Sheriff Garrett Indicted

Members of a Nicholas County Grand Jury indicted Nicholas County Sheriff Leonard Dick Garrett Monday morning.

Members of the grand jury indicted Garrett on two charges: theft by unlawful taking, more than \$300, and abuse of public trust.

According to multiple sources in law enforcement and the local judicial system, including Sheriff Garrett himself, the indictments stem from audit findings issued by Crit Luallen, Auditor of Public Accounts, in July of this year, with the audit covering revenues, expenditures and excess fees of the Nicholas County Sheriff's Office for the year ending Dec. 31, 2009.

Luallen's audit found that, "The sheriff did not maintain proper documentation for disbursement of the drug account: The sheriff should deposit \$698 of personal funds to cover the current year's deficit: The sheriff needs to deposit \$40,401 of per-

sonal funds into the drug forfeiture account from disallowed expenditures from the 2008 sheriff's fee audit: The sheriff's office lacks adequate segregation of duties over receipts and disbursements.

Multiple sources, including Garrett, expressed a belief that the audit and the subsequent indictment against Sheriff Garrett came about as a result of money taking during a drug raid conducted against Gary Lee Barnett and Vickie Shepherd of East Union in the summer of 2007.

Hundreds of pills and several thousands of dollars were confiscated during that raid.

Special Prosecutor Kathryn Hendrickson presented the case to members of the grand jury.

Kentucky State Police Detective David Owen, has been leading the investigation and testified to members of the grand jury, according to Hendrickson.

Hendrickson is the Commonwealth Attorney for Fleming, Mason and Bracken County and was assigned as special prosecutor by the attorney gen-

eral. Doug Miller, Commonwealth Attorney for Nicholas County, said a special prosecutor was assigned in cases such as this where a law enforcement officer who regularly worked with the existing Commonwealth Attorney would present a distinct conflict of interest.

Nicholas Circuit Court Judge, Honorable Jay Delaney, has also recused himself from the case as it poses a distinct and direct conflict of interest.

Hendrickson, who acted in the capacity of special prosecutor following the death of former Commonwealth Attorney of Nicholas County, Doug Wright, spoke briefly about the process Monday morning.

"I was assigned as the special prosecutor by the attorney general, due to a potential conflict of interest," Hendrickson said Monday. "Hendrickson said the indictments came about as a result of an investigation launched by Kentucky State Police several months ago.

Hendrickson confirmed that the charge of theft

by unlawful taking, more than \$300, had a dollar amount attached to the indictment in excess of \$40,000, but said other than what was stated in the public document of

the indictment she "could make no comment on the ongoing case."

Circuit Clerk Sandye Watkins did not release copies of the indictments following their issuance

by members of the grand jury. (Though several in the judicial and law enforcement agencies, including Hendrickson, said the documents were cur-

Fate of senior center remains unclear

No one knows what will become of the Nicholas County Senior Citizen's Center?

The individual elements to be considered in the fate of the senior center are complicated, and the answer may not

be completely known for several weeks.

The Main Street Building that currently houses the senior's center is in dire need of repair. The county-owned Community Action Center (CAC) Building is a proposed site for the senior citizens center to occupy when they move from their current loca-

tion.

All agree the CAC Building is a more suitable building than the senior center currently has, but CAC administrators are asking more per month in rent than the senior center administrators say they can afford.

Compound that with a recently-completed

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) application for a new building to be constructed to house the senior citizens center and the future of the senior center is further complicated, especially considering that it will take about two years to be constructed, if the grant is approved.

Regardless of the chal-

lenges facing the uncertain future of the senior citizens center, a solid voice of support for the center and the programs the center administrators implement to assist the 'greatest asset of the community'; Its wise and deeply-valued senior citizen population, was heard during a public hearing on the grant Monday af-

ternoon at the Nicholas County Courthouse.

