Attempted murder charge bound over

A Carlisle man accused of the attempted murder of a Bourbon County woman had his charge bound over to a future Nicholas County Grand Jury at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing in Nicholas District Court last week.

The identity of a local citizen who stopped to assist the alleged victim and whose actions may have helped save the woman's life was also revealed during the hearing.

Kentucky State Police Trooper Chris Lairson arrested Christopher Mitchell, 37, formerly of Race Street Carlisle, and charged him with several

offenses during the execution of two separate warrants in early August. Among the charges filed against Mitchell was the charge of attempted murder. Mitchell was also charged with assault, 3rd degree (police officer), criminal mischief, 2nd degree and escape, 2nd degree.

Lairson testified during the preliminary hearing Sept. 1.

He answered questions regarding Mitchell's charges from both County Attorney Dawn Letcher and Public Defender Matthew Perdue.

Mitchell's charges stemmed from an incident which occurred in the late night hours of Aug 1 and early morning hours of Aug. 2, according to Lairson's testimony.

Lairson was directed to respond by KSP dispatchers to a 911 call and upon arrival of where

the call originated from, he found Christopher Mitchell, unconscious lying in the middle of

Scrubgrass Road. Lairson contacted local EMS and Mitchell was transported to the Nicholas County

Hospital.

"He was barely conscious," Lairson said of Mitchell's condition upon discovery, under cross examination by Perdue. "I detected alcohol on his breath. He could barely talk."

Mitchell was treated and released from the hospital as was Tamara Fischer of Bourbon County.

According to testimony from Lairson, Fischer and Mitchell had been together that night and had previously been in a relationship. Fischer was bringing personal belongings to Carlisle to Mitchell when trouble between the two began.

According to court documents, and Lairson's testimony during the hearing

Grand jury returns indictments

Members of the Nicholas County Grand Jury met Sept. 2 and returned indictments against two men and two women.

Cindy Fryman, 58, was indicted on the charges of trafficking in marijuana-less than eight ounces, second

or subsequent offense. Fryman was also indicted on the charges of possession of a controlled substance (alprazolom), 3rd degree, 1st offense and possession of drug paraphernalia.

The indictments against Fryman were issued following the testimony of Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler.

Buckler arrested Fryman on June 4 at ap-

proximately 11:30 p.m., "Subject (Fryman) was the focus of an investigation in which the subject sold marijuana to a confidential informant," Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler wrote on Fryman's citation. "The subject was trafficking in a controlled substance within 1,000 yards of Nicholas County High School. Subject consented to

search. K-9 Hancock found and recovered the marijuana."

Fryman remains free after posting \$3,000 cash bond on June 6, according to court records.

Buckler noted that Fryman "had a large quantity of marijuana as well as numerous marijuana cigarettes rolled and ready for sale."

Officer Buckler also

noted on the citation, that Fryman, "had 3 bar zanax, a schedule four narcotic, packaged to sell."

Fellow Carlisle Police Officers: Mark Snedegar and Darrell Layne, assisted Officer Buckler with the investigation, which led to Fryman's arrest.

Crystal Peel was indicted on the charge of theft by unlawful tak-

ing (\$500 or more, but less than \$10,000).

Jeremy Dunn was charged with theft by unlawful taking (\$500 or more, but less than \$10,000) as well as a charge of persistent felony offender 1st degree.

Michael Gilvin was indicted on the charge of flagrant nonsupport.

All persons are innocent until proven guilty or pleading guilty.

Jackets fall short versus West Carter

After pulling off an emotional 28-20 win over host Fleming County and moving to 2-0 in the process one week earlier, Nicholas County returned home this on Friday night to face West Carter.

Facing its third non-district opponent in as many games, Nicholas County was limited offensively for the first time this season. West Carter held the Jackets to just one touchdown. Visiting West Carter scored once in each quarter en route to a 28-8 win over the Jackets.

Both teams exited the non-district game 2-1.

