Community mourns loss of courageous, caring young lady

The community continues mourning the death of a courageous and caring young lady who exemplified the finer qualities in life and whose tender strength continues to inspire everyone she came into contact with.

Chelsea Denise Markland, 18, was a bright and intelligent young student during her time at Nicholas County High School and was a member of the graduating class of 2010. She was a competitive Lady Bluejacket Softball Team player and a dedicated

member of the Bluejacket Cheerleading Squad. Both teams competed on the state level.

Chelsea faced many challenges as many students do during their academic and athletic high school years.

But Miss Markland's greatest challenges came off the campus, particularly during her junior year when she was diagnosed with Ewing's Sarcoma, a rare form of bone cancer that is diagnosed in only 250 children and young teens each year in the nation.

Chelsea finally succumbed to the cancer on Oct. 22, but her spirit and

Mitchell indicted by grand jury on Lesser charges

A Carlisle man accused of the attempted murder of a Bourbon County woman was indicted last week on lesser charges by members of a Nicholas County Grand Jury.

Kentucky State Police Officer Chris Lairson arrested Christopher Mitchell, 37, formerly of Race Street, Carlisle, on August 11, after signing a criminal complaint against him on the charge of attempted murder.

Lairson provided testimony during a preliminary hearing in Nicholas District Court on Sept. 1. At the conclusion of that hearing, Nicholas County District Judge, Honorable Charles Kuster, had the charges against Mitchell bound over to the grand

jury.

Mitchell was charged with several offenses during the execution of two separate warrants in early August. In addition to the charge of attempted murder, Mitchell was also charged with assault, 3rd degree (police officer),

criminal mischief, 2nd degree and escape, 2nd degree.

On Oct. 18 members of the grand jury indicted Mitchell on the charges of wanton endangerment, 1st degree, assault, 3rd degree; criminal attempt to commit escape, 1st de-

gree; assault, 4th degree; terroristic threatening, 3rd degree and criminal mischief, 2nd degree.

Mitchell's charges stemmed from an incident, which occurred in the late night hours of Aug. 1 and early morning hours of Aug. 2, according to Lairson's testimony during the preliminary hearing.

Lairson testified that he was directed to respond by KSP dispatchers to a 911 call and upon arrival of where the call originated from he found Mitchell, unconscious lying in the middle of Scrubgrass Road. Lairson contacted local EMS and Mitchell was transported to the Nicholas County Hospital.

"He was barely conscious," Lairson said of Mitchell's condition upon discovery under cross-ex-

amination by Perdue. "I detected alcohol on his breath. He could barely talk."

Mitchell was treated and released from the hospital, as was Tamara Fischer of Bourbon County.

It was Fischer who Mitchell allegedly assaulted.

Lairson answered questions regarding Mitchell's charges from both County Attorney Dawn Letcher and Public Defender Matthew Perdue.

According to court documents, and Lairson's testimony during the hearing, Fischer and Mitchell had once been dating but had separated. Mitchell had asked Fischer to return some of his items. Fischer returned the items to Mitchell who then asked her to speak with him. Fischer agreed

and they were inside Fischer's truck when Fischer drove to a church parking lot on Catherine Street.

Within moments of the arrival at Catherine Street Fischer told Mitchell that she "needed to go" because she had to get ready to go to work, according to Lairson's testimony. At that time Mitchell allegedly became aggressive, striking Fischer in the face and then choking her.

"She had blood clots in both eyes because she was choked so hard," Lairson testified.

Lairson testified that Fischer was rendered unconscious soon after that and awakened to find that she was being "dragged through a field and heard Mitchell say 'Dear Lord, please forgive me...' I'm

Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky



Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

"On the 16th of July 1776 on my return from retaking my daughter from the Indians, we lay all night on Flat Creek at the mouth of a small branch, a short distance from a cabin on the east side of said branch, where I afterwards entered 955 acres for William Watson, south of the Upper Blue Licks eight or so miles."

Deposition of Daniel Boone, volume 10 CC Draper Manuscripts.

"Two darling sons and a brother have I lost. My footprints have often been marked in blood... And I have often been a companion of the owl."

Daniel Boone to John Filson, as it appears in Filson's book "The Discovery and Settlement of Kentucky," published in 1784.

