas County go to the school. The school's total receipts for taxes are \$836,298.

Even the library takes in more tax dollars that the state. The Nicholas County Library receives a total of \$295,241.

The county employs three office workers, one worker at the land fill and ten employees at the county barn (one of those is off on sick leave) with coun-

ty workers at the county barn being paid through the county's "road fund", financed largely through the gasoline tax, according to Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tincher. The county coroner and staff and county attorney and staff are also paid out of the county's treasury, as are the magistrates.

"Most people think a lot of their tax dollars goes to the county," veteran outgoing Magistrate Daryl Stacy said during the Nov. 9 meeting. "But you can clearly see that just isn't the case."

Judge Tincher agreed as did other county officials.

Judge Tincher noted that other than receiving the taxing rates, which determines the amount of taxes to be paid, from the school and library, the county officials have no authority or legal jurisdiction over those entities, other than the occasional appointment to board members of the both the school and library.

We need more westerns on TV.

A friend contacted me through facebook and challenged me to list the top 15 characters (book, movie or TV), that had influenced my life. The challenge stated that I shouldn't spend too much time thinking about it.

Well, I haven't posted my answers yet on facebook, and may never get around to it, but I did spend several minutes over the Thanksgiving break thinking about how fictional characters had impacted and influenced my life.

The late 1960s, and the 70s were the golden years for the TV westerns.

Man, oh man, between TV westerns like Gunsmoke, Bonanza, The High Chaparral, The Virginian and Have gun, will travel; there were cowboy characters a plenty.

Movies were also comprised of lots of westerns.

All had strong male leads with a clear sense of right and wrong. We just don't have that today in entertainment.

Too many folks sitting on the edge of their seat hoping the latest reality floozy will slip and twist and ankle on "dancing with the stars", or at least that's my assessment of the anticipation of today's TV viewers.

But that wasn't the case in decades gone by for TV or major motion pictures.

The character of Ethan Edwards, the lead role for John Wayne in the classic John Ford western called "The Searchers" ranks at the top of my list.

But I was a pretty big John Wayne fan no matter how you sliced it.

Wayne, Ford (a master of cinema and storytelling) along with critics across time, have hailed "The Searchers" as the best western ever made, and I am strongly inclined to believe that.

Wayne's portrayal of Ethan Edwards, a Confederate Civil War veteran with a shady past, who seeks vengeance on raiding Comanche warriors, while hoping to free his captive niece, is a complex tale of a man struggling with his own demons.

Wayne's portrayal of US Marshall Rooster Cogburn in "True Grit" comes in a close second with another excellent performance by Wayne and several others, including Glenn Campbell, Kim Darby and even Robert Duvall, whose performance of Texas Ranger Augustus McRae in Larry McMurty's "Lonesome Dove" TV series, was flawless.

Wayne won the Oscar for his performance of the one-eyed Marshall, Rooster Cogburn, in 1969.

It was Wayne's only Oscar but most critics agree his role in "The Searchers" was a far superior job of acting.

Jeff Bridges is slated to portray Marshall Cogburn in a remake of True Grit, sched-

uled to hit the theaters just before Christmas this year.

I think Mr. Bridges will do justice to the Hollywood legend, though I was a bit disturbed that Matt Damon, who plays the Texas Ranger previously played by Glen Campbell. Damon was quoted recently as saying he'd never seen the original True Grit movie, so he lost big

points as far as artistic integrity and general knowledge, for a Hollywood star goes, though I've truly enjoyed all the other roles Damon has played in.

But I just don't see good storytelling and cinematography in today's movies like those of the western genre from 30 years ago.

Just a lot of complicated special effects, with no plot, no complex characters, and no storytelling, just lots of cool explosions and computer-generated "entertainment".

Where are the likes of Charlton Heston, Gary Cooper, Gregory Peck, Charles Bronson, Steve McQueen and so many others? True, Clint Eastwood did a wonderful job with "Unforgiven" in recent years, but Hollywood has essentially turned away from western movies in comparison to what was once the norm.

Who knows, maybe Matt Damon can get a call from "Dancing with the Stars" if the new "True Grit" does well.

But if he does and wins big or falls and breaks his hip, I won't be the wiser, cause regardless of how low the standards of the "normal" viewer of TV and movies goes, I've been trying to keep my standards fairly high.

No "Dancing with the stars" for me. Not once, not ever. I'm just not that desperate for entertainment.

