## Attempted murder hearing for Mitchell this week

A Carlisle man accused of attempted murder has a preliminary hearing in Nicholas District Court Sept. 1.

Kentucky State Police Officer Chris Lairson arrested Christopher Mitchell, 37, of Race Street, Carlisle, on August 11, after signing a criminal complaint against him on the charge of attempted murder.

Mitchell remains in the Bourbon County Detention Center on \$150,000 cash bond.

During Mitchell's Aug. 18 appearance, for his arraignmen, in Nicholas District Court, Nicholas District Judge, Honorable Charles Kuster appointed Public Defender Matthew Purdue to represent Mitchell as his legal counsel.

KSP Trooper Lairson is expected to testify Sept. 1 during the hearing and will answer questions related to the case from Dawn Letcher, the County

Attorney of Nicholas County and Perdue.

Mitchell had been previously arrested on Aug. 2, according to court documents and police sources, after an alleged domestic dispute.

Mitchell attempted to escape after being taken into custody, and was charged with assault, 3rd degree-police/probation officer; escape, 2nd degree and criminal mischief, 2nd degree.

According to the arrest warrant filled out by Trooper Lairson, Mitchell and Tamara Fischer were seated in Fischer's truck after Fischer had drove herself and Mitchell to "the church parking lot on Catherine Street" at approximately 11:36 p.m., on Aug. 1. According to the arrest citation, Mitchell allegedly became "aggressive toward victim (Fischer). Mitchell then allegedly struck Fischer in the face, causing serious visible injury to her right orbital area, causing a severe orbital hemorrhage, according to the court documents.

Mitchell then allegedly "proceeded to choke the victim with great force" until she lost consciousness and control of her bodily functions. When she awoke Mitchell was allegedly dragging her across a field in the dark.

"Dear Lord, please forgive me," Mitchell allegedly stated as he dragged Fischer, according to court documents.

Fischer escaped some time immediately after this with the "assistance from passers by," according to the warrant.

Sgt. Darrell Layne, and his K-9 unit Hancock, of the Carlisle Police Department, assisted Trooper Lairson and Trooper David Holland with the initial arrest of Mitchell, according to police sources.

Letcher said she continues to seek all the information related to the case and believes from the information to date that Mitchell "attempted to cause the death of another person (Fischer), according to court documents.

## Football phone thief arrested

A Fleming County man has been charged with theft after allegedly stealing an I-phone from an injured Nicholas County Football player during a recent football game at the Nicholas County School's campus.

School Resource Officer Ron Allison charged Matthew Corey Gray, 22, of Ewing Road, Ewing, with theft by unlawful taking less than \$500, on Aug. 30.

Gray allegedly took the phone on Aug. 20, after going into the Nicholas County gymnasium, following the injury of a Nicholas County football player. Gray allegedly took the I-phone from the injured player's personal belongings while the young man was suffering from excruciating pain.

The theft occurred during the Nicholas County

home game against Bath County.

"He confessed," Allison said after Gray was identified in school surveillance video, according to both Allison and Nicholas County High School Principal Marty Feltner. "He won't ever be allowed back on the Nicholas County School campus."

Amazingly, police sources say that Gray actually "helped carry" the injured player into the gymnasium, before allegedly removing the I-phone from the player's own personal gym bag. Court documents indicate that Gray, who is employed, sold the I-phone to his brother after allegedly stealing it from the injured high school student.

Feltner sounded distressed over the senseless crime when he spoke about it to The Mercury Monday afternoon, just as the school day ended.

"We're simply not going to put up with anything

like this," Feltner said. "Our school campus is for the education of our students and for the positive use of our community."

Feltner said he was "very proud" of the high school building and new facilities and continuing expansion, the staff and students, and was particularly disturbed that anyone was capable of stealing from a student, an injured student at that.

"The video tape was incriminating," Feltner said.

Feltner praised the efforts of Allison, who said he worked closely with Carlisle Police Officer Mark Snedegar, during the investigation.

Gray posted \$1,000 cash bond to prevent going to Bourbon County Jail and is scheduled to be arraigned in Nicholas County District Court on Sept. 8.

All persons are innocent until pleading guilty or being proven guilty.