As I continue my quest to uncover more information regarding Daniel Boone, I am drawn time and time again to Bath County.

I'm currently researching several historic places within Bath County related to the enigmatic figure that has become an American icon.

Boone's camp where he rested after repatriating his daughter and two daughters of Colonel Richard Callaway in July 1776, I believe, is on land later owned by Archibald Hamilton in the early 1820s and is located between Mt. Sterling and Owingsville on Flat

Creek. There is substantial documentation in various historical archives to confirm this.

A certain spring near Sharpsburg known as Fleming's Pond, was said to be another favorite location of Shelltovee, or The Big Slow Turtle, as was his adopted Shawnee name; and the spring is where he found the blood trail of Colonel John Fleming following the Battle of Battle Run. That battle, actually a 15-minute long skirmish, was fought in what would one day become southern Fleming County early in August of 1782. Five men were killed in that obscure conflict, with Fleming being severely wounded.

Boone trailed Fleming and assisted in returning him safely to the

interior settlements before dispatching messages alerting all the settlements of the hostilities.

Those hostilities would culminate in the siege of Bryant's (Bryan's) Station and the Battle of Lower Blue Licks; one week after Boone assisted Colonel Fleming.

Boone often followed the "Atlata-O-Waimee" or Warrior's Trail, which had many intersecting and connecting paths through what is today known as Bath County.

Boone enjoyed his 46th birthday on Oct. 22, 1780, only a few days after burying his brother Edward "Neddy" Boone at Plumb Lick.

I believe he may have been in Bath County on that day; taking one of his frequent solo hunting trips. The famed Bath County historian John Richards placed Boone on the old Judge Ewing farm, more recently owned by H.S.

Goodpaster Sr., about two miles south of present-day Owingsville, at a spring along Slate Creek.

Legend has it that the spring was a favorite of Boone's and one located along a prong of the Warrior's Trail.

A Shawnee musket ball missed Boone by mere inches and scalped a large section of bark from a nearby Beech Tree around the spring. Boone discovered there were two Shawnee warriors searching for him and he lay concealed in the brush until the trajectory from his Kentucky Long rifle was such that

when he fired, the bullet passed through one of the warriors' head and also struck the shoulder of the second warrior, who was found behind the first.

Boone claimed to historians that he was only sure of three Native American warriors he killed in his life.

The account of the Boone incident, involving the two Shawnee warriors, can be found in Richards' "A History of Bath County, Kentucky", which was copyrighted in 1961. Richards dedicated the book to Paul Lewis, former Editor of the Bath County News Outlook.

assuming he thought he killed her," Lairson said. Lairson said that Fischer "played dead" during the time. Members of the grand jury charged that Mitchell "wantonly engaged in conduct which created a substantial danger of death or serious physical injury to Tamara Fischer by choking Ms. Fischer."

Members of the grand jury also indicted Mitchell with assault, 4th degree, charging that Mitchell "caused physical injury to Tamara Fischer by punching Ms. Fischer in the face."

After a short time following the assault, Mitchell allegedly returned Fisher to her vehicle and placed her in the driver's seat. She became conscious and attempted to drive away, but could not see.

Local resident Clayton Kimes, a young man and veteran employee of Kimes and Sons Carpet and Carpentry, happened to be a passenger in a vehicle that came along and noticed Fischer struggling with driving. Kimes communicated briefly with Fischer, noticed the urgency of the situation and then drove her in her vehicle to the police station where she was later taken to the hospital.

"Mr. Kimes' actions helped save Tamara Fischer," Trooper Lairson said following the preliminary hearing.

After pieces of the complex puzzle began to come together, a warrant was issued for Mitchell, whom had been released from the hospital. Mitchell was going to be charged with domestic violence and assault, 4th degree at that

time as the investigation was in the early stages. He was located outside of a dwelling in Nicholas County and taken to the Carlisle Police Station where he received two additional charges of assaulting a police officer and escape.

According to Lairson, Mitchell asked to go to the restroom in the police station and upon his return attempted to escape from the station.

"He ran through the back of the police station and through what he thought was an exit door," Lairson said with a straight face, adding that what Mitchell thought was an exit door was actually a closet door.

