Sheriff Garrett arraigned

Nicholas County Sheriff Leonard "Dick" Garrett was formally arraigned in Nicholas Circuit Court Monday on two felony criminal charges.

Garrett was indicted by members of the Nicholas County Grand Jury on Oct. 18 on those two charges.

Special Prosecutor Kathryn Hendrickson, the Commonwealth Attorney for Mason, Fleming and Bracken County, who was assigned to the case, was present in court Monday for Garrett's arraignment.

Doug Miller, Commonwealth Attorney for Nicholas County, who typically prosecutes

Nicholas County felony cases, said a special prosecutor was assigned in cases such as this, when a law enforcement officer who regularly worked with the existing Commonwealth Attorney would present a distinct conflict of interest.

The charges which Garrett was indicted and arraigned on are: "Count one: (Garrett) committed the offense of theft by unlawful taking when he knowingly and unlawfully took or exercised control over certain movable property, having value in excess of \$300, belonging to the Nicholas County Sheriff Department, to wit taking cash in the approximate amount of \$43,291 from Drug Asset Forfeiture Account.

"Count Two: (Garrett)

committed the offense of Abuse of Public Trust when an audit revealed that Leonard T. Garrett obtained \$95,000 in federal asset forfeiture funds and spent in excess of \$10,000 for personal use."

Theft by unlawful taking is a Class D felony punishable by a possible sentence of one to five years imprisonment.

Abuse of public trust is a Class C felony punishable by five to ten years imprisonment.

Sheriff Garrett is represented by veteran regional attorney Raymond Bogucki of Mt. Olivet. Bogucki said he was quick to pledge his full attention, and that of his staff, to assisting in all the legal guidance for Garrett and entered a plea of not

guilty to the charges on Garrett's behalf Monday.

"I consider Dick a close friend and I wanted to help him as soon as I heard about the indictment," Bogucki said, following the arraignment. "Dick has been a close friend of mine for a while and we became friends because several years ago I noticed that every single time I came to Carlisle or Nicholas County he was helping people who needed assistance. He's always having a fish fry to help a family in need and he prevented tense law enforcement situations from escalating. Myself and fellow attorneys Richard Reid and Bryan Underwood will do everything we can to assist him."

Court approves fire training tower location

Where there's smoke there's fire and although a proposed fire training tower did receive some opposition on site location (attributed to smoke concerns) a motion to approve the training facility passed the Nicholas County Fiscal Court Nov. 9.

Nicholas County Fire Board Chairman David Smith and fellow board member Al Warner asked court members for their vote of support during the meeting.

The proposed location of the training tower will be next to the

Nicholas County Fire Department's Fire Hall.

Members of the fire board previously sought and received permission for the Carlisle City Planning Commission.

Concerns had been expressed about a possible abundance of smoke having a negative effect on Carlisle businesses.

Fire Board officials said that would not be an issue.

"Is everyone in agreement on the site," Magistrate Daryl Stacy asked.

"Yes," he was told.

The training tower is slated to be constructed pending the approval of a grant with there being no cost to Nicholas

taxpayers. The tower's construction location will be on county-owned property.

Community leaders and members of the fire board and fire department have expressed a belief that the tower can be used as a regional training facility and will entice neighboring firefighters to come to Carlisle for training sessions. Those firefighters will receive training and will spend money coming, going and while here, according to some.

The County Attorney for Nicholas County, Dawn Letcher told the members of the court that everything was in

place for the proposed project to proceed unless the grant required a survey.

But if a survey is required court members and fire board members said that shouldn't delay the project drastically.

Magistrate Steve Hamilton made a motion for the court to approve the construction of the tower on county property and his motion was quickly seconded by Magistrate Stacy.

Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tinchler was the lone vote of "nay."

"I think it's a good idea, just a bad location," Tinchler said.

Court discusses proposed sanitation project

With the proposed sewage line extension for the Lake Carnico District 2 looming in the near future, members of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court ensured that discussion, held during their Nov. 9 meeting, with GRW architectural firm representative Jason Hilenreight, would comply with their wishes.

Court members expressed concern over the number and dimensions of excavat-

ing aspects of the proposed project and how the road might be altered due to "road bores", which are cuts or tunnels beneath the road surface in which the sewage line will go.

Discussion indicated that the first plans of the project required seven road bores but new designs will cut that number dramatically.

