Booth defeats Clark, Kuster thrashes Newberry

Carlisle has a new mayor, and 18th District Judge Charles "Bill" Kuster will remain on the bench following yesterday's election after Kuster thrashed his challenger by over 1,500 votes.

Mayoral challenger Kevin Booth unseated incumbent Mayor of Carlisle Ronnie Clark by a margin of 47 votes.

Booth garnered 379 total votes to Clark's 332.

"Mayor Clark ran a clean campaign as did I," an elated Booth said following the election. "I'm looking forward to working with the members of



the city council and county. I'm looking forward to helping our communities grow. This was a hard-fought race and I wish Mayor Clark the best."

The top six vote getters among the 12 Carlisle City Council candidates were Tommy Crawford with 511 votes, Billy Mac



Gaunce with 382 votes, Doug Garrett with 370 votes, Betty Jo Booth with 359 votes, John Jones with 356 votes and Eugene Hall with 354 votes.

Other candidates for city council not in the top six were Gladys Shrou, **See ELECTION Page 12**

Police thwart drug activity on Main Street, and at courthouse

The illegal Black Market drug trade continues to thrive in Nicholas County and two incidents in downtown Carlisle recently have left police officers scratching their heads and wondering what will happen next.

One incident involved alleged pain pill snorting in broad daylight on Main Street. The second incident, which occurred Monday morning, allegedly involved cocaine and pills being brought into the Nicholas County Courthouse.

"It's a smack in the face to law enforcement and hard working respectable citizens," one veter-

an law enforcement officer said following the incidents, which have landed three in jail.

Paul Douglas Jolly, 47 and Lora Lee Herrington, 35, both of Carlisle were arrested by Carlisle Chief of Police William Denton on Oct. 27 late in the morning, as they sat in a 1995 Jeep at the corner of Main Street and South Broadway.

Trafficking charges dismissed against mother and daughter

Drug trafficking charges filed against a Nicholas County mother and daughter on Sept. 29 of this year were dismissed without prejudice following a preliminary hearing in Nicholas District Court last week.

Kathy Lawson, 51, and Jamie Lawson, 31, both of Moorefield Road Carlisle, were charged with felony trafficking in a controlled substance, 1st degree, and misdemeanor charges of trafficking in marijuana, less than eight ounces, cultivating marijuana, less than five plants and endangering the welfare of a minor, following their arrest by Carlisle Police Officer Mark Snedegar.

Snedegar filed the charges against the two following the execution of a search warrant. Also assisting in the execution of the search warrant and

the subsequent arrests were Carlisle Chief of Police William Denton, Sgt. Darrell Layne and his K9 unit Hancock and fellow Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler.

According to the arrest warrants issued to both women a "large amount of cash, Florida pill bottles recently filled and located empty" were found in the home. Police also found processed marijuana and evidence of freshly cultivated marijuana, including potting soil and marijuana freshly harvested that "was drying out" in the house, according to the arrest citations.

Police also found two children, which were removed from the home and led to the charges of endangering the welfare of a minor.

Officer Snedegar provided testimony regarding the felony trafficking charges at a preliminary hearing Oct. 27 in Nicholas District Court.

Under direct questioning from the county attorney of Nicholas County,

Dawn Letcher, Snedegar testified that although he found prescription pain medicine bottled from Florida in the Lawson home, receipts for various items from Florida and cash when asked if he found any controlled substance in the home Snedegar replied "No."

With there being no actual controlled substances located and Snedegar's testimony being unsure regarding the number of pills prescribed and dates involved, Letcher made a motion that the trafficking charges against the Lawsons be dismissed without prejudice.

District Court Judge, Honorable Charles Kuster granted the motion.

"There simply wasn't any physical evidence to pursue the charge as a result of the hearing today," Letcher said following the hearing.

The lesser misdemeanor charges, lodged against the Lawsons, continue to progress through Nicholas District Court.

Both were allegedly snorting pain pills in the jeep.

