Members of a Nicholas County Grand Jury indicted Nicholas County Sheriff Leonard Dick Garrett Monday morning.

jury indicted Garrett on two charges: theft by unlawful taking, more than \$300, and abuse of public trust.

According to multiple sources in law enforcement and the local judicial system, including Sheriff Garrett himself, the indictments stem from audit findings issued by Crit Luallen, Auditor of Public Accounts, in July of this year, with the audit covering revenues, expenditures and excess fees of the Nicholas County Sheriff's Office for the year ending Dec. 31, 2009.

Luallen's audit found that, "The sheriff did not maintain proper documentation for disbursement of the drug account: The sheriff should deposit \$698 of personal funds to cover the current year's deficit: The sheriff needs assigned as special prose-

PHASE I SIGN-UP TO BEGIN

Sign-up for the Phase I Cost-Share program will be October 25 through November 5, 2010 at the Nicholas County Extension Office. Office hours are 8:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. and 1:00 p.m.-4:30 p.m. This is not on a first-come first-served basis. If you are an eligible producer and wish to sign-up, you must do so during this time period.

The following programs are available: Ag Diversification; Cattle Genetics; Cattle Handling; Commercial Poultry, Dairy & Swine; Farm Fencing; Farm Structure & Commodity Handling; Farmland Improvement & Utilization (formerly called Forage); Goat & Sheep Diversification; On-Farm Energy Efficiency & Production; On-Farm Water Enhancement; and Technology.

You may sign-up for up to three programs at a 75/25 cost-share. The maximum that a producer can receive is \$4,500 total for this sign-up.

If you are approved, you will be mailed a notification. Deadline for completing your program will be May 20, 2011 at 4:00 p.m. As always, you must come in (before the deadline), complete a report and have appropriate photos, receipts and proof of payment to receive reimbursement. You do not have to wait until the deadline to receive reimbursement. If you complete your project before May 20, you may bring in your information for reimbursement at that time.

• Our continued refusal to come to grips with the need for more protection for the most innocent of our society-our children-hints of a nation that has lost its way. If you get some free time on one of these chilly October nights, consider renting some these from one of our local movie stores or just try to catch them on TV with the schedules I will provide. I guarantee that it will be fun for everybody that is with you, whether it's the entire family, a group of friends, or just yourself. I warn you that there are a few spoiler alerts throughout the article, but not enough to give away the endings. **10. Pet Sematary (1989)** First on our list in the infamous "Pet Sematary" based on the Stephen King novel of the same name. This tragic tale chronicles the Creed family's move to the country in present day Maine (as is the setting for so many Stephen King novels) and their introduction to the mysterious pet sematary (spelled wrong, as written by the children who made the sign at the entrance). The protagonist Louis Creed, a doctor from Chicago, gradually learns more about the ancient burial ground after the death of the family cat, Church. Jud, a befriended neighbor of the family tells Louis of the strange powers of the site. Jud shows Louis that upon burying the cat at the "sematary", that it would come back to life, but somehow different. Following the untimely death of Louis' son Gage from a tragic accident involving a speeding truck on a nearby road, Louis begins to contemplate utilizing the powers of the burial ground. Little did Louis heed Jud's advice that "sometimes dead is better." This movie airs on October 21st at 4 PM, the

9. Silence of the Lambs (1991)

Next on the list is the 1991 psychological thriller "Silence of the Lambs" starring Jodie Foster and Anthony Hopkins. This film would go on to win the Top 5 Academy Awards including Best Picture, Best Director, Best Adapted Screenplay, Best Actor, and Best Actress. The movie is based off of the novel by Thomas Harris and revolves around a spree of murders connected to a serial killer known as Buffalo Bill. Young FBI trainee Clarice Starling (played by Jodie Foster) is sent to cross-examine a brilliant psychologist and known cannibalistic murderer known as Hannibal Lector. 8. A Nightmare on Elm Street (1984)

Potentially the most recognizable horror movie on the list is none other than "A Nightmare on Elm Street". Coming to the scene in 1984, "A Nightmare on Elm Street" was directed by horror icon Wes Craven (director of "The Last House on the Left", "The Hills Have Eyes", and "The People Under the Stairs"). The film starred Heather Langenkamp as the protagonist Nancy Thompson and Robert Englund as the dream killer Freddy Krueger. 6. Night of the Living Dead (1968)

"Night of the Living Dead" is one of the older films on the list and was directed by the legend and pioneer of the 'zombie' genre, George A. Romero. This movie would lay the foundation for all future zombie movies. Filmed in black and white, the film quality only adds to the hor-The movie accounts the mass hysteria associated with a zombie outbreak, touching on social and environmental issues of the time. This landmark film spawned the idea of the "living dead" and the concept of the zombie. The idea of an adversary constantly growing in numbers comparable to a disease epidemic is scary enough, but when you add in the fact that the 'disease' causes the individual to crave human flesh it became something that was unfathomable to audiences of the time. "Night of the Living Dead" was made with only a \$114,000 budget and would gross \$42 million and is now a part of the National Film Registry.

5. Psycho (1960)

This legendary film was directed by "the master of horror" Alfred Hitchcock and is most notably known for the infamous murder scene marks wearing a red and Anthony Perkins, as Norman
