Magistrates balk at county clerk's budget

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Magistrates balked on the first motion to approve the county clerk's budget, during the Dec. 14 meeting of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court.

Nicholas County Clerk Doug Fryman's 2011 budget is \$1,137,215, according to

court documents, with his salary being \$71,100 with \$3,600 in expense allowance, plus \$100,000 for his deputy clerks.

The remainder of the budgeted funds largely "flow through" the clerks office.

"The budget is just about the same as last year," Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tincher said matter-of-

factly as he flipped through the budget and added that the budgeted salary for deputy clerks "was the exact same as last year."

Although Tincher used the same matter-of-fact tone and directness, Magistrates refused to second a motion by Magistrate Avery Thornsburg to approve the budget.

Magistrate Jeff Randolph noted to no one in particular and all in general, that the county clerk's office had one less deputy clerk now than they did in the previous year. Randolph speculated that if the office was one clerk less then the budgeted amount for the deputy clerks should be less and the budget should reflect it.

Court members agreed it was their understanding that there were "two full time and one part time" deputy clerk.

"Do you need \$100,000 for two full-time (employees) and one part-time?" Magistrate Daryl Stacy asked.

Court members grumbled without directly answering Stacy's question and no one ventured a second to Thornsburg's motion. Magistrate Stacy has been a veteran magistrate with the court and though he did not seek re-election in November's election he continues to be vocal on county issues and at times in recent meetings has made verbal points which seemed to act as a guide for Newcomers to the court, Judge-Elect Kenny Lyons and Magistrates Jimmy Wells and Darvin Mitchell, all of whom have attended several meetings.

Fryman is very well-liked privately, among citizens; and politically, among the elected and appointed leaders of the community. Perhaps that is why few magistrates commented on why they didn't second Thornsburg's motion. Neither Fryman nor his clerks were present.

Stacy nodded across the table

and spoke easily as the stares of other court members sought out imperfections on the floor and ceiling.

"Hey fellows, I don't care if it's your mother we're talking about here," Stacy said while looking across the table, and toward the cluster of newly-elected officials who would take office in January. "Sometimes you have to ask tough questions."

Magistrate Steve Hamilton speculated that a portion of the budgeted salary for the deputy clerks could be a 'cushion' to ensure enough funds were budgeted.

"I don't have the answers," Judge Tincher said and asked for a second to Magistrate Thornsburg's motion to approve.

No one seconded the motion. "The motion has died for lack of a second," Judge Tincher said.

Magistrate Randolph said he assumed the budget was going to reflect \$40,000 each

for the two full time clerks and \$20,000 for the part time clerk.

Randolph looked to Judge Tincher for an answer.

"The motion died for lack of a second," Judge Tincher said again.

"You know you can lose good friendships when you sit back and you don't say things because you're afraid you might hurt someone's feelings. I think Doug does a good job but I might want to ask him a few questions," Magistrate Stacy said.

Magistrate Steve Hamilton indicated he thought 'it was best to let someone explain their own theories (when it came to budgets)."

Discussion then seemed to drift toward the timelines required for budget approval.

Magistrate Randolph then made a motion to accept the county clerk's budget and Stacy seconded the motion.

Rooftop burglar bungles Moorefield heist, regional crime intensifies

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If you hear someone walking on your roof on Christmas Eve, it might not be Santa, but rather a desperate burglar seeking for a way into your home.

Nicholas County Sheriff Dick Garrett continues to look for a young male suspect who attempted to break into the Moorefield Store Saturday evening.

The would-be-burglar removed

an air conditioning unit from a kitchen window, and when that entry into the store was still blocked by bars over the inside of the store window, the young man climbed onto the roof.

"It doesn't look like he ever did get into the store," Sheriff Garrett said with a trace of disgust aimed at the would-be-burglar. "He sure tried though, even walked around on the roof for a little while looking for a way in."

According to Sheriff Garrett,

the would-be rooftop burglar also attempted unsuccessfully to gain entrance into a parked van in the store parking lot, but the van was occupied, the engine was running and the driver simply sped away, and left the rooftop burglar standing empty-handed in the parking lot.