Herrington is charged with possession of a controlled substance, 1st degree; prescription controlled substance not in original container and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Jolly is charged with Possession of a controlled substance, 1st degree.

According to the arrest citations, Jolly was in the passenger seat of the Jeep, which was approached by Chief Denton fol-

lowing a citizen's call to the police station regarding suspicious activity in the jeep.

Jolly allegedly had powder in his mustache and nostrils and the powder was allegedly from crushed pain pills that were found between him and the driver, Herrington. The suspected crushed pain pills were located on a DVD box on the console.

Herrington had powder residue in one of her nostrils and had a "rolled one dollar bill"

between her legs, according to the arrest citation. Rolled dollar bills and straws are commonly used to inhale crushed pain pills through each nostril by those who participate in the illegal whop practice, according to law enforcement officers.

Chief Denton obtained a "consent to search" from Herrington and then found the powder on the DVD box. Denton also found a pill bottle in Herrington's purse with no

Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky



Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

"When we came to Fort Boonesboro on March 26, 1778, we found a poor, distressed, half-naked and starved people, daily surrounded by the savage, which made it so dangerous the hunters were afraid to go out to get buffalo meat. There were about 80 of us in our company... In about two weeks, one of us, James Kelly, was killed and scalped by the Indians about a mile from the fort."

Collins experienced with Native American warriors.

From life in general at Boonesboro, to the various conflicts, including the siege of Bryant's Station and subsequent Battle of Blue Licks in 1782, to Clark's autumn

campaign northward of that same year, Collins' knowledge and accuracy of events that marked the frontier are a treasure to historians.

He was among 25 men from Harrodsburg, who joined the McConnell brothers in building a blockhouse at McConnell Springs. Collins was a robust young man and an expert with an axe. He had everyone in the

group step aside while he cut a burr-oak tree that stood near the spring to fell and make the first log for the blockhouse. He told his companions that he wanted it remembered that it was he who made the first strokes at the place that might one day turn into a well populated town. Indeed, Lexington, Kentucky continues to grow, though when Josiah chopped that

first tree it was wilderness terrain.

Josiah was also with a party of surveyors assisting Edward Waller survey various tracts of land in northeastern Kentucky and was with Waller at the construction of the first cabin built in Maysville.

The family of Colonel William Sudduth, another great Bath County frontiersman, stayed in that cabin after a disas-

trous trek down river. Sudduth and Collins would become close companions in the years to follow.

If the Good Lord is willing, we will join them in future columns as they join with their family and friends to survive in a place the Iroquois called simply The Land of Tomorrow, a place we know as Bath County.

Josiah Collins, Draper Manuscripts volume 12 CC

1841, on Flat Creek, in northwestern Bath County, near present-day Reynoldsville.

The Reverend John Shane sat in the house of Josiah Collins, located between Owingsville and Sharpsburg and scribbled furiously as the 84-year-old man delved into his personal memories.

Collins was a remarkable man and had been one of Kentucky's more adventurous pioneers in the early settlement days from 1778 on.

Shane was making his rounds in Kentucky and would record several interviews to add to his growing historical manuscript collection. The collection would eventually be purchased by Lynam Copeland Draper after Shane's death and would in turn become part of the immense Draper Manuscripts, from which I draw so much fascinating history as told by those who were actually there.

Collins remains a prime contributor of my information, dear reader, and though I've studied his interview countless times, I continue to learn more from it each time I return.

He was 24-years-old when he first came to Kentucky during that terrible summer of 1778.

60 years later found him in the beloved section of the state he treasured so highly: Bath County.

Josiah's first days among the terrified and starved survivors of Fort Boonesboro were among the worst of his life. He recalled vividly six decades later the awful living conditions and the fearful episodes, including lying in the woods at night and listening to Shawnee warriors slowly torture their companion James Kelly to death.

