## Nicholas County Attorney submits Annual Report

Dawn Curran Letcher, Nicholas County Attorney, submits the following to the citizens of Nicholas County as her 2009 report:

### Cold Check Collections

From August 1, 2008 through December 31, 2009 (less than 18 months) the Nicholas County Attorney's Office cold check collection service has recouped nearly \$49,000.00 in cold check restitution and fees for local merchants.

### DUI Prosecution Percentages

In addition to prosecution of all other traffic and misdemeanor offenses (offenses punishable by fine and/or 365 days or less in jail), the county attorney prosecutes DUI offenses which occur in our county. DUI conviction rates through December 2008 are 84%. Without the experience and efforts of local law enforcement personnel, this high percentage of convictions would be impossible to attain.

### Child Support

State-wide Rankings

As of September 2009, of 120 counties, the Nicholas County Child Support Enforcement Office ranked 33 overall, considering all categories such as establishment, paternity, collections and arrears.

### Nicholas County Victim Advocate

The victim advocate provides assistance to victims of violence in accessing the court system and other support agencies. The advocate makes referrals to appropriate agencies, attends court hearings with victims upon request and assists victims in the process of freeing themselves from the abuse. In 2009, the victim advocate provided assistance to approximately 68 residents in Nicholas County.

### Citizen Complaints

Citizen complaints are a very important duty of the office. The county attorney receives 10-20 formal, written citizen complaints each week. Often an investigation is required by law enforcement personnel. If possible, Mrs. Letcher attempts to mediate a reso-

## City officials ready for spring

As the warmest day of the year thus far began to fade Monday evening, Carlisle officials praised the efforts of city workers who successfully battled winter's icy wrath and Carlisle Mayor Ronnie Clark pledged to keep city crews busy with full-fledged spring-cleaning.

Mayor Clark has been instrumental in obtaining Kentucky Transportation Cabinet funding to complete the

city's newest sidewalk renovation project and Clark said, "as soon as the weather permits" the sidewalk grades and surrounding landscape would be sloped to match up evenly with the sidewalk surfaces and excess ground and gravel would be provided where necessary and removed where it was in excess.

"We're going to get on the sidewalks just as soon as it dries up," Mayor Clark said several times during Monday night's city council meeting.

According to language read during the meeting, the \$174,000 funding for the project will end on April 30.

A resolution to amend the budget finances for the sidewalk improvements and replacement passed unanimously after a motion to accept was made by Councilman Tommy Crawford.

Very few houses would be affected by the city's passage of the Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance. According to discussion led by Mayor Clark, approximately

four houses would fall into a city "flood plain" and be subjected to new federal regulations regarding property considered to be in a potential "flood plain". Mayor Clark indicated some of the properties were located near Sycamore Street. Councilman Eugene Hall introduced the ordinance.

In other business city council members:

- Introduced an amendment to the ordinance regarding the guidelines for council meeting requirements. If a

## Gray murder trial set for April

A former Nicholas County man who is accused of murdering his parents in their Scott County home will go to trial April 5.

James Gray, 63, and his wife Vivian, 55, had been married for over 40 years when they were found murdered in their Scott County home at 8811 Cincinnati Pike along US 25, near the small town of Corinth just south of the Grant County border, on April 26, 2007.

Their son Anthony Gray was arrested in October 2007 and charged with their murder.

"James Anthony Gray was arrested and charged with murder (2 counts) of James and Vivian Gray, of Scott County," a press release issued by the Scott County Sheriff's Office dated Oct. 22, 2007 states. The press release also states that Anthony Gray was additionally charged with one count

of tampering with physical evidence.

Gray was living near Lake Carnico at the time of his parents' murders and was living in Carlisle just prior to his arrest.

"The charge of tampering with physical evidence was made in connection with the removal of a weapon from the crime scene," Detective Roger Persley of the Scott County Sheriff's Office said. Persley is the lead detective in the case and has received assistance from fellow officers with the SCSO, particularly Detective Jack Patrick and agents with ATF and officers with the Kentucky State Police.

Persley made several statements of "no comment" when asked about specifics of the crime including and allegations that stolen weapons were found at one location, perhaps more, that may be connected to the murders.

Presley also offered "no comment" when asked about allegations that Gray

confessed to the murders.

A video, which allegedly shows Gray confessing has recently been ruled as allowable to be played in the pending trial.

Gray's attorney, the Directing Attorney for the Department of Public Advocacy, Rodney Barnes, was asked if Gray confessed

following his arrest.

"I don't think so," Barnes said. "It doesn't sound like a confession to me."

Barnes told The Mercury that Gray's arrest came after a seven-hour interview with officers from the Scott County Sheriff's Office, Saturday.

