Flash flooding sweeps across county

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From five to eight inches of rain fell across Nicholas County and Carlisle over the weekend, saturating the countryside, flooding streams, damaging homes and other structures, as well as causing damage to roadways.

There have been no reported injuries as a result of the flooding as The Mercury prepares to go to print.

"We had 7.5 inches of rain in Carlisle, Mayor Ronnie Clark said Monday. "We had some water get into some of our basements, but I'm not aware of any significant damage to any homes in



Carlisle, at this point."

Clark did confirm that the city's waste-water-treatment facility received some damage to the facility property, including a fence, and water did make it into the facility, but the plant was running as normal Monday morning, according to Clark.

Some sections of the county fared better than others with flooding being recorded across the county, according to Nicholas County Emergency Management Director Calvin Denton.

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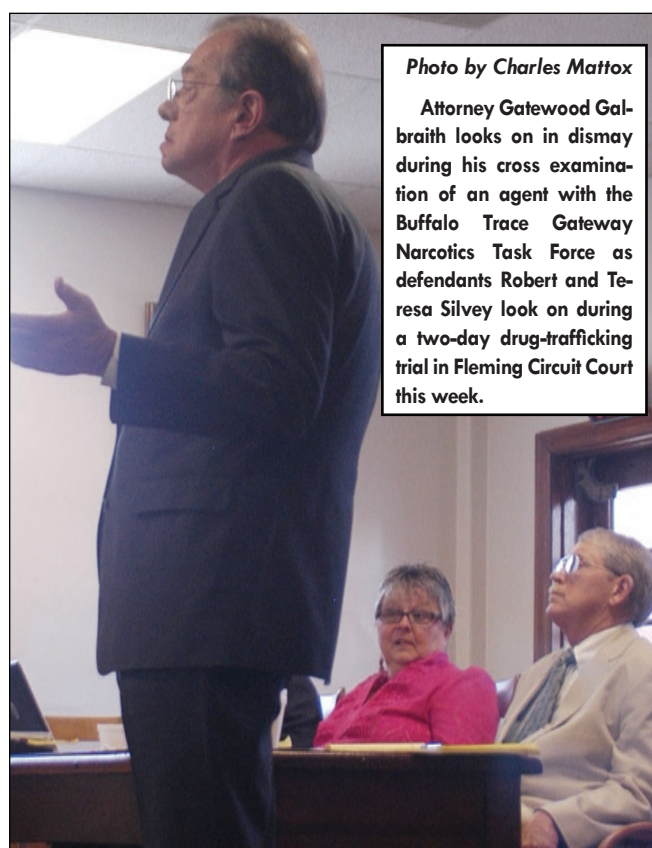

Silvey trial ends

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Nicholas County native, veteran attorney and candidate for Governor, honorable Gatewood Galbraith, spoke passionately during a two-day drug trial in Fleming County last week, which resulted in a jury of three men and eight women deliberating for several hours Wednesday evening before finding a Fairview couple not guilty of the charges of trafficking in a controlled substance, trafficking in marijuana, and cultivation of marijuana, at the conclusion of a two-day trial in Fleming Circuit Court.

Teresa Silvey was found not guilty of five criminal charges leveled against her following a raid on her home and that of her husband Robert two years ago by agents of the Buffalo Trace Gateway Narcotics Task Force.

The jury found Teresa Silvey not guilty of the charges of trafficking in a controlled substance, second degree, trafficking in a controlled substance, third degree, trafficking in marijuana, more than eight ounces but less than five pounds, possession of a controlled substance, first degree, cultivating marijuana more than five plants, and possession of drug paraphernalia.

The jury also found her husband Robert Silvey not guilty trafficking charges of controlled substances, not guilty of trafficking in marijuana more than eight ounces but less than five pounds, but did find him

guilty of possession of a controlled substance, first degree, (Demerol) and possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Circuit Judge, Honorable Stockton Wood, monitored the proceedings with vigilance throughout the trial and gave detailed and specific instructions to jurors members at the conclusion of the trial as they began their deliberation.

The trial was a result of agents with Buffalo Trace Gateway Narcotics Task Force (BTGNTF) receiving an anonymous tip during Oct. 2008 indicating that Robert Silvey was growing marijuana and selling marijuana in Lexington, according to testimony during the trial. That tip led to a "trash pull" being conducted at the Silvey residence and agents later serving a search warrant at the Silvey home where a marijuana grow room, weapons, processed marijuana and hundreds of pills were found and removed.

Asst. Commonwealth Attorney Gary Adkins called three of the BTGNTF agents involved in the investigation: Retired veteran agent Wilson Harmon, Reda Harris and Tim Feagin, to testify on behalf of the Commonwealth. Adkins also called Fleming County Sheriff Scotty Royse, who testified very briefly, as well as Kentucky State Police lab Technician Larry Boggs, who provided lengthy testimony about the identity of the multitude of bags of evidence, which contained marijuana and

Grand jury indicts three

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Members of a Nicholas County Grand Jury met Monday and returned indictments on three individuals.

William Ritchie, 29, was indicted on the charges of burglary, second degree; criminal mischief, second degree and persistent felony offender, second degree.

Members of the grand jury allege that on or about March 29 of this year, Ritchie committed the offense of burglary, second degree, when he allegedly "entered or remained unlawfully in the dwelling of Christie Nesbit.

Members of the grand jury allege that Ritchie committed the offense of criminal mischief, second degree when he "wantonly destroyed or damaged property belonging to Robbie Zornes causing pecuniary loss of \$500 or more."

Members of the grand jury also allege that Ritchie is a persistent felony offender, second degree, "in that prior to May 3, 2010, he had attained twenty one years of age, had been convicted of a felony, was over the age of eighteen years when he committed that felony, had completed service of the sentence imposed on the previous felony conviction within five years prior to the date of commission of the felony for which he now stands charged, and has not received a pardon for that felony conviction."

Members of the grand jury issued the indictments against Ritchie following the testimony of Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler.

