## Robbery suspects and their victims arrested

The illegal drug trade in Nicholas County has intensified to the point where alleged drug dealers are becoming victims to alleged robbers.

And then all of them are going to jail.

Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler arrested a pair of perpetrators and a pair of victims in the wake of an alleged robbery and burglary on Sunday, Oct. 7.

Jeffrey Dunn, 28, and

Michael Poe, 22, both of Carlisle are charged with robbery, 1st degree. Dunn is additionally charged with burglary, 1st degree and Poe is additionally charged with possession of drug paraphernalia. All of the charges were filed

following an incident Sunday afternoon at 118 South Locust Street at Lester's Apartments.

The victims of the alleged crimes, Samuel Fulton, 32, and Angel Ritchie, 25, both of apartment 5 of Lester's Apartment on 118 South

Locust Street, were also arrested.

According to arrest citations, Dunn allegedly "kicked in the door to Mr. Fulton's residence" at approximately 1:35 Sunday afternoon. Dunn allegedly said he had a gun and pointed an un-

identified object toward Samuel Fulton and his eight-year-old child.

Dunn allegedly demanded Fulton's medication and money and threatened to use the firearm if Fulton did not comply, according to the

The five are: Wes Hopkins, Caleb Pope, Nathan Kirby, Matthew Kelly and Devin Johnson.

Senior Wes Hopkins was

additionally honored with being named the all EKC Defensive Player of The Year.

Head Bluejacket Football Coach Robert Hopkins called the five outstanding athletes "extremely dedicated and talented."

Senior Wes Hopkins was honored for the second year in a row with the

distinction of being named Defensive Player of The Year.

"Wes loves the game and he gives every ounce of energy every play," his father, Coach Hopkins said. ## Controversy surrounds council meeting

Carlisle Mayor Ronnie Clark's request for a motion to approve a resolution to apply for a Homeland Security Grant listed on the agenda for Monday night's Carlisle City Council meeting was met with long silence with no motion being made, following a pointed discussion between Clark and city attorney Stanley Watson.

None of the six council members offered to make a motion in the 30 seconds of silence that followed Clark's request for the motion.

Clark had drafted a resolution to apply for a Homeland Security Grant for provisions of small arms and ammunition for the members of the Carlisle Police Force.

Clark wanted to list the existing pistols as "surplus" and offer them for sale to police officers at \$50 each, according to discussion between Clark, Watson and Chief of Police William Denton.

The city has allocations for nine full-time police officers but has only hired five full time officers and one part time officer, according to discussion.

Watson expressed concern that listing the existing firearms as surplus while they were being used by officers until

the grant was accepted might prove to be a legal slippery slope.

"You can't declare the old guns as surplus," Watson said during the lengthy discussion with Clark on the validity of declaring the existing firearms as surplus. "I think you need the second set of weapons in hand before you can declare them as surplus."

Watson added that he needed to research the issue further.

"It's a problem," he said. "I don't think we can get around this."

"I do," Clark said. And added moments later that, "the state police do it."

"Well, I don't represent the state police," Watson countered.

Inquiries between Watson and Chief Denton indicated that the old weapons (nine for the five full time officers and one part time) would be used as "back-up" firearms by the members of the police force.

The legality of offering "surplus" city material is a separate issue with apparent problems in and of itself as for offering the weapons only to city officers on the police force.

This reporter attempted to ask Watson regarding such, at the close of open session but was told by Watson "I don't have time to talk to you."

Jeremy Rogers, an

## Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

**Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky**

Daniel Boone

November, 1786, near Daniel Boone's half-face shelter and rude cabin works that were a Trading Post, in present-day Maysville, Kentucky.

Winter was coming and he wanted to make sure the tavern was properly supplied with buffalo and venison, not just for his own large family, but for the guests and the Shawnee prisoners he was paid to house and feed that had been brought back from Ben Logan's Raid.

