Cane Run accident results in fatality

A Nicholas County man died following a single-vehicle accident Saturday after suffering an apparent heart attack.

Ollie Mitchell, 76, of Cane Run Road was traveling on Cassidy Creek Road Saturday, just before noon, when, according to community sources,

he suffered a heart attack and his Chevy pickup truck left the roadway.

Nicholas County Emergency Responders arrived quickly on the scene and Mitchell was transported by helicopter to the University of Kentucky Medical Center where he was later pronounced dead.

Kentucky State Police Officers, including Trooper Eric Barnett,

who continues to lead the death investigation, according to KSP sources arrived on the scene and with emergency responders secured a landing zone for the helicopter and closed Cassidy Creek Road and KY. 32 as the helicopter landed near the intersection of the two Nicholas roadways.

Traffic remained closed for approximately 35 minutes.

Man arrested on marijuana trafficking charge

A Carlisle man is in jail facing drug charges following an incident at Hall's Apartments in downtown Carlisle, Friday.

Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler arrested Eric Michael Pasley of Hall's Apartments, Carlisle and charged Pasley with trafficking in marijuana, less than eight ounces, possession of drug paraphernalia and assault, fourth degree. Buckler noted on Pasley's arrest citation

that he was dispatched to the scene of Hall's Apartments regarding a possible "strong arm robbery."

According to Pasley's arrest citation, Pasley was hiding in another apartment other than his own when buckler arrived.

"The alleged victims stated the subject (Pasley) attacked them... and tried to steal their cell phone," the citation states, adding that the victims were at the location allegedly attempting "to buy a bed."

Pasley told Buckler the

alleged victims were actually there for another reason.

"The subject (Pasley) stated that they were buying marijuana from him and they tried to steal it and attacked him, he openly told this officer that he was selling marijuana," Buckler wrote on Pasley's citation.

Marijuana was found in Pasley's apartment after he gave Buckler a 'consent to search'. He also admitted to fighting with the victims who had injuries to their face, according to the citation.

Couple arrested for burglary following "marijuana" dispute

A Carlisle couple were arrested Sunday afternoon and charged with burglary following an alleged dispute over the purchase of marijuana.

Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler arrested Shawn Dale Doan, 30, and Korie Lynn Krebs, 26, both of Sugar Creek Road, Carlisle.

According to the arrest citation issued to the two, Doan and Krebs "kicked in" the door of an apartment located in Green Valley Apartments.

Doan and Krebs told Officer Buckler they were at the apartment attempting to buy marijuana. They told Officer

Buckler that they gave the resident of the apartment \$60 for marijuana and "he ran." They told Buckler they then knocked on the door and when the individual wouldn't open the door, they allegedly kicked it in.

Buckler noted on the citations that the victim, whose door was kicked in, told Buckler that Doan and Krebs had assaulted him, and they took his rent money.

Buckler arrived at the apartment just as Doan and Krebs were leaving, according to the citation.

Doan and Krebs were charged with burglary, second degree and lodged in the Bourbon County Regional Jail.

WILLY'S POSSESSION AT THE HOUSE OF FOUL PLAY



Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

Below is a true and documented story.

Autumn 1900, just east of Flemingsburg

At first, ten-year-old William Black Jr., or Willy, as he was most often called, did not really pay much attention to the strange apparition he saw out near the Old Sanford barn.

William Black Sr., his wife and their seven children had rented the Sanford farm, which was located in the center of a triangulated area bordered by the communities of eastern Flemingsburg, Bald Hill and Poplar Plains, in east-central Fleming County.

In the summer of 1900, when young Willy first experienced his possession, the rural landscape of this section of Kentucky was still somewhat isolated, and filled with Appalachian wood lore, superstitions, and heal-

ing arts, said by some to be witchcraft, including the exorcism of those possessed by spirits.

Willy's family first became aware of his strange behavior one summer evening when he casually mentioned he had seen what appeared to be a white sheet fluttering in the hay field, out behind the barn.

Willy was known as a good farm boy; who was obedient, helpful and not lazy or mischievous in any way.

When Willy asked how the sheet could change into a small white calf, his parents became alarmed.

Willy insisted he had seen the white calf and sheet clearly but his parents told him it was all "foolishness."

Later, when Willy saw the white calf again, a few days later, he threw a rock at it and was

amazed to see the rock passed through the calf just like it was fog.

The incident seemed to upset the young man and as his parents dreaded, he slipped farther and farther into madness in a very short time.