In the process of attempting to escape Mitchell had shoved Lairson.

"Did he manage to get outside?" Perdue asked Lairson during the hearing.

"No," Lairson responded.

The charges of assault, 3rd degree and criminal attempt to commit escape, 1st degree, stemmed from the altercation between Mitchell and Trooper Lairson.

Perdue asked several pointed questions of Trooper Lairson during the cross examination aspect of the hearing regarding the 72 hour difference in time between Fischer's initial statements and additional statements that led to the charge of attempted murder.

It was also revealed that during the course of the evening approximately 32 xanax pills prescribed to Fischer became missing from her purse.

Mitchell remains lodged in the Bourbon County Jail where he has remained since his August arrest.

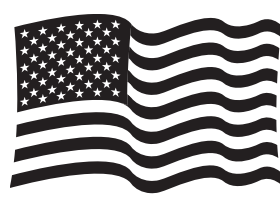

the gift of her friendship and love will always be part of Nicholas County. Some of her many friends commented on the blessings of knowing this remarkable young lady. "When I think about Chelsea I will always think about her gorgeous smile and her big heart," said NCHS Cheerleading Coach Jessica Letcher. "I will think of the courage and determination she had." Letcher knew Chelsea throughout her entire life and recalled when Chelsea first told her of her diagnosis. "She was always a sweet, kind and caring person, and that didn't change," Letcher said. "She always kept me updated on her condition and she loved to cheer. The thing that set Chelsea apart was her attitude. She would always try anything you asked of her and she was never disrespectful. She was always courageous and showed a lot of determination. I think she was one of the most precious gifts this community has ever had."

Chelsea's softball coach Barry Bretz expressed much the same. "Chelsea was a fierce competitor on the field, but had a very sweet demeanor off the field," Bretz said. "You couldn't ask for a better person or a better player to coach. She was what a teammate should be." Bretz has coached many students and said he often hoped that he would be a positive role model for various students, but the role was reversed with Chelsea. "Chelsea's father and I have been very close friends for a long time and I remember when Chelsea was born and I saw her grow into a fine young lady.... I've known her throughout her entire life. I was proud to be her coach and proud to know her. She made a difference in my life.... She meant a lot to all of us and we will miss her." Letcher and Bretz recalled how Chelsea's positive attitude and devotion to her family and friends was inspiring. Her friends agreed. "She was a very strong person," Shelby Brown said. The two became

friends in 7th grade, and the friendship blossomed throughout high school and following graduation. "When the day came that she told us that she was first diagnosed I began crying but she just smiled and told me not too worry that everything would be ok. She tried to live her life as normal as possible. She loved music and she had a very good sense of humor. She loved her family and she would always put her friends over herself. She never put herself in front of anyone. I thought many times her pain was getting bad, but... I just didn't want to believe it. I didn't want to lose her. Mutual friend, Petrea Mitchell, joined Brown Monday in preparing memorial photographs of Chelsea to honor her memory. "When it came to Chelsea and the younger kids, well, you could just tell that she was meant to be a pediatrician. She was very comfortable with children and they were very comfortable

around her," Mitchell said and commented on the strength that so many others noted. "Her family was a big part of her strength and her friends were also a big part, but I think she drew strength from the entire community. She is my hero and is an inspiration to me and she'll always be in my heart. I hope she knows how many people she touched. She never complained about any pain no matter how bad it got. She just smiled. That's how strong she was." Another close friend, one of so many Chelsea had, commented on their friendship. "I've known Chelsea since grade school," classmate Morgan Kelly, a fellow softball player and cheerleader, said. "When she got the news our Junior year, it was devastating. It was the kind of news that rattled a small town because we are all so closely knit. The whole town wept, but then we saw Chelsea and how well she was taking it. This was a girl who was not going to let anything get her down. Through her pain and suffering, she still managed

to make it to many games to support her team. That right there shows how courageous she was. Jackets pummel Paris for district win

Host Paris couldn't enjoy any home field advantage Friday night in a Class A, District 5 matchup versus the visiting Nicholas County Blue Jackets. Visiting Nicholas County secured a two touchdown advantage in the opening quarter and never faltered during the remainder of the regular-season matchup. The Jackets put the game out of reach in the second quarter, eventually defeating Paris 61-28.

