

Nicholas County Sheriff Dick Garrett credits seat belt usage and child seat restraints as preventing injury and possible loss of life during a head-on-collision that occurred at 1:30 p.m. on Sept. 3 on US 68.

Richard G. Snapp, 62, of Maysville Road, Carlisle, was driving a 1994 Chevy pickup truck east on Maysville Road, US 68, when his vehicle was struck head on by a 2004 Toyota Sequoia driven by Catherine Porter, 38, of Georgetown.

According to the accident report, the westbound Porter vehicle had earlier swerved onto the shoulder of the road to avoid colliding with a third vehicle. The Porter vehicle then overcorrected and came across the center lane striking the Snapp vehicle head-on.