The bungled Moorefield heist comes on the heels of a rash of vehicle burglaries in the Moorefield area that also remain under investigation by Sheriff Garrett. Regional

Christmas-time criminal activity is also on the rise with alleged criminals showing very little regard toward their fellow man and much motivation for trying to get on Santa's "naughty" list.

Fleming County lawmen arrested a Wallingford man Dec. 16 and leveled six different criminal charges against him after he allegedly beat and robbed a disabled man.

Two-vehicle accident injures one, small child escapes injury

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A two-vehicle, head-on collision Dec. 15 on KY 1285, East Union Road, sent one person to the hospital with non-life threatening injuries and destroyed both vehicles involved. Responders say the fact that a small child in one of the vehicles was properly restrained in a child

safety seat prevented a greater tragedy from occurring.

Isarel Hernandez, 21, of Moorefield Road, was traveling east on East Union Road in a 2000 Chevy Tracker with the Chevy's owner, Chasidy Castro, also of Moorefield Road. The Chevy Tracker rounded a curve and struck a 2005 Chevy Monte Carlo, driven by Melissa Roberts, 30, of

East Union Road, doing severe damage to both vehicles.

Roberts' passengers, Calvin Osborne, no age given, and Kaitlynn Rairdon, 22 months old, both also of East Union Road were not seriously injured.

Nicholas County Sheriff Dick Garrett, who continues to investigate the wreck, said the young girl was properly restrained and was not injured.

Nicholas County Emergency Medical Service personnel responded to the scene and transported Castro to the Nicholas County Hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

Nicholas County Volunteer Firefighters responded to the scene and assisted with freeing those entrapped, as well as assisting with other emergency responders. Hernandez was cited by Sheriff Garrett for no insurance and no license.

THE CHRISTMAS BUFFALO HUNT

"We all came out from one neighborhood and we knew each other and worked together."

William "Lazy Bill" Clinkenbeard on the 1779 group of Virginia families that were the first to arrive at Capt. John Strode's Station

Christmas day, 1779, near present-day Winchester, Ky.

Lazy Bill Clinkenbeard had used his last bullet and was experiencing the first twinges of frost bite settling into his toes as he beheld the two-feet of snow that blanketed the landscape, but he was still very, very pleased with himself.

His core group of companions: The Berkley Men, which included his two brothers; Isaac and

John, were also very proud of him.

Lazy Bill had turned 18-years-old in October, just about the time the entire group arrived at Capt. John Strode's Station (present-day Winchester).

Well, the station was really only parts of two cabins when the group arrived. Capt. Strode and Capt. John Constant had each began building a cabin when the Berkley group arrived. The men and their families; the Clinkenbeards, Andersons, Harpers, Mooneys, Bakers, Donaldsons, Bennetts, Spahrs and a handful of others, had migrated together on foot through the Cumberland Gap and initially sought out Fort Boonesborough.

But Captain Strode was offering land for corn and gardens rent free and thus the families moved there and gained many new friends from Boonesborough and from David McGee's Station, which was very nearby.

The Christmas buffalo hunt had been very successful and the five downed buffalo had been skinned, butchered and packed upon the horses ready to return to Strode's Station.

William had killed his first buffalo on this hunt with a fine shot through the heart of a fat buffalo cow.

Most of the men, like Lazy Bill, were down to their last bullet and they only obtained new sources of lead from travelers who came to the wilderness.

And that created quite a dilemma for the hunters.

With no lead, little powder and the

ever-present fear of attracting Indians with a second shot, the hunt was intense. After wounding the buffalo, the hunters were forced to kill them with stones or by approaching stealthily and using their knives.

Lazy Bill's roommate, John Kirk, and he were watching Peter Harper and Enos Terry stoning a buffalo when it suddenly sprang up and chased them both through the snow covered woods.

Running was difficult for the two men in such deep snow and out of desperation Terry grabbed onto Harper's large British coat.

