## Carlisle mother and daughter arrested on drug charges

Two Carlisle women were lodged in the Bourbon County Jail following their arrest for drug trafficking charges on Sept. 29.

According to police the two women are mother and daughter.

Kathy Lawson, 51, and Jamie Lawson, 31, both of Moorefield Road, Carlisle, face charges of trafficking in a controlled substance, 1st degree, trafficking in marijuana, less than eight ounces, cultivating marijuana, less than five

plants and endangering the welfare of a minor.

Both women were arrested by Carlisle Police Officer Mark Snedegar following the execution of a search warrant. Also assisting in the execution of the search warrant and the subsequent arrests were Carlisle Chief of Police William Denton, Sgt. Darrell Layne and his K-9 unit Hancock and fellow Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler.

According to the arrest warrants issued to both women a 'large amount of cash, Florida pill bottles recently filled and located empty' were found in the

home. Police also found processed marijuana and evidence of freshly cultivated marijuana, including potting soil and marijuana freshly harvested that "was drying out" in the house, according to

the arrest citations. Police also found two children, which were removed from the home and led to the charges of endangering the welfare of a minor.

Chief Denton praised

the efforts of Officer Snedegar who spearheaded the investigation. He also complimented the work of K-9 Hancock and his handler Sgt. Darrell Layne.

According to the search warrant, Officer Snedegar received information from a confidential informant (CI) about illegal drug activity occurring at the Lawson home. The CI provided information about illegal drug activity, the location of a "secret room" in the home where illegal items were kept and other information, according to the search warrant.

Among the non-illegal

items recovered from the home during the execution of the search warrant was the recovery of "16" business cards of Florida Pain Clinics and hotels.

Jamie Lawson remains lodged in the Bourbon County Detention Center on \$5,000 cash bond. Kathy Lawson posted \$5,000 cash bond on Monday, according to sources at the Bourbon County Jail. Both have entered not guilty pleas during their arraignment and are currently scheduled to have a preliminary hearing in Nicholas District Court on Oct. 6.

## Court names new Animal Control Officer

Members of the Nicholas county Fiscal Court met in special session Sept. 28 and hired a new Animal Control Officer.

After discussing personnel matters in closed session for approximately 30 minutes as the special meeting began, in accordance with Kentucky Revised Statute 61.810, members voted to return

into open session after having taken no action in closed session. Once in open session, members unanimously voted to approve the hiring of Darren Johnson as the new Animal Control Officer.

The action comes on the heels of the court's reception of the resignation of former Animal Control Officer Tammy Williams.

Court members continue to work together to achieve desired goals with members of the Nicholas

County Animal Welfare Society (NCAWS), and Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tincher said that cohesive effort would continue. Judge Tincher said he welcomed Johnson aboard as a county employee.

## Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

"I was one of the company that pursued the Indians that killed Edward Boone, my wife's father, in the year 1780; and after burying him we followed the trace of the Indians to the Upper Blue Licks then along a plan war-road about a north east course until we came to the waters of what is now Fleming Creek, where they had roasted their meat; thence along the said road until ...we came to the North Fork, as Colonel Boone called it at the time, where there were a number of camps, peeled and chopped trees...I set my pocket compass to know the course in case we should be defeated... We came over the waters of Cabin Creek and Colonel Daniel Boone thought the Indians would cross the Ohio River at the Mouth of Cabin Creek, if we did not overtake them. After going down Cabin Creek some distance to where the creek makes a large bend, the war road went across the White Oak Point, and on the point there were many trees peeled, and the picture of a turtle and I think that of a deer; and after going some distance not far, Charles Gaitliffe spoke

to Colonel Boone and requested him to send some spies forward to see if they had crossed the Ohio River.

Deposition of Peter Scholl April 17, 1818  
Draper Manuscripts volume 7C pages 84-88.

Scholl came to KY in late fall of 1779, and was to hunt for four families, and they were to raise four acres of corn for him in exchange for his hunting.