Hilenreight and district 2 Sanitation Chairman Denny Gallagher both said there would only be two road bores with the current plans. Magistrates Mike

Webb and Jeff Randolph engaged in discussion to ensure that construction bid contracts would be held to "performance based specifications" and that any deterioration of the road as a result of the project would be the responsibility of the construction contractor.

"They will have to complete the project to our specifications," both Hilenreight and Gallagher said. Court members unanimously passed a motion to allow GRW to proceed with the design aspect of the proposed project.

The song has long been associated with the drug culture and disassociation of reality brought about by prolonged drug use. I remember hearing it for the first time in the 2nd grade. *"I wish that I could cry*

fall upon my knees Find a way to lie about a home I'll never see

It may sound absurd... but don't be naive Even heroes have the right to bleed I may be disturbed... but won't you concede Even heroes have the right to dream."

From the third and fourth stanza of the song "Superman," written by Vladimir John Ondrasik, of the group Five For Fighting.

If you, or a family member, have not been swept into the bottomless hole of substance abuse, in one form or another, then you are a member of a very small family or you 'just got off the bus, Gus.' Or you're living in your own fool's paradise and oblivious to the reality that surrounds this region.

Or you are very, very

lucky. Like a mechanical drill, pain pill abuse continues to bore its way into the very soul of our communities. The terrible, terrible statistics, coupled with a casual examination of any regional county's district or circuit court docket history will reinforce my conclusion. Members of my generation and younger adults of today aren't just abusing pain pills by swallowing them, or even crushing them and snorting them; now the growing trend is to inject them by needle.

Some publisher's of local and regional newspapers have dedicated themselves to the duty of largely printing "only the good news" and as they are their own bosses (some with not-so-secretive financial backers, in one form or another) well, that is certainly their prerogative. More than one concerned citizen has held conversations with me about all of the drug-related stories I ensure gets printed.

But as your News Editor, I believe that pigeon holing information, which can be best described as only "good news", is a luxury I can neither embrace, tolerate or respect. I am "duty-bound" to inform the community of all the news: The Good, The Bad, The Beautiful, and the Ugly. I feel it is a disservice to fail to publish any news simply because certain individuals or organizations deem it "bad" and therefore become uncomfortable. All jobs end, just like all life ends. Knowing and embracing that truth motivates me to shy away from the wretched practice of "cowardly journalism." By different computations from Law enforcement officials, and others, Bath County alone has endured nearly 40 civilian deaths in approximately 37 months, with each of those 40 deaths being related in one way or another to substance abuse, or pain pill overdose. Overdose deaths continue to climb in Nicholas, Menifee, Fleming and Robertson

County. I sure do wish that weren't the case.

But since it is, it remains my duty to ensure to the best of my ability, that the communities under "my watch", which are shackled with this tragic reality, are informed; and that duty under my watch is, in the words of the Pulitzer Prize winning Columnist Walter Lippman, to "shine light into the darkness" for the masses to better see and understand.

The illicit, illegal and deadly Black Market pain pill epidemic that has descended upon our region like the talons of a vulture is, in my opinion, fueled by widespread communal despair and often financed by parasitical, powerful and wealthy, local individuals and special interest groups.

These pain pills aren't falling from the sky like skittles from the magical candy rainbow we see on TV commercials.

No dear reader, they are being prescribed by local and out-of-state doctors. Some of the trips to these out of

state doctors are being financed locally, and I believe several of our elected officials aren't lifting a finger to help solve the problem.

Where I come from, if you aren't willing to work hard to be part of the solution, then you are part of the problem.

When citizens demand that this problem be better controlled, then it will be.

I believe the Kentucky State Police are spearheading efforts to control this problem.

They are failing miserably.

Our Kentucky State Police officers are astronomically understaffed and overworked, and this too is the responsibility of our elected officials.

When I was young, my friends and I thought we were invincible.

We thought we were supermen.

Far too many Kentuckians of my generation and those younger than us are falling prey to the use and trade of Black Market pain pills.

We are falling prey to Kentucky Kryptonite.

The program was started to reduce the overpopulation of cats and dogs, minimize unwanted animals in the county and help owners financially who want to reduce the pet care costs and improve the health of their pets.