It would be one of numerous encounters

Ohio man injured in motorcycle accident

An Ohio man is recovering from injuries, following a motorcycle on Somerset Road, last Saturday.

Frederick Miller, 54, of Beaver Creek, Ohio, was traveling at approximately 35-40 mph on KY 57, also known as Somerset Road (Gravel Road), near the one mile marker at approximately 1:40 when one of the wheels of his 2005 Kawasaki Vulcan motorcycle slipped off the road in a curve and subsequently slid onto its side.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Editor,
This letter is to correct some incorrect statements made by Mayor Ronnie Clark about the price of natural gas used for heating in Carlisle in January 07 when he took over as Mayor. He stated that the price being charged is \$18.00 per M Cubic Feet. The actual price being charged was \$13.20 per M Cubic Feet. He also stated that he got rid of the service fee on natural gas purchases. That fee was negotiated away I believe in the month of July or August of 2006 before he arrived.
In April 07 after only being in office 4 months he raised the price of natural gas from \$13.20 to \$14.55 per M Cubic Feet. By January 08 the price of natural gas was \$13.00 per M Cubic Feet. The price of natural gas then continued to rise and by June 08 the price was \$19.00 per M Cubic Feet. After the big spike in prices in June they slowly were reduced to \$14.00 per M Cubic Feet by October 08 the year of 09 started at \$12.50 per M Cubic feet and ended at \$11.50 per M Cubic feet. Starting the year of 2010 the price of natural gas was \$11.00 per M Cubic feet for January. In June 2010 the price was increased to \$11.50 per M cubic feet and continues to the present.
I would also like to dis-

cuss the pricing of natural gas further. They city government has always had a markup of \$2.65 per M Cubic feet of natural gas. Since we as citizens own our natural gas system it has always made a great deal of money each year at a markup of \$2.65 per M Cubic feet. I believe at the present price being charged that the markup is probably between \$4.00 to \$5.00 per M Cubic feet. That is an outrageous markup since a lot of our senior citizens live on a very limited income. During the summer of 2009 when we would normally purchase our winter gas for October 2009 through September 2010 the price was at a 20 year low due to the recession. The price on September 4, 2009 on the New York market where our natural gas is purchased was

\$2.51 per M Cubic feet. "Lexington Herald 9/4/09". We should have made a much lower price for our natural gas over the last year. Columbia gas had a much lower price to their customers during this period. Our natural gas for the year of October 2010 through September 2011 has been advertised as costing us \$10.50 per M cubic feet. That is well above what it should be since natural gas has been selling on the New York market this summer from a high of \$4.12 per M cubic feet to a low of \$3.31 per M Cubic feet. I hope that the mayor and council take note of information and decide to lower the price of natural gas to where it should be for the sake of our Seniors who are living on a limited budget.

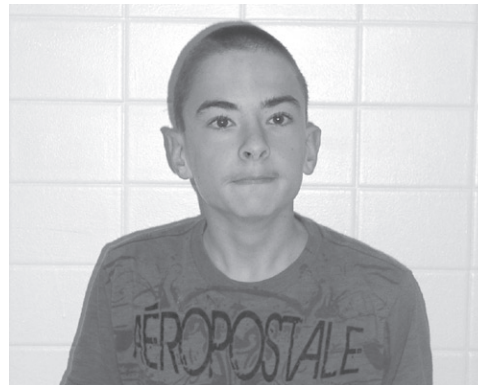

As the holidays draw near, the absence of a loved one continues to offer a reminder that it will not be the same this year. Even though it maybe in the back of our minds; it really was so far away, and now it is here. Holiday grief contains elements of anxiety. It is a time of mental worry and rehearsal of what the season may bring. This overwhelming fear of what to expect also contains a heightened sensitivity of the past, which can push emotions to the forefront. This may be especially difficult when social contacts, and even family, think that "you should be over it by now."

