





IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER TESTS SHOW COLIFORM BACTERIA IN (SYSTEM) WATER

The Nicholas Co. Water District routinely monitors for coliform bacteria. During the month of November, 2009 fifty percent of our samples tested positive. The standard is that no more than five percent of samples may test positive.

What should I do?

- · You do not need to boil your water or take other corrective actions. However if you have specific health concerns, consult your doctor.
- You do not need to use an alternate (e.g., bottled) water supply. People with severely compromised immune systems, infants, and some elderly may be at increased risk.
- These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. General guidelines on ways to lessen the risk of infection by microbes are available from EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at What does this mean?

This is not an emergency. If it had been, you would have been notified immediately. Coliform bacteria are generally not harmful themselves. Coliforms are bacteria which are naturally present in the environment and

are used as an indicator that other, potentially-harmful bacteria may he present. Coliforms were found in more samples than allowed and this was a warning of potential problems. Usually, coliforms are a sign that there could be a problem with the system's treatment or distribution

system (pipes). Whenever we detect coliform in any sample, we do follow-up testing to see if other bacteria of greater concern, such as fecal coliform or E. coli, are present. We did not find any of these bacteria in our subsequent testing.

We took additional samples for coliform bacteria which all came back negative. As an added precaution, we chlorinated and flushed the pipes in the distribution system to make sure bacteria were eliminated. This situation is now resolved. 3-1-2010.



What is sinusitis and how do I know if I have a sinus problem?



Each year, sinus problems, also knows as sinusitis, affects 37 million Americans. Sinusitis is the most frequently reported chronic condition in the United States.

Sinusitis is a swelling of the inner lining of the sinuses. The sinuses are the spaces between the bones in the face where air passes and where a fluid called mucus drains into the nose. With sinusitis, the swelling blocks the openings in the sinuses through which mucus drains into the nose, creating pressure that is often painful.

Most of us know the symptoms. Your nose runs and becomes stopped up. You feel pressure and pain in the forehead and cheeks. You may have continued post nasal drainage. You may experience plugged ears, pain in the back of the head, watery eyes and sneezing.

Plugged ears can cause secondary ear infections. Nasal drainage can cause sore throats, chronic hoarseness and possible tonsillitis problems in adults as well as children. Difficulty swallowing can cause indigestion and an upset stomach. Repeated problems with sneezing may be a sign that a person has an allergy problem. Early treatment can often prevent irreversible major problems and surgery in the future. Certainly, if over-the-counter treatments fail, people should consult an ear, nose and throat specialist who will take the time to locate the source of the problem.