Barnes was also quick to point out that Gray had "cooperated fully with the police investigation" and during Gray's arraignment asked Judge Vanessa Dickson to consider lowering Gray's bond from \$500,000 cash to \$50,000 cash.

Judge Dickson paused be-

Whispers and Bloodlines



**Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky**

"I came here to Grant's Station Dec 5-6, 1786... A woman, about one half mile from Grant's Station was in her cabin boiling soap. Had her gourd and was standing by to keep it from boiling over. The first that she knew there was anyone about, an Indian took her by the arm. She dipped up a gourd full of the hot soap and dashed it in his face. The violent screaming of the Indian frightened the others, some half dozen, from the door and they run. She then took up an axe and dispatched him... This was just before we came." Colonel John Graves, Draper Manuscripts volume 12 CC. Colonel Graves was an early frontier settler of Grant's Station and was a close companion of the infamous frontier scout, Jacob Stucker.

taken. They had cut her petticoat off to her knees. They found they would be overtaken and they killed her. There were seven or nine Indians. We killed two of them." John Hardesty, Draper Manuscripts volume 11CC page 171.

Spring 1788

Jacob Stucker rode his mare back to Colonel John Edwards, near the edge of the Licking River, at the Upper Blue Licks in present-day northern Nicholas County. The men could tell that "Injun Jake" as he was most-often called, had news that was not good. He kept shaking the one Shawnee scalp he'd just taken and he had that crazy look in his eye that he sometimes got when his anger exceeded his physical control.

But few of the men paid particular notice to Jake's wrath and how Colonel Edwards finally, and mercifully, simply

reached out and hugged the young man and let him weep uncontrollably into his arms; The men and the two horses they sat astride of seemed frozen, like marble statues in the ancient and beautiful forest near the river's edge.

Jacob Stucker, though young, took each loss of the community very personal, as he was the lead Frontier Ranger of the communities between Bryant's and Grant's Station.

Though he was only 23-years-old he was a hardened veteran of the border wars, having buried his father and his aunt and uncle, who had perished from Shawnee aggression, in 1780.

He had only been 15-years-old then but had instantly become a trusted companion of Colonel Daniel Boone who placed him in command as the lead scout in October of 1780 when Boone and others had trailed a similar Shawnee raiding party that had killed Daniel's brother, Edward Boone, near Plum Lick.

Those raiders had also escaped.

It was known that Jacob

Stucker had killed nearly two-dozen Native Americans in the eight years since then, and he had led frontiersmen during raids when many more warriors had been killed.

He had become a victim of too much sorrow and bitterness, which had hardened him as a ruthless frontiersman who had grown wise beyond his years, but this experience had pushed him beyond his limits, just as it too had pushed his companions beyond their limits and many of them wept accordingly near the river's edge with him.

The evening prior there had been a strong knock at the double-log cabin of the Shanks family, their neighbors, and a strong English voice had inquired, "Who keeps the house?"

A small group of Shawnee warriors had made another successful hit and run raid into the interior communities around Grant's Station and had killed five members of the Shanks family along Cooper's Run.

It was believed that the same group of warriors had killed Michael Gillespie, only a few weeks earlier.

He and his wife Betsy Shanks

Gillespie had just celebrated the birth of their first child.

Two of her sisters were killed at the house, along with their mother and a brother. One of the dead girls had killed a warrior with a loom knife as he burst into the cabin. One girl had been taken captive and another, Susan Shanks, had hid in a hollow log as the cabin burned.

Only Betsy Shanks Gillespie and her babe, along with her brother Michael Shanks, had escaped the evening's violence.

The pursuit of the Shawnee raiders had culminated when the female prisoner had slowed down and was tomahawked because she was slowing the progress of the raiders' escape. The Shawnee raiders had escaped due to the sacrifice of two of their warriors; Suicide Shawnee back spies who stayed behind to slow the progress of the approaching pioneers.

They had sacrificed themselves so their friends could escape.

That had been a bitter pill to swallow for them all, but worse yet was seeing young Michael Shanks, cradling his still-alive

sister, as she lay scalped and dying near the river.

With failing breath she had whispered a final farewell to him and then she was gone.

The thought of those dying whispers shook them all.

The dead girl was carried back to Cooper's Run and she and her four dead family members were buried near the ruins of the burnt cabin in one common grave.

In January 1789 Susan Shanks, the sister who had hid in the hollow log during the attack on the cabin, married William Rice and they moved to the small community of Sherburne in southern Fleming County along the Licking River where they raised a large family.

Descendants of her family, including Minnie Emmons Doyle, still live in Fleming County.

Jacob Stucker married Betsy Rogers in June of 1789. They would have 14 children together. Their bloodline, likewise, flows through the veins of many family members in northeastern Kentucky and across the nation.