He'd been part of that raid. With his left hand Lt. Colonel Daniel Boone pulled downward on the hide of the white-tail buck that hung upside down before him. With his right hand he made several quick and well-placed cuts across the deer's carcass with his

knife, and thus by pulling with one hand and cutting with the other, he soon had the hide nearly off the deer.

He would have normally included his children in this chore, but he wanted to be alone today.

He suffered from infrequent bouts of depression and normally lost himself in the woods when this happened, but there was too much work to be done at home for that.

So he let his melancholy thoughts drift while his hands did their steady work.

The northern raid led by Logan that he and his companions had just returned from, was initially hoped to be a catalyst in ending the frontier violence between Kentuckians and tribes of the northern Native American clans.

But such had not been the case. William McGinnis had been killed in neighboring Washington, a few nights earlier.

With a short-handled squaw axe Boone made two quick chops against the deer's neck bone, and the head with the hide attached

came away clean, leaving the carcass swinging slowly in front of him, ready to be butchered.

He sat down and caught his breath.

He was 52-years-old. His heart was heavy and weary.

The northern raid with Logan had resulted in the death of the renegade Shawnee known as Big Jim, one of those personally responsible for torturing and killing his oldest son James in October of 1773 on Walden Ridge. He'd spotted the Shawnee warrior on the raid and shouted ahead to the scouts, men from Strode's Station, to "Mark Big Jim"

They'd caught him, killed him, and scalped him before Boone could get to them in the confusion of battle.

Some of the men had stood by and let the ancient Shawnee Chief Moluntha be killed by McGary. Boone had known Moluntha and McGary well.

With a few well-placed cuts and a single chop from the squaw axe he removed the front hams from the deer's carcass.

The meat was cold to the touch and the morning frost made him consider building a small fire near his butchering post.

He remembered similar mornings in the Carolinas when James had been a very small boy and he'd let the child snuggle inside his black bear coat, next to his body so they both stayed warm as they watched a deer lick.

Memories that brought tears to his eyes.

The cool wind that blew as he'd helped wrap James mutilated body in his wife's finest linen that cool October morning on Walden Ridge in 1773 would always be with him.

And the cold Kentucky rain that struck him the next spring on a sojourn to the boy's grave had marked his low.

Wolves had partially excavated his son's grave, and overcome with grief he'd simply crawled into the grave and rocked back and forth in that muddy hole while holding the rotting corpse of his son, as rain fell in torrents upon him.

Hearing the shouts of

Shawnee warriors had caused him to nearly give himself to them in a fit of suicidal despair, but instead he'd covered the grave and slunk away through the woods, never to be the same.

He probed with the fingers of his left hand as he sliced with his right and removed one of the two tenderloins, or back straps from the deer.

Losing his son James had been hard. Losing his second son Israel, who died in his arms at the Battle of Blue Licks in 1782, had been even harder.

"Momma says she's fixing some food to take to the McGinnis home," six-year-old Nathan Boone, his youngest, said from behind him.

"Carry one of these hams to her for diner and then get cleaned up," he told his son as he handed him one of the fore-leg deer hams.

He let his fingers probe the carcass again as he began removing the second tenderloin.

Oh, how he longed for peace.

But there would be no peace for decades to come.

Well the dreaded time change has occurred! I don't know about you all but I really feel like I lose most of my play-time when this time change takes place each year. Sure, I love the fact that I get to sleep in an extra hour but coming home in the dark really doesn't work for me. I'm sure that there are plenty of you out there that share the same thoughts, but guess what, nobody is asking us for our opinion! I guess we'll have to make the most of it.

This clinic is a great example of how horse owners can do the right thing for their animals in spite of a challenging economy, with the help of organizations that are willing to come alongside them with resources and expertise."

The Kentucky Horse Park has already formed successful partnerships with the Kentucky Horse Council in hosting the annual John Henry Memorial Equine Adoption Fair, and with the Kentucky Equine Humane Center in helping homeless horses become more adoptable.

Nicholson concluded, "As a result of the enormous success of the Alltech FEI World Equestrian Games, we are more aware than ever of the tremendous contribution that horses make to our Commonwealth. The Kentucky Horse Park and our partners want to repay some of that debt by continually seeking ways to improve horses' lives."