While other men came to the rescue, Harper and Terry nearly came to blows because once Terry had grabbed onto Harper, he refused to let go, and the enraged buffalo nearly plowed them both under its stampeding hooves.

They had all had a great laugh over it as they finished butchering the buffalo.

Lazy Bill had carefully removed his lead musket ball from the buffalo he'd killed and butchered and had later chewed the bullet until it was round again. He'd then skirted away from the camp and killed a white tail deer with the chewed lead bullet as the group made its way home to Strode's Station.

The luxurious cane fields and endless wilderness made this section of Kentucky a virtual paradise with an abundance of wild game, but the harsh realities of isolated frontiersurvival would soon make themselves known to the handful of inhabitants of Strode's Station.

Many of them would perish at the hands of Native American warriors in the months and years to follow, though the Clinkenbeard brothers

would live long and industrious lives.

Lazy Bill would marry his sweetheart, Mary Mooney at the beginning of 1781, only weeks before a terrible Shawnee attack on Strode's Station.

If the Good Lord is willing, we will join Lazy Bill and The Berkley families in future columns. Until then I can only share a thought I believe Lazy Bill shared with his fellow brothers in arms that cold, cold Christmas day in 1779 as he retrieved his last musket ball from the buffalo carcass and held it aloft with a broad smile for all to see. The sight of Lazy Bill standing there covered in blood and holding that tiny piece of lead in his uplifted right hand, while Peter Harper's two dogs jumped up at his feet was indeed a sight for sore eyes.

"Merry Christmas everybody," Bill shouted. "Merry Christmas!"

Fleming Deputy Sheriffs Gary Kinder and Jared Wagner arrested Leslie W. Jester, 25, of Farris Branch Road after Jester allegedly beat and robbed his neighbor, Kenny Milton, who is disabled. Jester allegedly stole Milton's medicine, money and truck, and then wrecked the truck less than 150 feet from the driveway.

Kinder said Milton was reluctant to give Jester anything, but Jester threatened and beat him until he complied.

Kinder, Wagner and Kinder's K9 Basco, tracked Jester through the woods and arrested him after he initially refused to comply with the officers.

Jester remains jailed and is under \$50,000 cash bond, being charged with burglary, 1st degree, and several theft charges. Lawmen say there may be other charges added. Fleming lawmen also continue to investigate the Dec. 13 robbery of copper ground wire from Goddard Electrical Substation. Approximately 100 pounds of copper was taken by criminals from the somewhat secluded location.

Criminal activity has also intensified southeast of Nicholas County in Menifee County.

On December 17, 2010, at 3:38 PM, Kentucky State Police Detective Larry Bowling arrested Monty Colman Brown, 20, of Frenchburg,

in connection with a robbery that took place on December 12, 2010, in Frenchburg, Kentucky. The armed robbery took place at the Kash's Trade Mart. Mr. Brown fled the scene on foot with at least \$500 in cash. Mr. Brown is also being charged for a robbery that took place on December 14, 2010, at the Fast-Trac Convenient Center in Camargo, Kentucky. The case in Frenchburg is still under investigation by Detective Larry Bowling with the Kentucky State Police. The case in Camargo is still under investigation by Detective Ralph Charles with the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office, according to Kentucky State Police press releases.