"Oh my God can you believe that Bristol Palin beat Brandy out on Dancing with the stars the other day," I was asked recently.

"Nope, can't believe it," I answered.

I'd rather watch reruns

of BJ and the Bear. Heck, maybe Greg Evigan could make an appearance on Dancing with the Stars, or the chimp.

If he's still alive, that is. Either way, I won't be watching him boogie on down or anyone else, for that matter. Nope, not even Matt Damon and Jeff Bridges. Not even if they're square dancing with the stars.

I guess I'll just watch reruns of "Stagecoach", "She wore a yellow ribbon", "Shane" and "The magnificent Seven" until something better comes along.

I won't be holding my breath, Pilgrim.

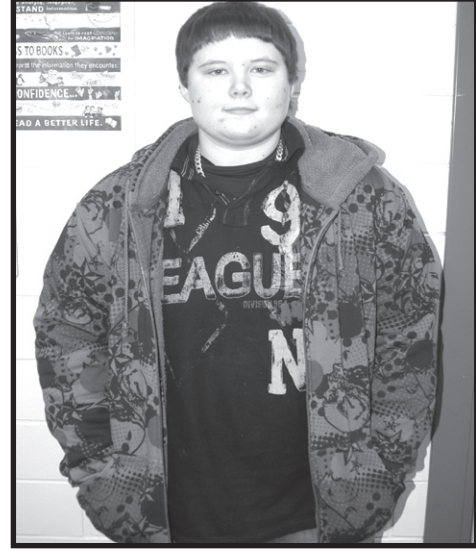

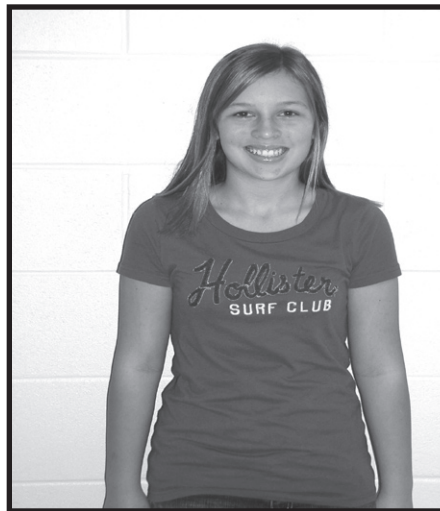
# STUDENT SPOTLIGHT

# Save on Winter Heating Bills

Rebates, Tax Credits, Financing and Grants are all available to help homeowners make their homes more energy efficient. It can be confusing to figure out if you're eligible for any of the cost savings that are available. I'm in my second year as a VISTA Member at Frontier Housing working on a new line of business, Green Solutions, a green rehabilitation and replacement housing program. I've become familiar with the different savings that are out there and I wanted to pass along this information.

You may not be aware that your electric utility company co-op offers incentives for making energy efficiency home improvements. You'll need to check with your specific utility company and the programs they offer. Some offer cash rebates for installing new energy efficient heat pumps or adding insulation.

Touchstone Energy Cooperatives has a Home Energy Calculator on their web site which allows you to enter information about your house and helps you discover your potential energy savings based on different improvements projects, such as adding insulation.

Some utility companies even offer Energy Audits, where a certified technician will use special equipment to analyze your home's energy efficiency. You will receive a detailed report that outlines your energy usage with a list of recommended improvements and the estimated cost to apply those measures. It's never too late to be thinking about federal and state tax incentives. If you purchase and install specific products, such as energy-efficient windows, insulation, doors, roofs, and heating and cooling equipment (including some wood burning stoves) in your existing home you can receive a Federal tax credit for 30% of the cost, up to \$1,500, for improvements from January 1, 2009, through December 31, 2010. There are also tax incentives for those building a new home. Kentucky offers state tax credits for 30% of the installed cost up to \$500 for specific energy efficiency home improvements from January 1, 2009 to December 31, 2015. You'll need to save your receipts to submit with your 2010 taxes. If you do \$5,000 worth of qualifying work, you not only get a \$1,500 federal tax credit and \$500 state tax credit, but also savings on energy bills for years to come.

Rebates are paid directly to homeowners or homebuilders. Kentucky had a mail in Appliance Rebate program to help residents replace older inefficient appliances with new ENERGY STAR qualified appliances. All of Kentucky's rebate funds have been reserved, but they are anticipating a large number of the reserved rebates will not be redeemed by residents who did not make an actual purchase after reserving funds. They are encouraging people to sign up on a waiting list for unclaimed funds that will be distributed on a first-come first-served basis. Read the requirements carefully, you may be eligible for rebates ranging from \$50 to \$400.