Applications are currently being accepted for the Free Gelding Clinic. The clinic is open to anyone who is financially unable to afford the surgery. Castrations will be performed by a veterinarian or a veterinary student under close supervision by a licensed veterinarian. Stallions must be halter broke, in good health, with two descended testicles, and

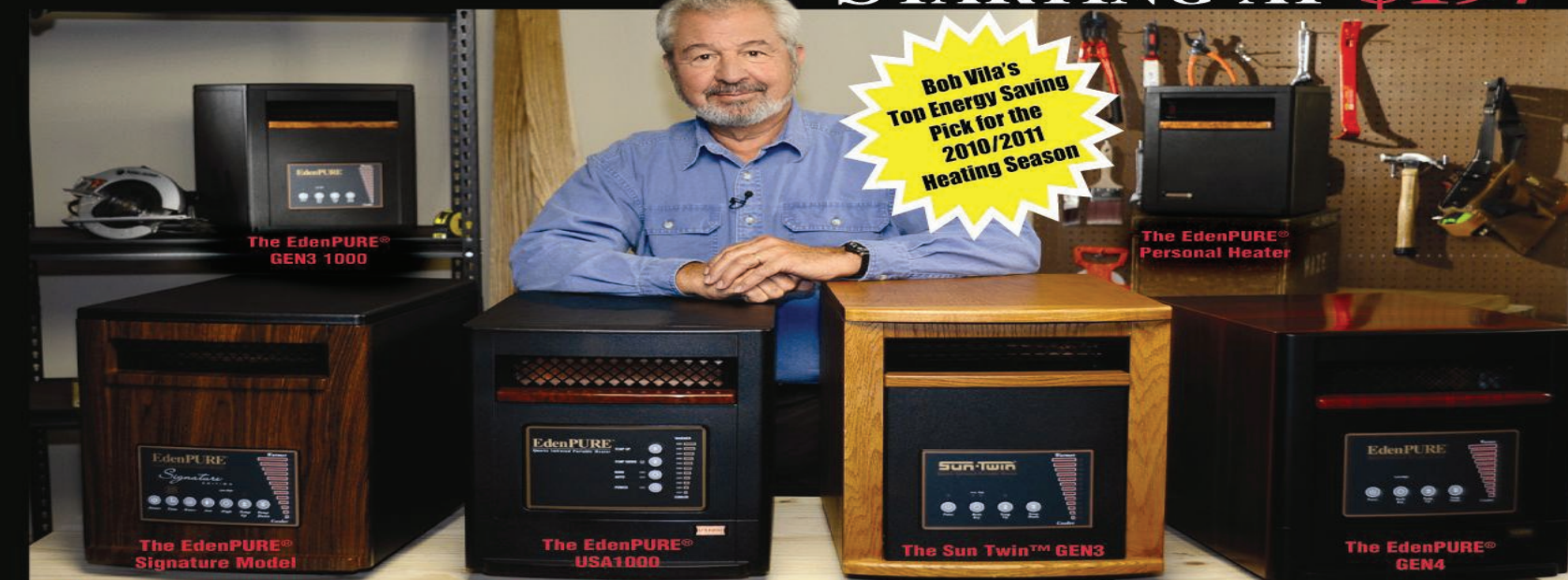

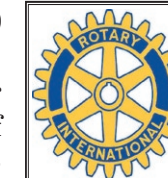

## Stabbing sends one man to hospital, two men to jail

One Ewing man clings to life while another remains in jail charged with attempted murder following a stabbing incident Sunday.

Kentucky State Police Detective Wes Prather charged Oscar Guerva Garcia, 23, of Owen Davis Drive, Ewing, early Monday morning following the stabbing of Thomas Houston, 55, also of Ewing.

According to court documents, KSP reports and comments made by Fleming County Sheriff Scotty Royse, Fleming County Dispatch received a call of a stabbing at 261 Owen Davis Drive in Ewing.

