Attempted murder hearing for Mitchell this week

A Carlisle man accused of attempted murder has a preliminary hearing in Nicholas District Court Sept. 1.

Kentucky State Police Officer Chris Lairson Christopher arrested Mitchell, 37, of Race Carlisle, Street, on August 11, after signing a criminal complaint against him on the charge of attempted murder.

Mitchell remains in the Bourbon County Detention Center on \$150,000 cash bond.

Court documents indicate that Gray, who is employed, sold the I-phone to his brother after allegedly stealing it from the injured high school student.

The War in Afghanistan began on October 7, 2001, as the US military's Enduring Operation Freedom (OEF) that was launched, along with the British military, in response to the September 11, 2001 attacks on the US The Iraq War (also known as the Occupation of Iraq, the Second Gulf War, and Operation Iraqi Freedom) was a military campaign that began on March 20, 2003, with the invasion of Iraq by a multinational force led by troops from the United States and the United Kingdom. The last combat brigade left Iraq on August 19, 2011 with approximately 50,000 U.S. troops still remaining in an "advise and assist" capacity. They are scheduled to leave by August 31, 2011, ahead of their required departure of December 31, 2011. number The of American military prsonnel killed thus far in both theaters of war is 5,633, according to US Central Command. As of May 28, 2010 4,404 there were



American military personnel killed and 31,827 wounded in action, (WIA) from the Iraq War alone.

According to The Pentagon, as of early May 2010 an additional 1,060 American military personnel were killed in Afghanistan with an additional 5, 831 being wounded.

The dates of the releases is the reason for the mathematical discrepancies on the total number of American military personnel killed.

Seal Collin Navy Thomas, 33, of Morehead, who was assigned to an East Coast-based SEAL team; died Aug. 18 during a combat operation in eastern Afghanistan The next day, Army Specialist, Ranger Wright. Christopher 23, of Tollesboro, who was assigned to 1st Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment was killed as a result of wounds sustained during a firefight in Afghanistan.

Defense and special teams help Nicholas County to win over Fleming

BlueJackets start 2-0 for first time since 2002 By Brad Laux

A 40-yard Matthew Kelly touchdown run off a fake punt and a pair of interceptions in the final two and a half minutes of Friday's road game gave the Nicholas County football team a 28-20 victory over rival Fleming County and its first 2-0 start to a season since 2002.

It also marked the Bluejackets' first win over the Panthers since 1999. In each meeting since that game, Fleming County had claimed a double-digit victory.

"This was a big win. On paper we were not supposed to beat them. They're a 3A school (and we are a 1A school)," Nicholas County coach Robert Hopkins said. "Our defense stepped up and played well tonight. The kids stepped up and made plays when they had to. The kids wanted this win."

Nicholas County (2-0) began the game with a pair of first-quarter touchdowns. The first came when Jessie Smith took a double handoff reverse and scampered 41 yards for the score with 3:58 left in the opening quarter. However, Jim Lantz blocked Austin Allison's point-after attempt.

Nicholas County got the ball right back after A.J. Brown picked up his first of two fumble recoveries on the day. Two plays later Caleb Pope ran through the middle of the Panther defense for a 75-yard touchdown. Smith ran in the 2-point conversion to give the visitors a 14-0 lead with 2:13 to play in the opening period.

Fleming County (0-1) turned the tables on the Bluejackets in the second quarter. Landon Maxey got the Panthers on the board with an 80-yard punt return with 8:57 remaining in the half. Eerik Mikelsoo added the extra point to cut the deficit in half.

Caleb Pope led the way with 22 carries for 157 yards. Smith contributed eight rushes for 50 yards and Kelly added three carries for 43 yards. In total the BlueJackets ran the ball 48 times for 242 yards. Charby Pope completed 3-of-9 passes for 19 yards.

Nicholas County's defense also came up big, forcing five turnovers, collecting four sacks and 12 tackles for a loss, as well as breaking up two passes.

"I think everyone stepped up," Hopkins said. "The key to the win was our player's determination. They just did what they needed to do to get the win."

Fans on both sides of the field recognized several rather obvious blown calls by the stripped shirts that were costly to the Bluejackets. One blatant bad call occurred directly in front of the Nicholas County bench when a Bluejacket punt bounced off of a Fleming receiver and Lineman Austin Allison pounced on the ball to the roar of the Bluejacket crowd. The crowd was stunned into silence in the next few seconds when the refs said no Panther had touched the ball.

Coach Hopkins confronted the referee who was standing within five feet of the play.

"They didn't touch it," the ref said.

"Well how did the ball just happen to bounce in a different direction toward the sideline?" Hopkins asked in stunned disbelief, but the ref said nothing more. Instead of wallowing in defeated self-pity as a less mature team might have done, the Bluejackets instead stepped up their defense and played with the intensity that win-

What is a Hernia and how do you treat it?



A hernia, or "rupture" is a weakness or defect in the wall of the abdomen. This weakness may be present at birth, or, it can be caused by the wear and tear of daily living. If left untreated, a hernia can get worse with time and physical stress.

A weak area in the abdominal wall allows the contents of the abdomen to push outward. This often causes a noticeable bulge under the skin. The bulge may get bigger when you stand and go away when you lie down. You may also feel pressure or discomfort when lifting, coughing, urinating, or doing other activities.

Types of Hernias - The type of hernia you have depends on its location. Most hernias form in the groin at or near the internal ring. This is the entrance to a canal between the abdomen and groin. Hernias can also occur in the abdomen, thigh, or genitals.

An incisional hernia occurs at the site of a previous surgical incision. An Umbilical hernia occurs at the naval.

An *indirect inguinal hernia* occurs in the groin at the internal ring. A *direct inguinal hernia* occurs in the groin near the internal ring. A *femoral hernia* occurs just below the groin. An *epigastric hernia* occurs in the upper abdomen at the midline.

A hernia will not heal on its own. Surgery is needed to repair the defect in the abdominal wall. If not treated, a hernia can get larger. It can also lead to serious medical complications. The good news is that hernia surgery can be done quickly and safely. In most cases, you can go home the same day as your surgery.