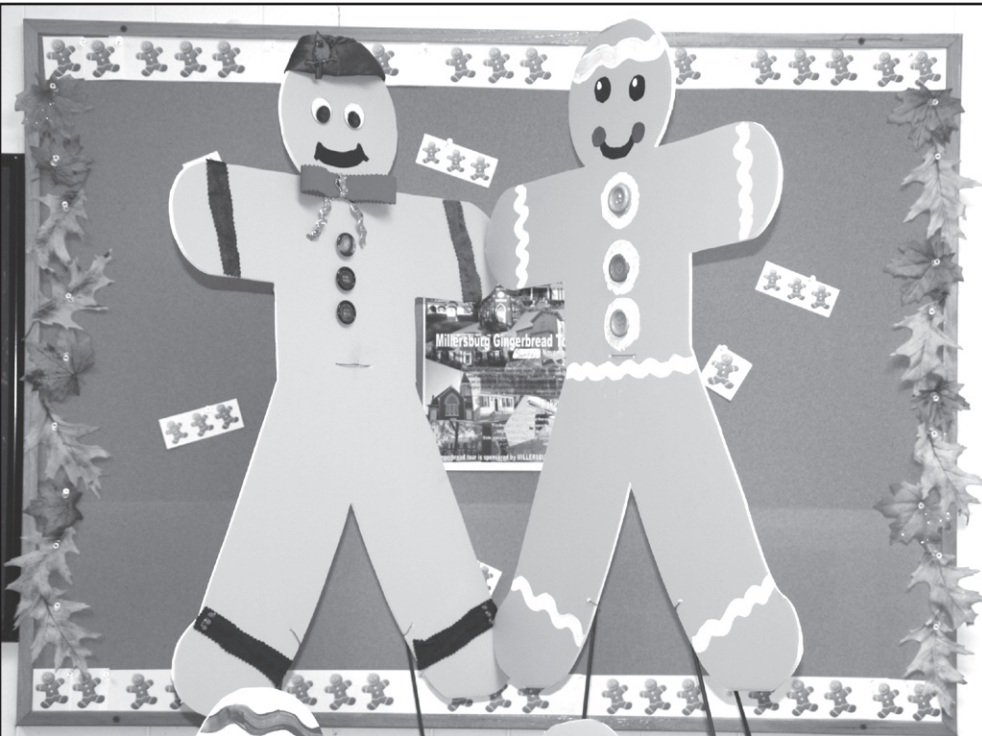

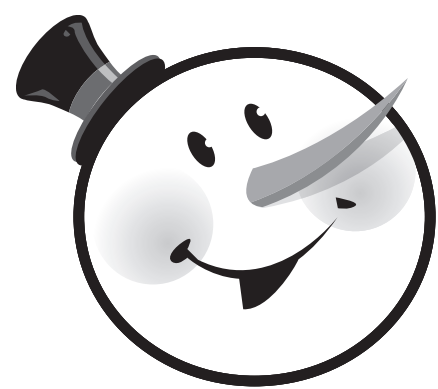

Modern Gun Deer Season opens

FRANKFORT - The frost on the leaves in the pre-dawn hours along with the general nip in the air makes Kentucky deer hunters happy. Modern gun deer season opened on Saturday, Nov. 13.

In the excitement brought by the arrival of the most popular of deer seasons, hunters need to keep in mind some simple things to make the season productive, safe and ensure they'll be invited back next year.

This sounds extremely simplistic, but it always brings true: treat the landowner and their land with respect.

"Treat the property like you would want to get invited back," said Tina Brunjes, deer and elk coordinator for the Kentucky

Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "Use some common sense."

Remember to leave gates as you found them and cross fences at the posts, not in the middle section between posts. Few things make a landowner angrier than someone who breaks down their fence by crossing in the middle of the stretch between fence posts. Replacing or repairing fences costs a lot of money and you won't be invited back next year if you cause damage crossing one this year.

Using a gate is the best plan, even if you have to walk a distance.

"Try not to hunt along a fence that marks a property boundary," said David Yancy, deer biologist for Kentucky Fish

and Wildlife. "If your deer jumps the fence, get the landowner's permission before your try to retrieve it.

Don't trespass."

If you must drive across the landowner's property, keep your vehicle on the roads. "Be careful not to rut the place up," Yancy said. "Drive around mud-holes and don't make them worse. Don't drive across crop fields or pastures."

After a successful hunt and field dressing, a hunter must dispose of a gut pile.

"Ask the landowner before you discard a gut pile," Brunjes said. "Use your sense and don't dump it in a creek or where a neighbor can see or smell it. Don't dispose of it near the landowner's home."