I love my peace and quiet. I think we all do. When I get home after a long day at work, the last thing in the world I want is to deal with a bunch of telemarketers. For that very reason, one of the first things I did when I got telephone service was register my telephone number with the government's National Do-Not-Call registry (www.donotcall.gov). This works for cellular phones as well as for home phones and businesses.

I understand that telemarketing is an important way of doing business, and I feel some sympathy for the people who make the calls. I know they are just trying to make a living, just like everyone else. But for me, personally, I just don't see the need. When I discover that I'm

running low on something, like toothpaste or deodorant, I'll add it to the shopping list so we'll remember to pick some up the next time we go to the store. Or if it's something I need urgently, I'll drive into town and get it. Admittedly, my memory is not as sharp as it used to be, but I'm pretty sure that instead of running to the store I have never - not even once - stood by the phone wishing and waiting for a telemarketer to call me up and sell me the one thing I need.

And so telemarketers, even though my heart goes out to you, "No, thank you."

I have discovered, how-

ever, that the Do-Not-Call registry is not fool-proof. The government reminds us that "[e]ven if your number is registered, charities, political organizations, and telephone surveyors may continue to call you. Companies with which you do business may also continue to call, unless you have asked them to stop calling you."

Cindy and I use a credit card for most of our purchases because we get a 2% cash reward for using it. And because we pay off the balance each month, there is never a finance charge. Shopping this way last year earned us over \$250 - that's more than a month's worth of gasoline - free. So we thought we were being pretty smart.

Then one evening, I got a phone call from the credit card company. I figured they were just calling to

confirm a recent purchase. It turned out to be a telemarketer "affiliated" with the credit card company trying to sell me identity theft protection. Our conversation went something like this:

"Hi, Mr. Scalf, I'm calling with a special offer from your credit card company to help protect you from identity theft should someone get access to your personal information..."

"Hold on, a second. Are you an actual employee of the credit card company?"

"Uhh... what do you mean?"

"Does the credit card company give you a paycheck?"

"No, I work for an affiliate."

"So you're with a company that got access to my credit card information, trying to sell me protection in case somebody gets

access to my credit card information?"

"That's right, sir. And absolutely free of charge, we're going to send you a credit report..."

"So not only do you have access to my credit information, you're going to make a copy of my personal information and mail it to me, without my permission, putting my personal information at greater risk, to convince me that I need your product?"

"Well, it's a free report..."

All that talk about personal information reminded me about the Geneva Convention training I received in the Army - about the information I would be required to give if taken prisoner of war: Name, rank, service number (social security number) and date of birth.

Isn't that funny? The ex-

act information someone needs to steal your identity is what we are required to give our worst enemies. Instead of physical torture, all they have to do is take out a credit card in the prisoners name and make him watch as they buy worthless junk on eBay with his credit card until he finally agrees to talk.

Credit cards are very convenient and if you use them like we do, they can even make you some money. But if you have to pay all that money back to protect your information and to keep people from calling you at home every evening, it's not worth it anymore.

If it means I get my peace and quiet back, I think I'd rather just pay cash.

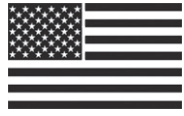

## Ernest W. Duke, Jr.

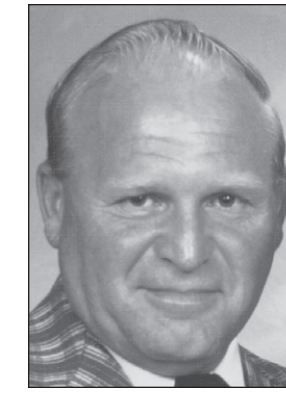

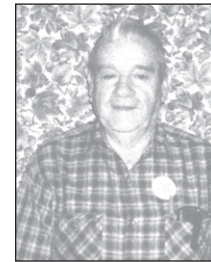

## "New" business - old friends

### Carlisle welcomes Thunderheart Studio

For months, curious on-lookers have been able to peek through the storefront windows of the C.C. Cole building and witness the gradual transformation as Alex and Susann Kazunas carried out extensive restoration work.

Earlier this month, however, a dramatic change took place. Brown paper covered the windows, offering a certain degree of privacy to the work going on inside, but word began to spread quickly that someone had rented the building - that a new business was coming to town - Thunderheart Studio.

Although Thunderheart Studio is a new addition to Main Street businesses in Carlisle, neither the business nor the owners are strangers. The studio has been operating in Paris for 18 years and its owners, John T. "Jay" and Diane S. Morford have ties in Carlisle that date back to 1948 when Jay's father, Dr. Morford set up his medical practice in town, which - with the exception of the time he

was called back on active duty and sent to Panama, Dr. Morford ran continuously until 1992.