With the win, Nicholas County improved to 5-4 overall and 1-3 in the district. Paris dropped to 0-9 overall and 0-4 in the district after suffering the loss.

Nicholas County led 16-0 at the conclusion of the first quarter. The Jackets then exploded in the second quarter, outscoring Paris 31-6 to carry a commanding 47-6 lead into halftime.

Nicholas County gave up three scores in the second half but was never threatened after building the huge lead in the second quarter.

Paris added two touchdowns late, scoring on on a pass and a run via two separate drives in the final quarter.

The Nicholas County offensive unit racked up 436 yards. Caleb Pope led the way for Nicholas County, rushing 16 times for 122 yards and one touchdown.

Pope was even more productive with his pass-catching skills, grabbing

three receptions for 138 yards and one touchdown. He also returned two kicks for 53 yards.

Wes Hopkins and Matthew Kelly also delivered touchdown runs for the Jackets.

Quarterback Charby Pope aired it out on several lengthy passing attempts for the Jackets. Charby Pope completed 5-of-7 passes for 211 yards and two touchdowns.

Caleb Pope opened the scoring for Nicholas County in the first quarter with an 81-yard scoring reception from Charby Pope. Wes Hopkins hauled in a two-point conversion pass from Charby Pope as the Jackets moved out in front of the Greyhounds 8-0.

Hopkins scored on a 1-yard touchdown run and

Caleb Pope tacked on the two-point conversion to push Nicholas County out to a 16-0 lead prior to the end of the first quarter.

The Jackets opened the game up in the second quarter, outscoring Paris 31-6 as part of a brilliant offensive effort.

Paris got on the scoreboard in the second quarter when Marcus Champs hauled in a 45-yard scoring pass from Nate Stevens.

The Jackets continued to control the game in the second half en route to the district victory.

Veteran head coach Robert Hopkins and the Nicholas County coaching staff utilized several players offensively. Seven different Nicholas County players rushed the football against Paris in the

district game.

The Nicholas County passing game was also diverse. Kelly caught one pass for 69 yards. Hopkins added two catches and Allison made one grab for the Jackets.

Nicholas County returned to the win column following a disappointing 18-28 loss to district foe Fairview one week earlier. The Jackets won for the second time in three weeks.

Nicholas County will host Bracken County on Friday night in a regular-season finale. Kickoff for the Nicholas County-Bracken County game is set for 7:30 p.m.

Fatality Statistics

Preliminary statistics* indicate that ten people died in ten separate crashes on Kentucky roadways from Monday, Oct. 18, through Sunday, Oct. 24, 2010. Seven of the crashes involved motor vehicles and six of the victims were not wearing seat belts. Single-fatality crashes occurred in Adair, Breathitt, Hardin,

Jefferson (2), Laurel, and Lincoln counties. The suspected use of alcohol was a factor in the Adair and Lincoln County crashes. One motorcycle involved fatal crash occurred in Shelby County and the victim was wearing a helmet. One pedestrian involved fatal crash occurred in Bell County. One ATV fatal crash occurred in Leslie County and the victim was not wearing a helmet. The suspected use of alcohol is a factor in this crash.

Through Oct. 24, preliminary statistics* indicate that 616 people have lost their lives on Kentucky roadways during 2010. This is 26 less fatalities than reported for the same time period in 2009. There were 475 motor vehicle fatalities and 247 of those victims were not wearing seat belts. Sixty-seven of those crashes involved a commercial motor vehicle. Forty-seven fatal crashes involved a pedestrian and two involved a scooter. Seventy-four crashes involved a motorcycle

and forty-two of those victims were not wearing helmets. Thirteen crashes involved an ATV and eleven victims were not wearing helmets. Five crashes involved a bicycle. A total of 125 fatalities have resulted from crashes involving the suspected use of alcohol. Citizens can contribute to highway safety by reporting erratic drivers to the Kentucky State Police toll-free at 1-800-222-5555. Callers will remain anonymous and should give a description of the

vehicle, location, direction of travel and license number if possible. *These statistics are still preliminary as KSP waits for all local law enforcement agencies throughout the state to

report any crashes and fatalities that may have occurred in their areas. Crash data for this report is generated from the Kentucky Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS).