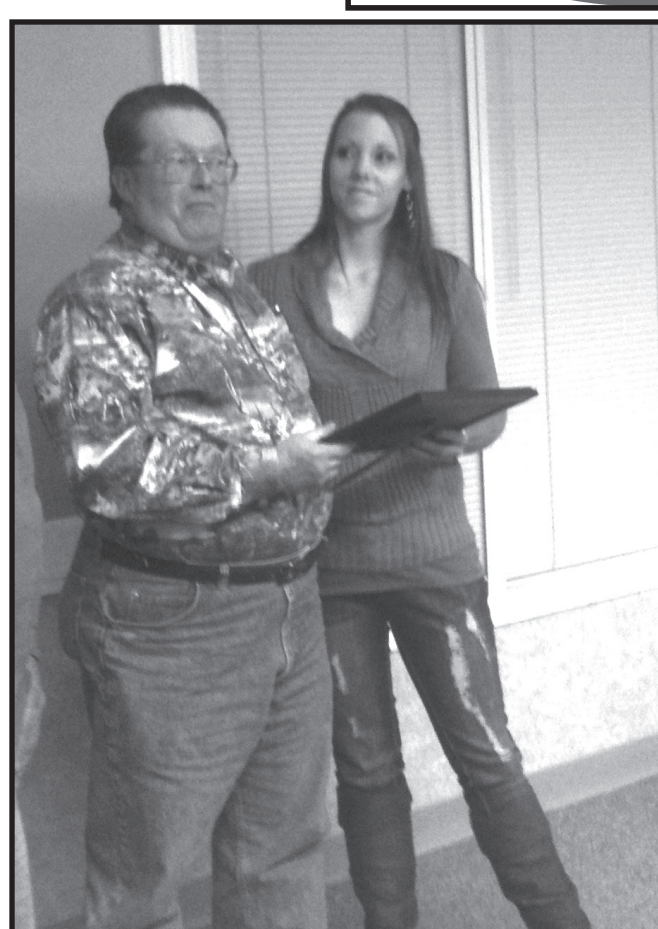

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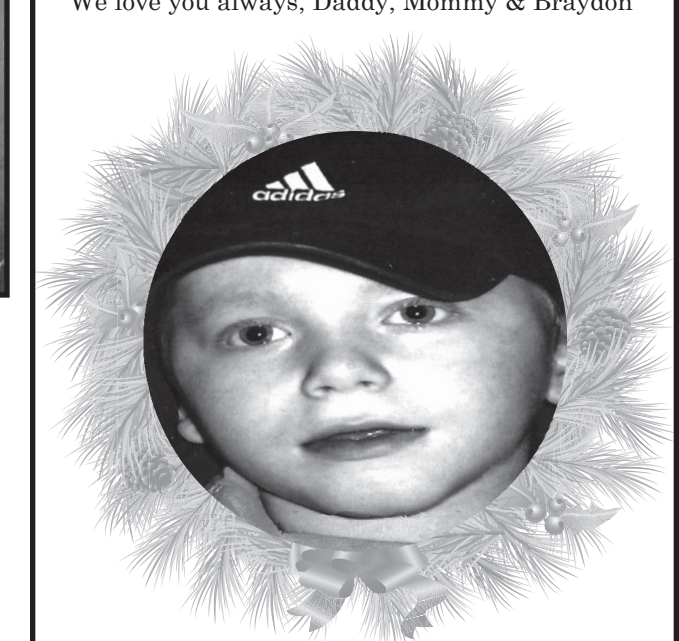

LadyJackets fall in opening of new gym

Despite all of the accolades given to the debut of the new Nicholas County gym, the one thing it could not produce on opening night was a victory for the home team.

The Fleming County girls' basketball squad, in the midst of its best start in years, jumped out to a big lead and never looked back in pulling out an 84-41 win over the host LadyJackets on Wednesday night in the first game ever played at the new facility.

Nicholas County coach Jennifer Cornett admitted the pressure of being the debut game got to her players. "The new gym is awesome! We have one of the best, if not the best gym in the 10th Region.

... It was similar to playing in a district or regional ball game," she said. "But, the girls were very nervous being the first team to open up in this new gym."

The nerves impacted the LadyJackets right from the start as Fleming County scored 13 of the game's first 16 points and eventually pulled to a 23-6 lead by the end of the opening period.

"This is a really good, nice new gym. It is great to have it in this area," Fleming County coach Kristy Orem said. "It was really important to have a good start and have even scoring (throughout the lineup). We distributed the ball and were unselfish. I could not be more happy as a coach."

Fleming County (6-0) never flopped back after its fast start. The Lady Panthers continued to distance themselves from the hosts, pulling to as many as a 28-point lead (39-11) after a steal and a layup by Morgan Jett with 3:30 left in the first half.