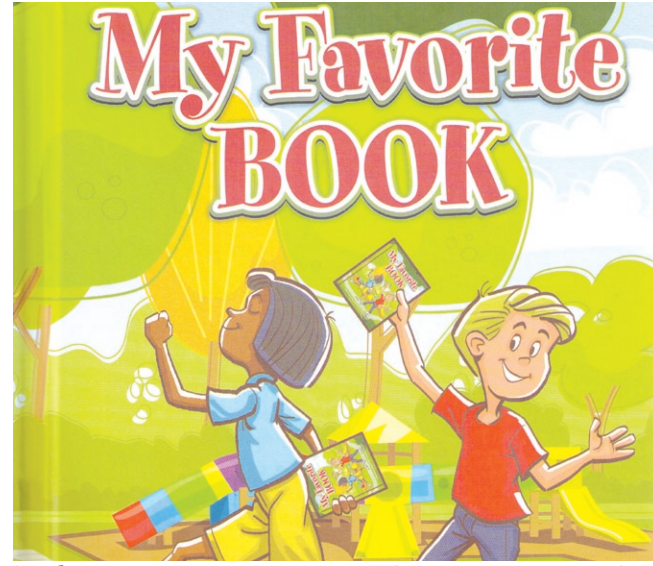
## Young readers learn character thanks to community sponsors

The War in Afghanistan began on October 7, 2001, as the US military's Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF) that was launched, along with the British military, in response to the September 11, 2001 attacks on the US.

The Iraq War (also known as the Occupation of Iraq, the Second Gulf War, and Operation Iraqi Freedom) was a military campaign that began on March 20, 2003, with the invasion of Iraq by a multinational force led by troops from the United States and the United Kingdom. The last combat brigade left Iraq on August 19, 2011 with approximately 50,000 U.S. troops still remaining in an "advise and assist" capacity. They are scheduled to leave by August 31, 2011, ahead of their required departure of December 31, 2011.

The number of American military personnel killed thus far in both theaters of war is 5,633, according to US Central Command. As of May 28, 2010 there were 4,404

American military personnel killed and 31,827 wounded in action, (WIA) from the Iraq War alone.

According to The Pentagon, as of early May 2010 an additional 1,060 American military personnel were killed in Afghanistan with an additional 5,831 being wounded.

The dates of the releases is the reason for the mathematical discrepancies on the total number of American military personnel killed.

Navy Seal Collin Thomas, 33, of Morehead, who was assigned to an East Coast-based SEAL team; died Aug. 18 during a combat operation in eastern Afghanistan

The next day, Army Specialist, Ranger Christopher Wright, 23, of Tollesboro, who was assigned to 1st Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment was killed as a result of wounds sustained during a fire-fight in Afghanistan.

How long will these awful, awful wars go on, dear reader?

"He was a great man and he was a great Ranger. He knew every aspect of his job and we absolutely trusted him with our lives."

Two fine, young, local men who served their country and both were highly trained members of elite military

units. They were the best of the best.

And now they are gone.

It's easy to be an arm-chair general. Easy to offer an opinion without the full and complete complex understanding of the geopolitical aspects of the conflicts our country is now engaged in, but I know that everyone I have spoken to has said much the same thing.

"Those people over there have been fighting amongst themselves for thousands of years and they will be doing the same for many years in the future after American forces leave."

I believe we should simply declare victory and move our ground troops out of harms way in both Iraq and Afghanistan.

Maybe I'm just a simple-minded hillbilly who doesn't like to stray far from this section of Kentucky, but I too was a soldier once and young.

And I know what I know, and I've seen what I've seen.

And I can say with all the lies that have been thrust down the throats of all Americans starting with the "weapons of mass destruction" fiasco, that I believe the first casualty of every war is always the truth.

With recent reports of over \$5 billion of American tax payer money being wasted on rebuilding projects in Iraq alone, (wasted as in the sum was paid and there was no rebuilding done by Iraqi contractors), I can't help but think that we are investing our tax money far, far from home when it could be better invested in America, but you can ask hurricane Katrina victims their opinion on that one if you don't like mine.