Nicholas County Sheriff Dick Garrett was called to Jackstown Road Oct. 19 when Kentucky Dept. of Transportation workers found a suspected discarded safe.

The safe was found near the roads and, appeared to have been forced open. The door to the small safe was not recovered.

Although several items still remained in the safe, mostly various pill sample packets, and opened coin roll wrappers, no identifying items have been recovered thus far, although Sheriff Garrett was able to obtain some physical evidence in addition to the safe.

Anyone with any information regarding a missing safe or information regarding strange behavior along Jackstown Road, which may be connected to the recovery of the suspected stolen safe, is urged to contact the Nicholas County Sheriff's Office at 289-3740.

Ag Investment Program Approved

The Kentucky Agricultural Development Board, chaired by Gov. CAIP is designed to provide farmers with incentives to allow them to improve and diversify their current production practices. CAIP combines what were previously known as county model cost-share programs into one, where each model program becomes an investment area.

"Through this on-farm investment program, Nicholas County farm families

have an opportunity to increase net farm income by expanding or modernizing their farm operations," said Rep. Sannie Overly, of Paris.

"These Ag Development Funds are a great benefit to Nicholas County farm families," said Sen. Sen. R.J. Palmer II, of Winchester.

"By providing this program, the fiscal court is giving our farmers the opportunity to diversify or modernize their farm operations."

CAIP covers a wide variety of agricultural enterprises in its 11 investment areas, including commercial production of aquaculture; bees and

honey; equine; forage; fruit; livestock; mushrooms; ornamental horticulture; poultry; rabbits; timber; and vegetables, as well as agritourism business development; commercial kitchen construction or conversion; energy efficiency/production; and on-farm water enhancement.

In just this week alone, I have witnessed and felt so many different emotions as I have watched my dear Diamonte struggle to earn her position into my herd of four. As I have watched the struggle within this herd, I have come to realize that the good Lord has used these creatures to open me up spiritually, as well as, allowing me to recognize and accept who I am as a woman, and to teach me many, many valuable lessons that I may never have learned if he hadn't opened my heart, mind and soul to these special creatures. I pray and thank him every day for even the slightest lesson that he sends my way and I hope that in the end I may have been able to pass along just a little knowledge, spirituality, compassion and desire to my readers to recognize the amazing creatures that we have been graciously blessed with and that it just might help make us to become better people toward our peers and caretakers of our critters.

As I have watched and observed my own horses over the last week, I have had times of laughter, as well as, being close to tears by the way that horses naturally interact with each other. This is just one more way that is stressed to me that they are animals and that they think differently than most of us humans do. I guess I have a hard time thinking this way because I have a way of seeing things the way I want to see them at times. In fact, I believe we all do.

There have been several occasions that I have just wanted to run out in the middle of all of them and say "be nice, let her in, I won't change the way I feel about you or the way I take care of you", but of course, we all know that it wouldn't mean a darn thing to them except maybe re-affirm that I may be just a little crazy. I have wanted to fix it and make everything all right as I see it as being right in my human mind. In fact, I have even gone as far as grabbing my training stick wanting to go out and smack some sense into them, but I also know that this would not teach them a thing except to fear me. I will admit though, most of you will probably laugh and call me crazy but I have gone out and actually took my stand as the "alpha" mare while pointing my finger and telling them "NO", and yes, they actually have responded and respected me. All of them as a matter of fact, even my alpha mare Sweets!

So...As I am sitting here working on this week's article, I am having a hard time trying to