The visitors eventually went into the locker room with a 45-19 edge.

Reesa Martin helped Nicholas County try and keep pace by scoring 11 of the team's 13

second-quarter points, but it was not enough to slow the Lady Panthers. Martin led all scorers at the break with 12 points, while Fleming County's Mandy Boyd added 11.

Nicholas County (2-1) had a huge advantage at the free-throw line in the first half, taking 13 more foul shots than the Lady Panthers, but could only make eight of their 20 attempts.

Fleming County opened the third quarter by scoring the first 13 points to extend their lead to 58-19. The hosts finally got on the board on an Ashley Jordan field goal with 3:17 to play in the period. Nicholas County finished the quarter strong, out-scoring the visitors 8-5 over the final three and a half minutes, but trailed 63-27 at the break.

The Lady Panthers stretched their advantage as high as 46 points at 74-28 after a Tierra Taylor steal and layup with 4:38 to play, but the LadyJackets kept battling and went on an 11-4 run over the next two minutes and 19 seconds, led by five straight points from Megan Bretz.

However, the hosts could only manage a pair of Bretz free throws the rest of the way.

"The girls, like I said earlier, were very nervous. I believe this played a major factor in the ball game. Fleming has a very disciplined team and jumped out on us early, and it was very hard for us to bounce back from that," Cornett said. "Our girls never gave up no matter what the score was. I hope that we use this loss as a learning experience that we have to all come ready to play for all games."

Orem credited her team's early season success as a big reason for the team's strong performance on Wednesday.

"We are more confident and that is a big thing for

the girls. Getting wins equals more confidence," she said.

The final margin was the largest in a string of 13 straight victories for Fleming County over Nicholas County in a series that has been played nearly annually since the two teams were both in the same district early in the decade. The LadyJackets last defeated the Lady Panthers in a pair of meetings in 1998-99.

Fleming County had a significant edge in turnovers (13 to 25), assists (22 to six), steals (16 to four) and rebounds (42-28).

Twelve Lady Panthers scored in the game, led by 14 points from Boyd. She also added three assists.

"Teams used to focus on (2010 graduate) Kaylyn (Emmons) and now they key on Robbie (Allex), so I just try to step up. I try to bust my butt to get down the floor and get open for a layup," Boyd said. "We are a family. The senior class is where it started. We have strength and love between us all and that helps. We've played so much with each other that we know what each other will do at all times."

Allex chipped in 11 points, five assists, three rebounds and three steals. Taylor notched 10 points, four steals and two rebounds. K'Osha Puente logged eight points, four steals, three assists and two rebounds. Jett finished with eight points, two rebounds and two steals. Abby Miller came off the bench to add eight points and five rebounds. Victoria Edmond added seven points, while Alliyah Johnson had six points and five rebounds, and Alex James finished with four points and six rebounds.

Martin led all scorers with 20 points and made all three of the team's 3-pointers. She also added a team-high nine rebounds. Megan Bretz finished with 12

Fleming spoils Nicholas' debut of new gym

Wednesday's opening of the new Nicholas County gym was a success in virtually every way, but one: on the scorebook.

Fleming County has had its way with the BlueJackets on the basketball court, winning all nine match ups this century, but never before had the Panthers done such a number on Nicholas County.

In the second game of Wednesday's doubleheader with the Fleming County girls, the Panther boys defeated the BlueJackets 84-39. It was far and away the largest margin of victory in the nearly annual series that dates back to the turn of the century.

However, after the game, most of the discussion was about Nicholas County's new gym, which drew raving reviews.

"It was a good crowd and was exciting. I'm just disappointed that we put together a better result," Nicholas County coach Greg Letcher said. "The kids played hard in the first half, but it is just the same-old-same-old. The opponents bring out a lot of pressure and we just couldn't put the ball in the hole. We had some easy baskets, but it is hard for us to play catch-up."