He suffered with fits of delirium and spoke of hallucinations and conversations he'd had with the white calf.

And from the darkness near the barn a voice began to call to Willy.

The voice began to tell Willy incredible things, referring to itself as a 'voice of the dead' and being with "the Bald Thorn."

The voice said it was speaking on behalf of a man named Dr. Bradshaw, a local practitioner of the medicinal arts, who had once lived in Poplar Plains.

Willy said that the voice of Bald Thorn told him that Dr. Bradshaw had been killed in a local orchard and had never been seen in the

community since.

Willy's parents became alarmed and called for the help of their neighbors, as Willy's delirious fits grew more intense.

Neighboring members of the Kissick, Smithers, Deering and Secrest families came to the aid of the Black Family.

The group became concerned when it was learned that several years earlier, a certain Dr. Bradshaw, who had lived in Poplar Plains and fancied taking long walks in the local orchard mysteriously vanished one night.

"Well, where do you suppose Dr. Bradshaw is, Willy?" One of the men asked Willy in an attempt to further diagnose his mental illness or the extent of his being 'touched' by a spirit.

"Dr. Bradshaw is buried right over there," Willy said to those gathered as he pointed to a section of floor near his bed. "Dr. Bradshaw is buried with other men

and women and even children too."

"Here on the rug," one of the men said with a sheepish grin.

"Beneath the floor," Willy said with a flat tone.

A flip of the rug revealed a secret trap door.

I can't imagine what those men were thinking, dear reader.

I only know what they did.

They dug up a small area beneath that trap door.

And they found the bones of six men, three women and three children.

Local legends have since referred to the farm dwelling as a 'house of foul play' and though I refuse to give its exact location, as I am not convinced the Ghost of Bald Thorn is a kindly spirit, I have friends who know where the location is and even more who can verify that the old Fleming County Historian Wade Cooper knew it well

when he penned his book "Early Fleming County Pioneers."

Mr. Cooper devoted a few pages to the "House of Foul Play."

Young Willy Black recovered and although supernatural events did occur at the farm, nothing else happened to the degree of Willy Black's possession.

A small white calf is said to still been seen late at night in the nearby community of Poplar Plains.

A crying woman can also be heard along the neighboring ridges over on certain moonlit nights, and I've heard her lamentations myself and tried in vain to track them down.

It remains uncertain if the lamentations of the ghost woman are connected in any way to the voice of Bald Thorn.

I have found no evidence of the identity of the others buried in the house of foul play, with the exception of Dr. Bradshaw, who disappeared in 1876, before young Willy Black was ever born.

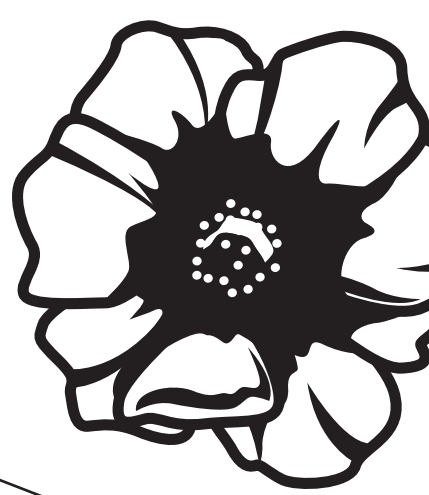

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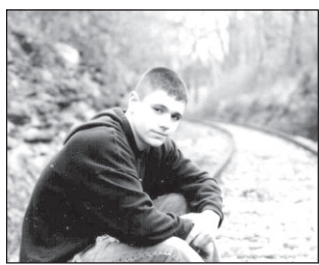
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Cinema's Impact on Halloween

In dedication to the great month of October and with Halloween quickly approaching us, I felt that I would give the idealistic and philosophical discussions a rest, and go with a more holiday oriented theme. Halloween is such a great time of year and something I've always felt connected to - the movies, the books, the culture, literally everything about the holiday is great (with the exception that we don't receive presents). Throughout the remainder of the month I plan for my column's to have a horror based connotation or theme. Today, I wanted to discuss how movies have influenced our modern day conception of Halloween.