Julius Talbott, 20, was indicted on the charge of burglary, first degree; assault, fourth degree (three counts) and criminal mischief, third degree.

Members of the grand jury allege the offenses occurred on or about Dec. 29 and that Talbott committed the offense of burglary, first degree, when he allegedly "knowingly entered or remained unlawfully in the dwelling of Paula Auxier, and when in effecting or while in the dwelling or in the immediate flight there from, he or another participant in the crime caused physical damage to any person who was not a participant in the crime."

Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

Engine, engine, number nine,
Going down the Chicago line.

If the train should jump the track,
Would you want your money back?

Children's play rhyme chanted by me, my siblings, and our friends, before the selection of teammates or to identify the first person chosen "it" in the game of tag or other games played during the 1960s and 70s.

We live in interesting times, dear reader.

Whole lot of button pushing going on.

Our technology is becoming increasingly awe-inspiring, particularly for those of us who grew up before the age of the mighty, mighty, computers.

And though there have been generational divides for thousands of years in the hills, hollows and meadows of this part; this most-beautiful part, of the state; the behavioral divide has widened and increases to grow between the members of the younger generation and their elders.

Our youngsters have better forms of communication than we ever

even dreamt of at their age, but I often wonder if they are better communicators.

I suppose time will tell.

As I 'run around like a chicken with its head cut off' in my weekly, frantic, yet systematic, approach to completing the tasks I've been assigned as the news editor for MC Publications, I couldn't help but notice a thing or two.

Even though we had snow for several weeks in a row this winter, I didn't see as much outside activity from the youngsters as I have in the past.

I certainly didn't see the kind of activity this winter, as would have been a normal observation for the children of my youth.

I can't be everywhere at once, but regardless of where I was this winter I can honestly say I didn't see the first really good, down-homey snowball fight or massive effort at sleigh riding as I did everywhere I went as a child in the winter.

I remember once

sleigh riding behind Tubby Emmons' store in Tilton in a snowstorm so severe that me and friends Mark Ishmael, Billy Hart and others, had to tie fodder twine strings around our waists and work together to make it back to the store from the bottom of the far side of the hill in the only white-out I was ever in.

But we went sleigh riding the next day.

And we kept a little fodder twine string in our coveralls too, cause you know, if there's one thing I learned a long time ago, there's nothing handier than a good flat rock, a broken tobacco stick or a piece of fodder twine, to have on hand in a pinch.

None of them had buttons to push.

And the games we played with didn't really have any buttons to push on them.

Except for Rockem Sockem robots, which I personally thought was a never-to-be-repeated break thru in toy technology.

And there were no batteries required, either.

I turned 47-years-old last week and I am increasingly aware of the fact that I'm starting to say things to some of my young friends that I heard my parents and

members of their generation say to me as a teen and young adult.

Things like, 'you don't know what tough times are' and, 'you young people have it made today' and, 'we didn't have luxuries like that when I was growing up.'

It seems to me like the more technology advances, the more some of the very fabric of our down-homey Kentucky culture rips farther apart from us.

As a child my family life resembled, in many subtle ways, that of the TV Walton family, who lived upon Walton's Mountain.

The TV series played from 1972-1981 and followed a successful, made-for-TV movie about a Christmas Homecoming.

Although the show was based upon the lives of a rural Virginia family in the years before the outbreak of WW II, there were many similarities between the characters on the show and the local lifestyles of the rural Kentucky families in the 1960s and 70s.

The early shows ended with the home encased in darkness, a single room dimly illuminated and a brief conversation between two characters is held before various family members wish "good

night" to one another with the phrase "good night John Boy" being a pop icon hook and catch phrase repeated by every single person alive at the time and a phrase spoke today under various circumstance.

And though the show was very cleverly written and produced, the characters and way of life seemed so parallel in many ways to my own and those around me that I yearned instead for the TV show, which was more than the imagination could fathom.

Star Trek ran for three seasons on NBC in the mid 1960s.

And if someone stood just right, perfectly still, with a close hanger wrapped in aluminum foil in one hand and the antenna in the other, you could actually watch portions of it before the quality distorted.

Ah, the good old days!

The show impacted my generation in ways beyond comprehension at the time.

The original show has morphed into movies and follow-up series, which, with the original shows, remain in syndication across the globe.

The show remains part of the American lexicon of pop culture and few phrases have

been repeated across the country in the past 40-odd years as often as "Beam me up Scottie".

I used to marvel at how Captain James Tiberius Kirk (William Shatner) (No, I'm not a "trekkie", but I do know what his middle initial stood for) used to whip out his communication device with the classic "Kirk to Enterprise" line.

And now we have cell phones that double as cameras and computers, something even Captain Kirk didn't have direct access to with his interstellar communicating device, called a communicator.

I don't know, maybe I'm just a person out of time, but the quickness with which our culture has changed with the blossoming impact of the computer and microchip; I can't help but wonder, "what's next?"

I guess that's the way of the world.

The typical "Walton" family of Kentucky will soon resemble "The Jetsons" in a few years at the rate we're going.

And if you don't know what the Jetsons are, well, you're a 'young, whiper-snapper' and part of the great generational divide shared by my generation and yours.



The Crazy Horse Lady



Rain, rain, go away and come back some other day! I know we have been blessed with the past rain, but it is so hard to muster up the energy to work those horses when it is cloudy, rainy, dreary and muddy!

Of course, this hasn't stopped me and in fact, has given me some time off to try to clean out all the dust bunnies that are lurking in my house! I guess I should be saying "thank God for rainy days so I can get some of my housework caught up" or at least that is what my family is probably thinking!

In between the showers, I have been really concentrating on "pressure and release" with my horse, Dia. ALL horse training involves the application of pressure to request a desired response.