Now you know all the ways you can save money on energy efficient improvements, but how do you pay for these improvements? Frontier Housing has low interest loans for all income levels. The bottom line is that the combination of tax credits, rebates and favorable loan programs provides a significant incentive for people wishing to improve the energy performance of their homes, or invest in renewable energy systems.

## Nine Deaths on Kentucky Roadways During Thanksgiving Holiday

(FRANKFORT, KY) Preliminary statistics\* indicate that nine people died in eight separate crashes on Kentucky roadways during the Thanksgiving holiday enforcement period (Wednesday, Nov. 24 through Sunday, Nov. 28, 2010). Last year there were eight highway fatalities during the same time period.

All of the crashes involved motor vehicles and four victims were not wearing seat belts. Single-fatality crashes occurred in Hancock, Marshall (2), Owsley, Rowan, Shelby and

Trigg counties. The crashes in Marshall and Owsley counties involved the suspected use of alcohol.

A double fatality crash occurred in Oldham County and both victims were wearing seatbelts.

Through November 28, preliminary statistics\* indicate that 695 people have lost their lives on Kentucky roadways during 2010. This is 24 less fatalities than reported for the same time period in 2009. There were 541 motor vehicle fatalities and 288 of those victims

were not wearing seat belts. One hundred forty-one of those crashes involved a commercial motor vehicle. Fifty-three pedestrians and six bicyclists have been killed. Seventy-eight fatalities involved a motorcycle and fifteen fatalities involved an ATV. Two fatalities involved a scooter. A total of one hundred forty-one fatalities have resulted from crashes involving the suspected use of alcohol.

Citizens can contribute to highway safety by reporting erratic drivers to the Kentucky

State Police toll-free at 1-800-222-5555. Callers will remain anonymous and should give a description of the vehicle, location, direction of travel and license number if possible.

\*These statistics are still preliminary as KSP waits for all local law enforcement agencies throughout the state to report any crashes and fatalities that may have occurred in their areas. Crash data for this report is generated from the Kentucky Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS).

## Cowan man pleads guilty in connection with trailer thefts

A Fleming man recently entered guilty pleas in connection with the theft of trailers from a Cassidy Creek farm.

Harold Wayne McIntyre, 35, of Cowan, entered a guilty plea to the charge of receiving stolen property, over \$500, but less than \$10,000, recently in Fleming Circuit Court.

McIntyre entered the plea on Nov. 5 in the presence of his attorney Bryan Underwood and Fleming Circuit Court

Judge, Honorable Stockton Wood.

According to court documents, McIntyre allegedly "had in his possession and disposed of, two farm trailers belonging to Darrell Myers".

The trailers were allegedly taken from Myers on or about Dec. 27 of last year.

McIntyre was indicted by members of a Fleming County Grand Jury in May of this year following an investigation headed by Kentucky State Police Troopers Chad Bowling and Chris Arnett.

Commonwealth

Attorney for Fleming County, Kathryn Hendrickson, signed documents with McIntyre regarding an offer on a plea of guilty which indicates a two-year prison sentence will be recommended to Judge Wood during McIntyre's scheduled January 7 sentencing hearing in Fleming Circuit Court.

Upon receiving McIntyre's guilty

plea, Judge Wood ordered a pre-sentence investigation (PSI) report be submitted to him prior to the issuance of any sentence.

Hendrickson indicated on court documents that the Commonwealth would have "no position" on a recommendation of probation until the PSI report was complete.

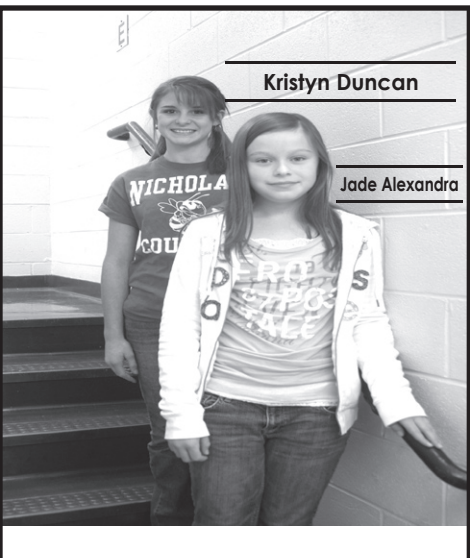

## State highway crews ready for winter snow season!

FLEMINGSBURG, Ky. – It's "snow season" in Kentucky Department of Highways District 9, and highway crews in Bath, Boyd, Carter, Elliott, Fleming, Greenup, Lewis, Mason, Nicholas and Rowan counties are ready to keep 2,000 miles of state roads passable during inclement weather.