Because we as a society grew up in the doctrine of Halloween, it is almost second nature that certain things are simply associated with it. However we rarely look into how these things became the foundation for what we think of as Halloween. When I think Halloween, it is always the same horror icons that come to mind - the classics like vampires, werewolves, or ghosts; the modern characters like Jason Voorhees, Freddy Krueger, or Michael Myers. But, we always seem to take these things for granted and hardly question the origins of these things. This week's article will simply be a precursor for next week's; allowing everyone to become acquainted with the figures I will be addressing today. So now without further adieu, I give you the top ten horror icons of cinema history. However, I would like to note that I will be avoiding specifics since there are so many great figures to address. So for instance, instead of saying "Dracula" as the icon, I will



be using "Vampires" to generalize all members of the genre.

10. The Mummy

Characters associated with the mummy were originated from a film from 1932 entitled "The Mummy" starring actor Boris Karloff. Although characters associated with the mummy theme are somewhat a bore, I thought that it was necessary for them to at least make the list. The film from 1932 carries the typical plotline for a "mummy" movie. Two archaeologists come across the mummy of the ancient pharaoh Imhotep during an expedition. After taking the mummy and all the riches found at the burial site to a museum in Cairo, the mummy is mysteriously resurrected by the reading of an ancient "life-giving spell" by one of the archaeologists. After the mummy is resurrected it proceeds to cause nothing but turmoil towards those who are the primary characters of the movie.

9. The Frankenstein Monster

Possibly one of the most recognizable faces on the list is Professor Victor Frankenstein's creation. Made from the body parts of countless deceased people, professor Frankenstein re-animated this mixture of death and decay to create a monster unlike any that had ever been seen before. The character Frankenstein, was first developed in author Mary Shelley's novel

"Frankenstein" or "The Modern Prometheus". In this English horror classic from 1818, we see the struggle of an individual with no self-identity and no concept of belonging. Created as a hideous monster, Frankenstein is shunned by society, which turns the once good-hearted monster into a vessel of destruction. The novel paved the way for the classic movie "Frankenstein" in 1931, as well as many sequels and parodies that have allowed Mary Shelley's idea to live on forever.

8. Werewolves

Upon recent discussion of the werewolf characters throughout time I have seen that it unfortunately has never been done right (in my opinion). Although this popular culture icon has certainly placed its mark on society, no one can really state a great werewolf movie. My coworkers and I came to the conclusion that the 1981 classic "American Werewolf in London" seems to be the essence of what the werewolf character embodies. Only to be stopped by a silver bullet, werewolves have ensured a fear of full moon's ever since their creation. And although werewolves appear on the list before vampires, I still feel that the heavily debated topic has to go the werewolf.

7. Possessed Entities

Although this is an extremely broad topic I feel that it had to be included. Characters like the children's doll, Chucky from Child's Play and the car, Christine, have never been a favorite of mine, but many people still associate the films with Halloween. Within these types of movies it seems that the concept is often scarier than the actual movie. It's obvious that the

fears of a car or a doll becoming possessed are definitely there, but to me it seems like they too have been poorly made or poorly scripted. However, the idea of an object that we see everyday coming to kill us is very frightening. Probably would make you second guess buying a creepy looking doll in the first place...

6. Ghosts

One of the most stereotypical concepts within Halloween are of course ghosts and/or supernatural spirits. Due to various folk lore and stories that are so often told, ghost stories fall to the forefront of most Halloween discussions. We see in movies like the classic "House on Haunted Hill" that sometimes it might not be an individual we should worry about, but perhaps a multitude of spirits that intend to cause harm to the living. With the ideal Ghost being the translucent white-sheeted being, it leaves a variety of paths an artist could undergo when developing a story around the concept. The idea of life after death has been the subject of much discussion throughout the entirety of human history, and so, there will always be room for ghost stories.

5. Demons

Potentially the most real form of evil for the majority of the populace is the idea of demons. Coming from a largely religious area of America we see that the concept of the Devil, demons, and Hell scare people more than say a Vampire would. Because so many people hold extremely strong religious convictions it is easy for them to feel like things happening in a movie could be true. With the old adage of "it's only a movie" thrown out the window due to certain people's beliefs, this could be the scariest

set of characters on the list. The idea of demons in horror films have spawned such great movies as "The Exorcist" and "The Evil Dead" series to name a few. With a supernatural power dictating the conclusion of a movie it is extremely hard for the protagonist to ever win without somehow losing something.