I have been using a heavy duty leather bridle with a full cheek snaffle bit along with heavy corded reins. (You can check out what I'm talking about on the John Lyons' website to see what I use as an example.) This, I have been taught and have accepted, is a great training bit. It is a good one for you and

your horse. This will allow you to make them so light in the mouth that when you put your regular bit in, you will be able to feel the difference in your horse easily (I am currently using a wonder bit). I do have to warn you though, at times, you will feel like you are pulling their head off, when in fact you are actually encouraging their mouth to become very soft.

I really had a hard time with this concept. In fact, until I began to see and feel the results, I wondered if it wasn't a bunch of poppycock! You have to admit, everyone has their own theories about exercises to encourage a horse to be "soft" in the mouth. I want you to know that I have tried several bits and techniques and have found that this one is what it is cracked up to be! It allows you to really ask and it encourages your horse to respond to your cues so that it is easier for them to tell what you are expecting of them without hurting their mouth. Of course, you need to remember that ANY BIT can hurt your horse with rough or unkind hands! This fact should not be taken

lightly and ALWAYS remembered!

You are probably saying that this is pretty basic stuff. You are right, it is, but are YOU doing it? I mean are you really releasing the pressure by literally throwing your reins down on the neck so that your horse is able to appreciate the reward? I know I thought I was until I was shown differently. I have to tell you it isn't as easy as it sounds when you first try to accomplish this feat, in addition to remembering to maintain that half second timeframe.

It is not easy for a human to throw down the reins when the horse achieves a goal. The only thing I can tell you to make it easier is the same thing that I was told "you need to trust your horse". This doesn't mean to release them, throw them down on the horse and not be aware that they may start to walk off or even take off. It simply means you need to have the mindset that you are able to trust your horse in this exercise and do it. You will be very surprised with the results! I know I have been and it certainly is a nice

reward for all the hard work and time we've put into it together.

Another fact that just blows my mind is that you literally have a half second to reward your horse after doing something RIGHT by releasing pressure. Fact! Think about how quickly you need to react! It takes some doing let me tell you, but I encourage you to try this, you and your horse will not be sorry.

Where I have had the hardest time understanding and trying to be consistent in is the initial application of pressure. This is where the "Vowel Method of Applied Pressure™" comes into play. Simply put, we should use as little pressure as possible, but as much as is needed.

A.E.I.O.U., in this instance, stands for Ask, Encourage, Insist, Order, and Undo.

Always start with an ASK, and always end with the UNDO. What you need in between the two is determined by your HORSE.¹

This also requires a little coordination which I struggle with, believe me! I believe

I am probably one of the most uncoordinated people around. You should see me try to think about it in my brain, while trying to get my feet, hands, seat and whatever else needs to be cooperating with me at the time so we can accomplish our exercises/training. You can laugh ~ but there are times when I could just throw up my hands and say "screw it". It just seems too hard but I want this relationship between myself and my horse so badly, that I tell myself to breathe, relax and start all over again. You might even see that "dumb" look on my face at times when I am really overwhelmed. (Not a pretty sight!) When this occurs, I try to do something with my horse that is easy for both her and I so we end on a good note and either quit for the time being or go for a little trail ride, a reward to her ~ not to mention me!

SPRING TIME REMINDER: On a more serious note, this is the perfect time of the year for your horse to turn up with seasonal laminitis or colic. With all the green lush grass that is growing, your hors-

es are very, very happy and content just standing around grazing. In fact, they may eat like they've never seen a green blade of grass in their lifetime. You need to be aware of this and keep an eye out for signs! It is your responsibility as horse owners to oversee this for the health of the horse. It is like leaving my husband in the house with a fresh bag of Oreos, whether opened, closed or even frozen - crazy.

This time of year can turn out to be very dangerous for your horses!

Until next week - remember pressure, release, pressure, release. God Bless You, Your Family and YOUR EQUINE FRIENDS and I pray you all have a safe, blessed, horse-filled week! HAPPYTRAILS and remember to carry out what you have carried in while trail riding!

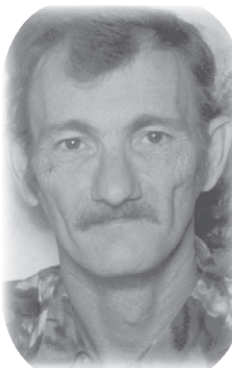

Work on US 68 in Nicholas County expected to begin May 5

Pavement improvements along six miles of Millersburg-Maysville Road (US 68) in Nicholas County are scheduled to start next week. Beginning Wednesday, May 5, crews with

Strawser Construction Inc. plan to seal cracked pavement along US 68 from Brushy Creek to near KY 1244.

Operations will require one lane traffic on US 68 through

Saturday, May 8, although inclement weather could extend work into the following week. Motorists should watch for flaggers and be prepared for periods of stopped traffic during

daytime work hours. Pavement sealing operations will set the stage for "microsurfacing" of the highway later in the month. Microsurfacing is a high-tech process us-

ing a thin layer of quick-set paving material to preserve the roadway surface. The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet has awarded Strawser Construction a \$379,685.82 contract for

the work. During the project, motorists are asked to heed warning signs, "Drive Smart" in work zones and remain aware of workers and construction equipment when traveling.

Road Projects awarded

More than \$2 million in state highway improvements are coming soon to Fleming, Nicholas, Rowan and Carter counties.

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet awarded four low-bid contracts in March for the following work in Department of Highways District 9:

Road (KY 36) in Nicholas County from KY 32 to the Bath County line, a distance of 9.5 miles – to Eaton Asphalt Paving Co. Inc., \$627,888.

- Replace bridge and approaches on KY 32 over the TTI Railroad just west of KY 560 in Fleming County – to RGF Inc., \$977,024.77.

Boulevard (KY 7) in Carter County from the Little Sandy River Bridge north to US 60, a distance of 0.5 miles – to Mountain Enterprises Inc., \$114,972.15.

- Asphalt resurfacing on sections of the Morehead Bypass (US 60) in Rowan County between KY 519 and KY 3032 for a total distance of 1.17 miles – to Hinkle Contracting Company LLC, \$414,989.