"The support for this project has been overwhelming," Senator R.J. Palmer said before the public hearing. "All portions of the application are being completed and I will be writing a letter of support seeking approval for the funding of

Fire destroys Headquarter's home

A fire completely destroyed a mobile home Tuesday morning at Headquarters trailer Park.

Daniel Martin, his girlfriend Genela Stanley, and their two children were awakened by thick smoke early Tuesday morning.

"We were asleep and were awakened by the thick smoke chocking us," Martin said. "We hurried up and got the kids and got outside."

Within only moments thick smoke completely engulfed the home, followed quickly by flames.

"We tried to get back into one bedroom to get

some clothes, but the smoke and flames were too thick," Stanley said. The family lost everything except their lives.

"We didn't get out with anything, no clothes, no shoes, not even any diapers for the children," Stanley said.

Within moments the home was completely engulfed in an inferno

and though members of the Nicholas County Fire Department arrived quickly on the scene, there was nothing they could do except ensuring the fire didn't spread.

THE GHOSTS OF TUNNEL HILL



Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

You might want to shy away from the railroad tracks, especially the Cowan railroad tunnels at midnight this week. There's a full moon Saturday night. They say the ghost of the headless rider races down the tracks at midnight during the full October moon. I can't say if it's true or not, but I research things and I hear things and I'm just passing on what I hear and what I research.

There are two Cowan railroad tunnels, with one being much longer than the other. Both are located on the old CSX-TTI railroad tracks that run through Nicholas County into Fleming. The railroad through Fleming from Maysville and into Carlisle was completed in 1869 and remains in use today.

The old Tunnel Hill Cemetery has been desecrated and partly destroyed in recent times and some believe it is the ghosts of those buried there who clam-

ber along the railroads on October's full moon nights. Others say it is the ghosts of those killed during the construction of the railroad, particularly the longest tunnel at Tunnel Hill, which haunts the location.

A literal ghost railroad track that once ran from Johnson Junction through Flemingsburg to Poplar Plains and into Hillsboro once existed, but a 1907 train wreck in Flemingsburg, which killed two people was the beginning of the end for that spur of the rail line.

The tracks and ties have long since vanished though the path of the great locomotives can still be seen along the countryside, particularly near Poplar Plains. Two were killed in the 1907 wreck and several were injured. Some nights glowing lights can be seen along the tracks, especially

between the Licking River and Tunnel Hill, a distance of 2-3 miles.

The longest of the tunnels has special notches cut into the stone walls of the tunnel so people who are in the tunnel will have somewhere to stand if a train unexpectedly comes along and they don't have time to exit.

But the notches carved in the walls are said to be a trap for those seeking refuge when the headless ghost comes along on the full moon October nights.

They say that if a man were to slither into those notches on such a night, with the glow of the ghastly apparition approaching, that the very walls of the tunnel will open up and swallow whoever is standing there.

There have also been several unexplained deaths associated with the railroad in close proximity, the bodies of people lying near or on the tracks with no clear known cause of death.

It is also said to be a legend of how one

of the Irish workers was killed in a fight inside the longest of the tunnels and he tried to ride for help along the newly constructed tracks

but died somewhere along the line as his horse kept galloping down the tracks. There are many strange anomalies associated with the

old railroad tracks in that area. One to be considered and which should compel caution are the ghosts of Tunnel Hill.

You may sign-up for up to three programs at a 75/25 cost-share. The maximum that a producer can receive is \$4,500 total for this sign-up.

If you are approved, you will be mailed a notification. Deadline for completing your program will be May 20, 2011 at 4:00 p.m. As always, you must come in (before the deadline), complete a report and have appropriate photos, receipts and proof of payment to receive reimbursement. You do not have to wait until the deadline to receive reimbursement. If you complete your project before May 20, you may bring in your information for reimbursement at that time.

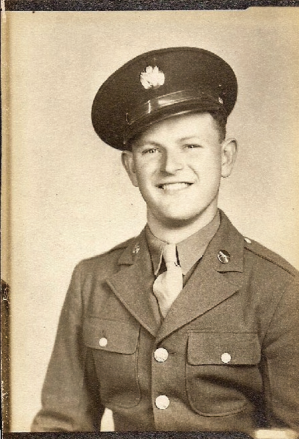
roots (more options than the present dysfunctional two party system), or other checks and balances safeguards.