This is a season of uncertainty and loneliness, especially for the elderly grieving accumulated loss of friends and family. Major changes, such as a move from the farm to town, failing health, and not being able to drive anymore, only contribute to emotional pain. Young families suffer enormous strain, as the surviving spouse struggles with his/her grief, while feeling pressure to plan the holiday for the children. Many consider it their responsibility

to make it "like it used to be"; however this is impossible and unrealistic, as the absence of the loved one will always have this season forever changed.

The holidays have the tendency to make everyone relive childhood feelings surrounding memories and traditions. Life without the deceased can often return a person to earlier stages of the grief process and that is ok. Customs can be re-vamped to be more appropriate to the loss. The most important idea is to have a plan of what small changes may be possible to help decrease stress, while still honoring the holiday and the deceased.

Ways to Help
 Have a plan of what you want.
 Consider how much energy it will take to put this plan

in place. Grieving is exhausting. Think of energy reserves as compared to a bank. Draw out the smallest amount to accomplish the plan. Choose to do only what you can handle.

Flexibility for ongoing change is important. Think of changing traditions in small steps. Consider a meal Christmas Eve instead of Christmas Day. Perhaps going to a restaurant or relatives' home would be very different from previous years.

Go with the flow.
 Streamline preparation by letting others help in cooking and decorating. Use the deli or let others bring food. Shop early and use mail order or gift cards.

Finally, remember the deceased and the spirit of the holiday by using ritual. Ritual can be a very power-

ful method for honoring and remembering a loved one. A toast to them at dinner or including their name in prayers can help a family continue to keep an emotional connection. Writing Christmas cards and placing them on the tree or at the grave is especially meaningful. Placing holly or greens around their picture can show honor. Some may choose to give to an Angel Tree or charity in their memory.

While holidays are difficult, it is an especially good time to teach younger generations about the deceased. This is a wonderful learning experience for sharing about the life and personality of the person

and can begin to help prepare children for all seasons of life. ©2008 McKenzie

Fire board seeks approval for training tower

Members of the Nicholas County Fire Board met Nov 1 at the Nicholas County Fire department and are currently submitting advertisements to bid to begin construction on a fire training tower in the county.

"We'd like to get the bids in and break ground as soon as possible," said Fire Board Secretary Al Warner.

According to Warner the fire tower will act as a regional training facility with a Forestry grant paying for the construction.

The only hurdle left to clear for the facility, which many believe will be an economic benefit for the community, will be approval of the members of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court this month.

Warner and others say

that surrounding fire departments will use the training facility and that will mean a positive im-

Nicholas middle school girls' basketball caps magical season with title, parade

Grace Kiskaden does not usually ride a school bus, but the trip she made on one on Wednesday night will be something she will never forget.

Kiskaden and her teammates on the Nicholas County Middle School girls' basketball seventh-grade team were led through town as the centerpiece of a parade celebrating the LadyJackets' first undefeated Ohio River Valley Conference season and tournament title since 1989.

"It was exciting. We got to scream out that we were the champions while the fire trucks escorted us through town," the sixth-grade guard/forward said. "I was thinking it was awesome to win the championship and bring two trophies back to the school."

The team almost did not accomplish its undefeated season had it not been for the efforts of Kiskaden, who made a pair of game-winning free throws in the initial regular-season game against Bracken County.

"The first time we played Bracken, we were down by five and then we tied the score," she said. "With three seconds left, I was fouled and made both free throws and we won by two."

A parade celebrating a championship is something special, but Wednesday marked the second time seventh-grade forward Kaela Saner had one in her honor.

In the summer of 2009, Saner's all-star softball team was the focus of a parade through Cynthia after her select summer team of 10-12-year olds won a title.

But, she said, this one was better.

"We won the championship two years ago in softball and we got to ride fire trucks through Cynthia," said Saner, who lives in Robertson County, but played for the LadyJackets this season because her father Anthony teaches at the Nicholas County Middle School. "Wednesday's parade) was really intense. It was better than the other parade. I liked

it a lot -- just riding the different fire trucks and waving my hands at other people I didn't know."