express how amazed and blessed I feel by the number of lessons and experiences my horses have added to my life in the past couple of years. They are constantly teaching and showing me the true meaning of "patience". Believe me, I still have plenty to work on in this area and pray often. They have also shown me that everything is not as it appears sometimes and they have taught me I can't fix everything or everybody nor is it my responsibility and nothing I should carry the guilt of the world on my shoulders over. 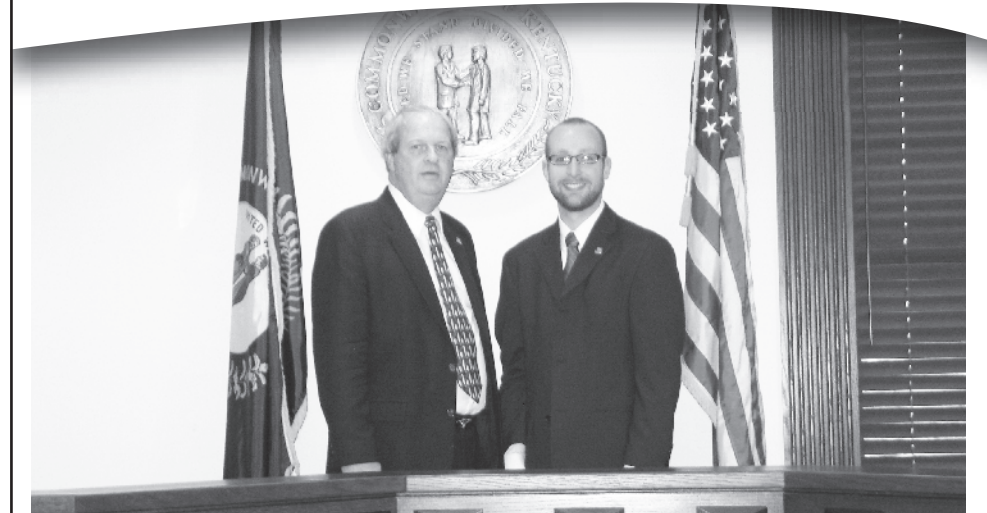

As I have read the last 2 months editions of your newspaper and found very little information among the school news of this population, I felt as if you might need help in getting some details.

This group of students is the Nicholas County High School Marching Band. The Marching Bluejackets consist of 20 musicians and 5 guard members from the 7th-12th grade and are led by Ms. Debbie Hale and Ms. April Hawkins with assistance from other young adults that have been with the program off and on for several years. In July, these students went through 3 grueling weeks of band camp on the pavement in temperatures topping 100 degrees. Since school started, they have practiced anywhere from 15-20 hours of week all the while maintaining good grades. They performed on most Saturdays, sometimes having to be at the school as early as 6 a.m. on Saturday and arriving back at the school after midnight. Don't misun-

derstand this as a parent complaining about the time their child is spending on a hobby, but as a parent who is so proud of these kids and the commitment they have made to their team and their school.

This commitment and hard work is evidenced by the band being rated in the top 5 of the 1A bands in Kentucky for most of the marching band season. This past Saturday, they gave an extraordinary performance in the 1A East Regional at Beechwood earning a distinguished rating and placing 4th in the 1A East Regional among bands that are 3 & 4 times their size. KMEA sizes their bands on school size rather than band size so in sports terms it is like letting the opposing football team play 22-36 players at a time while you are only allowed to have 11 on the field. The band now advances to the State semi-finals at Butler in Louisville next Saturday with hopes of advancing to the state finals at Papa John's Stadium on Saturday evening. Also advancing in 1A is Beechwood who has Carlisle connections with Nicole Moore, the daughter of Bill Moore, a young band member who previously attended Nicholas County Schools along with Chase Boone, the son of Dana and Rock Boone who plays for the Paris High School Band. The Paris marching band show was also written by Nicholas County's own Dr. Alex Wilson.

My main point editor, is please give these students comparable recognition to your other sports teams as they are hard working and dedicated students who will be representing our school and our community at the state level this coming weekend. A few of our band alumni have also gone on to play for Division I schools, such as 2009 graduate, Daniel Broderick, who plays in the University of Kentucky marching band and is such a great role model for our kids and a classy representative for our community.

To the community, thanks to those of you who continue to support us through our fundraisers and donations. 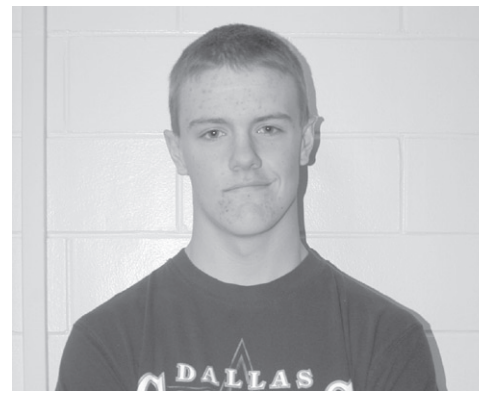