"William Ray, who was (Major Hugh) McGary's stepson, was killed by the Shawnee back in 1779. They cut him up in pieces and stuck him on bushes. McGary killed a warrior that had on William's shirt. He cut up the warrior and fed him to the dogs. McGary's wife, the boy's mother, took bad sick and died shortly after that. That's what made McGary so fierce against the Indians."

"Charles Gaitliffe was out hunting when Capt. Isaac Ruddle's Station was captured and taken in June 1780. His wife and five children were taken prisoners. One child died."

And so it came to pass, dear reader, that 230 years ago this week, as the cool October wind nibbled away at their souls, death had become a daily part of the lives of the hardy frontiersmen that dared to venture north from their fortress homes into the lands near the Licking River and farther north toward the mighty Ohio River.

And the group of four dozen or so men who buried Ned Boone at the Plum Lick, near a small stream that still carries his name today; partook of certain rugged graveside rituals and later struggled with their sorrow as they tracked Ned's Shawnee killers to the Ohio River, where approximately ten Shawnee warriors made a clean escape.

Charles Gaitliffe and James Ray, brother of the late William

Ray, had especially hoped to catch the killers. James Ray not only blamed the death of his brother William on the Shawnee, but also the death of his dear mother.

The loss of her eldest son and the vicious revenge of her husband Hugh McGary, had simply been too much for her and many believed she died of a broken heart.

Numerous frontier family members had been killed and so many more captured within just the past two years.

Even young, wild Jacob Stucker, or 'Injun Jake' as he was being called, had been particularly troubled at the escape of Ned's killers.

He'd buried his own father, uncle and aunt, only a few months earlier after the Shawnee burnt Grant's Station.

He was only a teenager but he was already a seasoned scout and one of Daniel Boone's most trusted companions.

And like all the rest of them, he had genuinely liked Edward "Neddy" Boone.

Daniel Boone had been so distraught, that even though he had been the ranking member of the militia soldiers present, he had taken himself com-

pletely out of the chain of command.

Gaitliffe was in charge with Ray being second in command and Stucker being the lead scout.

Captains John McIntyre and James Estill were along, as was William "Bull Elk" McConnell.

Daniel Boone's son Israel and his son-in-law, Flanders Callaway, who married Jemima Boone, were along. Also along were Boone's nephew, Israel Grant, and Peter Scholl, who had just married Ned's daughter, Mary.

The Shawnee had crossed the Ohio River at the Mouth of Cabin Creek only hours before.

The frontiersmen had chased them through what would one day be Bourbon, Nicholas, a small portion of Bath, Fleming, Mason and Lewis County.

Most of the frontiersmen returned to the interior of Kentucky and their homes by way of the Buffalo Roads that led to and from the Lower Blue Licks.

Flanders Callaway was still grieving the loss of his uncle, Colonel Richard Callaway, killed only a few months earlier. His nephews Micajah and James, two salt makers cap-

tured with Daniel Boone a couple of years earlier were still missing and said by some to be complete renegade Shawnee warriors now. But they had said the same of his father-in-law Daniel Boone before he had proven them wrong and beaten the military court martial held against him.

Israel Boone saw the Ohio River for the first time. The return from the Ohio River held only one more memorable activity. Daniel Boone had pulled Israel aside as he had Flanders Calloway, Israel Grant and Peter Scholl; and together they split from the main party, killing a single buffalo bull near George Stockton's Spring (Flemingsburg) on their return home, linking up the next night with the Gaitliffe party just south of Lower Blue Licks

Later, Flanders and others would believe the 'dark and bloody ground' was cursed. Within two years James Estill, Israel Boone and Israel Grant, like so many others, would perish at the hands of the Shawnee.

I was just tired of my old bed and wanted to purchase another so I looked into the mark-up and the factory price of it. This bed I was looking at was marked up over 60 percent. I thought to myself.

"Wow they really like to rip people off."