You can also offer to bury the gut pile for the landowner, but raccoons and other critters quickly consume the pile if left out in the woods.

Not only does a hunter have a gut pile to dispose of after field dressing the deer, they also have a carcass.

"Do not throw them on the side of the road or on other people's property, said Capt. Myra Minton, assistant director of law enforcement for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "You can't leave it on a wildlife management area, either. It is considered littering and you can be cited."

Minton suggests hunters contact their local waste removal company or government agency that handles trash and inquire

about carcass disposal.

"Most of the time, they will dispose of the carcass at the landfill,"

Minton said. "Contact them first, however."

You hear stories every year about people in a buck fever-induced panic firing at sounds in the woods with tragic consequences.

Always know your target before you pull the trigger. If there is any trace of doubt, pass on the shot.

Do not fire at deer on top of a ridge or hill; always have a backstop in case the bullet goes through the animal or you miss. A bullet can travel a long distance after clearing the hill or ridge.

Also, avoid hunting near a home or outbuilding. Not many folks appreciate someone firing high-

powered rifles near their home, especially if they have children or pets.

Be mindful of the location of livestock such as horse or cattle. Hunt as far away from them as possible. Horses can spook and injure themselves from the sound of a rifle discharging a round.

Modern gun deer season opened Nov. 13 and closes Nov. 28 in Zone 1 and Zone 2 counties. The season closes Nov. 22 in Zone 3 and Zone 4 counties.

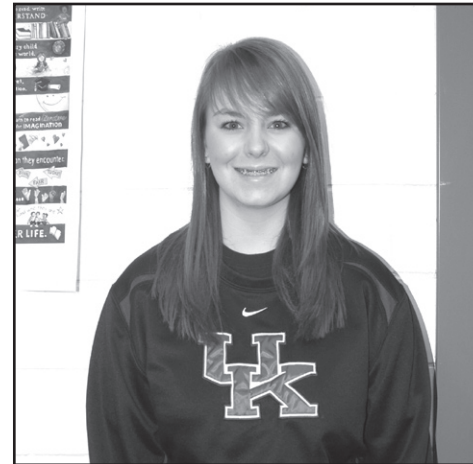

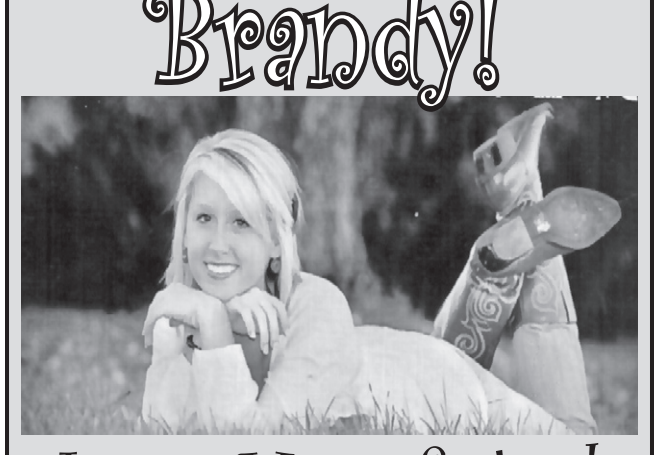

One of cable TV's hottest new series has lots of zombies and strong regional ties.

Two Harrison County creative geniuses collaborated in 2003 to begin a comic book series, which has become AMC's new sky-rocketing series "The Walking Dead," a post-apocalyptic thriller with complex plot twists and compelling characters.

The six-week series, which was recently contracted for a second 13-episode run after phenomenal ratings is a riveting story about survivors seeking safety from a zombie invasion. The story is based

on the comic created in 2003 by Robert Kirkman and Tony Moore, best friends from Cynthiana's Harrison County High School.

The main character, from the increasingly popular comic book of the same name as the series, is Harrison County Sheriff/Cynthiana Police Officer Rick Grimes, who draws viewers into an unbelievable, yet thought-provoking, epic story where the undead roam the nation while a handful of survivors, including Grimes, struggle to survive against the zombies and themselves.