- Asphalt resurfacing of Moorefield

Flooding can affect our lives in many ways

First of all you want to make sure your home is livable by making sure things are clean and not contaminated. Here are some things to consider when dealing with flooded homes.

Carpets and Flooring
It's best to have professional cleaners work on carpets and floors, but if that isn't possible, there are some steps you can take. Remember to clean and dry the floor thoroughly before attempting any repairs.

- Pull up saturated carpets and rugs, and drape them outside.

- Spray off muddy carpets with a hose. Use a broom to work a low-sudsing, disinfectant carpet cleaner into soiled spots.

- To discourage mildew, rinse the backing with a solution of 2 tablespoons of bleach to 1 gallon of water. Do not use this solution on wool carpets; instead, try pine-oil cleaners.

- Disinfect the slab or sub-floor, and allow it to dry completely. (This may take several months.) Replace any section that separated.

- Discard and replace carpet padding.

- For wood floors, remove a board every few feet to reduce buckling. Replace the boards once the floor is dry.

- Remove floor coverings with wood subflooring, and replace the subfloor. You don't have to remove vinyl covering concrete floors, but doing so will hasten drying and prevent mold.

- Replace loose tiles over soaked flooring. This may mean a few tiles or the entire

sheet.
Water

Watch your well...because it, too, can be flooded.

If you see water around or in your well, it's probably flooded. Take steps to disinfect it, or contact a well contractor or driller to disinfect it after the floodwaters recede. Use water from a safe public water supply, or bottled water, until your well has been disinfected.

Remember, many older wells are located in well pits that can flood after a heavy rain even if the surrounding area is not flooded.

If you choose to disinfect your own well, be prepared to:

- Open outside faucets until water runs clear.

- Turn off the electric power to the pump, and remove the well cap.

- Prepare a solution of bleach and water. Let it sit for a half hour; then pour the entire mixture into the top of the well. The ratio of bleach to water can vary depending on the size and depth of your well. Contact your local health department or Extension office for more details.

- Re-circulate the water by connecting a hose to a faucet and spraying the water back into the well for at least 15 minutes.

- Open every cold-water faucet in the system, and let the cold water run until the smell of chlorine can be detected. Then run the hot and cold water until clear. Close all faucets, and seal the top of the well.

- Let the chlorinated water

stand in the system for several hours, preferably overnight.

- The next day, turn on all the faucets, and continue running the water until all odor of chlorine disappears.

Be sure to take a water sample and have it tested before using the water. Call the county health department to find out where to test well water in your area.

Disinfecting will not protect your water from pesticides, heavy metals, and other types of non-biological contamination. If you suspect such contamination, special treatment is required.

Furniture
Salvage other belongings... because many can survive a flood

The first step in salvaging your belongings is determining what to keep and what to throw out.

You'll need to evaluate the extent of the damage, the cost of the article, the cost of restoration, the quality of the wood or fabric, and the sentimental value. Always wear rubber gloves and wash hands frequently when working with cleaning solutions and flood-damaged items. And remember - never mix chlorine and ammonia.

Furniture that has been flooded...in your home

Furniture that has been flooded and has porous materials such as leather, fabric and stuffing is contaminated. It should be discarded because it will likely produce dangerous molds in your home.

Use the following guidelines to begin salvaging

flood-damaged furniture. Before starting, evaluate the time and equipment needed.

Submerged or Wet Furniture

- Take furniture outdoors, and remove as many drawers and removable parts as possible. Drawers and doors may be stuck tight. If they are, do not pry them open. Instead, remove the back of the furniture, and push them out from behind.

- Clean off mud and dirt, using a hose if necessary.

- When the furniture is dry, re-glue it if necessary.

Damp Furniture

- If the entire surface of the furniture is covered with white spots or a cloudy film, rub it with a damp cloth dipped in turpentine or camphorated oil, or use a solution of 1/2 cup of ammonia and 1/2 cup of water. Wipe dry, and polish with furniture polish.

- For deep spots, use a drop or two of ammonia on a damp cloth. Rub immediately with a dry cloth and polish.
- If color is not restored, dip 3/0 steel wool in mineral or olive oil, and rub lightly with the wood grain. Wipe off and re-wax.

- If spots remain, refinish the piece.

After cleaning, store the furniture in a shady, well-ventilated place because furniture dried in the sun will warp.

FLOOD DAMAGE OF
LARGE ELECTRICAL
APPLIANCES**

Appliances submerged in floodwater are often not repairable, and even those that are repaired will have a shortened life expectancy. And it's

not economical to repair such small appliances as microwaves, televisions, and radios. Use the following guidelines to begin salvaging appliances.

- Disconnect the power to the building or to the circuit that feeds the appliance before unplugging it from the wall. Water can short-circuit an appliance so parts that don't normally conduct electricity can shock you.

- Make a diagram or list of all switches, contacts, motors, and wiring before disconnecting them.

- Rinse and flush all parts with clean water, and allow them to dry for several days.

- Dry and lubricate hinges, bearings, and other moving parts to prevent rust.

- Use spray-on drying agents to get rid of moisture on contacts and motors.

- Consult the diagram you've made as you reassemble the appliance. Appliances that have absorbent insulation, such as ovens, freezers, refrigerators, and water heat-

ers, need to have wet insulation replaced. Water heaters also require special care when flushing the pipes. Be sure to flush hot water lines last so sediment doesn't end up in the water heater.

Follow these steps to begin dealing with wet insulation in your appliances, water softener, filters, and purifiers.

- Remove insulation, and consult the owner's manual for details. Be sure to wear gloves when removing the insulation.

- Clean the area, and install new insulation. Duct insulation can replace old fiberglass insulation.
- If the insulation can't be removed, it's best to discard the appliance. If that's not an option for you, and you're sure the floodwater was not contaminated, drill holes in the outer casing so the insulation can dry faster. Make sure the appliance is unplugged and do not drill through wires.