Nicholas County head coach David Flowers also enjoyed the school bus ride and reminisced about his days as a youth growing up in Louisville. He never played on a team that got a parade and like the players he relished the moment.

"It just blows my mind," he said. "I was thinking 'Wow, sitting on the bus in the parade, it just blew my mind. The girls don't realize how special that is. It gave me inspiration and I think it did for them too."

"When I watched the girls on the bus, I thought this is something they can remember for the rest of their lives. They may never be on a championship team again. I was so happy for them," he added. "I would give anything to be where they are, be on the floor instead of being the coach."

The 14-member LadyJacket seventh-grade team finished its season with a 16-4 overall record and a perfect 8-0 mark in ORVC play.

"The reason why we were so good, because we played the best as a team of any group of girls I've ever coached," Flowers said. "We could attack a team in so many different facets. If they stopped us one way, we'd try another. They just couldn't shut us down."

Saner and Kiskaden were the team's leading scorers, but they were not the only major contributors to its success. Sixth-grader Hannah Jolly and fifth-grader Jasmine Flowers shared the point guard duties. The youth at the position was a concern, but coach Flowers felt the pair did well considering their age and relative inexperience at running a team.

Sixth-grader Autumn Martin and seventh-grader Shelby Watkins were the team's wing players. Coach Flowers counted on them to help with the scoring.

Despite multiple players being able to put the ball in the basket, it

was the team's versatility and ability to play in-your-face defense that was the key to success.

"We were a dangerous team because everybody could do everything. It was a collective effort. ... We played a lot of man-to-man press, and they were all quick kids. Kaela is long and lanky, Grace could get down and get after you, Jasmine is fast and Shelby was scrappy. All four were really good defenders," coach Flowers said. "We also had multiple ball handlers. They were the most versatile of any team I've coached. I would hate to coach against this team."

The middle school actually fielded three teams, one each for the sixth, seventh and eighth-graders, although everyone, including fifth-graders, were eligible to play on the grade-level teams above their age group.

The eighth-grade team had just one member in that class: Ayla Robinson, so she was ineligible to play on the seventh-grade team. Coach Flowers also did not let his three fifth-graders play with the eighth-graders. With a group universally younger than all of its opponents, the eighth-graders finished with a 4-10 record.

"Ayla Robinson had just played for two years, but she is real athletic, and she always worked hard and was supportive of her teammates," coach Flowers said.

In addition to the seventh-grade team's success, the sixth-graders finished 11-1 with its only loss coming against Mason County. That team also won the statewide Kentucky Basketball Championship Invitational two weeks ago.

After a pre-season conditioning program and four to five practices a week during the summer, the LadyJacket seventh-graders opened the season with a 40-21 win at Menifee County. After two more wins in a tournament at Paris, they dropped a semifinal game to eventual champion Whitley County.

Nicholas County

then reeled off a stretch of 11 straight wins, the longest seventh-year coach Flowers can remember, before suffering three defeats at the KBCI on Sunday, Oct. 24.

After receiving a first-round bye, the LadyJackets opened the conference tournament on Tuesday against fourth-seeded Deming, Saner's former team.

"It was awkward seeing all of my friends and playing basketball against them because they were my friends," Saner said.

Nicholas opened the contest with a 10-0 lead, but Deming closed the gap to 20-13 in the second quarter, before Flowers called a time out and re-focused his team. After that the LadyJackets reeled off the next 10 points to grab a 30-13 halftime advantage. The Lady Devils scored only six points in the second half as Nicholas County pulled out a 52-19 victory.

Saner had 18 points, and coach Flowers guessed she also had at least 10 rebounds. The win was bittersweet for Saner.

"It was both disappointing and fun that I beat them," she said.

Kiskaden and Saner played a big part in the LadyJacket seventh-graders winning the tournament title. Tied entering the fourth quarter of the championship game against Bracken County on Wednesday at Augusta High School, the pair each scored five points to help Nicholas

County capture its first seventh-grade crown in 21 years.

