Nicholas County Attorney submits Annual Report

Cold Check Collections

From August 1, 2008 through December 31, 2009 (less than 18 months) the Nicholas County Attorney's Office cold check collection service has recouped nearly \$49,000.00 in cold check restitution and fees for local merchants.

DUI Prosecution Percentages

In addition to prosecution of all other traffic and misdemeanor offenses (offenses punishable by fine and/or 365 days or less in iail), the county attorney prosecutes DUI offenses which occur in our county. DUI conviction rates through December 2008 are 84%. Without the experience and efforts of local law enforcement personnel, this high percentage of convictions would be impossible to attain.

Child Support State-wide Rankings

As of September 2009. Nicholas County Attorney, of 120 counties, the submits the following to Nicholas County Child Enforcement County as her 2009 re- Office ranked 33 overall, considering all categories such as establishment, paternity, collections and arrears.

Nicholas County Victim Advocate

The victim advocate provides assistance to victims of violence in accessing the court system and other support agencies. The advocate makes referrals to appropriate agencies, attends court hearings with victims upon request and assists victims in the process of freeing themselves from the abuse. In 2009, the victim advocate provided assistance to approximately 68 residents in Nicholas County.

Citizen Complaints

Citizen complaints are a very important duty of the office. The county attorney receives 10-20 formal, written citizen complaints each week. Often an investigation is required by law enforcement personnel. If possible, Mrs. Letcher attempts to mediate a reso-

murder trial set for April

A former Nicholas County man who is accused of murdering his parents in their Scott County home will go

to trial April 5. James Gray, 63, and his wife Vivian, 55, had been married for over 40 years when they were found murdered in their Scott County home at 8811 Cincinnati Pike along US 25, near the small town of Corinth just south of the Grant County border, on April 26, 2007.

Their son Anthony Gray was arrested in October 2007 and charged with their murder.

"James Anthony Gray was arrested and charged with murder (2 counts) of James and Vivian Gray, of Scott County," a press release issued by the Scott County Sheriff's Office dated Oct. 22, 2007 states. The press release also states that Anthony Gray was addition-

of tampering with physical evidence.

Gray was living near Lake Carnico at the time of his parents' murders and was living in Carlisle just prior to his arrest.

"The charge of tampering with physical evidence was made in connection with the removal of a weapon from the crime scene," Detective Roger Persley of the Scott County Sheriff's Office said. Persley is the lead detective in the case and has received assistance from fellow officers with the SCSO, particularly Detective Jack Patrick and agents with ATF and officers with the Kentucky State Police.

Persley made several statements of "no comment" when asked about specifics of the crime including and allegations that stolen weapons were found at one location, perhaps more, that may be connected to the murders.

confessed to the murders.

A video, which allegedly shows Gray confessing has recently been ruled as allowable to be played in the pending trial.

Gray's attorney, Directing Attorney the Department of Public Advocacy, Rodney Barnes, was asked if Gray confessed

"I don't think so," Barnes said. "It doesn't sound like a confession to me."

Barnes told The Mercury that Gray's arrest came after a seven-hour interview with officers from the Scott County Sheriff's Office, Saturday.

Barnes was also quick to point out that Gray had "cooperated fully with the police investigation" and during Gray's arraignment asked Judge Vanessa Dickson to the consider lowering Gray's for bond from \$500,000 cash to \$50,000 cash.

Whispers and Bloodlines

"I came here to Grant's Station Dec 5-6, 1786... A woman, about one half mile from Grant's Station was in her cabin boiling soap. Had her gourd and was standing by to keep it from boiling over. The first that she knew there was anyone about, an Indian took her by the arm. She dipped up a gourd full of the hot soap and dashed it in his face. The violent screaming of the Indian frightened the others, some half dozen, from the door and they run. She then took up an axe and dispatched him... This was just before we came." Colonel John Graves, Draper Manuscripts volume 12 CC. Colonel Graves was an early frontier settler of Grant's Station and was a close companion of the infamous

Spring 1788

Jacob Stucker rode his mare back to Colonel John Edwards, near the edge of the Licking River, at the Upper Blue Licks in present-day northern Nicholas County. The men could tell that "Injun Jake" as he was most-often called, had news that was not good. He kept shaking the one Shawnee scalp he'd just taken and he had that crazy look in his eye that he sometimes got when his anger exceeded his physical control.