- You don't have to remove the foam insulation from newer refrigerators and freezers.

"We had some high water on Arthur Pike, at Headquarters, and along Barterville Road. Damage also occurred to the roadway on Bus Clark Road, where high water washed a portion of the road foundation away."

Damage was also done to bridges over Johnson Creek and Crooked Creek.

"The current was very swift over Johnson Creek and Crooked Creek with some damage to asphalt and concrete on some bridges," Denton said.

According to Denton, Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tincher declared a state of emergency after touring the county with Denton early Monday morning.

Community sources indicate a State Highway vehicle became stranded after being abandoned on Taylor Creek Road and was abandoned, due to rising water.

High water also caused damage and concern for citizens on Myers Road and Cassidy Creek with significant flooding being done near the Fleming County border in the community of Pleasant Valley.

Although travel was limited for Nicholas motorists, Nicholas County fared better than surrounding communities, particularly Mount Sterling, and Morehead, where flooding covered much of those downtown areas.

The Kentucky Governor's Scholars Program (GSP) was established in 1983. It is a five-week summer program for rising high school seniors. The scholars selected stay for the duration of the program in the residential halls of three Kentucky college campuses. The three campuses currently hosting the program are Centre College, Morehead State University, and Bellarmine University. Excluding group trips, GSP requires that all scholars remain on campus at all times. This encourages the development of rich community within the group. There is also a college fair during the program, allowing the scholars to survey Kentucky's colleges and universities. 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

...pills.

Veteran Attorney Gatewood Galbraith, who is also a candidate for Governor of Kentucky in the 2011 election, represented the Silveys.

Galbraith seemed to connect with jury members on several key issues regarding the trial, the charges lodged against his clients, the motivation of the agents involved and the total lack of "believable" evidence to indicate the Silveys had ever sold any illegal product to anyone.

BTGNTEF agents testified that it was typical for 5,000 joints (marijuana cigarettes) to be made from a pound of marijuana and that a typical plant of marijuana produced a pound. The agents also testified that the street value of a joint of the marijuana recovered from the Silvey residence would sell for \$10.

"So if there's 5,000 joints per plant and you say there were nine plants... You're telling me that this was a \$450,000 marijuana plot?" Galbraith asked Feagin, the current lead agent of the BTGNTEF.

"According to the DEA (Drug Enforcement Agency)," he replied.

Galbraith then made a point to explain to the jury that there were approximately 454 grams of weight in a pound and that most joints could hold an excess of one gram of marijuana, which would result in about ten percent of the number of joints the agents testified could be obtained from a pound of marijuana.

"Can you explain this discrepancy?" Galbraith asked.

The agent indicated his training with DEA indicated the standard formula was 5,000 joints per plant.

Galbraith asked specific questions of all the agents and Sheriff Roysel regarding the trafficking charges against his clients.

ents. All three agents and Sheriff Roysel, who was present during the search at the request of the agents, testified that they had "no" evidence of any witnesses saying they had purchased marijuana or controlled substances off either of the Silveys.

"You have no audio or taped recordings of any transaction?" Galbraith asked.

"No," was the answer from all he asked.

"You have no marked money recovered from controlled buys?" Galbraith asked.

"No," was the answer he received each time he asked.

"There were no confidential informants who made any purchases?" he asked.

"Not that I am aware of," was the standard reply.

Galbraith also sneered with contempt regarding the processing of evidence when it was clarified that some of the evidence recovered and sent to the KSP lab for analysis was "root material and dirt" from harvested plants.

"I guess they wanted to charge my clients with illegal dirt," he said as he shook his head in theatrical disbelief, which drew quiet smiles from more than one of the jurors.

Galbraith entered a single photo into evidence. It was a photo of the ceiling of the basement area of the Silvey home taken by a BTGNTEF agent but not introduced into evidence by Adkins.

The agent testified that the design on the ceiling was a marijuana plant and testified that it was amazing that someone would chose to design their home with such a design.

Galbraith asked the agent if she was aware that "when you are a hammer, everything looks like the head of a nail." It was a remark Galbraith also used in closing arguments and seemed to give a voice of his belief that

the agents had acted inappropriately and made false and unsubstantiated charges against his client.

"The design that the agent thought was a marijuana leaf was nothing more than spackle, one of four spackle designs the Silveys had to chose from, not a marijuana leaf," Galbraith told the FCN following the trial.

Both Silveys took the stand in their defense during the trial, with Robert Silvey admitting he grew marijuana and smoked it as well as consuming it in tea formula.

Silvey is a Vietnam era veteran who suffered painful injuries during his service to the country and is 100 percent disabled. He also battles pain each day, according to testimony of the trial.

The jury received their instruction from Judge Wood just before hearing closing arguments from Adkins and Galbraith.

The jury then began deliberating the case at approximately 5 p.m., Wednesday evening. They returned with their verdicts approximately five and one half hours later.

Teresa Silvey was found not guilty of all charges.

Roberts Silvey was found guilty of misdemeanor possession of marijuana, (two counts) guilty of possession of drug paraphernalia and guilty of possession of a controlled substance, first degree.

Robert Silvey was sentenced to four months imprisonment on the misdemeanor charges and two years imprisonment on the possession of a controlled substance, first degree, with all sentences running concurrent for a total of two years imprisonment.

Robert Silvey was transported to the Mason County Detention Center immediately after the trial ended just after midnight.

Galbraith commented briefly following the

Members of the grand jury also allege that Talbott committed the offense of assault, fourth degree when he allegedly "intentionally caused physical injury to Jessica Auxier."

Members of the grand jury further charged Talbott with two additional counts of assault, fourth degree, alleging

that he also caused physical injury to Amber Auxier and Jazlyn Auxier.

Members of the grand jury allege that Talbott committed the offense of criminal mischief, third degree, when he allegedly "intentionally damaged property belonging to Paula, Jessica and Amber Auxier."