Since October, district crews have been inspecting snow plows, calibrating salt-spreading equipment – trucks are put through a 300-foot test run to make sure spreaders distribute the correct amount – and developing snowstorm

response procedures. "We take snow and ice response very seriously," Chief District Engineer Bart Bryant said. "Highway safety is an essential function of the Transportation Cabinet, and our crews are prepared to meet that mandate by keeping our roads as safe as possible during bad weather."

When bad weather hits, crews plow and treat roads using a priority system based on the amount and nature of traffic within each individual county. Priority A routes include major through

routes and are those most heavily traveled. Priority B routes include other important, but lesser traveled, state routes. Other roads fall into Priority C.

While it's the Transportation Cabinet's goal to treat all routes within eight hours of a routine winter storm event, higher priority routes are treated within a one- to four-hour turnaround time.

More detailed information about the Department of Highways' snow and ice response plans, in-

cluding maps of priority routes in each county, is available on District 9's web site at [www.transportation.ky.gov/d9/](http://www.transportation.ky.gov/d9/) by clicking the "District Snow Operations!" link.

"The Transportation Cabinet recognizes how important roadway conditions are to Kentucky motorists, especially during winter storms," Bryant said. "That's why our highway crews often spend long hours away from home to keep roadways clear and safe for the traveling public. We appreciate their service."

Throughout snow sea-

son, which runs from November to March, highway response teams across Kentucky serve weekly on-call rotations. The teams monitor weather reports when snow is in the forecast and determine when to activate the state's arsenal of snow-fighting equipment, including more than 1,000 snow plows.

In District 9, more than 120 crew members operating 75 snow plows – plus contract plows and crews – are involved with snow removal operations. And, approximately 24,700 tons of salt are current-

ly stockpiled to battle winter precipitation. Crews work around the clock until storms pass to keep roadways in the best possible condition.

Motorists are reminded to give a wide berth to plows, salt trucks and other snow-clearing heavy equipment. To be effective in dispersing de-icing material, trucks tend to travel at a slower speed. Also, snow plows may create a snow cloud which can cause a white out or zero visibility condition, so keep a safe distance away from the trucks.