Volleyball's valiant effort falls short at district tournament

The Nicholas County volleyball team fell just two points shy of making the 10th Region Tournament for the first time in history.

The LadyJackets dominated Bourbon County in the opening set of last Monday's 38th District semifinals in Winchester, but the Lady Colonels battled back to win the second set to tie the match.

Trailing 24-19 in the final set, coach Jennifer Cornett's club rattled off five straight points to tie the score at 24-24. However, a ball handling error and a Lady Colonel

service ace gave Bourbon County a 15-25, 25-18, 26-24 come-from-behind victory, its first in the tournament since 2007, earning the team a berth in the Wednesday championship match against host George Rogers Clark and a spot in the 10th Region Tournament.

"We got too relaxed in the second set and we just started to over think things," Cornett said.

Still, it was a history-making season for the LadyJacket squad, which won more total matches (seven) and contests against regional opponents (four) than any team in the program's seven-year history.

Five seniors finished their careers in the match: Katie Rainey, Lotta Keskimaaenpaae, Mandi McLean, Whitney Morris and Taylor Johnson as Nicholas County ended its season 7-14 overall and included first-ever wins against Montgomery County and Bourbon County during the regular season.

After the score was tied 2-2 in the opening set of the district tournament, Nicholas County jumped all over Bourbon County (8-16) by tallying the next six points, led by a pair of kills from Keskimaaenpaae and another from Robyn Cohorn.

The LadyJackets extended their lead to 10-3 after a Morris service ace. Nicholas County used another 5-0 run to push the margin to 17-5, primarily on Lady Colonel errors.

Bourbon County started to rally and cut the deficit in half at 20-10. The Lady Colonels continued to make a run and closed the gap to seven points at 22-15, before two Keskimaaenpaae service aces sealed the win.

Nicholas County held an early 5-3 lead in the second set, but Bourbon County took a 7-6 advantage after a pair of aces from Karissa Johnson. Coach Cornett's club battled back and tied the score at 10-10 on a Johnson service ace, before going ahead on a Lady Colonel hitting error.

However, a 5-0 Bourbon County run gave it a 15-11 lead. After falling behind by six, Nicholas County closed to within four points after a Briann Ishmael service ace and a Keskimaaenpaae kill at 21-17, but a pair of Johnson aces and a Hannah Stout kill gave the set to Bourbon County.

Three straight service aces by Ishmael opened the third set in favor of Nicholas County. But, the Lady Colonels battled

back to knot the score at 3-3, the first of eight ties in the final set.

Bourbon County pulled ahead 15-14 after a ball handling error began a 5-0 run for the team from Paris. Nicholas County closed to within two at 21-19 after a Keskimaaenpaae service ace, but the Lady Colonels reeled off the next three points to go ahead 24-19.

However, the gutty LadyJackets crawled back to tie the match at 24-24, behind a service error from Bourbon County, a Keskimaaenpaae kill, a Lady Colonel hitting error, a Morris kill and a second Bourbon County hitting error, before the Lady Colonels were able to regroup and tally the final two points.

Bourbon County held its biggest edge in service aces at 23-11. The Lady Colonels also had six more kills (20-14), but made more hitting errors (20-15) and service errors (15-9).

October 26, 1950
A near capacity Homecoming crowd at the athletic field Friday night watched Georgetown sub-

mit to the fifth white-wash job splashed on by Carlisle this season as the Musketeers rolled to a 25-0 CKC verdict over the Buffalos from Scott County. Halftime ceremonies spotlighted Misses Carole Smith, queen, Jame Ellen Gillespie and Saranell Seamonds, attendants who were presented to the crowd by co-captians Hardin and Morrison.

Queen for a day: Miss Betty Blake, daughter of State Senator and Mrs. H.