Frankie Abnee, 54, was indicted on the charges of operating a motor vehicle while under the in-

fluence, fourth offense; fleeing or evading police, first degree, and operating a motor vehicle while his license was revoked or suspended.

Members of the grand jury allege that on or about March 24 of this year, Abnee was operating a vehicle while under the influence and "refused to submit to any test of his blood breath or urine as requested by an officer having reasonable

grounds to believe that (Abnee) was operating a motor vehicle while under the influence." According to the indictment Abnee has been convicted of driving under the influence three times in the past five years.

Members of the grand jury also allege that Abnee, "knowingly and wantonly disobeyed a direction to stop his motor vehicle given by a person recognized to

be a police officer and that by fleeing or eluding the officer, (Abnee) created a substantial risk of serious physical injury or death to mother motorists."

The members of the grand jury also allege that Abnee's license had been revoked or suspended at the time of his latest alleged driving violation.

Members of the grand jury issued indictments

against Abnee following the testimony of Carlisle Police Officer Mark Snedegar.

An indictment is not considered an indication of guilt, but merely ensures that a case may be moved from the district court level to the circuit court level if the alleged crime is severe enough. All persons are innocent until proven guilty or pleading guilty.

Dispatch policy raises concerns

As the Carlisle Mercury goes to press a situation has arisen, which some believe could jeopardize the lives of citizens of Nicholas County and those who travel through the county.

The situation is in regards to an April 5 memo distributed from the Nicholas County Fire Board regarding the dispatching of fire department personnel when a motor vehicle accident is reported.

"On April 5, 2010 a meeting of the Nicholas County Fire Board was held to discuss the policy on when, and how to dispatch the Nicholas County Fire Department," the memo begins. "The seven-man board voted unanimously 6-0, with one board member absent. The vote was that the Nicholas County Fire Department be dispatched immediately on all motor vehicle accidents regardless of entrapment or not, in Nicholas County. This policy is effective immediately."

The memo is signed by Fire Board Chairman David Smith and Nicholas County Fire Chief Mark Hughes and is dated April 9.

According to Hughes, the policy is not being put into action and he fears that lives are being unnecessarily put at risk due to the failure to implement the policy.

Dispatch supervisor, Carlisle Chief of Police William Denton, confirmed the policy is not being enforced and explained why, stating that he had been contacted approximately three weeks ago by Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tinker regarding the memo.

The Nicholas County Dispatch is a jointly funded entity, which is funded in part by the city of Carlisle and the Nicholas County Fiscal Court.

Chief Denton said that Judge Tinker expressed concern about dispatching fire department person-

nel and vehicles to "every single motor vehicle accident" in that it would unnecessarily waste tax dollars, risk fire department personnel and citizens who might be adversely impacted when firefighters race to the scene of every single accident, which would include minor fender benders and simple accidents involving a vehicle backing into another vehicle at a very low rate of speed.

According to Denton, Tinker told him fire department personnel should be dispatched when there is entrapment or entrapment is unknown, but not to every single "fender bender" in which there is no entrapment.

Judge Tinker echoed those sentiments in a brief interview with The Mercury, Monday morning, stating that to dispatch the fire department to every single motor vehicle, as is stated in the fire board memo, would create more problems than it would prevent stating that he feared fire department personnel and/or citizens might be injured when motorists and citizens acted to move out of the way of fire trucks or personnel going quickly to the fire station.

Judge Tinker stated

he did appreciate the dedication of the fire department personnel, but thought the policy should be examined closely and fire department personnel and vehicles should not be dispatched if the accident is only a minor fender bender.

Nicholas County Fire Chief Mark Hughes expressed concern that 911 calls routed to Kentucky State Police Dry Ridge Post Dispatch might lead to miscommunication and delay needed assistance, as was the case as recently as Sunday when six people were transported to the hospital following a single-vehicle accident, followed quickly by a two-vehicle

accident that occurred as a result of the first accident, along US 68 on Sunday, according to Hughes.

The fire department was notified of the accident 45 minutes following the initial call to dispatch, according to Hughes, who said similar accidents and miscommunication had occurred and luckily no lives had thus far been lost in the miscommunication.

A meeting between Judge Tinker, Carlisle Mayor Ronnie Clark, Chief Denton, Carlisle Fire Chief Jeff Jefferson, Chief Hughes, EMS personnel and other emergency responders is tentatively scheduled to be held to reach an agreement

on the language of the policy within the next week, according to those involved.

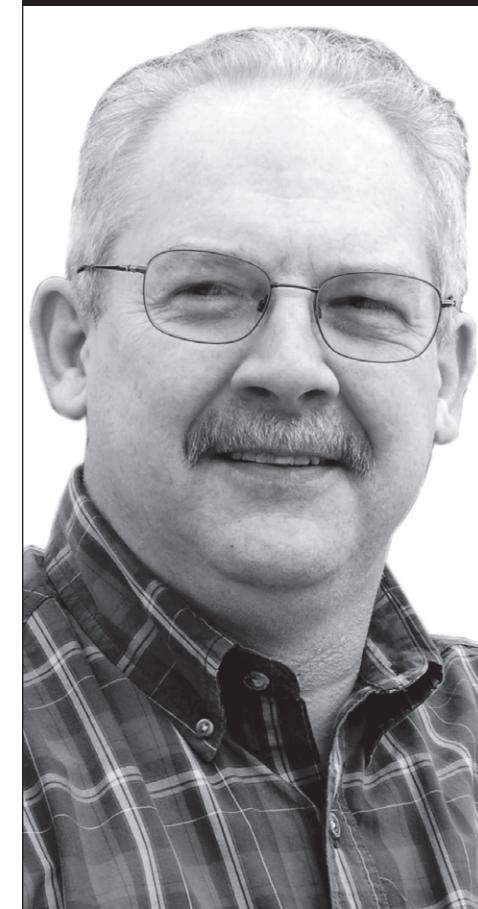

Governor Beshear declares state of emergency, urges Kentuckians to avoid contact with flood waters

Governor Steve Beshear today confirmed at the Commonwealth Emergency Operations Center (CEOC) the issuance of an executive order, effective May 1, 2010 declaring a state of emergency in response to the severe storms and flooding that hit the Commonwealth over the weekend. There have been four confirmed deaths attributed to this latest storm system in Madison, Barren, Allen and Lincoln counties. Forty-one counties and 15 cities have issued emergency declarations either in writing or verbally. These numbers are likely to increase as recovery efforts continue.