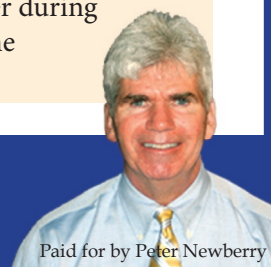

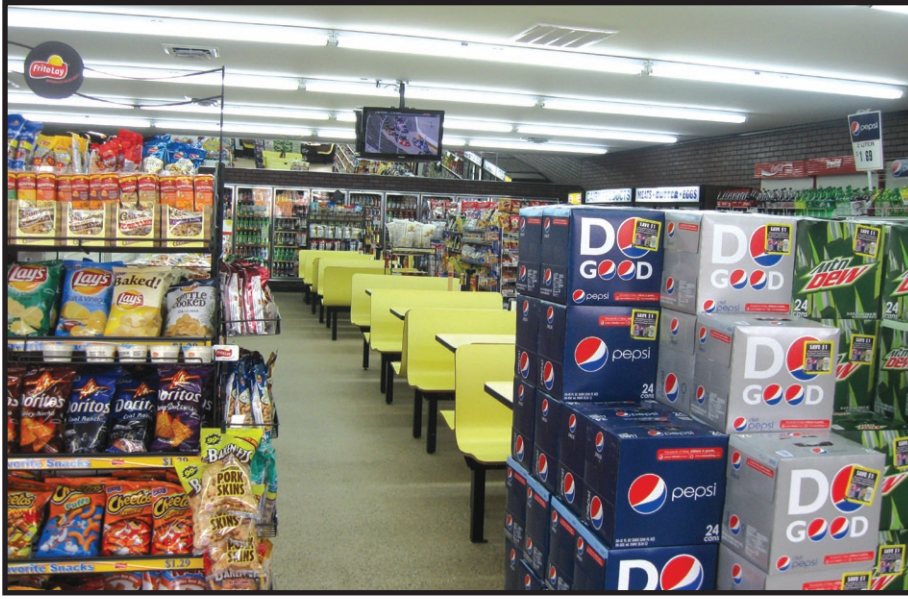

A few common sense tips will make Halloween a safer and happier occasion

Fall is in full swing making Halloween the perfect time for children and adults to enjoy a festive celebration. With the change of the season producing cool, crisp evenings and a rainbow of colorful leaves, autumn provides an ideal setting for good old-fashioned fun and merry-making. Fall just lends itself to spending time with the children in your life.

What better way to spend an evening with children or grandchildren than carving a pumpkin or decorating the house and yard with scarecrows and Jack-o-lanterns? It is a great way to make memories that will last them and you a lifetime, but it is also a chance to talk to them and strengthen the family bond. Talks could range from what's happening to school to what is going on with friends and may encompass any concerns or topics that your children want to discuss. Opening the line of communication gives you more insight into their lives, allows you to get closer to them and gives you an opportunity to understand their fears and anxieties – as well as some of the things that get them excited.

And, speaking of getting excited, Halloween costumes, parties and trick-or-treating always gets children and young adults enthusiastic. Halloween is a magical time for them and by following a few tips and using a little common sense, we can help to make the most out of the Halloween season.

Costumes are a good place to start. Costumes should be fireproof and have eyeholes large enough for good peripheral vision. Jack-o-lanterns with candles on the porch should be placed out of the way enough not to be a danger to children in costumes. Costume props -- such as a scythe, butcher knife or pitchfork -- should have smooth, flexible tips so not to cause injury if there is a fall.

Dressing up and trick-or-treating is a treasured part of childhood. To keep the evening's fun meter on high, the Center for Disease Control and other health and safety groups advise:

- Allowing children to go out during daylight hours only, unless accompanied by a responsible adult.
- Never allowing small children to go out alone on Halloween. Make sure an older sibling or adult is with them.
- Planning a safe route and know where your older children are at all times. Set a time for their return home.
- Instructing them not to cut through back alleys and fields and to stay in well-lighted, populated areas. Warn them not to go off the beaten track.
- Telling them to stop only at familiar houses in your own neighborhood unless you or another responsible adult is with them.
- Instructing them not to eat any treats until they bring them home to be examined.
- Instructing them not to go into the home of a stranger or get into anyone's car.
- Making sure the trick-or-treaters carry a flashlight, glow stick or has reflective tape on their costumes so they are more visible to cars.
- Letting them know that they should stay together as a group if they go trick-or-treating without an adult.