Just remember next time you are going to buy something. Look it up and see when the newest version of what you want will be coming out. Because most likely the price will drop to a price that you can leave with a smile on your face, feeling as if you got a great deal, then go brag to your friends that have the same items and the price you paid compared to theirs.

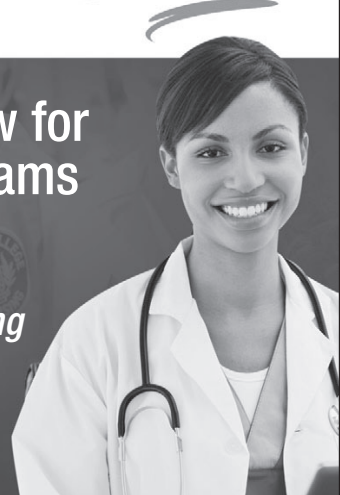

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# ASK the DR?

A Radiologist is a physician trained in the diagnostic and/or therapeutic use of X-rays and radionuclides, radiation physics and biology; a diagnostic radiologist is trained in diagnostic ultrasound and magnetic resonance imaging and mammography.

**Q: What is Digital Mammography?**

**A:** Digital Mammography is the latest technology in the detection of breast cancer. Digital Mammography uses computers and specially designed digital detectors to produce an image that can be displayed on a high-resolution computer monitor, and transmitted and stored just like computer files.

From a patient's point of view, having a digital mammogram is very much like having a conventional screen-film mammogram. Both film-based and digital mammography use compression and x-rays to create clear images of the inside of the breast. During all mammography exams, the technologist positions the patient to image the breast from different angles and compresses the breast with a paddle to obtain optimal image quality.

Unlike film-base mammography, digital mammograms produce images that appear on the technologist's monitor in a matter of seconds. There is no waiting for film to develop, which can mean a shorter time spent in the breast imaging suite.

**Q: What are some of the benefits?**

**A:** Unlike other parts of the body, the breast is composed mainly of soft tissue. When breast tissue is x-rayed, it creates an image that looks something like a smoky haze, making it difficult to see tiny "spots," called microcalcifications, and other subtle signs of early cancer.

With digital mamography, the radiologist reviews electronic images of the breast, using special high-resolution monitors. The physician can adjust the brightness, change contrast, and zoom in for close ups of specific areas of interest. Being able to manipulate images is one of the main benefits of digital technology. It can also greatly reduce the need for retakes due to over or under exposure. This potentially saves additional time and reduces your exposure to x-rays.

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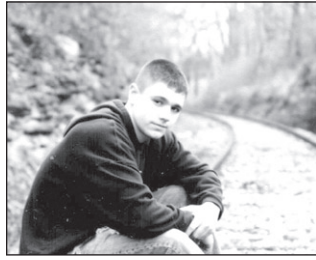
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# Deception: One of Mankind's Ugliest Truths

## Mercury Memories

October 10, 1935  
The annual Nicholas County agricultural fair closed Saturday afternoon after a successful session. Although exhibits were not as large as in some past years, the quality of the exhibits was as good as ever displayed here. Large crowds attended every session of the fair. One of the most disappointing features of the fair was the failure of many merchants to erect booths. The booths not only add to the attractiveness of the fair, but also serve as a valuable advertising medium for the merchant.

Before an audience which filled the circuit court room, of the court house Saturday afternoon. Hon. Fred M. Vinson opened the Democratic campaign in Nicholas County with an address in the interest of the state ticket. Mr. Vinson predicted the election of A. B. Chandler and the entire ticket by an overwhelming majority in the democrats go to the polls he urged the election of every nominee is endorsement of the administration of President Roosevelt. Floyd Clark, campaign chairman, presided at the meeting and presented William Conley, who introduced Mr. Vinson.

A group of Democratic women met at the court house last Thursday afternoon and formed

a campaign committee for the November election. Short talks were made by Mrs. John Lee, Bruce Morford, Joe Frank Conley and Fithian Rye, after which the officers were elected.