The Adjutant General may issue active duty orders for the mobilization of needed National Guard personnel and equipment. The Finance and Administration Cabinet is directed to fund the urgent operational or response costs incurred in response to this emergency. Transportation on and access to any and all public roadways in the affected area may be restricted or prohibited in the interest of public health and safety. The Kentucky Crisis Response Board (KCCRB) is directed to activate their network of trained counselors to provide crisis response services.

and Kentucky Division of Emergency Management regional response managers are in the process of coordinating damage assessments with local officials to determine the scope of damage across the Commonwealth. "Preliminary assessments indicate the largest impact is to infrastructure, which includes roadways and water/sewage treatment plants," said John W. Heltzel, director of the Division of Emergency Management. "We know there have been businesses and residents along many waterways that have experienced flooding and these numbers are likely to increase as run-off water continues."

have begun damage assessments and a full assessment of damages to bridges and culverts will commence once waters recede. So far, KY 15 at Clark-Powell line and KY 715 in Menifee County at the Red River Gorge are closed indefinitely. KY 921, Barren County is closed due to a 20-foot section of pavement missing. In Cumberland County, KY 953 and KY 3115 are expected to be closed in places for up to two weeks. Mudslides and debris are causing blockage of roads, especially in eastern and southeastern Kentucky.

for Health and Family Services' Department of Public Health also warn individuals of the dangers of flood water contaminants and the potential for mold to develop as waters recede. Individuals who have experienced power outages due to the storms should also be cautious when using food that has been refrigerated or frozen because of possible spoilage. posed to flood waters. In the absence of safe bottled water, tap water should be boiled to kill most types of disease-causing organisms that may be present. In addition to the transportation and public health officials, representatives from the Department for Fish and Wildlife Resources, the Division of Forestry, the Kentucky National Guard, the Division of Water, local and state emergency management and emergency services are all assisting in storm damage assessment and recovery and rescue efforts.

"The safety of our citizens is my first priority," said Gov. Beshear. "That is why I urge individuals who encounter high waters to use extreme caution and avoid unnecessary contact with flood waters if at all possible. Our thoughts are especially with those who lost loved ones in the tragic deaths that have been attributed to the weekend's storms."

The executive order regarding price gouging implements certain provisions of law aimed toward protecting Kentucky consumers from price gouging.

Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) officials have closed approximately 400 roads across the state and dozens more remain partially obstructed due to water, mud or rock slides and storm debris. A total of 76 Counties have reported road closures.

Motorists should always use extra caution while driving in flooded areas, including allowing ample travel time, planning a possible detour and remember to never cross a flooded roadway—turn around, don't drown. The public can access updated travel and weather information online at www.511.ky.gov or by dialing 511.

The Kentucky Division of Water urges residents to properly disinfect water for in-home use, including drinking, cooking, making prepared drinks and brushing teeth. The easiest alternative is to use bottled water if it is available and has not been ex-

Is this an alien life form, or something else?

Although they have the visual appearance of an extraterrestrial, the bizarre, tentacle laden, swollen, woody galls are actually a fungal disease known as Cedar-apple rust.

All of the rust diseases are caused by fungus of the Gymnosporangium juniper-virginianae genus.

The galls, as the orbital growths, which commonly appear on cedar trees, are called, can survive from year to year.

The orange, gelatinous, growths emerge from the galls in the spring and produce spores, which spread to infect the rosaceous host, which can include apple, crabapple, hawthorn, and pear trees. The juniper hosts include, red cedar, Rocky Mountain juniper and other types of juniper trees. Cedar-apple rust examples seem to be on the rise in northeastern Kentucky.

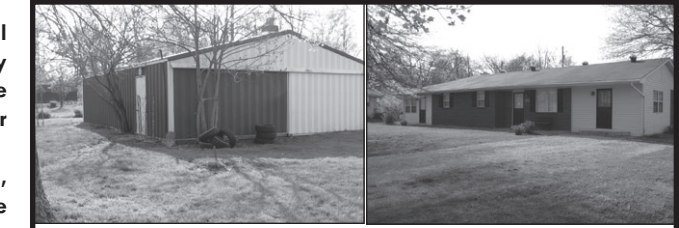

Lady Jackets fall to Bishop Brossart in All 'A' semis

Thursday was just one of those nights for the Nicholas County softball team. No matter what the LadyJackets did, they just could not slow down Bishop Brossart.

The Lady Mustangs pounded out 11 hits and Nicholas County (9-4) compounded the problem by committing five errors as Bishop Brossart won the match up between the two teams in the semi-finals of the 10th Region All "A" Tournament in Paris 9-1.

"We just didn't catch (the ball) today," said Nicholas County coach Barry Bretz, whose team had its four-game win streak snapped. "We hit (Brossart's Alicia Miller) and she is one of the best pitchers in the region. With as many errors as we made, we did a good job to (play all) seven innings."

Bishop Brossart (20-4) scored four times in the first, once in the second and twice more in the third to establish a 7-0 advantage.

"We held a team that had 150 runs in 12 games to just one run," Brossart coach Mel Webster said. "Our defense was solid. I am happy with our hitting, but we left nine runners on base. We have to do better getting the runs in, but I'll always take the win."

Paige Baynum got things started in the bottom of the first inning with a single to left field. Natalie Woeste followed with a bunt single and advanced a base on an error.