4. Vampires

Although Vampires typically top the list of horror icons for many I feel that it has somewhat been played out. Vampires are indeed an icon for the world of horror movies and for Halloween as a whole. Out with a vengeance caused by their deaths as wicked mortal person, Vampires carry a bloodlust that is unmatched by anyone. Of course I'm obviously not talking about the extremely metrosexual "Edward" from the "Twilight" series because those movies are terrible, I am, however, discussing notorious vampires such as the black and white Nosferatu from a German film made in the 1920's. The character Nosferatu paved the way for all future concepts of Vampires in the future. Typically very charismatic and charming, it would be hard for one to resist the lustful ways of the vampire. Famous movies include "Bram Stoker's Dracula", "Nosferatu: Symphony of a Vampire", "The Last Man On Earth", and of course the most recent hit, "I Am Legend".

3. Slashers

The "slashers", as coined by popular culture, are horror icons that are reoccurring. Characters like Freddy Krueger, Jason Voorhees, and Michael Myers. All slashers typically have many things in common, for instance: extremely specific/almost predictable styles, excessive kill-

ings, and millions of sequels. If you are looking for a good movie marathon, look no further than one of these franchises. All of which has their ups and downs, but nonetheless always ensures you a good time.

2. Serial Killers

Chosen because of their incredibly realistic nature, serial killers pose the greatest threat to our society. Considering that all the other members of this list are of supernatural origin, it is easier to throw them to the wayside, unlike serial killers. Serial Killers are as real as it gets - the idea that a mass murderer that harbors pent up sexual and mental frustrations could live next door is something that will send a chill up anyone's spine. With such characters as the infamous Hannibal Lecter of Silence of the Lambs and Patrick Bateman from American Psycho it shakes the very core of a "sophisticated" society. You can guarantee anytime you see a movie depicting a serial killer, either fictionally or realistically, it will almost always scare you.

1. Zombies

My obvious favorites within the list is the dreaded undead - Zombies. Coming in almost all forms, Zombies have probably played the most influential role on popular culture, inspiring movies, video games, and books alike. This race of the undead is never satisfied, a brainless machine hoping only to find it's next meal, which wouldn't be so bad if their meal didn't consist of human flesh and brains. Starting typically as a disease, the concept of Zombies in almost all forms can only end in Apocalypse. In all situations if there is a Zombie outbreak there will be no end in sight. Basically created by Horror genius George A. Romero, Zombies first touched the silver screen in 1968 with "Night of the Living Dead".

This is perfect weather to get your barns and fields ready for winter. Yes, I said winter. You know the season that I dread, but accept that I have to go through it in order to get to Spring. I know that most of us don't like to think about winter right now, but before we know it, it is going to be upon us. I know that I would rather get my repairs and necessary chores done during the nicer weather well before the cold temperatures hit. Even though this means I may have to give a little of my riding and playing with my horses time up, this is stuff that I need to take care of so I might as well make it easy on myself and others.

I've attached a section of an article that I received from an online source. I thought this would be helpful and might even motivate us all a little to get these things done and behind us so we can

enjoy whatever good weather we are blessed with before the cold, nasty winter arrives.

"Here are The Top Ten "Green" Tasks Horse Owners Should Do Before Winter:

1. Winterize the barn: This means repairing or replacing broken windows and doors, and making sure that they can close completely to keep out cold winter air and drafts. If you have a bathroom and/or heated wash rack, wrap the water heater with an insulated blanket. Hot water pipes can also be wrapped to help save energy. Refill under stall mats where needed, or haul in fill in stalls without mats. Remove anything that's not used during the winter like fans (blow off fan and motor with an air compressor), and any liquids that might freeze in an unheated barn like fly spray, hoof black, fence paint, etc.

2. Harrow pastures. If you don't

have a harrow, use a pitchfork and break up manure piles.

3. Spread manure and compost on hay fields and on pastures that are resting for the winter.

4. Drain hoses and water tanks: Drain hoses of all water, roll them up, and store indoors. Unused water tanks should be drained and cleaned with dish soap or a bleach mixture--then turn them upside down if left outside. A run-in shed or a horse trailer that isn't going to be used during the winter is another good place to store water tanks.

5. Clean and store show tack: Give your show tack a good cleaning and bring it indoors for the winter. This will protect it from the damaging effects of extreme temperatures, as well as prevent potential damage from mice and other critters and insects that might over winter in your barn.

6. Wash fly sheets, fly masks, stable sheets, and un-

used halters. Repair any tears in blankets, masks, and leg wraps. Store these items in a sealed container like a tote.

7. Clean out horse trailers after their last use: If you don't plan on using the trailer over the winter, either store it inside, or tarp it--making sure to cover the tires. Empty perishable items from tack compartment, dressing room, and living quarters. Remove anything that could get damaged if the roof or windows leak. Put a couple handfuls of mothballs inside to help repel mice and other pests.