Although Hollywood producers Frank Darabont, known for his creative work with "The Shawshank Redemption"

and "The Green Mile" joined Kirkman and Gale Ann Hurd of "Aliens" fame to put a slicker polish on the story, with much of it taking place near-present-day Atlanta, the opening episode featured a hospital where Grimes is recovering from a coma-inducing gunshot wound. He awakens and stumbles out of the hospital, much like Harrison County Memorial Hospital, and the odyssey to reunite with his missing wife and child begins.

Kirkman, and illustrator Moore, self-published their first comic, "Battle Pope," before working together on The Walking Dead Comic Book series.

The show is captivating a large array of viewers

near and far.

Questions arise as to who the main character is based upon. Kirkman isn't saying at this point.

Some followers of the comic book series believe that Officer Grimes may in fact be loosely based upon real life veteran Cynthiana Police Officer Walter Tapp, as in one of the early comic books a police cruiser with the number 13 can be seen.

Tapp's cruiser is number 13 for the Cynthiana fleet, according to Cynthiana law enforcement sources.

"I can see similarities between the character and officer Tapp," the source said.

Others say Grimes is a deputy sheriff or sheriff of Harrison County.

"I've seen the first two episodes and I've enjoyed what I've seen," said Harrison County Sheriff

Bruce Hampton (The real Harrison County Sheriff, which may or may not be one of the inspirations for Kirkman's character, Officer Rick Grimes). "I'm ready to find out more about the story."

So are millions of viewers.

The Walking Dead is a provocative story telling at its best, created by natives of Harrison County and Cynthiana.

Sheriff Garrett's indictment and subsequent arraignment of the charges stemmed from audit findings issued by Crit Luallen, Auditor of Public Accounts, in July of this year, with the audit covering revenues, expenditures and excess fees of the Nicholas County Sheriff's Office for the year ending Dec. 31, 2009.

Luallen's audit found that, "The sheriff did not maintain proper documentation for disbursement of the drug account: The sheriff should deposit \$698 of personal funds to cover the current year's deficit: The sheriff needs to deposit \$40,401 of personal funds into the drug forfeiture account from disallowed expenditures from the 2008 sheriff's fee audit: The sheriff's office lacks adequate segregation of duties over receipts and disbursements."

Multiple sources, including Garrett, expressed a belief that the audit and the subsequent indictment against Sheriff Garrett came about as a result of money taking during a drug raid conducted against Gary Lee Barnett and Vickie Shepherd of East Union in the summer of 2007.

Hundreds of pills and several thousands of dollars were confiscated during that raid.

Hendrickson, who acted in the capacity of special prosecutor following the death of former Commonwealth Attorney of Nicholas County, Doug Wright, spoke briefly about the complex process which followed the indictment of a sheriff.

"I was assigned as the special prosecutor by the attorney general, due to a potential conflict of interest," Hendrickson said Monday. Hendrickson said the indictments came about as a result of an investigation launched

by Kentucky State Police several months ago.

Garrett said he had "dreaded" the possibility of the indictment since the investigation began.

He said he had spoken with KSP Detective David Owens on more than one occasion regarding the special drug forfeiture and the Crit Luallen audit.

"It's the first time a special drug fund was established in this office," Garrett said.

Garrett said he had used the money for the service of the community and admitted having spent some of it to erect a flagpole and flag at West End Ballpark as well as funding a tractor pull at the park.

"I did use the money in a departmental capacity," he said Monday.

Garrett also said he had cooperated "completely" with Detective Owens and all other officers involved in the investigation.

"It was total cooperation on my part. I made sure they had access to all of my bank accounts, everything," Garrett said.

Detective Owen agreed that Garrett had been very forthcoming with information.

Nicholas Circuit Court Judge, Honorable Jay Delaney, has also recused himself from the case as it poses a distinct and direct conflict of interest.

Senior Status Judge, Honorable William Mains, was on the bench for Garrett's arraignment Monday.

Garrett's case was the second with his name on it, which was brought before the bench on Monday.

Suzanne Van-Wert was in Nicholas Circuit Court Monday morning standing in for attorney James Hart of the Cincinnati law firm of Weltman, Weinberg and Reis. They represent

Chrysler Financial Services and have filed a civil suit against Garrett with court records stating that Garrett has an "obligation past due" in which Garrett allegedly owes "a principal amount of \$14,507", according to court documents.

That complaint was filed against Sheriff Garrett on May 6 of this year and stems from an apparent misunderstanding of a lease agreement between Sheriff Garrett and Frank Shoop Chevrolet auto dealership in Georgetown regarding a 2008 Dodge Ram Truck.