Jay and Diane met while they were both working in the banking business - the two sharing a combined total of 48 years of banking experience. Diane, who grew up in Winchester, fell in love with Nicholas County when Jay brought her back to meet his family 34 year ago when the couple married (they celebrated their anniversary on Mar. 5).

After retiring from the banking business, Jay decided to open a studio and turn his long-time hobby of photography into a new career. This meant coming up with a name for the business.

"I wanted a name that people could remember and that wasn't necessarily tied to my name so the studio could outlive me," Jay explained, "One evening when I was the president of a bank in Morgantown, I drove to Bowling Green and saw the Val Kilmer movie, 'Thunderheart.' The name and the theme of the movie seemed the perfect match for the direction I wanted to take

regular meeting cannot be held on a designated date, generally the second Monday of the month at 7 p.m. at the city office, then a special meeting is required rather than rescheduling the regular meeting. Only items placed on an agenda during a special meeting can be discussed and acted upon by city officials but regular meeting are less stringent in regards to discussion and actions regarding city officials.

- Placed three city vehicles for sale as surplus property. The vehicles

are two Ford city cruisers: A 2001 and a 2004 cruiser, as well as a 1991 Chevy Pickup. The surplus vehicles will be sold at a negotiated price.

- Briefly discussed the city's relationship with the animal control officer and actions regarding dogs in the city with city officers working with County Attorney Dawn Letcher to resolve issues with owners of problem dogs. "We have dogs running all over the place," Council member Sandy Ritchie said.

- Briefly discussed establishing neighborhood watch groups to battle city crime. "They (crimi-

## Nicholas man pleads guilty to child pornography charges

A Nicholas County man entered a guilty plea to child pornography charges in U.S. District Court March 4 and will receive a minimum sentence of 15 years imprisonment.

He may serve as much as 40 years, according to those close to the case.

Robert Ray Butler, 39, entered a guilty plea in federal court last week to receiving child pornography. Butler has a prior conviction for possession of matter portraying the sexual performance of a minor and sexual abuse, first degree, according to a press release issued by U.S. Attorney James A. Zerhusen, of the Eastern Kentucky Branch of

the United States Attorney's Office.

The press release states that Butler was stopped in Powell County Kentucky in April 2009 for a traffic violation and "subsequently arrested pursuant to an arrest warrant for failing to register as a sex offender."

According to Kyle Edelen, Information Officer for the U.S. Attorney's Office, the electronic crime branch of the Kentucky State Police was instrumental in obtaining information related to Butler's case and conducting several aspects of the investigation, which led to his guilty plea.

Butler's girlfriend, allegedly discovered child pornography on Butler's computer, which was in his vehicle during the Powell County traffic stop. She turned the com-

puter over to Kentucky State Police who later obtained a search warrant for the computer and for the home computer in Nicholas County. KSP Detectives found child pornography on both computers, according to the press release.

Edelen discussed the growing problems associated with cyber predators during an interview Monday.

"Computers are part of society," Edelen said. "Our laws are extremely strict in regard to possessing or distributing child pornography. You don't have to touch a child to be severally punished."

Edelen said most predators target children between the ages of 11-15, but some predators possess and distribute images and videos of much younger individuals.

Butler allegedly had images and videos on his home computer that included "images of toddlers and infants engaged in sexually explicit conduct," according to the U.S. Attorney's press release.

Edelen said that in many instances the children who are subjects of the images and videos "come from good households and have good parents," but he added that many of the parents aren't as technologically savvy as their children, who are ultimately targeted and exploited through the technology.

"With the continuously evolving technology in many instances the kids know more than the parents about technology."

Edelen urges all parents to, "Be as nosy as possible,"

when it comes to your child's use of advanced technology.

"These aren't neglectful parents," Edelen said. "It's just that the technology is foreign to them."

Edelen encourages all parents to become as computer savvy as possible and encourages them to develop a My Space page to help them learn all the tools that their children have access too.

"Taking away a child's computer is not the answer," Edelen said while describing how children have access to advanced technology and parents can only shield them from that technology to a certain degree but education can make the complex social and technologically bound problems easier for the parents to negotiate with their children.

"There are things a parent can do to protect their child from certain crimes," Edelen said. "There may be a certain section of a community where drug use and sales are more dominant and you can keep your child away from that section of the community," Edelen said. "But with these crimes, all a predator has to have is computer access anywhere in the world."

Butler is scheduled to return to U.S. District Court in Lexington on June 10, 2010 for sentencing.

Edelen praised the efforts of Nicholas County Attorney Dawn Letcher, who worked with U.S. Attorneys, KSP Detectives, Fayette County Commonwealth's Office and Fayette County Sheriff's Office officials, during the investigation.