Nicholas County enjoyed a short-lived lead in the second quarter but never owned an advantage in the second half.

West Carter, which had blanked Bath County 39-0 for its first win of the season one week earlier, got on the scoreboard in the opening quarter when Harrison Bond scored on a one-yard

run. Following a successful extra-point kick from Josh Ackerman, West Carter led 7-0.

The Comets carried the one-touchdown lead out of the opening quarter.

Nicholas County took its first and ultimately only lead in the second quarter when Caleb Pope hauled in a 60-yard touchdown pass from Dalton Pope. The Jackets moved out in front 8-7 in the second quarter when Dalton Pope hooked up with Jessie Smith on a two-point conversion pass attempt following Caleb Pope's touchdown reception.

West Carter, however, wouldn't trail for long. The Comets moved back out in front later in the second quarter as Bond located Cody Stanford on a 34-yard scoring strike. Ackerman added his second successful point-after kick to lift West Carter to a 14-8 lead prior to the inter-

mission.

Nicholas County surrendered seven points in each of the last two quarters while not returning to the endzone. Caleb Whitt scored for West Carter on a 15-yard run in the third quarter as the Comets

carried a 21-8 lead into the final period. Danny Cline rounded out the West Carter scoring in the fourth quarter when he found the endzone on a 14-yard scoring run.

Shelving the non-district loss, Nicholas County has now turned

its focus to district play. The Jackets will entertain Berea on Friday night (Sept. 10) in a key Class A, District 5 game. Additional regular-season opponents remaining for the Jackets are Raceland (Sept. 24, home), Lexington

Christian (Oct. 1, away), Lewis County (Oct. 8, away), Fairview (Oct. 15, home), Paris (Oct. 22, away) and Bracken County (Oct. 29, home).

Kickoff for the Nicholas County-Berea game is set for 7:30 p.m.

Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

I love nature and I had a good weekend camping out on a secluded piece of farm land in south central Fleming County that once belonged to my late grandfather, Russ Mattox, and was the farm I grew up on (literally) in a small community called Martha Mills. My father sold the farm about two decades ago and I hadn't been on the land since. But a piece of ground tends to get in the blood over the years and I could feel it calling me these past few years.

A quick and pleasant conversation with the present owner and bada boom-bada bing, the next thing you know, I'm camping up by the old pond, near a small, shaded locust thicket. The bullfrogs were belching that first night. A few have been silenced since. I got ten good-sized bullfrogs and left plenty to replenish the stock for next year. "Always be sure and leave plenty for next

year," I could almost hear my late father say to me as I eased around the pond, light in one hand and four-pronged frog gig in the other. One of the frogs was sitting on a flat rock, just beneath the surface and I didn't see it as I thrust the gig downward; now I've got a three-pronged gig. And it could probably use a good sharpening too. Chris Cannon, my self and our late mutual friend Randy Owens, had gigged exactly 100 large bullfrogs one late summer night back in 1981. Hard to imagine how

long ago that seems now, and I can tell you something else, dear reader, it's hard to imagine how much 100 frogs in an old feed sack weighs. I can tell you, I didn't think we would ever get all of those frogs cleaned that night so many years ago, and it was pretty near sunrise when the chore was complete and Randy dropped me off at my parents home. A Bobcat screamed just as I opened the door of his car and got out of it that night. Funny how some small things you never forget. It was the first and last time we ever heard such a sound together. Randy perished in an automobile accident before the year was out. During my camping trip this weekend I thought about the good times Randy and I had had together with our other friends in the woods and streams: farm boys who hadn't drifted far from home in our high school days. The memories rooted in my grandfather's old farm wrapped around me and kept my shivering soul warm as I thought of a million other things associated with that land and my youth and the trials and tribulations I had survived and which several of my childhood friends had not. A million other things,