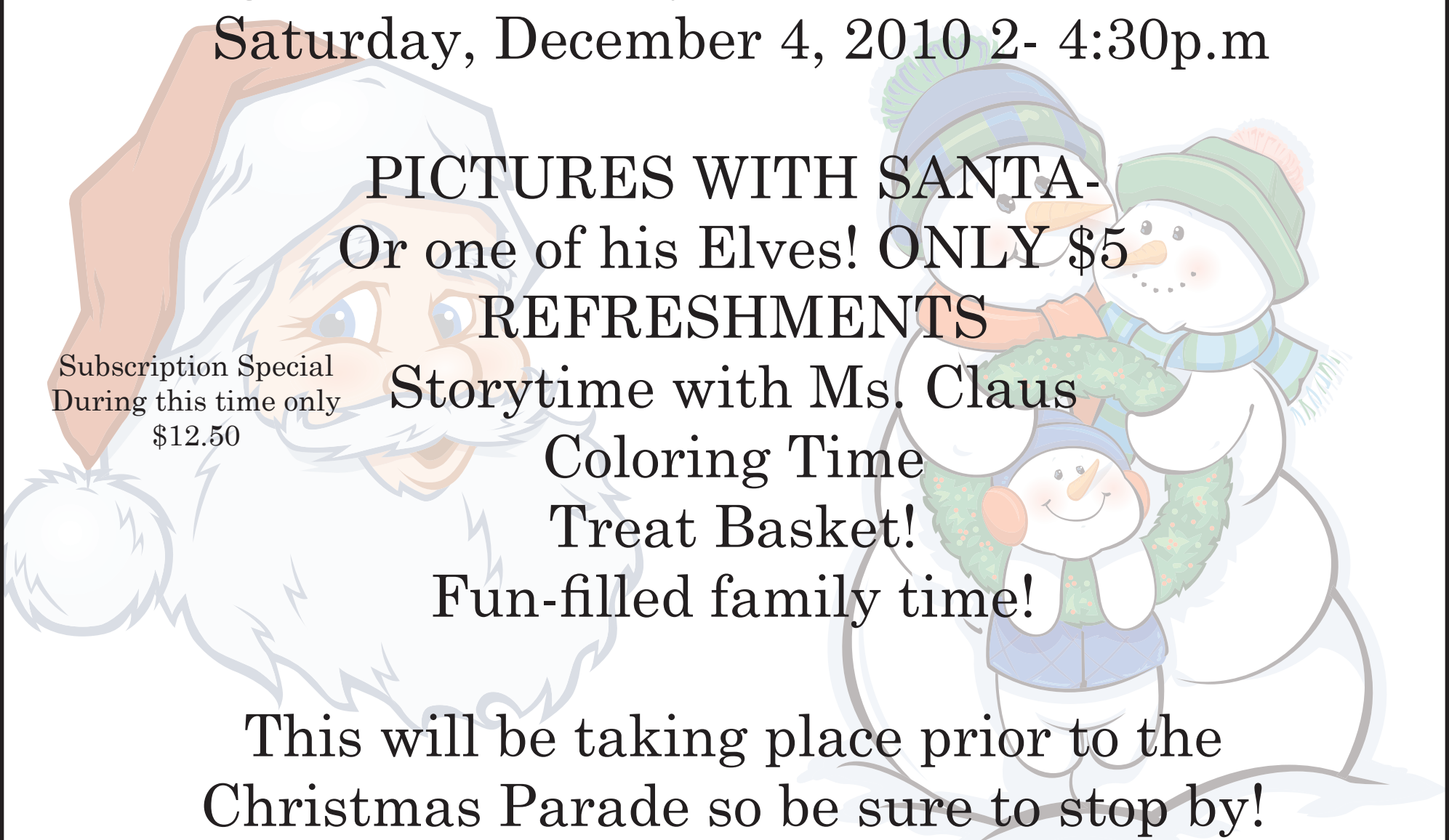

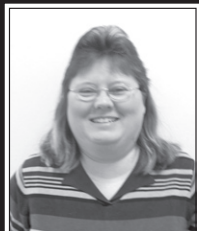

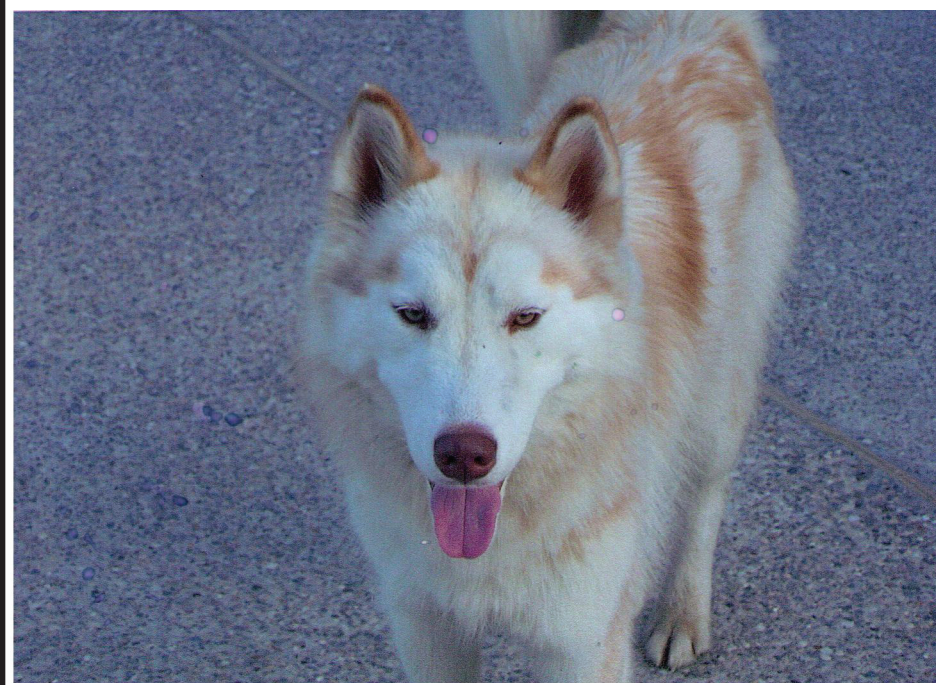