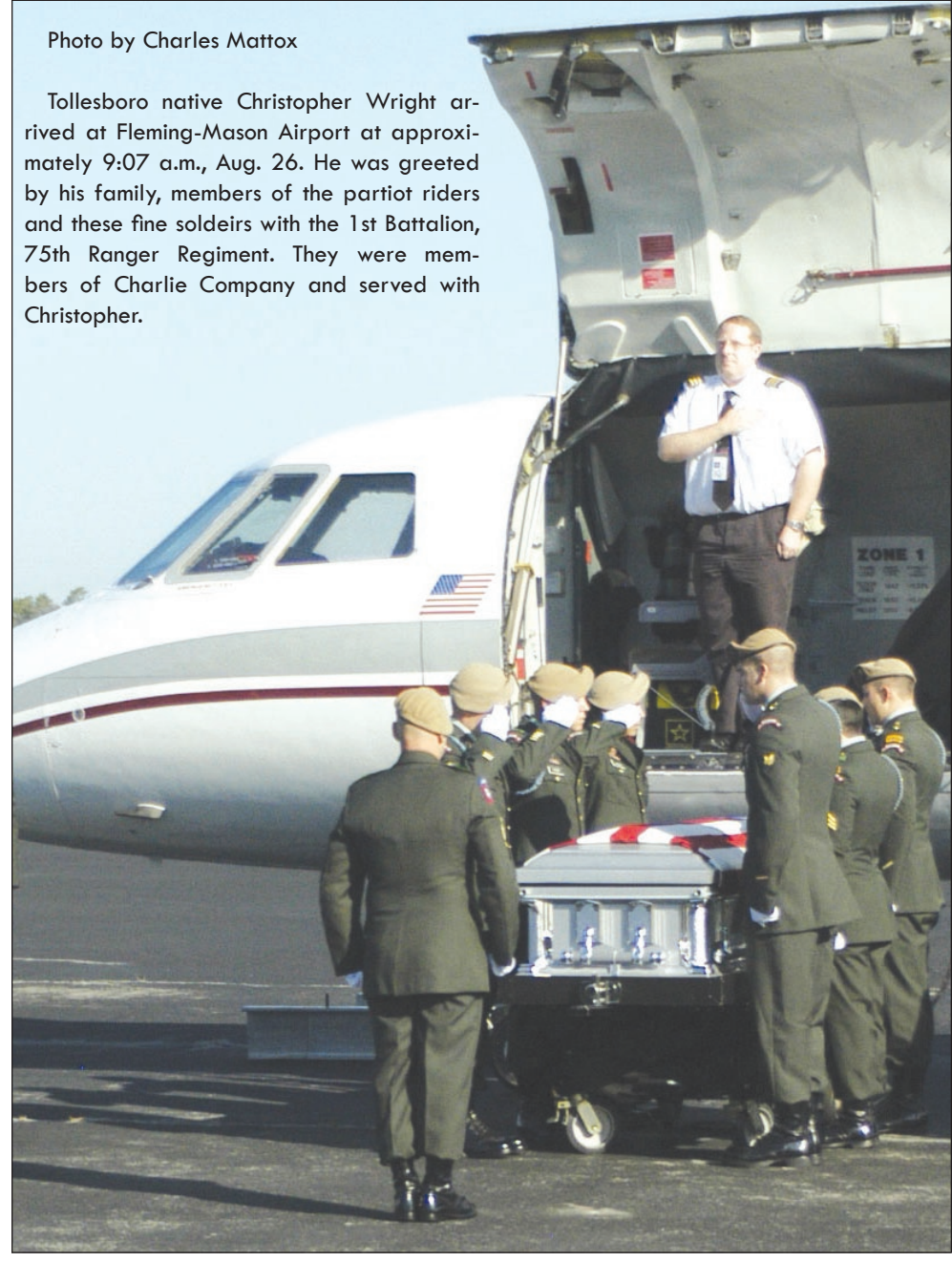
money to members of a corrupt military industrial complex that has defiled our very philosophy of freedom.

## Defense and special teams help Nicholas County to win over Fleming

**BlueJackets start 2-0 for first time since 2002**

A 40-yard Matthew Kelly touchdown run off a fake punt and a pair of interceptions in the final two and a half minutes of Friday's road game gave the Nicholas County football team a 28-20 victory over rival Fleming County and its first 2-0 start to a season since 2002.