just like the remembered Bobcat scream, which had been hidden away in my memory, came flooding back during my camping trip and later, while at home cleaning the frogs. My late father was fairly skilled at butchering, and all the associated uses of a knife. It's a craft I continue to hone. Dad had given me his old knife when I salvaged it and some other things following one of the massive floods that destroyed my parents' home and washed nearly all their belongings away, several years ago. I'd seen that knife clean a million fish and skin a thousand furbearing animals, like mink, fox and muskrat, during the trapping seasons of my youth. I had suggested my father get rid of that knife when I was in from the army in 1984 and knew all the knowledge to be had in the world and couldn't understand how my stupid old man could even want to use such a worn out and old broken down knife, such as he had used a million times before and he was using that particular evening to clean a large snapping turtle. "That don't make 'em like this any more boy," he had said in a flat tone without bothering to look up and then suggested that I go inside and visit my mother.

He had heard the tone of disgust in my voice when suggesting he get a new knife. I guess, maybe he forgave me for my ignorance in his later years (though I doubt I'll forgive myself) when he told me to keep the knife after I'd found it about a mile down stream from his and my late mother's mobile home that was within rock throwing distance of Fleming Creek, which sprang from it's bank in historic flood depth that year. Their home sat at the base of the hill where I camped this past weekend. It's someone else's home now and the farm belongs to another family. And yet combined, they will always be the place that I come from. It held such a multitude of natural wonders in the wild woods, streams, hills and valleys. I passed the knife along to my nephew Steve a few years ago, along with some of dad's fishing lures that I also salvaged from the flood debris. Steve is another Mattox who is a lover of the great outdoors. I think, maybe dad would have liked that his holiest of hunting relics continues to rest in good hands.

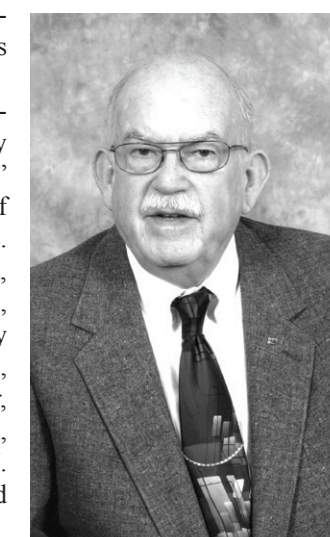

"This was a head-on collision and I'm glad the driver's were buckled up and the children were in child restraints. I believe it prevented serious injury and possible loss of life during this accident," Sheriff Garrett said.

ing, Fischer returned the items to Mitchell who then asked her to speak with him. Fischer agreed and they were inside Fischer's truck when Fischer drove to a church parking lot on Catherine Street.

Within moments of the arrival at Catherine Street Fischer told Mitchell that she 'needed to go' because she had to get ready to go to work, according to Lairson's testimony. At that time Mitchell allegedly became aggressive, striking Fischer in the face and then choking her.

"She had blood clots in both eyes because she was choked so hard," Lairson testified.

Lairson testified that Fischer was rendered unconscious soon after that and awakened to find that she was being "dragged through a field and heard Mitchell say 'Dear Lord, please forgive me...' I'm assuming he thought he killed her," Lairson said.

Lairson said that Fischer "played dead" during the time.

After a short time Mitchell returned Fischer to her vehicle and placed her in the driver's seat. She became conscious and attempted to drive away, but could not see.

Local resident Clayton Kimes, a young man and veteran employee of Kimes and Sons Carpet and Carpentry, happened to be a passenger in a vehicle that came along

and noticed Fischer struggling with driving. Kimes communicated briefly with Fischer, noticed the urgency of the situation and then drove her in her vehicle to the police station where she was later taken to the hospital.

"Mr. Kimes' actions helped save Tamara Fischer," Trooper Lairson said following the hearing.

After pieces of the complex puzzle began to come together, a warrant was issued for Mitchell, whom had been released from the hospital. Mitchell was going to be charged with domestic violence and assault, 4th degree at that time as the investigation was in the early stages. He was located outside of a dwelling in Nicholas County and taken to the Carlisle Police Station where he received two additional charges of assaulting a police officer and escape.