Deputies Josh Planck and Gary Kinder joined KSP Troopers Eugene Robinson and Trooper Daniel Armstrong at the scene of the stabbing.

Fleming County EMS

also responded to the scene and transported Houston to the Fleming County Hospital where he was later transported by air to the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

Trooper Robinson initially arrested Garcia on the charges of resisting arrest, menacing and carrying a concealed deadly weapon.

According to the arrest citation, Garcia was located at the residence 'hiding behind a sofa.' Garcia had to be shot with a TASER and was found to be armed with two large knives and another large butcher knife was found behind the sofa after Garcia was arrested.

Sources at UK Medical Center say Houston is in stable condition.

Garcia remains lodged in the Mason County Detention Center on \$250,000 cash bond.

A second man was also arrested at the residence.

Gustavo E. Ramos, 33, also of Owen Davis Drive, Ewing was arrested by Trooper Armstrong and charged with disorderly conduct, alcohol intoxication, criminal trespassing and resisting arrest.

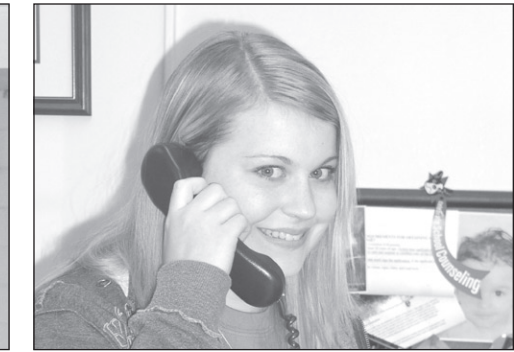

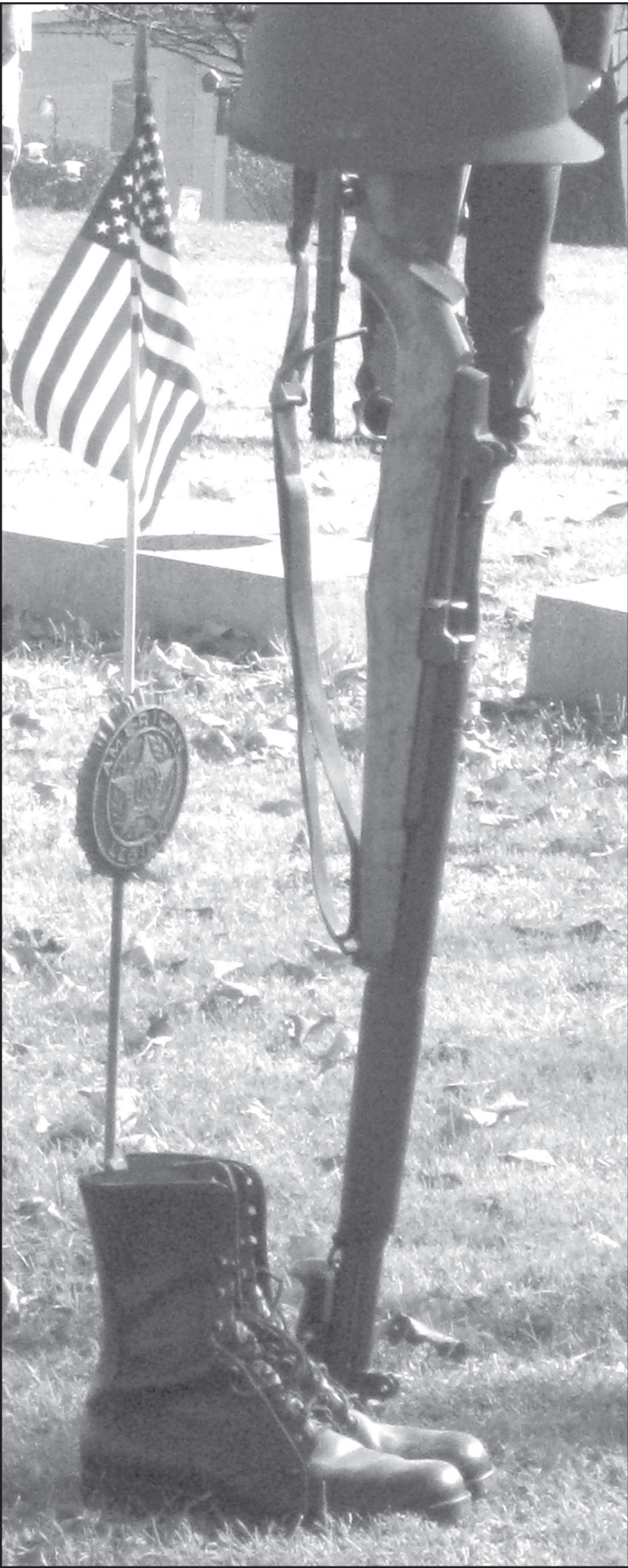

# Rachel's Challenge

The Columbine High School shooting was in April 1999, it was a day that will be known as the worst high school shooting.

Twelve students and a teacher were shot and killed that day. Most of them were shot several times by two gunman who also attended Columbine High School.

This past Thursday Nicholas County Middle and High School students attended a one hour presentation by Larry Scott of Rachel's Challenge he is also the uncle of Rachel Scott the first person that was killed in the Columbine Shooting.

Larry Scott is one of the many people who travel the world teaching Rachel's Challenge inside the school systems. Which is based on Rachel's goals in life of touching the

lives of many has done through her family and the supporters of Rachel's Challenge. This challenge is taken from school to school across the nation asking students why they bully and why they should accept Rachel's Challenge and put bullying to a stop. Like Rachel had tried her hardest to do while she was living.

Mr. Scott's presentation included background information on Rachel and her family as well as many things she believed so strongly in. The presentation also included CNN and local TV stations extensive coverage of the shooting on April 20, 1999 explaining the horror and tragic event that so many faced and had to deal with that day.