Stanley Blake of Carlisle will reign over one day of Lexington's Homecoming celebration which begins October 30. Miss Blake and her four sister queens will be presented at all homecoming activities scheduled for their day of sovereignty and will be escorted by members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, organization sponsoring the beauty queen contest and Homecoming parade. A UK junior, Miss Blake wants to be a tobacco buyer and is a member of

Kappa Alpha Theta, the Kentuckian staff, YWCA and Student Union.

October 30, 1975
Gov. Julian Carroll announced Friday that work will start in the spring of 1976 on the grade crossing to replace the present railroad bridge over the tracks on the Moorefield Road near the Nicholas County Hospital. The road will be re routed just west of the present bridge at ground level, cutting through the old Straw

Nursery Property. This will eliminate a large part of the curve in the present road and will eliminate the bridge entirely.

October 24, 1985

A free Kentucky Hunter Education course is scheduled for October 21 & 22, 2010, from 6:00 PM until 9:00 PM and October 23, 2010 from 9:00 AM until 12:30 PM at the Nicholas County Health Department, 2320 Concrete Rd., Carlisle. Range Work will be held following the last classroom session on Saturday October 23rd at a site to be announced.

The course, sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, the Nicholas County Wildlife Club, and Bourbon and Nicholas County 4-H Shooting Sports includes classroom instruction in hunter ethics, wildlife identification, outdoor survival, first aid, firearms, bow hunting and ammunition. The last session includes actual range firing and a test.

Upon successful completion of the course, a course completion card is issued which is valid in any state, province or territory where such certification is required. Attendance at all sessions is required for certification, unless an alternative method is utilized. All students must be at least nine years old to take the written examination and receive a course completion

card. Persons born on or after January 1, 1975, shall carry a valid hunter education course completion card or exemption permit while hunting. Kentucky accepts certifications from any state, province or country whose course meets the standards established by the International Hunter Education Association (IHEA). A bow hunter not in possession of a firearm, may carry a

hunter education or a bow hunter education course completion card from any state, province or country. The course shall meet the standards established by the IHEA. This certification is in addition to appropriate license and permit requirements. Children are not required to complete the course until they turn 12 years old. Children must be 9 years old to take the test for course completion. For li-

cense requirements check the Kentucky Hunting & Trapping Guide or online at fw.ky.gov.

Court members vote to fund GED testing

Members of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court voted unanimously to fund Nicholas County citizens who are enrolled in adult education to take their general education diploma tests.

"The tests cost approximately \$55 a test," said Bill Teegarden, regional director of the Adult Education Center, which oper-

ates in part through Maysville Community College.

Teegarden came to last week's meeting to, inform court members of the success of the program and to ask them to consider assisting with test funding.

"We have 17 adults involved in the program," Teegarden said while explaining that the state does not provide funding and often times the students struggle to come up

with the extra money required to pay for the test. Teegarden said he and others involved in the voluntary program had spent money out of their own pockets to the tune of \$400 for recent test takers.

"Nicholas County Judge - Executive Larry Tinchler said he had attempted to obtain funding for GED testing for Nicholas County adults who wish to take the test through possible Mathers funding, but the stipulations of

the fund did not allow funding for adults.

Magistrates Daryl Stacy, Jeff Randolph and Steve Hamilton led discussion on the program.

Stacy and others noted that the county provides \$60 a month for magistrates to assist with indigent citizens in their districts through a special indigent fund and several suggested that funding might be the best source to use.

"it's money that's

budgeted and I can't think of anything better to use the money on besides education," one magistrate said after Teegarden explained the increase in annual and lifetime income the difference a person with a GED would have over an individual without one.

Magistrate Randolph made a motion to use \$275 for Oct. and Nov. from the indigent fund to pay toward GED testing through the adult education center.

The motion was seconded by Magistrate Mike Webb and passed unanimously.