It also marked the Bluejackets' first win over the Panthers since 1999. In each meeting since that game, Fleming County had claimed a double-digit victory.

"This was a big win. On paper we were not supposed to beat them. They're a 3A school (and we are a 1A school)," Nicholas County coach Robert Hopkins said. "Our defense stepped up and played well tonight. The kids stepped up and made plays when they had to. The kids wanted this win."

Nicholas County (2-0) began the game with a pair of first-quarter touchdowns. The first came when Jessie Smith took a double handoff reverse and scampered 41 yards for the score with 3:58 left in the opening quarter. However, Jim Lantz blocked Austin Allison's point-after attempt.

Nicholas County got the ball right back after A.J. Brown picked up his first of two fumble recoveries on the day. Two plays later Caleb Pope ran through the middle of the Panther defense for a 75-yard touchdown. Smith ran in the 2-point conversion to give the visitors a 14-0 lead with 2:13 to play in the opening period.

Fleming County (0-1) turned the tables on the Bluejackets in the second quarter. Landon Maxey got the Panthers on the board with an 80-yard punt return with 8:57 remaining in the half. Eerik Mikelsoo added the extra point to cut the deficit in half.

Just 20 seconds after their score, the Panthers were back in the end zone. After Nicholas County turnover on the next play, Panther running back Chip Clark scampered 15 yards for a touchdown. Mikelsoo's extra point tied the score at 14-14.

Both teams tacked on a touchdown in the third period. Caleb Pope returned the lead to Nicholas County on a 53-yard run down the right sideline with 10:15 to play

in the quarter. However, the Bluejackets' 2-point conversion pass attempt fell incomplete.

The Panthers got the equalizer with 1:33 left in the period after Chris Jones forced a fumble from the Bluejacket ball carrier and Clark scooped it up and ran it in for a 35-yard touchdown. Devin Johnson blocked the extra-point attempt to keep the score tied at 20-20.

In the fourth quarter, both teams were able to move the ball, but neither could manage to get on the board.

That is until Nicholas County lined up for a punt on the Fleming County 40-yard line. Kelly took the direct snap and avoided a handful of tackles as he ran to his right before cutting back to the middle of the field and crossed the goal line with 2:27 to play.

"The play is called gut right and I line up behind the left guard," Kelly said. "I stepped in front of the center and he hiked it to me. Coach told me that this play would come into use when we needed it and it came into play for

me when we needed it." The play was a brainchild of Coach Greg Letcher.

"That was a great call from Coach Letcher," Head Coach Robert Hopkins said of the winning play. "We'd been practicing that and Coach Letcher thought the time was right to run it."

However, Kelly threw the ball into the air as he crossed into the end zone and the premature celebration nearly wiped out the touchdown and drew a personal foul penalty. "The goal line was closer than I thought and when I saw the flag, my heart sank," Kelly added. "It was kind of a sigh of relief (when I learned the touchdown would stand)."

Because of the penalty, Fleming County regained the ball with good field position, but Smith intercepted the ball in the end zone with 1:07 left in the game.

Nicholas County tried to run out the clock, but the Panthers were able to get the ball back at their 34-yard line after a short punt. However, on the next play

Ty Warmouth intercepted a pass with 25.2 seconds left to secure the Bluejacket victory. Nicholas County used its powerful ground game to generate nearly its entire offensive yardage. Caleb Pope led the way with 22 carries for 157 yards. Smith contributed eight rushes for 50 yards and Kelly added three carries for 43 yards. In total the BlueJackets ran the ball 48 times for 242 yards. Charby Pope completed 3-of-9 passes for 19 yards.

Nicholas County's defense also came up big, forcing five turnovers, collecting four sacks and 12 tackles for a loss, as well as breaking up two passes.

"I think everyone stepped up," Hopkins said. "The key to the win was our player's determination. They just did what they needed to do to get the win."