Fleming County (2-3) never trailed as the Panthers scored the game's first four points. However, Nicholas County (1-4) battled back and closed within three on two occasions midway through the quarter (10-7 and 12-9).

Yet, the Panthers scored five straight points over a two-minute stretch to open up an eight-point advantage and eventually stretched it to 13 at 24-11 after scoring the final seven points of the period.

The visitors gradually built on the lead and stretched it to 43-18 at the half.

The Panthers were particularly effective at pressuring the BlueJackets backcourt, forcing Nicholas County to commit 12 first-half miscues that led to a 21-2 advantage in points off turnovers.

Brady Saunders led the way for the visitors, finishing the half with 13 points on 5-of-7 shooting. As a team Fleming County shot 51.5 percent from the field, while holding the hosts to just 25.9 percent.

"We had a few good practices where we worked on our 'D' a lot," Saunders said. "We had intensity, a lot of ball denial and played hard. We got a lot of steals and that led to easy points."

The Panthers really turned up the pressure in the third quarter, forcing the BlueJackets into committing 10 turnovers and holding the hosts to just four points.

"We jumped on them early and I don't think they expected that kind of pressure," Fleming County coach Brian Kelly said. "They have a lot of young kids and we are a little more ahead of the game at this point. Our defense was pretty good and I was pretty pleased with it."

The Panthers finished the third quarter on a 14-0 run to lead 66-22.

The two teams played evenly in the final period, with Fleming County out-scoring the BlueJackets 18-17. The final score represented the largest margin of the game at 45 points.

Fleming County improved to 2-1 on the road this season. In the Panthers' two victories this year, the margin has been 45 and 44 points.

"With our young kids, it is good to play teams like this

that put a lot of pressure on us," Letcher said. "Hopefully, we can learn to turn (that pressure) into easy scoring opportunities for us."

Fleming County shot 53.1 percent from the field on the day and held Nicholas County to just 30.8 percent. The Panthers had a 36-4 edge in points off turnovers. The BlueJackets committed 26 to the Panthers' nine.

The visitors also held a 20-5 edge in assists and a 12-5 advantage in steals. However, the BlueJackets won the rebounding battle 40-37 and the Panthers converted just 9-of-23 free-throw attempts.

"I was disappointed with our free throws," Kelly said. "When you play with that hard pressure it is hard to shoot free throws well. We had some empty legs and we've got to work on that."

Saunders led five players in double figures with 17 points. He also added eight rebounds.

"The coaches have said that we've got to have five guys on the boards," he said. "I am just trying to read the ball and go after it."

Ian Kinder helped key the inside game with 14 points, nine rebounds and two blocks. Bryson McKee came off the bench to score 13 points and grab four steals. He only missed one shot on the day, a free throw.

Travis Taylor also contributed 13 points. Dillon Hicks added 10 points, five rebounds, four assists and four steals; while Darion Burns had nine points, eight assists and four rebounds.

Dalton Pope led Nicholas County with 19 points and 10 rebounds. Ethan Smith chipped in 11 points and seven rebounds.