The Adult Education Center is housed in the Nicholas County library and the hours of operation are Monday and Tuesday 9 a.m. to 7 p.m., Wednesday 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., and Thursday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

currently "public records").
 "The only time they wouldn't be a public record would be if they were a sealed indictment," Hendrickson said. "These indictments weren't sealed, therefore I believe they are public records."
 Watkins said Monday that she said she felt she couldn't release the indictments until she said she received guidance from the Administrative Office of the Courts.
 The same held true for Tuesday and no copies of

any indictments were given to The Mercury upon request.
 Since Judge Delaney had recused himself due to a conflict of interest a special judge was required to sign the arrest warrant of Garrett following the issuance of the indictment, according to multiple court sources.
 No special judge had signed a warrant by Tuesday morning.
 "It may be a situation where there is no arrest warrant issued but rather a summons for a court appearance is issued," one individual who is knowledgeable in

court proceedings said.
 Garrett said he had "dreaded" the possibility of the indictment since the investigation began.
 He said he had spoken with KSP Detective David Owen on more than one occasion regarding the special drug forfeiture and the Crit Luallen audit.
 "It's the first time a special drug fund was established in this office," Garrett said.
 Garrett said he had used the money for the service of the community and admitted having spent some of it to erect a flagpole and flag at West End Ballpark as well as funding a tractor pull at

the park.
 "I did use the money in a departmental capacity," he said Monday.
 Garrett also said he had cooperated "completely" with Detective Owen and all other officers involved in the investigation.
 "It was total cooperation on my part. I made sure they had access to all of my bank accounts, everything," Garrett said.
 Garrett said the work that he and then deputy Bennie Buckler did to make the June 29, 2007 bust of Gary Lee Barnett was a lengthy process and helped remove dangerous drugs from the

community.
 "I certainly have nothing to hide," Sheriff Garrett said. "We laid all night in the weeds on several occasions to make that arrest and I do not feel like any of the drug forfeiture money was abused."
 He continued.
 "I'm surprised this case went before the grand jury," Garrett said. "I know the truth and that's all that matters. I'm going to continue to cooperate completely and I'm ready to get this over with."
 On June 29, 2007 Sheriff Garrett and Deputy Bennie Buckler confiscated an estimated 1000 pills and \$50,000

from Gary Lee Barnett at 4215 East Union Road.
 The case continues to manifest itself and expand in various forms.
 If Sheriff Garrett is asked to resign, or is stripped of his office, it will fall on County Judge-Executive Larry Tincher to appoint a new sheriff. Judge Tincher expressed an opinion that parallels the law in that "all persons are innocent until proven guilty." "As far as I am concerned he is the sheriff and he'll be sheriff until such time that he is not and I will make an appointment then if necessary."

this project."
 Dozens of citizens attended the public hearing and were joined by Palmer, Judge-Executive Larry Tincher, Judge-Elect Kenny Lyons, Magistrate Steve Hamilton, Magistrate-Elect Darvin Mitchell and Carlisle Mayor Ronnie Clark.
 Blue Grass Area Development District grant writer and administrator Betsy Laski led discussion at the public hearing.
 Laski said the grant

totalled \$575,000 and if granted would be awarded through the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and would be federal funding through a CDBG.
 Laski said 15 percent, or \$75,000 would be required by the community with in kind support such as land value, equipment, labor or other avenues of in kind contributions.
 Across Kentucky there are a total of \$28 million in grant monies available with \$4.5 million to be awarded in the state under Community Projects programs, which the proposed senior center

will be filed under. \$15 million will be awarded through economic development and public facilities programs across the state.
 Laski told the crowd that letters of support for the grant would be beneficial and Senior Center Director Shawna Hatton delivered two large packets of letters of support and endorsements at the hearing.
 A handful of citizens spoke to Laski during the hearing with each expressing deep support of the center and the approval of the grant for a new center.