Fans on both sides of the field recognized several rather obvious blown calls by the stripped shirts that were costly to the Bluejackets. One blatant bad call occurred directly in front of the Nicholas County bench when a Bluejacket punt bounced off of a Fleming receiver and Lineman Austin Allison pounced on the ball to the roar of the Bluejacket crowd. The crowd was stunned into silence in the next few seconds when the refs said no Panther had touched the ball.

Coach Hopkins confronted the referee who was standing within five feet of the play.

"They didn't touch it," the ref said.

"Well how did the ball just happen to bounce in a different direction toward the sideline?" Hopkins asked in stunned disbelief, but the ref said nothing more. Instead of wallowing in defeated self-pity as a less mature team might have done, the Bluejackets instead stepped up their defense and played with the intensity that winning teams do.

The Bluejackets will now turn their focus to West Carter.

"We have a very hard challenge this week versus West Carter," Hopkins commented. "We have been playing them since the 90s and this is by far their best team. They're very explosive on offense and swarm to the ball on defense. It's a big chal-

enge but I think the kids will step up to the challenge."

Kickoff for the Nicholas County-West Carter game is set for 7:30 p.m. in Carlisle.

Junior lineman Cody Livingood twisted an ankle and senior lineman Nathan Kirby suffered a shoulder in-

jury versus the Panthers but Coach Hopkins thought both players might be healed by kickoff.

## Kentucky Nearing 1 million on Organ Donor Registry

Over 105,000 men, women and children in the U.S. are on the waiting list for a life-saving transplant. Right now, more than 740 Kentuckians are in need of this gift of life.

In 2009, 286 successful organ transplants were performed in Kentucky. It is estimated that twice as many could have been performed if more people said YES to donation.

Kentucky is taking great strides in lowering the number of people

waiting. Due to the efforts of the Kentucky Circuit Court Clerks, more than 916,000 Kentuckians have placed their name on the Kentucky Organ Donor Registry. The Clerks are vital to building the donor registry because they ask each person obtaining their license or ID card if they would like to place their name on Kentucky's Organ Donor Registry.

"Along with the Circuit Court Clerks all over the Commonwealth, I am committed to this mission

of saving lives," declares Nicholas County Circuit Clerk, Sandye Watkins.

Kentucky's Organ Donor Registry began in May 2007. "Kentucky's registry is still fairly new in comparison to other states. Kentucky is an incredibly giving community, and I know we will reach 1 million," explains Trust For Life, Executive Director, Shelley Heavrin.

"Reaching 1 million names on the registry will give hope to the hundreds

of patients, and their families, in Kentucky awaiting a transplant," says Ms. Watkins.

"It is very rare that someone will die in a way that they can become an organ donor and save someone's life. Therefore, it is essential that we have as many names on the organ donor registry as possible," explains Heavrin. Any adult Kentucky resident can sign up on Kentucky's Organ Donor Registry at their Circuit Court Clerks' office or online [www.trustforlife.org](http://www.trustforlife.org).

# History of Nicholas County

A historic pioneer meeting house once stood on the Taylors Creek Rd. two and one-half miles south-east of Carlisle. Its origin dates back to 1793 when Kentucky had recently become a new state and pioneer families everywhere were struggling to open the wilderness to settlement. A group of Presbyterians build the first structure on

the site, a log church typical of the pioneer era.

Its first pastor was Robert Finley. He was there from 1793 to 1795. He was followed by James Welch, John F. Campbell, Isaac Tull, Samuel Rankins, Robert Marshall and Samuel Shannon. In July, 1801, a five day and night "protracted meeting" was held

at Old Concord and many person united with the church, Barton W. Stone, a noted Presbyterian divine, preached here and also at Cane Ridge in Bourbon County. 123 years later after the church was built, a fierce windstorm destroyed the frame church. Being in bad repair, it didn't take much to cave the old house timbers in.

# ASK the DR?

A general surgeon is a specialist prepared to manage a broad spectrum of surgical conditions affecting almost any area of the body. The surgeon establishes the diagnosis and provides the preoperative, operative and post-operative care to surgical patients and is usually responsible for the comprehensive management of the trauma victim and the critically ill.

**Q:** What is a Hernia and how do you treat it?

**A:** A hernia, or "rupture" is a weakness or defect in the wall of the abdomen. This weakness may be present at birth, or, it can be caused by the wear and tear of daily living. If left untreated, a hernia can get worse with time and physical stress.