No action was taken on the civil case against Garrett.

In the unrelated criminal case of the Commonwealth of Kentucky versus Leonard T. Garrett, Judge Mains set Garrett's bond at ten percent of \$10,000.

Carlisle Police Officer Sgt. Darrell Layne acted as bailiff during

Garrett's arraignment, a position typically held by Garrett or his deputy.

Judge Mains conferred with Hendrickson, her investigator Bob Tribby, and Garrett, Bogucki and Reid. Judge Mains additionally set Garrett's trial date for April 26 with motions of discovery, reciprocal discovery and other motions, to be filed as needed in the weeks and months to come.

"The only legal documents I have seen at this point are the indictments," Bogucki said. "We'll proceed as needed upon discovery motions being filed."

Sheriff Garrett continues to serve the citizens of Nicholas County in his elected position.

"Sheriff Garrett continues to be the sheriff," Bogucki said. "I don't think that will change and I think he's one of the best sheriff's Nicholas County has ever had."

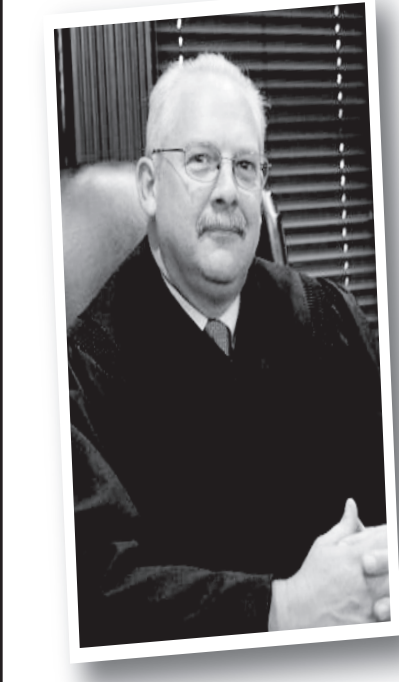

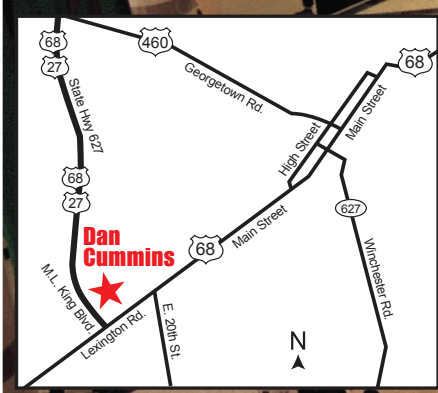

Kentucky State Parks Adjust Hours For Winter Months

FRANKFORT, Ky. – Kentucky State Parks will be adjusting their hours of seasonal operation for the winter months beginning Nov. 14, 2010 through March 15, 2011.

Beginning November 14, 2010, all 17 resorts will be open to the public beginning at 3 p.m. on Wednesdays for lodg-

ing as well as dinner Wednesday evenings, then remain open until 3 p.m. on Sunday afternoons during the winter. They will return to normal schedules on March 15, 2011 to accommodate the increase in spring visitors.

KSP Release for November

With the holidays upon us, millions of Americans are hitting the road to visit with family and friends. The Kentucky Office of Highway Safety (KOHS) wants every celebration to be a joyous occasion, so it's reminding travelers that state and local law enforcement will be out in force from Nov. 15 to Nov. 28, sending the strong message to Click It or Ticket.

“No one wants to start off the holidays with a ticket,” said Transportation Cabinet Secretary Mike Hancock. “Save your money for turkey and buying presents for loved ones – don't throw it away simply because you failed to buckle up.”

While seat belt use is at a record high of 84 percent nationwide, Kentucky lags behind

with an 80 percent usage rate. Statistics for 2009 indicate 398 (61.3 percent) of the 649 people who were killed in motor vehicles last year in Kentucky were not wearing a seat belt.

“Sadly, the holidays, which for many are the happiest time of the year, is also one of the deadliest and most tragic,” said KOHS Executive Director Chuck Geveden. “Clearly

this is an indication that people are just not aware of the huge risk taken by not buckling up.”

In Kentucky last year there were 1,120 crashes over the Thanksgiving holiday, resulting in 330 injuries and seven fatalities. Of those fatalities, five were unrestrained.