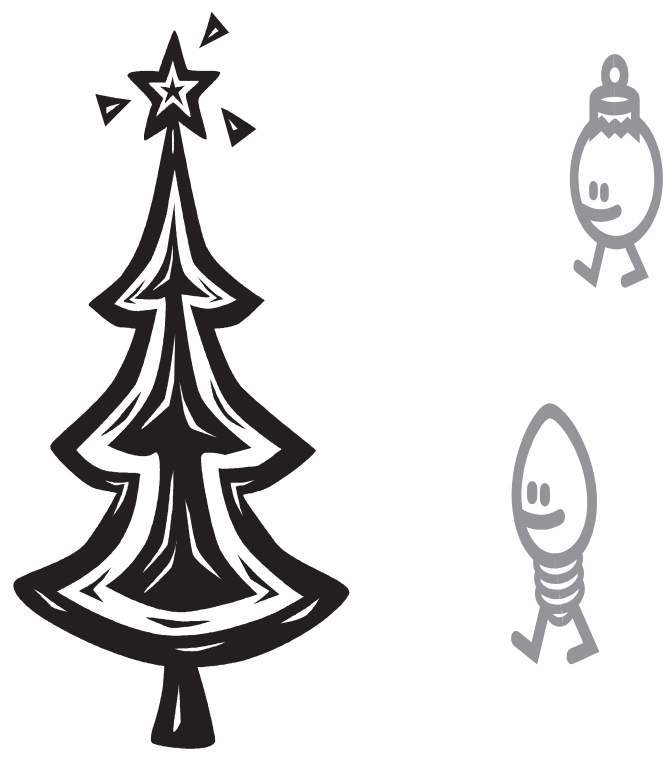

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


Local district judge participates in orientation program

FRANKFORT, Ky., Dec. 20, 2010 – Newly elected District Judge Charles W. Kuster, who serves Harrison, Nicholas, Pendleton and Robertson counties, participated in the New District Judges Orientation from Dec. 5-7 at the Administrative Office of the Courts in Frankfort. The AOC Division of Judicial Branch Education hosted the orientation.

Judge Kuster had been serving as an appointed district judge for the four counties since May. He won the seat in the November election and took office immediately after his election results were certified.

In addition to the orientation, newly elected judges were invited to an AOC vendor fair where court personnel provided assistance with office space, human resources matters, computer equipment, e-mail addresses, stationery, judicial robes and more.

"It's important for new judges to get off to a good start and this comprehensive orientation was designed to help them know what to expect when they take office," said Campbell County District Court Judge Karen A. Thomas,

who also serves as chief regional district judge for the Northern Region, president of the Kentucky District Judges Association and chair of the District Judges Education Committee. "They benefited from the expertise of the experienced judges who conducted the sessions and were also able to network with their newly elected colleagues."

The presentations covered such areas as ethics and conduct, pretrial and bail, evictions, young offenders and cases involving domestic violence, probate, driving under the influence and small claims. The newly elected judges also attended sessions about extradition, disability and adult guardianship, criminal procedure, DNA and paternity, and mental health issues. They had the opportunity to earn 17.5 continuing judicial education credits through the orientation.

"You are assuming a position of high calling and great responsibility," Chief Justice of Kentucky John D. Minton Jr. said in a letter congratulating the newly elected judges. "The Judicial Branch provides a forum in which citizens can exercise their

constitutional and legal rights in a timely and efficient manner. More than 1 million cases flow through Kentucky courts each year and judges and court personnel must work together to maintain an honorable, independent judiciary."

District Court District Court is the court of limited jurisdiction. District Court handles juvenile matters, city and county ordinances, misdemeanors, traffic offenses, probate of wills, felony preliminary hearings, small claims and civil cases involving \$4,000 or less, voluntary and involuntary mental commitments and cases relating to domestic violence and abuse.

Administrative Office of the Courts The AOC Division of Judicial Branch Education provides continuing judicial education to Kentucky judges. The AOC in Frankfort supports the activities of approximately 3,400 court system employees and 403 elected justices, judges and circuit court clerks. As the fiscal agent for the state court system, the AOC executes the Judicial Branch budget.

Merry Christmas! No one can certainly complain that it hasn't felt like Christmas this year! Brr! Isn't the snow pretty though? □

Even with the weather being brutal, the ever increasing hustling and bustling trying to get ready for the holiday, I did manage to purchase a real Christmas wreath to hang in the barn for my equine friends. Needless to say it did require me adding candy canes to the wreath for my precious horses! Christmas week in the barn will be celebrated with peppermint candy canes. My horses will love them! Not to mention what Santa will be bringing. I would have like to have gotten lights strung but that will be on next year's list. Can't do everything! Speaking of hustling and bustling while looking and feeling beautiful in our chic barn outerwear, we have the opportunity to spend a little more enjoyable time dealing with our patience! Not only is it that time of year that requires us to have a little more patience but muscles as well, especially since it takes a little extra time and strength to complete those same chores that we tend to 365 days a year. Of course, some