The nuts and bolts of funding a proposed move of the senior center to the CAC Building was discussed among fiscal court members last week but resulted in no clear cut solutions, other than the county would continue to lease the county-owned Community Action Center Building to CAC.
 With the senior citizen center needing a new home and CAC being a possible location the subject of the CAC lease led to monthly lease payment concerns being addressed by Angie Schalch, Director of Community Action, and Shawna Hatton, Director of

the Senior Citizen Center, during the court meeting.
 Schalch said utility costs for the area, which would house the senior citizen center was estimated at \$458.
 Hatton said the senior center could only pay \$350
 "Somebody's got to bite the bullet," Carlisle Mayor Ronnie Clark, who was present stated.
 "That's \$458 a month the first year," Schalch said "The second year it could be more or it could be less."
 Magistrate Steve Hamilton pointed out it would be a differ-

ence of "about \$1,300 a year"
 But the amount was still firm.
 "It would be a shame if \$1,300 kept the (senior) center out, but I know we can't go down," Schalch said.
 Mayor Clark quickly voiced support for the city paying \$650 (of the needed \$1,300), if the county would match it, but at least two magistrates quickly grumbled that, "the county would find a solution."
 The Mercury will continue to cover the ongoing developments.

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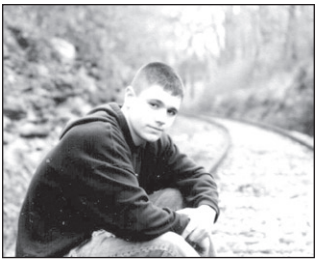
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Horroriest: The Ten Films You Must See During October

The Ten Films You Must See During October

As a continuation of last week's column on Horror movie icons I wanted to share my personal top ten list of scary movies to watch during October. Yes, I know, "another top ten list of things I don't care about", really exciting I'm sure (saturated in sarcasm). I understand that this topic probably isn't very appealing to the majority of our readers, and maybe I'm wrong, there might be a lot more than I would think. But the reason I've dedicated the past three articles (including this one) to subjects that are themes of Halloween is because of how much I enjoyed them as a child and on to this day (especially with the music and literature that it has included). All too often do I feel that people have poor taste in good horror movies (particularly those in my generation) and most of that is because of the poor quality/script of newer "scary" movies. This is why today I wanted to make sure that if you would enjoy having a horror movie marathon (like I so often do, because I'm a little odd) or maybe just watch a couple during the holiday season, you would have a good guide of the best of the best.

9. Silence of the Lambs (1991)

Next on the list is the 1991 psychological thriller "Silence of the Lambs" starring Jodie Foster and Anthony Hopkins. This film would go on to win the Top 5 Academy Awards including Best Picture, Best Director, Best Adapted Screenplay, Best Actor, and Best Actress. The movie is based off of the novel by Thomas Harris and revolves around a spree of murders connected to a serial killer known as Buffalo Bill. Young FBI trainee Clarice Starling (played by Jodie Foster) is sent to cross-examine a brilliant psychologist and known cannibalistic murderer known as Hannibal Lector. As the story progresses an estranged relationship develops between Starling and Lector which all culminates in the pursuit of the infamous Buffalo Bill.

8. A Nightmare on Elm Street (1984)

Potentially the most recognizable horror movie on the list is none other than "A Nightmare on Elm Street". Coming to the scene in 1984, "A Nightmare on Elm Street" was directed by horror icon Wes Craven (director of "The Last House on the Left", "The Hills Have Eyes", and "The People Under the Stairs"). The film starred Heather Langenkamp as the protagonist Nancy Thompson and Robert Englund as the dream killer Freddy Krueger. The film chronicles the developing nightmares of a group of teenagers in Springfield, Ohio. When the group realizes they are all having nightmares with a similar figure that it has to be more than just coincidence. A mysterious man with terrible burn marks wearing a red and green sweater, a worn out hat, and a glove that seems to be made up of knives is the recurring figure in each character's dreams. As the teens learn more about the man, they gradually learn that he is capable of killing them in their dreams. This movie makes one question whether or not you can say "it's just a dream".