Before noting two EPO violations of Gray in 2007, and an assault fourth charge against Gray from 2002, before asking the County Attorney for Scott County Glenn Williams what his position was.

"Due to the seriousness of the charges I recommend bond be raised to one million dollars cash," Williams said.

Absolute silence descended upon the crowded courtroom for a full five seconds before Judge Dickson agreed with Williams and raised Gray's bond to \$one million.

"This was a very disturbing scene," Scott County Coroner and former Kentucky State Police officer John Goble said the week of the murder. Goble joined investigators at the

murder scene after the gruesome discovery was made.

"I can say there were no defensive wounds that would indicate any sign of a struggle, and no defensive mechanism or weapon came into play during the homicide." Goble then told The Mercury.

Anthony Gray also spoke candidly to The Mercury only days after his parents were murdered and prior to his arrest.

"They were the best parents you can possible imagine," Anthony Gray said of his parents only minutes after choosing the coffins for them. "I want them caught, whoever did this."

Gray has continually professed his innocence of the crime as the investigation progressed.

"They both loved people and they loved animals as well," Gray said of his parents "They were good

honest trusting Kentucky people and that makes this even harder to bear."

Gray appeared very calm before and during his arraignment and spoke frequently with Barnes. He also made several gestures to his fiancée Rosa Rowland, who was also present in the courtroom.

"I know he didn't do it!" Rowland told The Mercury after the arraignment. "I hope people continue to pray for Anthony."

Indictments against Gray, issued by a Scott County Grand Jury Oct. 29, 2007, state that on or about on the 24th-26th of April, Gray "Intentionally fired two .45 caliber bullets into the head of James Gray, his father, thereby causing his death."

The indictment further alleges that during the same time period, Gray also shot his mother to death and committed the

second count of murder against his parents when he "Intentionally fired one .45 caliber bullet into the head of Vivian Gray, his mother, thereby causing her death."

The grand jury also indicted Gray for the offense of tampering with physical evidence when he "believing that an official proceeding would be initiated, disposed of the .45 caliber pistol used to murder James and Vivian, so as to conceal or hinder its finding from law enforcement."

According to the indictments issued against Gray,

Scott County Sheriff's Department Detective Roger Persley was the only witness called to testify during the grand jury proceedings.

After Gray's indictment was issued, Persley was asked if there had been any other arrests made in connection with the murder of James and Vivian Gray.

"No, there has not been," Persley said.

When asked about speculation within the Scott and Nicholas County communities citing the requirement of taking at least two peo-

ple to move the safe allegedly taken from the home of James and Vivian Gray when they were murdered, Persley was also quick to respond.

"I have no comment," he said and walked away.

Gray has likewise remained silent to a certain degree and has denied two separate requests from the Carlisle Mercury for an interview since his arrest. Prior to his arrest he repeatedly professed his innocence.

Gray remains lodged in the Scott County Jail.

# Lady Jackets fall in regional opener

Nicholas County's first appearance in three seasons at the 10th Region girls' basketball tournament did not last long. George Rogers Clark out-scored the LadyJackets 21-2 in the first quarter and ran away with a 74-23 victory on Tuesday, Mar. 2 at the Mason County Fieldhouse.

"They just overpowered us. They were much more athletic," Nicholas County coach Jennifer Cornett said. "Their defensive pressure was the problem."

Last year's tournament runner-up George Rogers Clark (16-10) started off the game with a full-court press that frustrated Nicholas County (11-16) and forced turnovers on the first two LadyJacket possessions and six in the first four minutes.

The Lady Cardinals took an 11-0 lead at the 3:41 mark of the first quarter, forcing Cornett to call a time out.

"We wanted to get off to a good start, but we were not as fluid offensively as we wanted," Clark County coach Scott True said.

Nicholas County scored its only points of the opening quarter when Petrea Mitchell converted a pair of free throws at the 2:27 mark.

Clark County continued to build on its lead as Preshia Rogers hit a 3-pointer just before the end of the first quarter to give the Lady Cardinals a 21-2 advantage.

The LadyJackets did not score a basket in the opening period.

Megan Bretz made a pair of free throws just over a minute into the second quarter to add two points for Nicholas County, but the Lady Cardinals kept their foot to the pedal and scored the next six points.

Reesa Martin's 3-pointer from the left side of the extended free-throw line at the 3:15 mark gave the LadyJackets their first field goal of the game. Mandi McLean followed with a basket 55 seconds later as the LadyJackets put together a 7-2 run to close the gap to 29-11.

Clark County finished the quarter on a 5-2 run to take a 36-13 advantage into halftime. The 23-point lead matched its largest of the first half.