8. Fix fences: Make sure that fences are in good repair including working electric. Replace rotted boards and posts. You definitely don't want to be digging postholes in the frozen ground.

9. Paint gates: Gates seem to rust quickly in seam areas, as well as areas damaged by use and by horses. Use either sandpaper or

a wire brush to remove rust, and then follow up with a coat of primer and a then with a rust deterring paint.

10. Stock up on staples: Filling the barn with hay for winter goes without saying, however, stocking up on other things like bedding, stall freshener products, salt blocks, de-wormers, etc., helps to eliminate unnecessary trips to the feed or farm store."

I hope this list proves to be beneficial to you all or at least gives you a starting point on the things you need to take a good look at before winter arrives. Believe me this is not what I'd really like to be doing but it beats icicles hanging from

my ears and nose while doing it!

So...take care of what you need to get done and get saddled up and enjoy your equine partners while enjoying the changing colors of the leaves.

A couple of years ago in October I lost a very important person in my life. My grandfather, S.S. Lyons Jr. He was a farmer that lived for feeding cows, pigs, and chickens to raising tobacco and corn. Papaw was someone that loved to do many things, but I think that his favorite thing to do was eat.

He would start out his day with a big breakfast, eggs, bacon or sausage, toast sometimes biscuits and several cups of coffee.

I remember the days that I spent the night at their house, he would get up in the mornings, go to the end of the table where he would sit every day. He had one coffee cup that he used every morning. A brown speckled cup that had a picture of a pig on it.

Once he finished his breakfast, he would sit there and watch a little bit of T.V. then after about thirty minutes or so he would mosey on out to the barns and start feeding the animals, then he would start to grease the equipment and fuel up the tractors to start the day.

He always made sure that his work hands and himself would take a break before lunch, and even after lunch every day. His break food would be a Coca Cola and

a snack cake. That was every day.

He would rare back in the chair and rub his old belly and say boy that was good, or oh my I am so full I cant move.

Papaw you are greatly missed, all of the family miss you and truly love you. We know that you walk with us every day. You may be gone but you are not forgotten for you have left us with so many memories that you still live on.

Just remember that there may be times that family gets upset with each other but what would you do if they were not here to share the memories, or to be a part of the family. Make sure that each and every day that you let your family members know that you truly cherish them.

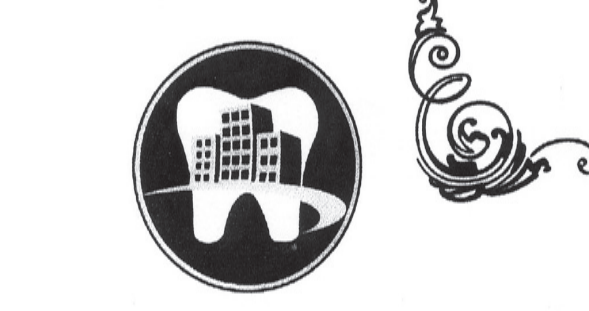

The Nicholas County volleyball team held leads in both sets of Saturday's regular-season finale at home against Mason County, but the Lady Royals were able to rally and pull out a 25-16, 25-18 victory.

"We were just not ready to play," Nicholas County coach Jennifer Cornett said. "We were coming off Fall Break and I think the girls' were thinking about (Monday's district tournament match against)

Bourbon (County)."

Nicholas County (7-12) jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the opening set, but Mason County (8-12) responded with five straight points. Led by the serving of Mandi McLean, the LadyJackets reeled off a 6-0 run to take a 9-5 lead.

The hosts were able to hold onto the advantage until the Lady Royals tied the score at 11-11. The score was again tied at 13-13 before Mason County's Karissa Greenhill served her team to an 18-13 edge. The hosts were able to claw back within three at 19-16, but Leigh Newdigate's serving helped the Lady Royals finish the set as

the visitors scored the final six points.


There were three ties early in the second set, but Nicholas County was able to take an 8-5 advantage after Lotta Keskimaeenpaeae served the team to a 3-0 run. The LadyJackets added another 4-0 run during the serving of Robyn Cohorn to pull to a 12-6 advantage.

The hosts led by as many as seven at 16-9, before the Lady Royals started to crawl back. The first-year club closed to within four points at 17-13, but then used an 11-0 run behind the serving of Kortney Carver to give

Mason County a 24-18 advantage before eventually sealing the victory.