of us are fortunate to have a significant other or helper that helps us during these times which helps our lives to be just a little easier! I know I have been blessed! Speaking of patience, what about those water troughs? Now this subject can wear on your patience! They certainly can be a nuisance this time of year having to break and clear the ice out of them every morning. I've decided that I'm not going to take part in that scenario again this year, especially since the frigid weather has arrived so much earlier. What a stupid cycle anyways. You fill the trough up, the horses drink some during the day and then it freezes over night. The next morning you are out there with Paul Bunyan's sledge hammer trying to break the ice in order to scoop the ice out of the trough, just to start the cycle over. Oh - horse crap! I'm not doing this. This way is not acceptable to me. My motto in the barn is "the easier, the better" as long as it works! So...I cut back to only one water trough instead of two, since they drink less in this type of weather, even though I stress and stress to you all that we still want to

encourage them to drink as much as possible. It just doesn't happen, and we just drive ourselves nuts trying to convince them to drink, drink and drink. Of course, they still have their salt block, don't misunderstand - not a mineral block because they're different, near the tank easily accessible for them to lick at and the salt encourages them to drink. In addition to eliminating the second tank, I've also started emptying whatever my horses haven't drank during the day out every night when I bring the horses in the barn, which stops the need to break and clear ice out of them in the morning. One less task - yeah! It certainly isn't the perfect solution but it seems to be working. While trying to come up with constructive ways to counteract the ice and encourage my horses to drink water, I purchased a caged heater this week for my outside water trough. I haven't even opened it and it is in the back of my car to return. Why? I guess this emptying thing is working out pretty good and this will save me the time of plugging it in, running the electricity during the night because

you all know very well I couldn't leave it in my tank during the day with Fred. You see, I have a horse named Fred that would have that thing from one end of the pasture to the other if I left it in the tank during the day. The other horses in my paddock wouldn't even act like they noticed anything. Not Fred, oh no, he just couldn't let that pass his curiosity. He would think I purposely put that contraption in the water tank just for him. One minute it would be in the tank where it belonged and the next minute he would have that think unplugged and dangling from his mouth. As soon as he saw me coming to the barn, he would start running with it hanging, smiling, and thinking "look at me, I'm at it again and you think I wouldn't notice"! I'll let you know what I come up with. By the way, I bet you all are glad you followed my helpful checklist and got your hay in your lofts, completed the odd jobs that needed to be done before Winter made its early arrival. This weather came on fast, brutal and unforgiving, and I thank God everyday that I took the initiative and got what I did get done so that I wouldn't be stressed out over the holidays because I wasn't prepared for this unexpected early winter snow and temperatures. I also am grateful for that old barn of ours that houses our wonderful horses, makes my time working with my horses a heck of a lot easier, and of course, a place for all the stray cats in the county to just show up and make it their home because there is

a crazy horse lady that also feeds and waters her barn cats daily. So...join the winter adventure and find a way to change some of those dull, time sucking chores so that you have more time for horsing around and to spend with your family. I hope you all have a very safe Merry Christmas and remember the reason for the season - Jesus! Court debates fate of leased truck

Members of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court will soon decide on whether they will be keeping a leased dump truck or selling it. The subject was discussed briefly during the Dec. 14 meeting of the fiscal court. Magistrate Jeff Randolph has worked closely with Tom Dotson of the Worldwide Truck-leasing company, a company which has provided several Kentucky counties with large dump trucks through K A C O - financed leasing terms, which give county courts the options to buy or sale. "This is an 08 model with low miles," Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tinchler said. County Attorney Dawn Letcher said she had reviewed the lease agreement, which had been renewed last year. Thus far Nicholas County has only paid the interest on the truck, which has a remaining principal of \$102,859. Dotson was unable to attend the meeting due to inclement weather and poor road conditions, but had previously guaranteed court members a large price on the truck if they decided to sell it an auction. A payment of \$35,000 is due on Jan. 20. Court members say will make a decision on the fate of the truck in January.