"We went over all of their stuff. We knew they had one really good player and we wanted to focus on her, but we didn't want to let the others step up, so we focused on our defense," Rogers said. "Our main goal was to press on defense."

The Lady Cardinals scored 17 points off Nicholas County's 17 first-half turnovers. Rogers led the way with 11 points and four steals. Bretz was 4-for-4 at the free-throw line, and

added four rebounds, three assists and two steals in the opening 16 minutes.

"Megan Bretz stepped up and played a good game," Cornett said. "We have a bright future with her at the point."

Both teams struggled shooting the ball in the first

half. Clark County hit 36.1 percent of its attempts, while Nicholas County made just 23.1 percent.

The Lady Cardinals started the third quarter on a 15-2 run, with Martin's lay-up one minute and 14 seconds into the period recording Nicholas County's lone

points during that stretch.

Laken Howard's two free throws at the 1:38 mark got the LadyJackets back on the board. Bretz added a free throw later in the quarter as Clark County extended its advantage to 56-18 by the end of the period.

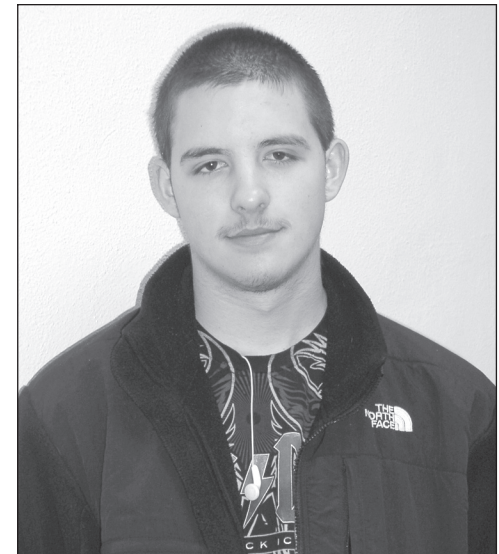

## Lady Jackets back on the diamond

The Nicholas County High School softball program is busy preparing for the 2010 season. Nicholas County has played its way into seven straight 10th Region tournaments and the upcoming campaign looks quite promising.

"We are coming off a very surprising and successful year in 2009," veteran Nicholas County Coach Barry Bretz commented. "We had lost so many good players from the 2008 team, seniors that had taken us to three state tournament appearances during their playing days, that we considered last year to be more of a rebuilding year for our program. We were hampered by bad weather last year and had numerous rainouts, but we still managed to go 14-8 and make the regional tournament for the seventh consecutive year. During the season we were Bluegrass Conference champions for the first time ever and finished runner-up in the 10th Region All "A" Classic."

Nicholas County lost Brittany Sosby and Jessica Gilkerson to graduation but returns numerous talented players. Some of the NCHS softball players continue to make a smooth transition from basketball.