Mason County improved to 4-3 in its last seven matches and raised its record against 10th Region opponents to 6-7. Nicholas County finished its home season with a winning mark at 4-3; the first time in school history the club has achieved that feat.

Center staff members also help with helping transport seniors to the doctor, assist them with their medicines acquisition and pharmacy needs, and just giving them some tender loving care.

Office hours are 8:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. and 1:00 p.m.-4:30 p.m. This is not on a first-come first-served basis. If you are an eligible producer and wish to sign-up, you must do so during this time period.

The following programs are available: Ag Diversification; Cattle Genetics; Cattle Handling; Commercial Poultry, Dairy & Swine; Farm Fencing; Farm Structure & Commodity Handling; Farmland Improvement & Utilization (formerly called Forage); Goat & Sheep Diversification; On-Farm Energy Efficiency & Production; On-Farm Water Enhancement; and Technology.

You may sign-up for up to three programs at a 75/25 cost-share. The maximum that a producer can receive is \$4,500 total for this sign-up.

If you are approved, you will be mailed a notification. Deadline for completing your program will be May 20, 2011 at 4:00 p.m. As always, you must come in (before the deadline), complete a report and have appropriate photos, receipts and proof of payment to receive reimbursement. You do not have to wait until the deadline to receive reimbursement. If you complete your project before May 20, you may bring in your information for reimbursement at that time.

Pope rushes for 123 yards, named MVP in Bluejacket win

Nicholas County coach Robert Hopkins had a simple plan for Friday night's Eastern Kentucky Conference road match up at Lewis County: run the ball. Behind the efforts of Bluejacket game MVP Caleb Pope, the team had 49 rushes for 253 yards.

"I just wanted to keep going and pounding it. I didn't expect (to be the MVP) since I fumbled the ball and made some ignorant penalties," Pope said. "We are getting our blocks up all the way around (from) everybody.... I like the respect they had for the other team and gave us a trophy."

Nicholas County threw the ball just three times and the only completion of the night was a 47-yard touchdown pass to Pope.

In total Pope accounted for 170 yards, touching the ball 25 times on offense as the Bluejackets won the 29th annual Paul Westerfield Bowl in Vanceburg 23-6 to improve to 4-3 on the year, 2-1 in the EKC and claim their third straight victory over the Lions.

"It was a battle. (Lewis County coaches) Corky (Prater) and Josh (Hughes) do a great job. They out-hustled us tonight. But, we had kids who were quicker and faster, and we were able to break some big plays and that's why we were able to do what we did," Hopkins said. "This was a big win for us."

The Bluejackets have not had a winning record this late in the season since 2007, when the team was also 4-3. Dating back to last fall, Nicholas County is 7-5 in its last 12 outings.

The Bluejackets' victory marked the first time in the last five meetings in the series that the road team won the contest.

It was the third consecutive home and fifth straight overall defeat for Lewis County (2-5), which also fell to 1-3 in the EKC race, while Nicholas County's win snapped a two-game skid and improved its road record to 2-1 this season.

"Fundamentally, we are just horrible right know. Maybe we are paying too much attention to our scouting," coach Hughes said. "The first two games, we were blocking people and then it just stopped. I figured tonight would be a different story with our suspended guys back, but we had no rhythm on offense. We'd have a good play or two and then get stuffed."

As effective as Pope and the offense was at moving the ball, the Bluejackets arguably won the game with their defense, twice holding Lewis County from scoring in the red zone midway through the second half.

Lewis County opened the contest with the ball and picked up three first downs on 13 plays as it marched into Nicholas County territory, primarily on the strength of its ground game. However, the drive stalled at the Bluejacket 36 after failing to convert a fourth-and-three play.

Defensively, A.J. Brown, Wes Hopkins and John Lee Allison combined for two tackles for a loss on the drive; while Hopkins was also credited with a quarterback hurry.

Pope ran the ball on the first five plays of the Bluejackets'

opening series, including starting things off with a 15-yard gain. The visitors continued to move the ball on the ground, with Cody Stapleton's tackle for a 1-yard loss being the only negative play in the drive.

On the final play of the first quarter, Pope converted fourth-and-two with a 6-yard run up the middle to push the ball down to the Lewis County 17.

However, after an incomplete pass into the end zone and a 5-yard penalty, the Bluejackets were unable to sustain the drive when quarterback Charby Pope broke several tackles, but only collected seven yards on a running play on fourth-and-12 from the 19.

Lewis County went three-and-out on its next possession and Nicholas County benefitted from good field position despite Laithan Davis' tackle for a 2-yard loss on the punt return.