“Wearing a seat belt costs you nothing, but not wearing it could cost you a ticket or worse...

your life,” said Geveden. “We want all drivers and passengers to Click It or Ticket, day and night.”

Regular seat belt use is the single most effective way to protect people and reduce fatalities in motor vehicle crashes, according to NHTSA. Research has shown that when lap and shoulder belts are used properly, the risk of fatal injury to front-seat passenger car occupants

is reduced by 45 percent, and the risk of moderate to serious injury is reduced by 50 percent.

KSP Fatality Report

(FRANKFORT, Ky.) – Preliminary statistics* indicate that eight people died in eight separate crashes on Kentucky's roadways from Monday, Nov. 8 through Sunday, Nov. 14, 2010.

Six of the fatalities were traveling in motor vehicles. Four were not wearing seat belts. One of the fatalities was riding a motorcycle and wearing a helmet. Five bicyclists and One was a pedestrian. One of the fatalities was the result a crash involving alcohol.

Two single-fatality crashes occurred in Jefferson County. Single-fatality crashes also occurred in Boyd, Campbell, Cumberland, Floyd, Henderson and Menifee counties.

Through Nov. 14, preliminary statistics* indicate that 656 people have lost their lives on


during 2010. This is 29 fewer than reported for this time period in 2009. Of the 507 motor vehicle fatalities, 269 victims were not wearing seat belts. Of the 77 motorcycle fatalities, 44 were not wearing helmets. Thirteen of the 15 ATV fatalities were not wearing helmets. The two scooter fatalities were not wearing helmets. Five bicyclists and 50 pedestrians have been killed. A total of 132 fatalities have resulted from crashes involving the suspected use of alcohol.

Citizens can contribute to highway safety by reporting erratic drivers to the Kentucky State Police toll-free at 1-800-222-5555. Callers will remain anonymous and should give a description of the vehicle, location, direction of travel and license number if possible.

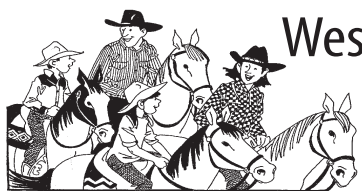

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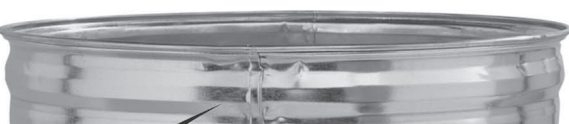
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 - Headaches** - Many people with allergies suffer from sinus headaches and people with allergies have a greater risk for developing migraine headaches. Some food and environmental allergies can trigger frequent headaches.
 - Sinus problems** - Most sinus problems are the result of an underlying allergy which causes swelling and inflammation in the sinuses. When the sinuses become too swollen, they cannot drain properly and excessive mucous builds up and can become infected.
 - Cough** - There are many diseases which cause a chronic cough, many of which are allergy related. A thorough examination by an allergist would include lung function tests that can tell if there is an underlying lung disease such as asthma, emphysema, or COPD. In children, often a diagnosis is made by a thorough history and physical exam since they are not capable of performing a lung function test.

- Frequent or severe infections** - An allergist is also a specialist in the immune system which helps fight off infections. If there is a history of frequent or severe infections such as recurrent pneumonia, skin and bone infections, sinusitis or even ear infections, an evaluation of the immune system may be warranted. However, in children and adults, frequent ear or sinus infections are usually the result of underlying allergies.
- Asthma, emphysema, COPD** - An allergist is capable of managing all but the most severe cases of these diseases. In fact, since 80% of children and adults with asthma have allergies, it makes sense to see one specialist for both conditions. It is a well proven fact that asthma is difficult to control unless the allergies are well controlled. Often allergy shots can help improve both conditions.
- Nasal congestion and runny nose** - Often these two symptoms are the hallmark of allergic disease. Most people who have to breathe through their mouth have allergies which cause blockage of the nasal passage.
- Eye irritation** - People with allergies often suffer from allergy symptoms in their eyes such as itching, redness, swelling, dark circles under the eyes, and excessive tearing.

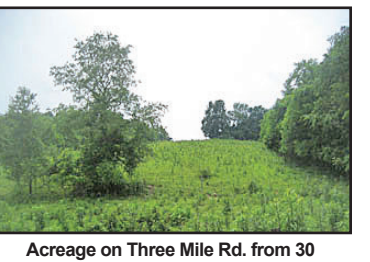