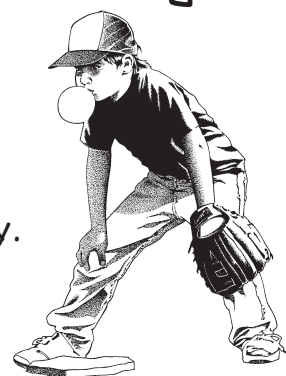

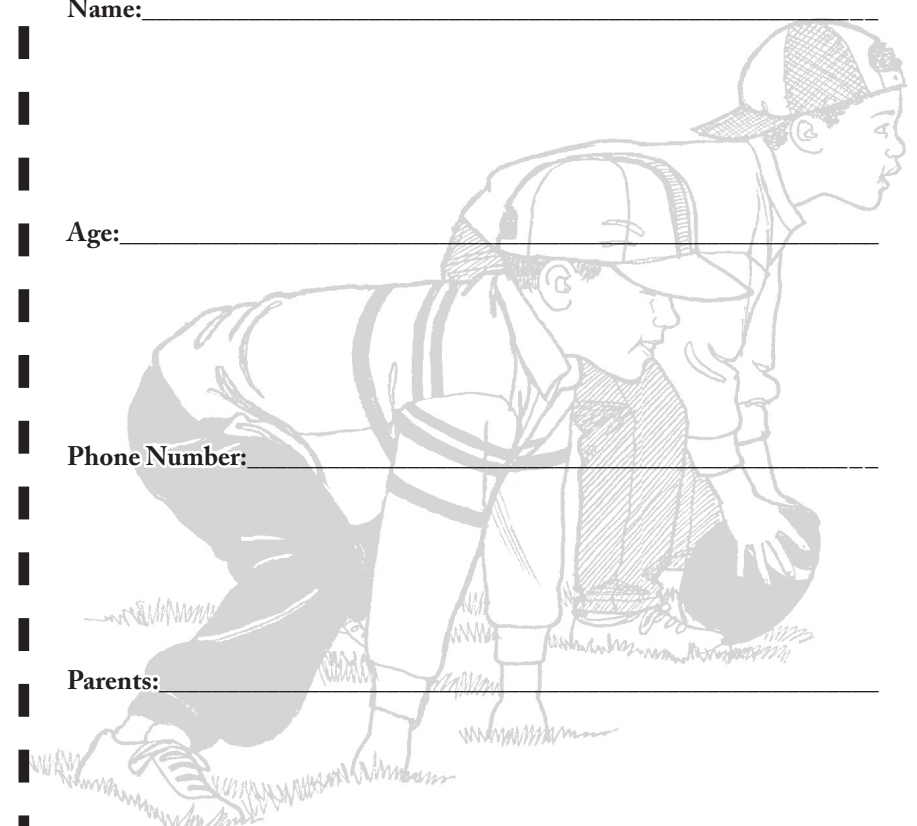

**What is the Alert?**

Diabetes means your blood glucose (sugar) is too high. Your blood always has some glucose in it because the body needs glucose for energy to keep you going. Too much glucose in the blood is not good for your health.

**Could you have diabetes?**  
Diabetes is a silent disease. You could have it for years and never know it. During this time, your eyes, nerves and kidneys may have been harmed by too much sugar in your blood.

**Who is at risk for diabetes?**  
Your risk for diabetes increases as you get older, gain too much weight or become inactive. Diabetes is more common in African Americans, Latinos, Native Americans, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders. Risk

factors for diabetes include:

- Having high blood pressure (at or above 130/80).
- Having a family history of diabetes.
- Having diabetes during pregnancy, or having a baby weighing more than nine pounds at birth.

Don't wait for the signs. Most people with diabetes do not notice any symptoms. However, if you should have any of these symptoms, call your healthcare provider right away.

- Very thirsty.
- Frequent urination.
- Losing weight without trying.

**What can you do?**  
You can do things now

to lower your risk for diabetes by:

- Keeping your weight in control.
- Eating low-fat meals that are HIGH in fruits, vegetables and whole grain foods.
- Staying active most days of the week.
- Ask your healthcare provider about your risk for diabetes during your next visit.

## Senate Week in Review

FRANKFORT

Actions taken earlier in the 2010 session have put us in the running for millions of dollars for education. On Thursday, it was announced that Kentucky made the first cut for the Race to the Top grant program, which offers \$4 billion to help bolster teaching and student performance in selected states.

In order to get to this point, the General Assembly had to work quickly and in a bipartisan fashion. Just a few days into session, we approved House Bill 176, which focused on moving education forward, and it was immediately signed into law by Governor Beshear. Our swift actions allowed our State to meet a January 19 deadline to compete for the Race to the Top Funds.

We were pleased to be named as one of the 16 finalists. We anticipate half a dozen states will be selected to receive shares of the \$4 billion that will be awarded in the first round of funding. We feel that Kentucky is poised to be among those finalists and could receive up to \$245 million. These funds would be used for: enhancing standards and assessments; improving the collection and use of data; increasing teacher effectiveness and achieving equity in teacher distribution; and turning around the low-performing schools.

The 16 finalists are to go to Washington the week of March 15 to make a presentation. The winners will be announced in April. The states that do not win

the impact this could have on our national security. SB 107 would help combat the use of these drugs before their use becomes more widespread. The bill would punish possession, manufacture, cultivation, or trafficking in these drugs, by up to a year in jail, with lesser offenses garnering up to 90 days. The message is clear: we take these drugs seriously, and we want to eliminate them before they grow to become the epidemic that others have become.

On another note, we passed legislation for some of our most valiant citizens. Senate Bill 71 creates a special license plate for recipients of the Silver Star and Bronze Star medal for valor. These license plates will allow our State to further recognize our heroes for their service. The men and women serving in our military too often find their lives at risk, and the recipients of the Silver and Bronze Star medal for valor have exceeded the call of duty to perform actions worthy of recognition at the highest honor. These special plates will allow the recipients of these awards to be more easily identified by the general public.

Applicants will be required to show proof of being a Silver Star or Bronze Star medal for valor recipient before being able to get a special license plate. March 30 is the last legislative day before we break for the veto period. In the remaining time, we still must craft a budget, consider domestic violence legislation, and deal with a host of other issues. 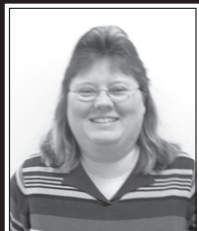

## Civic organizations meet to discuss Blackberry Festival

Tuesday evening, Mar. 9, the American Legion hosted a meeting with several civic organizations for this year's Blackberry festival, to be held in Carlisle on Jun. 28 - Jul. 3.