Davis, Mike Mustard and Dalton Cooper got the Bluejacket drive off to a slow start with a 3-yard tackle for a loss on second down. But, after a Lewis County penalty, Charby Pope connected with a wide-open Caleb Pope over the middle for a 47-yard touchdown strike.

Austin Allison's fake on the extra point attempt turned into a 2-point conversion when he found Devin Johnson in the end zone with a pass with 7:16 to play in the first half.

Lewis County started its next drive from its 10-yard line after an illegal block penalty. But, the hosts gained yardage quickly on the drive as Levi Clark hit Zach Zornes with a 30-yard pass play down the left sideline and Davis added a 25-yard run up the middle. The drive went all the way to the Nicholas County 26, before Hopkins and Brown combined for a 6-yard loss with a sack on

fourth down.

Lewis County's Cooper and Mustard had a 1-yard tackle for a loss, and Mustard and Jarrett Parker had a quarterback hurry that forced an incomplete pass on Nicholas County's next drive, forcing the Bluejackets to punt.

Both teams had the ball one final time in the first half, but Jessie Smith's 3-yard tackle for a loss helped force Lewis County to go three-and-out. Nicholas County took over with 1:07 left on the clock and moved the ball 23 yards, highlighted by a Wes Hopkins 11-yard run.

Nicholas County turned the ball over on a fumble that Cory Christy recovered at the Lewis County 34-yard line on the first possession of the second half. Two plays later Clark lofted the ball into the hands of a double-covered Zornes for a 59-yard gain down the left sideline.

Two plays after that, Nick Ruark ran left for a 5-yard touchdown. However, Clark's 2-point conversion pass was incomplete and Nicholas County held onto an 8-6 lead with 7:34 to play in the third quarter.

It did not take the Bluejackets long to answer. After Johnson recovered an on-side kick at the Lewis County 47, Smith opened the next drive with a 22-yard run. Caleb Pope ran the ball on the next two plays, the second of which he spun off a tackle and scampered 13 yards and across the goal line. Allison's extra-point kick sailed through the uprights to give the visitors a 15-6 advantage with 6:41 to play in the period.

Ruark returned the ensuing kickoff 32 yards and the Lions went back to work on offense. Ruark and Davis combined to rush for a first down, before Clark hit Zornes in the left flat for a 24-yard pass play.

A pair of Lewis County penalties nearly stalled the drive, but the hosts got a reprieve when a pass interference flag near the Bluejacket goal line gave the Lions a first down at the 19.

The hosts came away scoreless after Brown's quarterback hurry and Hopkins' pass breakup stopped the drive on fourth down.

Mustard continued to make his presence felt on the Lewis County defense with a 3-yard tackle for a loss and a fumble recovery after Christy forced the ball loose during the first two plays of the next Nicholas County drive.

However, the hosts were unable to capitalize on the opportunity. Davis' 6-yard run put the ball at the 9-yard line to start the fourth quarter, but after a penalty pushed the Lions back to the 12, Wes Barnett's 29-yard field goal attempt was short as Hopkins caught the ball and downed it in the end zone.

Charby Pope opened the next Bluejacket drive with a 15-yard run and Hopkins later added 14 more yards on a third-and-one play.

The visitors continued to run the ball effectively and marched all the way to the Lewis County 37, before Smith shook off a handful of tackles and scampered the rest of the distance to the end zone with 5:46 to play.

Again a fake extra-point kick resulted in a 2-point conversion as Austin Allison took the direct snap and ran the ball into the end zone.

Lewis County went to the air to try to make up the 17-point gap, but a Hopkins sack and a high snap forced an incomplete pass on fourth down to give the ball back to the visitors.

Nicholas County lost yardage on its next few plays after a pair of penalties, and a Davis and Mustard tackle for a loss on a fumbled snap. But, Caleb Pope kept the drive alive with a 34-yard run for a first down, despite an un-

sportsmanlike conduct penalty on the Bluejackets after the play.

The visitors continued to run the ball, before the drive ended with a Mustard 3-yard tackle for a loss on fourth down from the Lewis County 43.

The hosts went back to the air for one last gasp as Clark connected with Stapleton for a 13-yard gain and a first down. After three more incomplete passes, Ty Warmouth broke up a fourth-down pass play to give the ball back to Nicholas County, which took a knee on back-to-back snaps to end the game.