The Lady Bears took a 12-6 first-quarter lead and then scored the opening basket of the second period to grab an eight-point advantage. With the halftime score 17-15, coach Flowers' locker room speech seemed to inspire the team.

"I told them that this was the last game of season and they need to let it all hang out. They had worked too hard to go through an undefeated season and give the game away," he said.

With the score tied at 24-24 entering the final period, Saner took it upon her herself to help carry the team to victory. Bracken County scored the first two points of the quarter and then the LadyJackets answered with the game's final 10.

With the score tied at 26-26, Saner hit a 3-pointer that gave her the confidence that the LadyJackets would pull out the victory.

"I knew I had to make a shot," she said. "After I popped open and made the 'three', everybody knew we would win. That was the winning shot and from there we pulled away."

Kiskaden led the team with 14 points, while Saner added 13 in the championship.

"I'm from Louisville. I didn't realize how important basketball was to the people around here. The girls didn't just play for the school, they played for the entire county," coach

Flowers said. "If you think about it, it is a tradition passed down from parents who played at the middle school. You don't have that in big communities."

Coach Flowers was extremely appreciative of the combined efforts of everyone involved with the program in helping it reach its potential.

"Everything was new. We had a new AD (Athletic Director), coach 'Hop' (Robert Hopkins) and a new principal (Marty Feltner), and they've been awesome," he said. "At this age, getting the parents to get the kids to practice and having the parents buy into the fact that each practice is important matters. If parents don't buy in, the kids won't. We had a good group of kids, but a good group of parents. The parents were committed and that was reason we had success."

The team was comprised of eighth-grader Robinson; seventh-graders Saner, Watkins, McKenna Jett, Abby Derosset, Gabby Short and Mary-Kate Tolliver; sixth-graders Kiskaden, Martin, Jolly, Jessica Hudson and Sara Johnson; and fifth-graders Jasmine Flowers, Samantha Sowell and Kayley Letcher. Sara Kiskaden was the assistant coach, Shelby Stanford and Sara Jolly were the managers, Phillip Kiskaden was the bookkeeper, and Shirley Trussell was in charge of the stats and operating the clock.