7. Tales From the Crypt (1972)

Not to be confused with the hit series of the late 80s, early 90s, this British horror

classic is an anthology based film consisting of 5 separate stories that are all intertwined. Although this film would be hard to find for someone wanting to watch it, it's occasionally played on TV and can be bought online. Instead of the grim decomposing "crypt keeper" of the recent series, this film focused on the deceiving monk of the English catacombs. Upon touring these catacombs, 5 strangers find themselves separated from the group and under the watch of the strange crypt keeper who consistently assures them they will know their fate "all in good time". The stories collected in this immaculate film are from the notorious EC Comics from the 1950s.

6. Night of the Living Dead (1968)

"Night of the Living Dead" is one of the older films on the list and was directed by the legend and pioneer of the 'zombie' genre, George A. Romero. This movie would lay the foundation for all future zombie movies. Filmed in black and white, the film quality only adds to the horror it evokes in the audience. The movie accounts the mass hysteria associated with a zombie outbreak, touching on social and environmental issues of the time. This landmark film spawned the idea of the "living dead" and the concept of the zombie. The idea of an adversary constantly growing in numbers comparable to a disease epidemic is scary enough, but when you add in the fact that the 'disease' causes the individual to crave human flesh it became something that was unfathomable to audiences of the time. "Night of the Living Dead" was made with only a \$114,000 budget and would gross \$42 million and is now a part of the National Film Registry.

5. Psycho (1960)

This legendary film was directed by "the master of horror" Alfred Hitchcock and is most notably known for the infamous murder scene in the shower of the eerie Bate's Motel. The film stars Anthony Perkins, as Norman Bates and Janet Leigh, as Marion Crane and is based off on the crimes of serial killer Ed Gein. The lead character, played by Janet Leigh, is hiding from her boss after embezzling money from the business. Amidst paranoia of being caught by the law, Marion has little time to acknowledge the eccentricities of the motel owner, as well as his estranged fascination with his mother. When the film begins to seem extremely predictable, watch out for a tremendous twist that will

leave you filled with uneasiness. This is indeed one of the best horror films ever made.

4. The Shining (1980)

What could really be better than a movie based off a Stephen King novel and directed by Stanley Kubrick? I really feel that this film is close to my heart, one of my favorite authors and one of my favorite directors all in one. The only thing that can be said about this magnificent film is that it is absolutely brilliant. The story is about an author (Jack Nicholson) and his family (his wife and son) undertaking care of an isolated hotel in the mountains. Little did the family know that the hotel had a terrible past of murder that still lurks the halls of the seemingly never ending hotel. As the family is left alone in the hotel, the author, Jack Torrance slowly descends into madness via a supernatural presence. It's up to the son, Danny, who has learned he has psychic powers to overcome the hysteria. This movie airs on October 21 at 12:30 PM on AMC.

3. The Texas Chainsaw Massacre (1974)

One of the most disturbing movies on my list is the original (I stress, not the remake) "Texas Chainsaw Massacre" from 1974 directed by Tobe Hooper. This film, much like "Psycho", is based off of the serial killer Ed Gein. The film depicts the systematic murders of a group of friends taking a road trip through Texas. The group encounters a demented cannibalistic family after picking up a questionable hitch-hiker on their way. Upon stopping at an old family farmhouse some of the members of the group stumble onto the dreaded Leatherface. Leatherface could quite possibly be one of the most alarming "slashers" of all time. Dawning a mask of the face's of his victims, this extremely large,

chainsaw wielding monstrosity will certainly leave one at the edge of their seat. Made on a budget of \$140,000, the film grossed over \$30.8 million.

2. The Exorcist (1973)

Considered the most profitable horror film of all time is "The Exorcist". A tale of two priest's attempt to perform an exorcism on a girl that is possessed by a demon. The film depicts a girl by the name of Regan MacNeil and her eventual exorcism. Throughout the movie we not only see conflicts within the situation of the child, but conflicts within the priests as well. For the main priest, Father Damian Karras, this exorcism could be what reassures his dying faith or what leads to his destruction.