According to Lairson, Mitchell asked to go to the restroom in the police station and upon his return attempted to escape from the station.

"He ran through the back of the police station and through what he thought was an exit door," Lairson said with a straight face, adding that what Mitchell thought was an exit door was actually a closet door.

In the process of attempting to escape Mitchell had shoved Lairson.

"Did he manage to

get outside?" Perdue asked Lairson.

"No," Lairson responded.

Perdue asked several pointed questions of Trooper Lairson during the cross examination aspect of the hearing regarding the 72 hour difference in time between Fischer's initial statements and additional statements that led to the charge of attempted murder.

It was also revealed that during the course of the evening approximately 32 zanax pills prescribed to Fischer became missing from her purse.

Perdue asked Judge Kuster to amend the attempted murder charge or dismiss it as a result of the time line discrepancies and added that Mitchell did not attempt

murder as he had placed Fischer back in her truck.

Letcher argued strongly that the charge was legitimate and the fact that Mitchell returned Fischer to the truck did not indicate good faith on his part.

Kuster agreed and had the charge of attempted murder bound over to a future Nicholas County Grand Jury.

Mitchell sat quietly next to Perdue throughout the hearing and appeared very calm.

Perdue seemed frustrated with a portion of Lairson's testimony and the fact that Lairson said he had not located the exact field Fischer had said she was allegedly dragged through, but offered "no comment" immediately following the hearing.

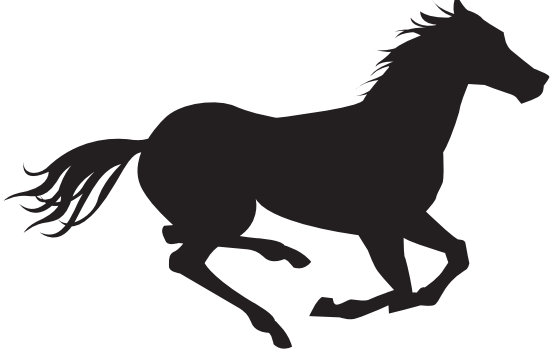

Q: How do I know if I have a Sleep Disorder?

Keep enjoying those horses and...

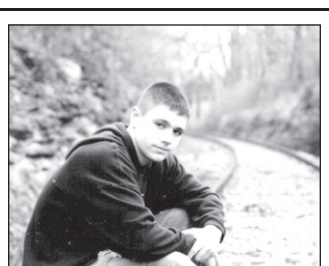

On Representative Realism

Representative realism is a concept that has been discussed throughout the past few centuries by philosophers and psychologists alike. The theory states that "we do not (and cannot) perceive the external world as it really is; instead we know only our ideas and interpretations of the way the world is. This might be said to indicate that a barrier or 'veil of perception' prevents first-hand knowledge of the world, but the representational realist would deny that 'first hand knowledge' in this sense is a coherent concept, since knowledge is always via some means." (Encyclopedia Britannica). What this means in laymen's terms is that every individual's perception of reality is different because perception is based solely on our preconceived notions of the objects that our mind is interpreting. The development of the concept representative realism has been supported throughout the years by some of the greatest minds that have discussed the philosophy of life including Rene Descartes, John Locke,

and Bertrand Russell.

Perception in the realm of representative realism states that the object is only perceived by the mind after being filtered through of idea of the object we are perceiving. If the ideas of representative realism are true then we can only theorize that everyone's perception of reality is different. Because everyone sees reality and the various objects of the world differently we could call into question whether or not there is any true form of any given object.

For instance, when an object is brought up such as a TV, everyone has something that comes to mind. Some may see an old 13 inch black and white, some a 60 inch plasma, and others could have an infinite array of interpretations of that object. Thus showing us that all humans have predisposed conclusions on an object that could sway the perception of the ob-

ject through sense experience. Representative realism basically says that we are not to trust our feelings on sense experience because all the things we experience with our senses is merely a reflection of our thoughts.