It is always better if an adult accompanies children and it is safer for them to trick-or-treat at locally sponsored events at businesses, churches, schools or festivals. We all have happy memories of Halloween and our children – and grandchildren – can have those too if we follow a few simple guidelines.

Firefighters look for rain during record-breaking month of fires

Nicholas Firefighters have battled 20 blazes in almost as many days and dry conditions last week swept a 35-acre fire through western Fleming County that Nicholas County volunteer firefighters helped stop in its tracks until an additional 20 Forestry Service firefighters

ers helped clear the scene. "We had cooperation with 68 local volunteer firefighters, including several with the Nicholas County Fire Department arriving to assist us at the scene," Fleming County Emergency Management Director and Ewing Volunteer Fire Department Chief, Dwayne Price said. Price said the fire started at approxi-

mately 1:30 Saturday afternoon in a remote section of extreme western Fleming County on land between US 68 and Mt. Tabor Road. Much of the land destroyed by fire was on state owned park property, according to Price and others. "We've had more fires this month than any other month I can ever remember," Nicholas County Volunteer

Department Fire Chief Mark Hughes said the day after the Fleming forest fire. "We've had approximately 20 fires this month so far." Hughes and 12 firefighters from Nicholas, joined area firefighters from Ewing, Flemingsburg, Tilton and Mayslick, who battled the Fleming blaze for several hours until relieved by 20 fresh firefighters from the US Forestry Service.

Hughes and three other Nicholas Firefighters were actually in training at Maysville Community College when their assistance was needed. It is becoming an almost daily routine for the dedicated members of the Nicholas County Fire Department who have had many sleepless nights due to the dry conditions a regional drought has inflicted.

"We just want everyone to use extreme caution due to the dry conditions," Hughes said over the weekend as the "no burn ban" remained in place for Nicholas, Fleming and several surrounding counties. "Nicholas County is fortunate to have such a good group of dedicated volunteers, who have dedicated themselves to protecting life and property."



Program focuses on positive change

Members of the Nicholas County Agency for Substance Abuse (ASAP) Board will present a powerful program to Nicholas County students from grades 6-12 on Nov. 4 and members of the community are encouraged to attend as well. The Nicholas County FRYSC will be hosting the program.

The subject of the program is how positive change in the way students treat one another can have a profound effect upon them and can literally change make a better world. The educational program is called Rachel's Challenge and is based on the detailed positive influences individuals such as Rachel Joy Scott had upon others. Rachel Joy Scott was the first person killed during the horrific shooting at Columbine High School, in Littleton Colorado,

on April 20, 1999. Eric David Harris, 19, and Dylan Bennett Klebold, 18, killed 15 people, including themselves, and injured 24 others, in the shooting that day. Rachel knew Dylan Klebold since kindergarten and both were members of Columbine's theater production club. Rachel Scott was shot while eating lunch with a friend, Richard Castaldo, on the lawn outside of the school's library. She was killed by multiple gunshot wounds to the head, chest, arm, and leg. Afterwards, her

car was turned into an impromptu flower-bedecked memorial in the school's parking lot by grieving students. Castaldo was wounded by multiple shots, but survived. At the time of her death, the 17-year old Scott was an aspiring writer and actress, having had the leading role in a student-written play. Rachel's mother described her as "a devout Christian," and a youth group leader at Orchard Road Christian Center Church, located near Littleton. Rachel left behind six dia-

ries and several essays about her belief in God and how she wanted to change the world through small acts of kindness. Shortly before her death, she wrote an essay for school stating, "I have this theory that if one person can go out of their way to show compassion then it will start a chain reaction of the same."

The program will be presented to 6-7-8 grade students at 8:30 a.m., Nov. 4 and will be held at 10 a.m., for high school students afterward. Parents are encouraged to attend both programs and are also asked to join others in the community for an evening program also held in the gymnasium at 7 p.m., that evening.