But few of the men paid particular notice to Jake's wrath and how Colonel Edwards finally, and mercifully, simply

reached out and hugged the Stucker had killed nearly twoyoung man and let him weep uncontrollably into his arms; The men and the two horses they sat astride of seemed frozen, like marble statues in the ancient and beautiful forest near the river's edge.

Jacob Stucker, though young, took each loss of the community very personal, as he was the lead Frontier Ranger of the communities between Bryant's and Grant's Station. Though he was only 23-

The dead girl was carried back to Cooper's Run and she and her four dead family members were buried near the ruins of the burnt cabin in one common grave. In January 1789 Susan

Shanks, the sister who had hidden in the hollow log during the attack on the cabin, married William Rice and they moved to the small community of Sherburne in southern Fleming County along the Licking River where they raised a large family.

Descendants of her family, including Minnie Emmons Doyle, still live in Fleming County.

Nicholas man pleads guilty to child pornography charges

A Nicholas County man entered a guilty plea to child pornography charges in U.S. District Court March 4 and will receive a minimum sentence of 15 years imprison-

He may serve as much as 40 years, according to those close to the case.

Robert Ray Butler, 39, entered a guilty plea in federal court last week to receiving child pornography. Butler has a prior conviction for possession of matter portraying the sexual performance of a minor and sexual abuse, first degree, according to a press release issued by U.S. Attorney James A. Zerhusen, of the Eastern Kentucky Branch of

The press release states that Butler was stopped in Powell County Kentucky in April 2009 for a traffic violation and "subsequently arrested pursuant to an arrest warrant for failing to register as a sex

U.S. Attorneys Office, the electronic crime branch of the Kentucky State Police was instrumental in obtaining information related to Butler's case and conducting several aspects of the investigation, which led to his guilty plea.

Butler's girlfriend, allegedly discovered child pornography on Butler's computer, which was in his vehicle during the Powell County traffic stop. She turned the com-

the United States Attorney's puter over to Kentucky State Police who later obtained a search warrant for the computer and for the home computer in Nicholas County. KSP Detectives found child pornography on both computers, according to the press release.

> ciety," Edelen said. "Our laws are extremely strict in regard to possessing or distributing child pornography. You don't have to touch a child to be severally punished." Edelen said most predators

target children between the ages of 11-15, but some predators possess and distribute images and videos of much younger individuals.

Butler allegedly had images and videos on his home computer that included "images of toddlers and infants engaged in sexually explicit conduct," according to the U.S. Attorney's press re-Edelen said that in many

instances the children who are subjects of the images and videos "come from good households and have good parents," but he added that many of the parents aren't as technologically savvy as their children, who are ultimately targeted and exploited through the technology. "With the continuously

evolving technology in many instances the kids know more than the parents about technology."

Edelen urges all parents to, "Be as nosey as possible,"

when it comes to your child's use of advanced technology.

"These aren't neglectful parents," Edelen said. "It's just that the technology is foreign to them."

Edelen encourages all parents to become as computer savvy as possible and encourages them to develop a My Space page to help them learn all the tools that their children have access too.

"Taking away a child's computer is not the answer," Edelen said while describing how children have access to advanced technology and parents can only shield them from that technology to a certain degree but education can make the complex social and technologically bound problems easier for the parents to negotiate with their children.

"There are things a parent can do to protect their child from certain crimes," Edelen said. "There may be a certain section of a community where drug use and sales are more dominant and you can keep your child away from that section of the community," Edelen said. "But with these crimes, all a predator has to have is computer access anywhere in the world."

Butler is scheduled to return to U.S. District Court in Lexington on June 10, 2010 for sentencing.

Edelen praised the efforts of Nicholas County Attorney Dawn Letcher, who worked with U.S. Attorneys, KSP Detectives, Fayette County Commonwealth's Office and Fayette County Sheriff's Office officials, during the investigation.

Senate Week in Review

The Nicholas Co. Water District purchases water from four different sources. One of the providers of water for Nicholas County Water District's customers is the City of Carlisle. This information is being published because of Monitoring Requirements not being met by the City of Carlisle. We routinely monitor for the presence of drinking water contaminants. Testing results we received from

October 1, 2009 to Deember 31, 2009 that our system exceeds the standard for maximum contaminant level (MCL) for trihalomethanes (THM) and Haloacetic Acid (HAAs).