As stated earlier many notable philosophers had much to say in regards to this theory. Most distinguished of which had to be the 17th century philosopher John Locke. Locke described objects as having two qualities - primary and secondary qualities. Primary qualities were qualities of objects that expressed traits that could not be taken away by means of thought of thought. Primary qualities included things like the specific movement or mass of an object, and sometimes the inclusion of shape. These are the qualities that are a direct representation of our sensory experience - things that we can literally touch and feel. Secondary qualities were considered qualities of an object that involved the senses but not in terms of sense experience, rather the subjectivity of sense experience. These qualities demonstrate

how people's interpretation of their senses leads to various physical bias on the literal perception of the object. With that being said, can we truly trust that anything we see, smell, feel, hear, or taste? Or does our own explanation, concluded from sensual perception of the object, dictate what we see, smell, feel, hear, or taste?

Although the last few sentences may have seemed redundant, the consecutive listing of the senses are there only to emphasize the significance of this point. What if everything we've come to know throughout our lives through our senses is false? Would this devastate our conception of the universe or would it only strengthen it? Could this concept cause you to become more appreciative of your individual reality? None of these questions can be answered with fact - only opinion; and it is these questions that were the foundations of this thought.

The problem with the theory of representative realism is the fact that if we are to have a specific perception of an object we had to have

an original connection with the object through sense perception. The true representative realist would say that the "truest likeness" of an object can only depend on how something is considered. With that being said your "true likeness" of an object may be different from my "true likeness" of the same object. The best example of this would be the use of an amazing piece of architecture like the Great Pyramids in Egypt. Yes, we could easily say that we all have the same view/perception of the Great Pyramids, however who is really the judge of that? I would say with almost 100% certainty that my view is at least slightly different than yours. Although we have seen pictures of this great wonder of the world, everyone's representation of it is different.

Representative realism takes a mental note (my attempt at describing RR) of a specific generalization/thought from a past sense experience. This initial thought tends to act as a template so that every image of said object is first filtered through this

template our mind has developed when we see the object. Since every aspect of reality is perceived this way (at a subconscious level) I restate that it literally questions our thoughts on reality as we know it, or as we think we know it.

Locke's theory of representative realism stated three imperative maxims that provided the basis of his claims: the first of which conveys to us that there is an external world that acts independently of our mind, second our awareness of the world we live in could be considered very oblique, because we rely so much on mental representations, and lastly that these representations could be inaccurate skewing our perception of life.

Representative realism shows that although we all live in the same world our interpretations of almost everything is different. This leaves room for an infinite amount of artistic perspectives. Since everyone sees things differently, artistic interpretations will never plateau and there are still an inconceivable number of possibilities out there.

Frog taking season at mid way point

A local delicacy is frog legs and Kentucky is in mid-season for taking bullfrogs.

Frogs can be found along the edges of most waterways in this section of Kentucky with frogs living in lakes, ponds, creeks and rivers. Farm ponds are a primary source for taking frogs during bullfrog season.

The daily limit (noon to noon)

for having frogs is 15; possession limit is 30.

If frogs are taken by gun or bow and arrow, a hunting license is required. If taken by pole and line, a fishing license is required. If frogs are taken by gig or by hand, either a hunting or fishing license is valid. It is illegal to possess a gig on a stream or lake, or in a boat, from November 1 through January 31.

301 KAR 1:082. Frog season; limits, as it relates to: KRS 150.025, 150.175, 150.360, states that, "It is necessary to

regulate the season, time, bag limit, and manner of taking of bullfrogs in order to utilize and conserve the population thereof. This amendment is necessary to change the opening day and time and to bring Section 3 of this administrative regulation in compliance with the gigging season.