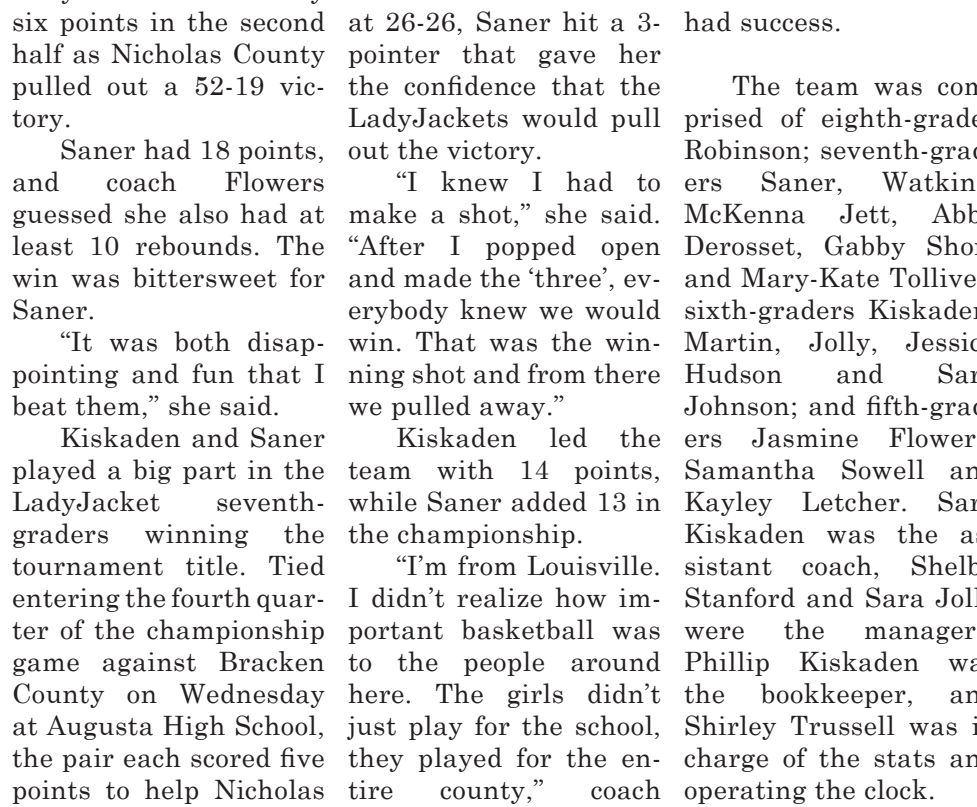

Nicholas ends regular-season 6-4

Nicholas County assured itself of a winning season Friday night, defeating Bracken County 48-22 in a regular-season finale. The Jackets concluded the regular-season on a two-game winning streak, prevailing in two of their final three outings.

Nicholas County ended the regular-season 6-4. Bracken County packed a 2-8 record out of the regular-season finale.

But overall winter at the Harper Household was great and lots of fun. And with plenty of family we had all sorts of ways to have fun.

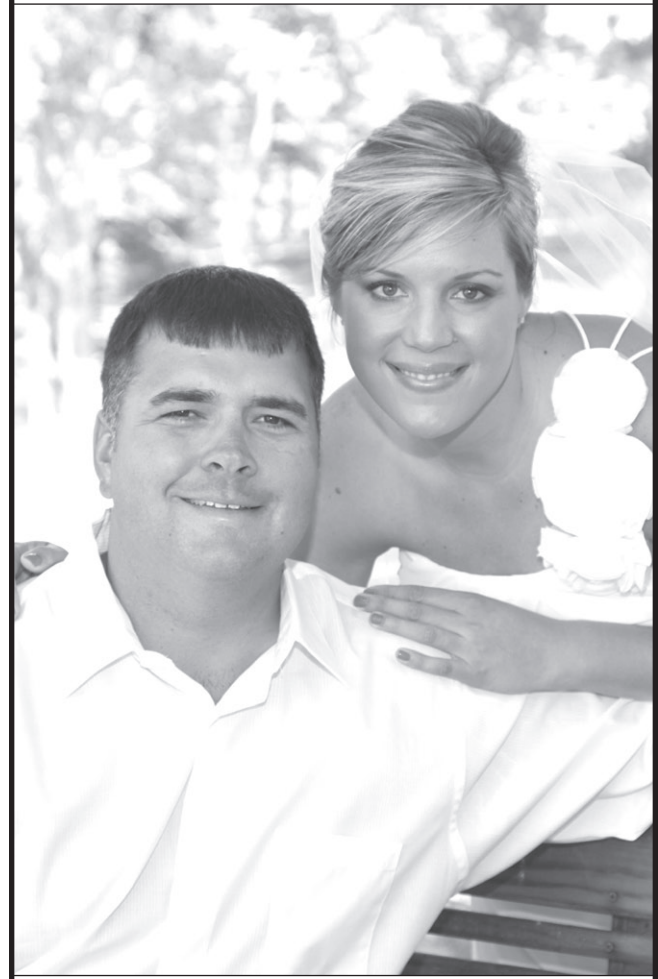
Winter is almost here and I can't wait, maybe I will have a fun year this year if we have a big snow.

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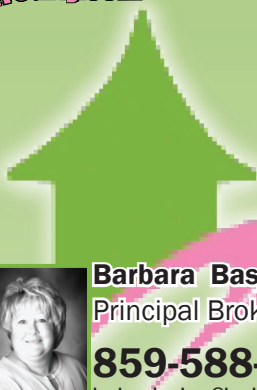