The presentation also included exclusive interviews with many of the family and friends of Rachel, that she left behind after her death. Larry Scott challenged all students to accept Rachel's Challenge to putting a stop to bullying. That often happens in school and leaves many who were bullied with problems later in life. Students could do that by signing a banner that was left in the school cafeteria when students went to lunch. Even though the presentation was over Mr. Scott stayed at the school where a group of students were selected to be trained by Mr. Scott to go on teaching Rachel's Challenge throughout the school as well as preparing for Rachel's Rally. attorney for Dinsmore & Shol, the firm which represents members of the Kentucky Press Association offered his opinion.

Rogers said after re-searching "procurement codes" as described in the Kentucky Revised Statutes, particularly KRS 45A.425 and KRS 45A.365 if the city has surplus weapons the appropriate action would be to offer the weapons at "a public auction or by sealed bid."

Rogers explained that his understanding of the law indicated that some governmental agencies were acting within the law when they offered weapons to "retiring" officers.

"But that is clearly not the case in this situation," he said.

During open session, Watson made the analogy of calling the weapons surplus now, while they were still be using would not be appropriate and possibly not truthful to administrators with the Kentucky Office of Homeland Security.

"It's kind of like someone who murders their parents and then begs the court for mercy because they are an orphan," he said.

Mayor Clark rapped his gavel on his desk immediately following Watson's analogy and said simply "let's move on."

The issue may be discussed at future city council meetings.

In other action coun-

cil members heard a request for additional patrolling of Carlisle Police from Councilman Eugene Hall.

"I've been asked to bring this up by several citizens," Hall said. "If there's any room in the budget they'd like to see additional night patrols.

Chief Denton indicated he thought it was a good idea.

"Give me another officer and I'll put them to work," he said, explaining that with such an undermanned staff, the existing staff couldn't do extra patrols due to lack of manpower.

Implementing a curfew for 17-year-olds and those younger was briefly discussed but no action taken.

Local citizen Jackie Bond came before council and asked for assistance in repairing some badly damaged areas of sidewalks around the city.