Section 1. The open season on bullfrogs shall begin at 12 noon on the 3rd Friday in May and continue until 12 midnight October 31. The daily creel limit shall be fifteen (15) bullfrogs

with a possession limit of thirty (30) bullfrogs after two (2) or more days frogging. Each day for taking bullfrogs shall begin at 12 noon and end at 12 noon the following day. No person may have more than fifteen (15) bullfrogs in his possession while in the field.

Section 2. Bullfrogs may be taken with gig, by hand, bow and arrow, firearm or hook and line from public and private waters, and an appropriate license is required. If bullfrogs are taken with firearm or bow and arrow,

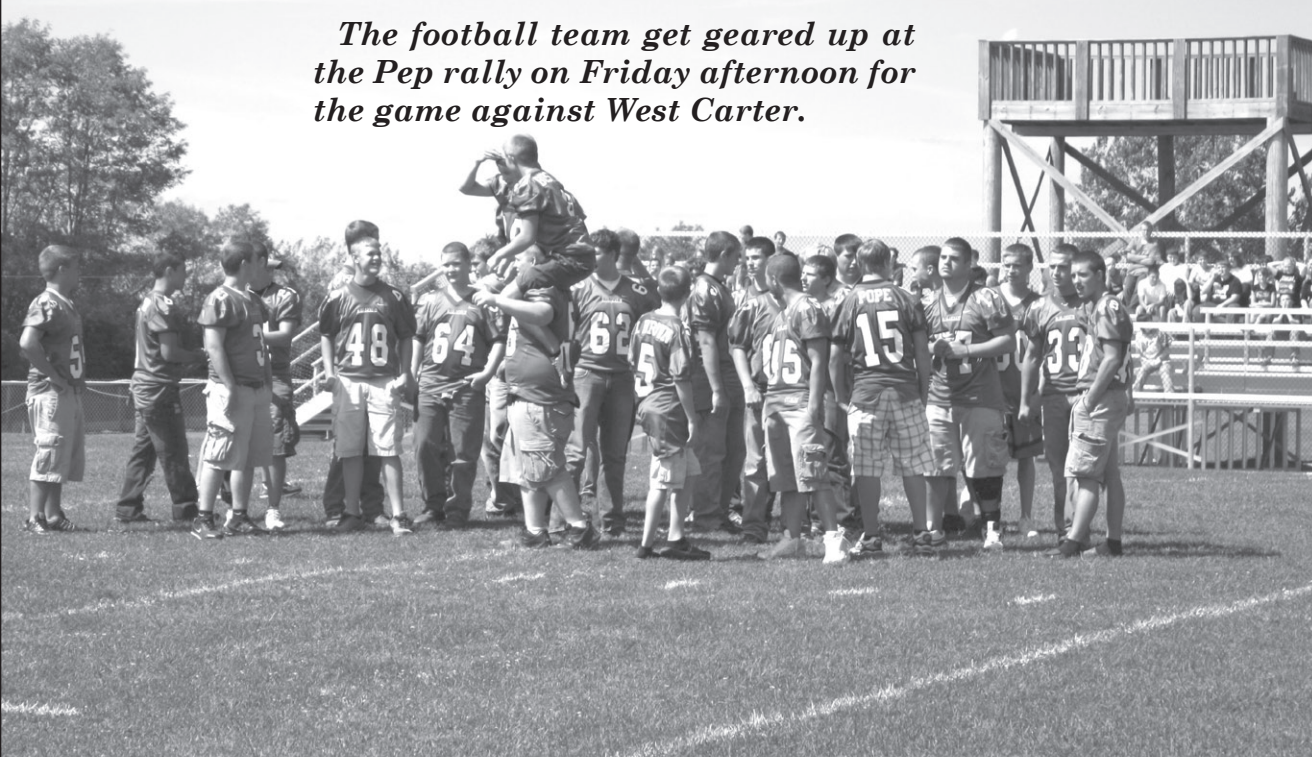