Lindsay Griffith grounded out to the shortstop, but Baynum scored on the play. Jenna Bezold followed with a sacrifice fly to center field that plated Woeste. Molly Williams then reached on an error and Miller doubled to center field to drive in Williams. Miller's pinch runner, Maria Greis, eventually scored on a pair of wild pitches.

McKenzie Hopkins singled down the left-field line in the top of the second for the LadyJackets' first hit. But, Hopkins was virtually all

of the team's offense on the day. She finished 3-for-3 and drove in the lone Nicholas County run.

In the bottom of the frame, Baynum hit a two-out double off the fence down the left-field line and came in two batters later on Griffith's single to right-center field.

In the top of the third inning, Shelby Wade hit a line drive that went off the left knee of Miller, forcing the Lady Mustang pitcher to leave the game. Erin Franke took her place in the circle and went the rest of the way.

Franke reached base on a fielder's choice in the bottom of the third inning. Emily Schubert followed by reaching on a dropped fly ball, before Krista Kennedy singled to right field and drove both Schubert and Greis, running for Franke, home.

Brossart threatened in the bottom of the fourth after the first four batters reached base. However, Woeste, who walked to lead off the inning, was thrown out on a fielder's choice at third base.

With the bases loaded, Nicholas County pitcher Shelby Brown struck out the next batter and forced the following one to ground out, ending the inning.

Jania Wagoner singled to left-center field to lead off the Nicholas County fifth, but Franke retired the next three batters to avert any run-scoring threat.

Kennedy earned a one-out walk in the bottom of the inning and then stole second before Baynum doubled to left-center field to drive her home. Woeste and Griffith followed with a pair of singles, with Griffith's shot to left field driving in Baynum.

Bezold then became the fourth straight Lady Mustang to pick up a hit, but like the shot in the third inning that went off the knee of Miller, Bezold's line drive ricocheted off the left ankle of Brown, forcing the LadyJacket pitcher to have to leave the game.

Emily Curran stepped into the circle to finish off the contest for Nicholas County and the sophomore reliever retired all five batters she faced the rest of the way.

Nicholas County finally got on the board in the top of the sixth. Shelby Sosby led off the frame with a double off the fence in center field and two batters later, Hopkins drove her in with a two-out RBI single off the fence in right-center field.

However, like Curran, Franke retired the next four batters she faced to end the game.

"We were missing (starting second baseman) Hannah (Coldiron), but there are no excuses," coach Bretz said after the game. "If we can catch the ball, we are right there with everybody in four region.

Today our pitching was good and our hitting was good, and we didn't give up."

Hopkins finished with half of Nicholas County's hits. Sosby, Wagoner and Wade had the other three. Hopkins had the lone RBI and Sosby scored the team's only run.

Three Lady Mustangs had multiple hits, including Baynum, who finished 3-for-4 with three runs and an RBI. Woeste was 2-for-2 with a pair of walks and a run scored, while Griffith went 2-for-4 with three RBI. Kennedy added a hit, a run and two RBI. Bezold, Williams and Miller had the team's other three hits. Bezold and Miller were each credited with an RBI. Greis crossed home plate twice, while Williams and Schubert each did once.

Brown was dealt the loss after pitching four and one-third innings. She allowed all nine runs and 11 hits, while walking three and striking out one. Curran pitched a perfect one and two-thirds innings in relief.

Franke picked up the win after going four and two-thirds innings. She surrendered one run on four hits, while striking out one. She did not allow a walk. Miller went two and a third innings before leaving the game. She did not give up a run or a walk, but yielded two hits. She also struck out three.

Brossart went on to

win the All "A" Tournament crown the next night with a 4-2 victory over defending champion Bracken County. It was the Lady Mustangs' second title.

Brossart opens the state All "A" Tournament on Saturday at 9 a.m. against 13th Region champion Middlesboro.

Nicholas County returns to action with a

two-game home stand beginning Wednesday with Paris. Harrison County then comes to Carlisle on Thursday. First pitch for both games is scheduled for 5 p.m.

The LadyJackets then go on the road for games at Bath County on Monday, Bourbon County on Tuesday and Mason County on Wednesday.

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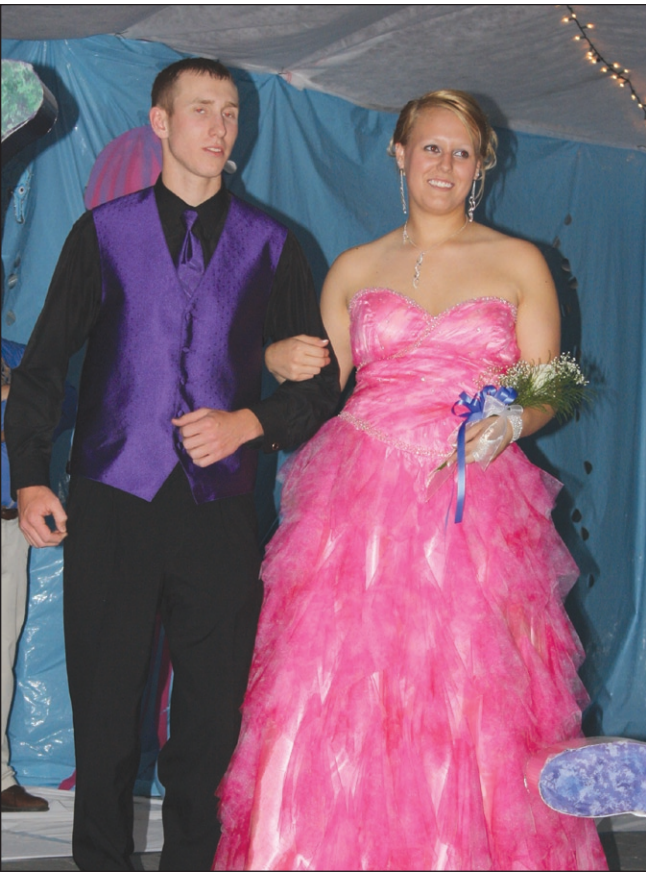