This year marks the festival's 60th anniversary. To help commemorate this, Gladys Shroud of Tourism, Inc. announced that they wanted to do something special, including inviting all the previous Blackberry Queens back.

The Legion introduced some of their initial plans, such as holding a street dance downtown the night of the parade and hold some kind of recognition for the previous Blackberry Queens.

Legion members recognize that any events held downtown will impact their profits at West End Park, but are willing to make that sacrifice if it helps provide the people something they want.

Many of the organizations raised concerns because historically, the Blackberry Festival has been their primary fundraiser for the year. Since the Festival was moved out to West End Park, most organizations experienced significant losses.

The Rotary Club reported that in 2007, the last year the festival was held downtown, their funnelcake booth took in \$1,783. In 2008, the first year at West End Park, the booth only made \$180. In 2009, the funnel cake booth lost \$108.

The Methodist Church's youth group held a luncheon downtown and cleared \$3,800. Last year, they only made \$700.

Organizations also discussed problems with private vendors selling the same items as non-profit organizations, which also hurt business.

Mayor Ronnie Clark said he was willing to make it a condition on

approving the road closure that only non-profit organizations that benefit the community would be allowed to operate downtown. Private vendors would be restricted to West End Park.

Tourism, the Historical Society and the Methodist Church reported similar losses. Some organizations had already discussed the situation and have decided not to operate booths at West End Park, limiting fundraising activities to downtown, the night of the parade.

Mayor Clark said he didn't have any problems with the road being closed for one evening, but emphasized that he didn't want the city crew to be responsible for clean-up. The vendors who operate downtown would need to clean up the street afterwards. He said the city could place dumpsters at the corners, but emphasized that it needed to be the vendors responsibility to

clean up the streets and get all the trash into the dumpster.

Mayor Clark also raised the possibility of moving the parade from Thursday night to Saturday night, and keeping the road closed from Noon until midnight. Several other organizations expressed support for this idea.

In closing, the group decided to re-convene at the Neal Building at 7:00 pm on Mar. 23 to bring in the remainder of vendors and non-profit organizations to work out which groups would be selling which items and to coordinate what additional activities the groups could help sponsor throughout the day if the festival were to operate downtown from Noon to midnight on Saturday, Jul.3.

There was an informal vote held about whether the festival should be moved back downtown. Only two individuals felt the festival should remain at West End Park.

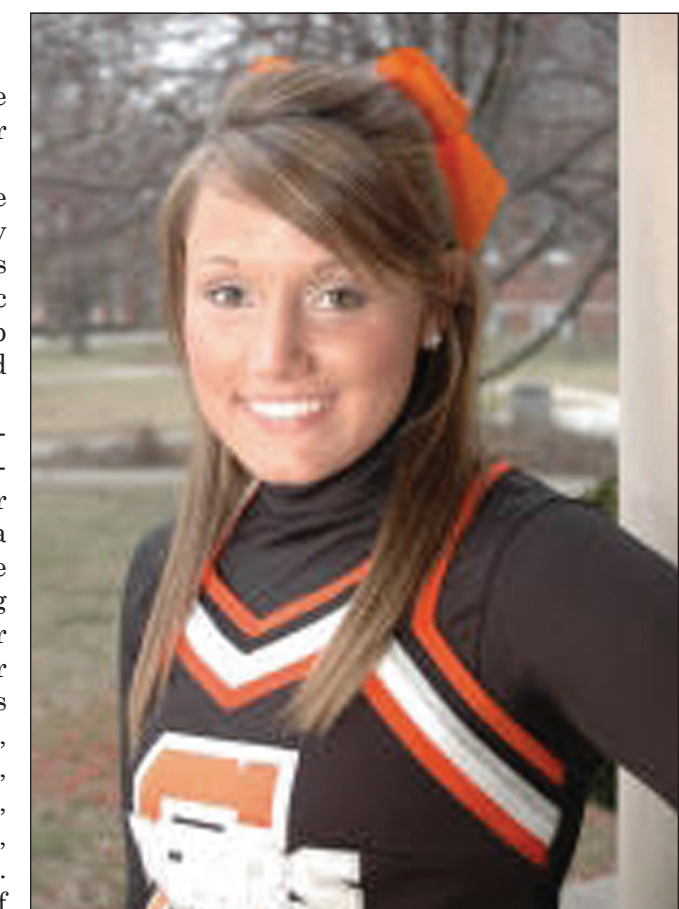
Campbellsville coach Vanessa Adkins was named the Mid-South Conference Coach of the Year.