County Agent R. J. Matson Thursday received approximately seven hundred checks for rental payments to Nicholas County Farmers, for tobacco taken out of production in 1935. the checks totaled \$36,750.

Albert Benjamin "Happy" Chandler, Sr. (July 14, 1898 - June 15, 1991) was the 44th and 49th Governor of Kentucky, a U.S. Senator, the second commissioner of Major

League Baseball, from 1945 to 1951 and a member of the Baseball Hall of Fame. His jovial attitude earned him the nickname "Happy," which stuck for the remainder of his life.

Chandler's first term as governor is still regarded as one of the most productive of any Kentucky governor. Following on this success, he unsuccessfully tried to unseat Senate Majority Leader and fellow Kentuckian Alben Barkley, but was appointed to the Senate shortly after the election due to the death of the state's junior senator. He would later resign this position to become Commissioner of Baseball, steering it through the difficult period of integration, which many contend led to his not being offered a second contract for the position. Instead, twenty years after his first term as governor of Kentucky, Chandler returned to the Governor's Mansion using the slogan "Be Like Your Pappy and Vote For Happy."

Later in life, Chandler's commitment to civil rights was questioned as he supported Dixiecrat Strom Thurmond's bid for President. Having been elected to his first term at the age of 37, Kentucky's "Boy Governor" was both the last surviving governor of any U.S. state to serve before 1939 and the last living Senator

## Reward offered in Jackstown Road dog murder

**By Charles Mattox** They did however make a gruesome discovery in the gravel driveway of their home. They found and photographed a pool of blood, which someone had carefully concealed beneath a pile of grave.

"I believe someone came to the home, shot Sampson, covered up the evidence and took Sampson away when they left," a distraught Sandy Stracner said last week. "Nothing from the home was taken and nothing was vandalized. I believe whoever did this came to our home specifically with the intent of killing Sampson. I believe he was killed within 25 feet of our home on our property."

Stracner said Sampson was a loving animal who was very adorable to her and her boyfriend and their children and had been considered a member of the family and the source of great happiness for her and the children. Stracner contacted Sheriff Dick Garrett and has placed reward posters in the community. A Facebook page called 'justice for Sampson' has also been created.

"I really hate that this has happened," Sheriff Garrett said Monday. "I did have a suspect and I have questioned them, but they swear that they had nothing to do with it. Like I say, I hate that this has happened. I hate that this has happened to their dog the same as I would hate it if it happened to my dog or anyone's dog."

Stracner said she remains heartbroken. "I raised the dog with my kids... and really he was one of the family. He slept inside. He was a very compassionate dog and he could tell if someone was feeling bad. He had a way of just coming up and snuggling against you to try to make you feel better. He was the absolute best family dog any family could ask for. When I came home and drove into the driveway he was always there. He was always so happy standing there wagging his tail and happy to see me. Now it just hurts to pull into the driveway and not see him standing there and knowing he'll never be there."

Stracner said the loss of Sampson is bad enough, but the dread does not end there. "When we found the concealed puddle of blood... Well it makes it very frightening at night to realize that someone was at our home in broad daylight and killed our dog. Will they be back? Will they come back with a gun like they obviously did before?"

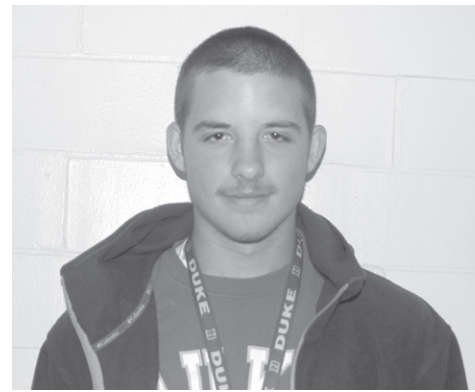

New Home Heating Patterns May Increase Potential for Chimney Fires and Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

With record-setting home heating prices anticipated this autumn and winter, efficiency is at the forefront this year. As many homeowners address their financial concerns by turning to a solid fuel appliance, like wood or pellet stoves, the Chimney Safety Institute of America (CSIA) sends the reminder that the new heating patterns, including an increase in solid-fuel use, have the potential to increase the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning and chimney fires. According to the most recent statistics from the National Fire Protection Association

(NFPA), chimneys and chimney connectors accounted for the largest share (36 percent) of home heating fire incidents in 2005, with "Failure to clean" accounting for two-thirds of those fires.