1. Halloween (1978)

The single greatest horror movie franchise ever developed, "Halloween". In 1978,

John Carpenter created his masterpiece. Starring actress Jaime Lee Curtis in her debut performance, the film is set in a typical Midwestern town known as Haddonfield. The film begins by following six year old Michael Myers as he proceeds to kill his sister. However, the bulk of the film takes place 15 years after the fact when the now adult Michael Myers escapes the mental institution and comes back to Haddonfield. Curtis' character, Laurie Strode, is the protagonist of the movie and is unfortunate enough to be the subject of Myer's onslaught. "Halloween" is truly a masterpiece and has set the tone for all slasher movies that have followed it. The visuals along with a superb musical score will never cease to satisfy audiences entranced with Halloween. This movie will air October 25th at 8 PM, the 26th at 12:15 AM, and 31st at 8 AM.

Jackets drop close district game to Fairview

Following a win over Lewis County last week, the Jackets fell to Fairview 26-18 in a vital district match-up. Last Friday held the potential for a possible upset and a Bluejacket victory, however two costly turnovers would cause the deficit. Despite the unfortunate turnovers, the Jackets were able to score twice on the offensive side of the ball, as well as once on special teams. The Jackets performance was that of great effort, but at the end of the night it would be Fairview who would prevail.

Nicholas County dropped to 4-4 overall and 0-3 in the district after suffering the

loss. Former district champion Fairview remained undefeated, improving to 8-0 and 3-0 in the district after registering the win.

Nicholas County quarterback Dalton Pope completed half of his pass attempts, finishing the night with 6 out of 12 completions for 91 yards. Caleb Pope had 15 carries for 27 yards and Wes Hopkins would have 4 for 5 yards in a disappointing running performance, however the two would have a touchdown a piece for the night. Jessie Smith, Dalton Pope and Ty Warmouth also rushed for positive yardage against the disciplined Nicholas County defensive unit. Caleb Pope also made a huge impact on special teams for Nicholas County as he returned a kickoff 82 yards for a touchdown. Three different Nicholas County receivers

hauled in passes. The versatile Wes Hopkins grabbed a team-high three catches for 30 yards. Matthew Kelly was the most productive Nicholas County pass-catcher, collecting two catches for 56 yards.

Warmouth punted four times, averaging 32.5 yards per punt. Nicholas County, which had contended for district wins against both Raceland and Lexington Christian earlier in the season, received several stellar individual defensive performances. Wes Hopkins led the Nicholas County defense with 11 tackles and two assists. Caleb Pope followed with nine tackles and two assists. Other key defenders for the Jackets were Devin Johnson (nine tackles, one assist), Nathan Kirby (seven tackles, two assists), Chris Morgan (seven tackles,

two assists), Austin Allison (seven tackles, two assists), AJ Brown (six tackles, two assists), John Lee Allison (six tackles, two assists), Smith (four tackles, one assist), Kelly (three tackles, one assist), Warmouth (three tackles, one assist), Drake Bussell (two tackles, two assists), Finn Brutsman (one tackle) and Toby Howard (one tackle) were other key defenders for the Jackets.

Fairview enjoyed success rushing the football. Gary Felder led Fairview on the ground, rushing 16 times for 172 yards and two touchdowns. Chris Brewer rushed 21 times for 152 yards. Chris Littlejohn and Jared Hutchinson added one rushing touchdown apiece for Fairview, which also owns regular-season wins over West Carter, Bracken County, East Carter, Boyd

County and Lewis County as well as district foes Paris and Raceland. Fairview quarterback Ty Lowe completed 4-of-7 passes for 55 yards in the district contest. Fairview will face Lexington Christian in the district championship game on Friday, Oct. 22. That same night, Nicholas

County will face Paris in another key district game.

The Jackets have regular-season games remaining with Paris and Bracken County. Nicholas County will venture to Paris on Friday, Oct. 22 for a regular-season district finale.