A weak area in the abdominal wall allows the contents of the abdomen to push outward. This often causes a noticeable bulge under the skin. The bulge may get bigger when you stand and go away when you lie down. You may also feel pressure or discomfort when lifting, coughing, urinating, or doing other activities.

**Types of Hernias** - The type of hernia you have depends on its location. Most hernias form in the groin at or near the internal ring. This is the entrance to a canal between the abdomen and groin. Hernias can also occur in the abdomen, thigh, or genitals.

- An **incisional hernia** occurs at the site of a previous surgical incision.
- An **umbilical hernia** occurs at the naval.
- An **indirect inguinal hernia** occurs in the groin at the internal ring.
- A **direct inguinal hernia** occurs in the groin near the internal ring.
- A **femoral hernia** occurs just below the groin.
- An **epigastric hernia** occurs in the upper abdomen at the midline.

A hernia will not heal on its own. Surgery is needed to repair the defect in the abdominal wall. If not treated, a hernia can get larger. It can also lead to serious medical complications. The good news is that hernia surgery can be done quickly and safely. In most cases, you can go home the same day as your surgery.

WNV can cause inflammation of the brain and spinal cord, fever, in-coordination, stumbling, hind limb weakness, depression, anorexia, inability to rise, muscle tremors, teeth grinding, inability to swallow, signs of colic, head pressing, lower lip paralysis, wandering, excessive sweating, behavioral changes, convulsions and in some cases, coma. So...I guess my point is this, do the right thing and get the necessary recommended vaccinations for your horses because the alternative is unfair to your equine friends and could be deadly.

# KSP Road Fatality Report

Preliminary statistics\* indicate that thirteen people died in thirteen separate crashes on Kentucky roadways from Monday, August 23, through Sunday, August 29, 2010. Seven of the crashes involved motor vehicles and five of the victims were not wearing seat belts. Single-fatality crashes occurred in Bath, Boone, Harlan, Jefferson, Livingston, Pulaski, and Shelby counties. Five pedestrian involved fatal crashes occurred in Carroll, Floyd, Hardin, Jefferson and Wolfe counties. The suspected use of alcohol was a factor in the Carroll county crash. One motorcycle fatal crash occurred in Boone County and the victim was wearing a helmet. Citizens can contribute to highway safety by reporting erratic drivers to the Kentucky State Police toll-free at 1-800-222-5555. Callers will remain anonymous and should give a description of the vehicle, location, direction of travel and license number if possible. \*These statistics are still preliminary as KSP waits for all local law enforcement agencies throughout the state to report any crashes and fatalities that may have occurred in their areas. Crash data for this report is generated from the Kentucky Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS).



The number of women diagnosed with ovarian cancer in its early stages is so small that the survival rates continue to be low. About 22,000 American women will be diagnosed with ovarian cancer in 2010, and about 15,000 women will die from the disease. Most women are diagnosed in the later stages of the disease when prognosis is poor and survival rates can be as low as 29%. The five year survival rate is over 90% if the cancer is diagnosed and treated early, but the signs are vague and often described

as "whispering". Low awareness of the symptoms often leaves women undiagnosed or misdiagnosed.

The risks are highest for women of any age with a personal family history of colon, breast or ovarian cancer and who have never been pregnant or given birth.

Symptoms include bloating, pelvic or abdominal pain, difficulty eating or feeling full quickly and/or urinary symptoms (urgency or frequency).

Research indicates ninety percent of women experienced some symptoms even with early stage ovarian cancer. Listen to your body—do not ignore the symptoms. Yearly PAP smears check for cancers of the cervix, but do not detect ovar-

ian cancer. There are no tests for

Treatment options and outcome depend on the type of ovarian cancer and how far it has spread but most commonly includes surgery to remove as much of the cancer as possible which should be done by an experienced gynecological oncologist. The surgery is usually followed by several months of chemotherapy.

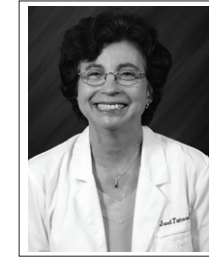