Responsible operation of heating appliances calls for annual maintenance. Surprisingly few homeowners realize that the chimneys venting their furnaces, water heaters and stoves, as well as the fireplace in the living room, need to be inspected by a qualified professional each year.

The most recent estimates available from the Consumer Product Safety Commission show an average of 25,700 residential structural fires related to fireplaces, chimneys and chimney connectors resulting in 30 deaths and \$627 million in property losses annually.

In addition to encouraging that chimneys

and vents be inspected on an annual basis and maintained as needed to reduce the risk of fires and carbon monoxide poisoning due to creosote buildup or obstructions in the chimney, the SCIA also recommends the following winter heating safety tips:

Ensure that new appliances as installed with the correct venting components as defined by the manufacturer.

Install a carbon monoxide detector on every

level of the home. Check smoke alarms. Replace batteries in both smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors when clocks are reset for Daylight Savings Time.

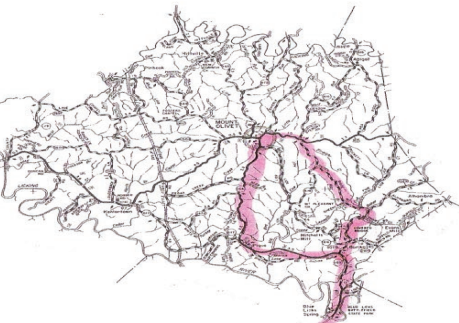

He would go on to add that they also help veterans who are homeless find shelters or places that they can stay until becoming financially independent again. Other various programs are put in place for the donations to contribute to as well, such as help paying bills or buying food. Hill stressed that all assistance is strictly need based and that they were a non-profit organization where all gains go towards the veterans. Need for assistance is determined through an interview of the veteran hoping to get help.

When asked what the importance was of every citizen supporting the military Hill responded quickly.

"Veterans are not receiving the help they deserve. Nowadays it seems like they have been made second rate citizens. The program provides the assistance, but they need our help raising donations to fund that help."



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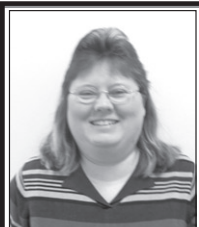

# Nicholas in drought

FRANKFORT, Ky. (Oct. 1, 2010) - The Office of the State Climatologist and the Kentucky Energy and Environment Cabinet, in coordination with the Kentucky Drought Mitigation Team (KDMT), are issuing a Level I drought declaration for counties in six drought management areas (DMAs) in central and eastern Kentucky. These new counties bring the total to 69 counties in 11 DMAs under a Level I declaration.

Countries within the new Level I drought declaration areas:

A Level I drought indicates moderate drought conditions have developed primarily affecting soil moisture and vegetative health. Serious impacts to agricultural water needs, an increased wildfire risk, water supply shortages with systems on small lakes and reservoirs, and other water-sensitive sectors can be expected in the designated areas.

The current Level I drought declaration has been expanded into more of the Bluegrass and into parts of eastern Kentucky to cover areas that have widespread dryness throughout with precipitation totals of only 50 to 60 percent of normal for several consecutive months. Significant rainfall has been restricted to southern and eastern parts of the state, while the rest of the state has experienced extremely dry to, in some locations, record dryness during the months of August and September.

Several counties in the central and eastern part of the state that are not within the Level I drought declaration are developing drought-like conditions and impacts. These conditions are the result of the rapid change to a dry weather pattern over the past 30 to 60 days. If this pattern persists, it is expected that drought declarations will be declared for additional counties.