"Some of the sidewalks are completely un-passable," Bond said indicating the sidewalks were not in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Bond said there were several areas around Carlisle where individuals who walked with a walker or used a wheelchair, or were visually impaired had "to walk in the middle of the street" because the sidewalks were so damaged and dangerous.

Mayor Clark said that sidewalks were the responsibility of the property owners of the city and damaged sections of any sidewalk was the responsibility of the property owners where the

sidewalk was located.

Clark did indicate that he was continuing to seek grants for sidewalk repair as he had done in the past and the city has many new sections of sidewalk due to Clark's persistence in that endeavor.

Council members also discussed blighted property and may take action against city property owners who are not in compliance with the nuisance ordinance, according to discussion during the meeting.

Councilman Tommy Crawford made a motion, which passed unanimously authorizing the mayor to begin negotiations with GRW Architectural firm to do a field study regard-

ing the "Sharpsburg Water District" as was listed on the agenda. Crawford noted that the field study could be authorized to GRW and not advertised openly for bid to any and all other qualifying entities because the proposed cost would be under \$20,000.

At the end of the open session, Watson requested a motion be made to enter into closed (secret) session to "discuss pending litigation". The source of the "pending litigation" was not mentioned or described but all guests were told to leave the room.

Two Carlisle Police Officers remained inside.

A Carlisle man was arrested and charged with trafficking in a controlled substance following an investigation by members of the Carlisle Police.

Larry Matt McFarland, 36, of Carlisle was arrested

Sunday by Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler.

Buckler charged McFarland with trafficking in a controlled substance, after executing a search warrant at McFarland's residence on Main Street.

William Denton, Carlisle's Chief of Police,

praised the efforts of officer Buckler and fellow officers Mark Snedegar, Dennis Jackson, and Darrell Layne and his K-9 Handcock, who participated in the drug arrests made over the weekend.

"It was a very eventful weekend," Chief Denton said. "We have received some very useful infor-

mation from the citizens of the community in making these arrests and we are asking for the members of the community to continue to assist us."

McFarland allegedly confessed to selling pills to "support himself and members of his family," according to his arrest citation.

Police allegedly found a variety of pills at McFarland's residence. During the execution

of the search warrant police found \$619 in cash, 33 Percocet 30 mg, 7 methadone pills, 7 xanax pills and at least 5 pills of another variety.

Chief Denton expressed praise for County Attorney Dawn Letcher and her staff who provided assistance in drafting the search warrants.

McFarland remains lodged in the bourbon County Jail.

## Nicholas farmers may receive drought assistance

Nicholas County was recently among 63 Kentucky Counties designated as primary natural disaster areas by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The USDA named Nicholas among the other counties in a Nov. 5 press release.

Nicholas was named due to drought conditions, which have gripped the county beginning Aug. 1, and which continues.

"President Obama and I understand these conditions caused severe damage to a wide variety of crops that include alfalfa,

corn, forage crops, soybeans and tobacco," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "This action will provide help to hundreds of farmers who suffered significant production losses."

All qualified farm operators in Nicholas County are eligible for low interest emergency (EM) loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), provided eligibility requirements are met. Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for loans to help cov-

er part of their actual losses. FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. FSA has a variety of programs, in addition to the EM loan program, to help eligible farmers recover from adversity.

"I'm pleased that Nicholas County has been included in the list of 63 other Kentucky counties," Judge-Executive Larry Tincher said. "Conditions have been very dry."

Judge Tincher said the burn ban is still in effect but if rain falls in enough quantity across the county he is considering lifting it in the near future.

USDA also has made other programs available to assist farmers and ranchers, including the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE), which was approved as part of the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008; the

Emergency Conservation Program; Federal Crop Insurance; and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program. Interested

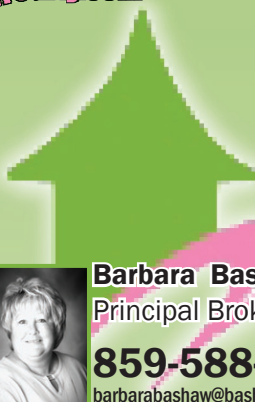