The Bluejackets finished with 52 plays for 300 yards and 10 first downs. They were 6-for-11 on third-down conversions, 2-for-4 on fourth downs and 1-for-2 in the red zone.

The team rushed the ball 49 times for 253 yards, led by Caleb Pope who had 24 carries for 123 yards. Smith finished

with seven rushes for 64 yards, while Hopkins had nine carries for 41 yards. Charby Pope added seven rushes for 24 yards and was 1-for-3 through the air for 47 yards.

Lewis County tallied 240 yards of total offense on 56 plays, most of which came through the air. Clark finished 9-for-21 for 147 yards with Zornes as his main target. Zornes had seven catches for 125 yards.

Davis earned the team's Offensive MVP award after rushing the ball 19 times for 81 yards. The Lions finished with 35 rushes for 93 yards overall.

Lewis County had 10 first downs, but had trouble converting its other opportunities, finishing just 3-for-12 on third downs, 1-for-6 on fourth downs and 1-for-3 in the red zone.

Mustard was named the team's Defensive MVP after forcing five tackles for a loss as well as a quarterback hurry, and recovering a fumble.

Happy 50th anniversary

Long time manager Ed Toy joined Jerry's as a manager/owner before the move

to the present location. As Jerry's prospered over time, two additions were made to the original building. A major remodel was done in 1991. Over the years Jerry's has been committed to serving a wide variety of food, at a reasonable price. All items served by a caring group of people who strive to make your visit a pleasant one. Jerry's still proudly serves the J-Boy, Strawberry Pie and Fried Chicken along with newer items such as the Mexican Salad, Chicken Stir-Fry and Salad Delight. Carter Cornett currently manages Jerry's Family Restaurant. Mr.

Cornett has 29 years experience as a manager at Jerry's His assistant managers are Nancy Parks, Sarah Cornett, and Patricia Pargen. Jerry's is located at 706 North Maysville Road in Mt. Sterling, Ky. The telephone number is 859-498-1940. Jerry's would like to thank all their loyal guests over the last 50 years and extend our appreciation to the many great employees who have served us. History of Jerrico Welcome to Jerrico, and welcome to Jerry's. You are now a member of one of the winningest teams in the entire food service industry. As you may know, we are not new to the business. We began our winning ways quite a while ago during the depression. It all began when Jerome Lederer, then in a bank real estate department, became interested in the exciting success of the White Castle System and it's five cent hamburger. Deciding there was more than enough room for another chain, Mr. Lederer opened his first sandwich shop, called the White Tavern, in Shelbyville, Kentucky, in 1929. 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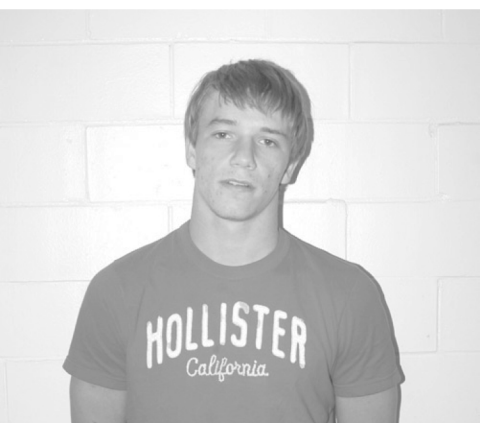

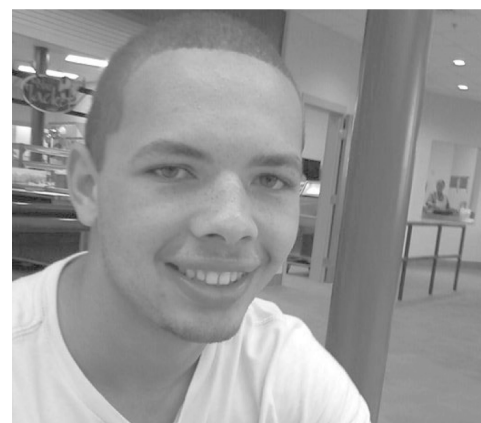

A fire erupted at approximately 1:40 p.m., Tuesday, on Saltwell Road very near the Harrison County line. The fire began in an outside building behind a house owned by Bob Kenny and occupied at the time of the fire by Molly Caudill and her son Jason Alcorn.

Caudill praised the efforts of Hollar and county firefighters and credited them with saving the house.

"I believe another minute or two and it would have been gone," an exhausted Hollar said of the blistering inferno that melted siding from the rear of the house and toasted over one half of an acre behind the house.