Streamflows on larger rivers (Green, Kentucky, Licking, Big Sandy and Ohio rivers) have remained at normal levels due to the releases from U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) lakes and timely rains in their headwaters. USACE reports their lakes are at normal water levels and many have undergone releases to lower levels to winter pool to help maintain, and even

increase, flows on the rivers they supply. Water levels in many smaller streams are extremely low, including the Drakes Creek watershed in Simpson and Allen counties, Elkhorn Creek in Central Kentucky, Rolling Fork River in the Lincoln Trail Region, Eagle Creek in Northern Kentucky, and the Red River in Powell and Wolfe counties.

Most of Kentucky's potable water supply sources are currently at safe levels. However, a few water systems relying on small lakes or reservoirs may begin to experience low water supplies. If these conditions continue to develop, water supply shortage watches will be issued by the Division of Water for the affected areas.

Wildfires have become a serious issue in areas experiencing drought conditions. The Division of Forestry reports a very large increase in wildfires during the month of September. The largest number of fires have been located in the Big Sandy, Pennyriple, Green River, Lincoln Trail and Kentuckiana Regional Planning and Development Agency drought management areas. The public is urged to take steps to prevent wildfires from starting.

The Fall Forest Fire Hazard Season begins today and a number of counties are already under burn bans. A list of counties currently under a burn ban can be found at <http://forestry.ky.gov/wildlandfiremanagement/Pages/CountyBurnBans.aspx>

The drought significantly affected agriculture. The dry conditions have sped up harvests, significantly reduced corn and soybean yields and caused over-drying of tobacco. The poor quality of many pastures has forced many producers to begin feeding hay to livestock.

Many livestock water supplies have dried up and are forcing producers to rely on municipal suppliers or water districts. These alternate sources result in higher costs for producers and increased demand on public water supplies. Urban landscaping has also been impacted resulting in the browning of lawns and the early loss of leaves on some trees.

Weather outlooks provided by the National Weather Service indicate that chances are slight over the next two months for widespread soaking rainfall events needed to alleviate the drought. Isolated, spotty events with no real regional improvements in drought status are expected to continue. This will likely exacerbate the current impacts including wildfires, possible water shortages for drought-vulnerable systems, an increased need for livestock water supplies, the selling off of livestock herds, difficulty planting winter wheat fields and hay shortages.

The state Drought Mitigation and Response Plan defines a tiered approach to classifying drought severity using multiple indicators to assess the intensity and location of developing drought. These indicators include the Drought Monitor, Palmer Drought Index, Crop Moisture Index, and precipitation and streamflow measurements.

This week we have selected Mrs. Jenna Smoot as teacher of the week.

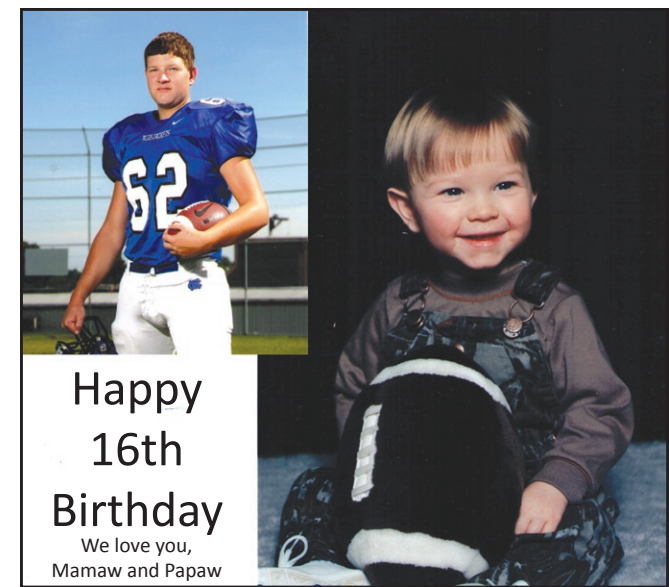
