Stolen safe recovered

An investigation intensifies after a safe, which was stolen during an August burglary of a Concord Road home, was recovered along the Licking River Friday.

Nicholas County Sheriff Dick Garrett said two fishermen found the safe on the bank of the Licking River, just off of Abner's Mills Road, Friday.

"They thought it was a refrigerator at first, but then discovered it was a safe," Sheriff Garrett said.

The safe had been reported stolen from the residence of Tom Adams of Concord Road on Aug. 14. The safe held cash, firearms, watches and other valuables.

Everything was found to be still inside the safe upon it's opening.

Except for approximately \$15,000 cash, according to Sheriff Garrett.

"Whoever it was took the cash and left everything else undisturbed in the safe," Sheriff Garrett said.

Indentions upon a steep bluff of the river bank, near the road, indicated to Garrett that whoever took the safe, dumped it from the road and over the bank, where it came to rest half in, and half out of the river. Sheriff Garrett said physical evidence had been recovered from the safe and a hidden game camera, attached to a tree in the immediate vicinity, is being analyzed and is believed to have been pointed in the direction of

the road, where the safe was unladen and dumped over the bank.

"The camera is one that takes infrared photographs for the night and also takes them in the day," Sheriff Garrett said of the motion sensitive camera used by fish and wildlife officials.

Garrett said he was optimistic that any photographs taken from the camera would give a clear photograph of suspects, and/or the vehicle they were in. "I believe at least two and possibly three individuals were involved in removing the safe from Mr. Adams' house," he said.

Trio pleads to drug store burglary charges

Three individuals charged in connection with the May break in of Soper's Family Drug Store entered pleas in Nicholas Circuit Court Monday.

Thomas Withrow, 24, who also listed his address as Convict Road, Owingsville,

Claudie Lee McCoy, Jr., 29, from Carlisle, and Lora Lee Herrington, 35, also of Carlisle entered pleas in Nicholas Circuit Court Monday before Nicholas Circuit Judge, Honorable Jay Delaney.

Withrow plead guilty to the charges of theft of a controlled substance, second or greater offense, and burglary, 3rd degree.

Commonwealth Attorney Doug Miller and Assistant Michael Laws recommended that Withrow be sentenced to eight years imprisonment on the theft charge and five years imprisonment of the burglary charge with both recommended sentences to run concurrent (at the same time) with each other for a total of eight years in prison.

gash compliments of a Shawnee warrior's tomahawk almost exactly one year ago when the 'big siege' on Fort Boonesboro had begun. Daniel Boone sometimes rubbed the scar on his head, one of many scars he'd collected on the Kentucky frontier, when assessing the terrain as he was doing now.

He still limped from a Shawnee musket ball, which shattered his ankle in 1778.

His eyes scanned the horizon looking for any sudden movement or any piece of vegetation that looked out of place. He was always careful when traveling near the

Licking River and he was being extra careful since his brother Ned was along with him on this hunting trip.

Daniel wasn't just familiarizing his brother with the intricacies of the buffalo roads that intersected northeastern Kentucky, he was also doing a reconnaissance of the area, particularly along the ancient Native American footpath that ran near the buffalo roads. The path was called the 'path of the armed ones', the Atlato-Oh-Waimee or Warrior's Trail, and was a heavily used path that connected northern and southern Native American Tribal lands.

Daniel didn't like what he saw near the Licking River at the Upper Blue Licks and the area where present-day Nicholas, bath and Fleming County joined

together not far from a small riffle on the river known as Vaughn's Ford.

When he and Ned crossed Vaughn's Ford Daniel paused before leading his pack horse up the steep bank along the buffalo road. The area was used extensively by Shawnee hunters and had been the place he'd been taken to on the first night of his captivity two years earlier.

Many of the trees had the bark peeled away and etchings of geometrical shapes, turtles and deer were visible on the peeled areas of the trees.

He had wanted to go farther northward, to George Stockton's Spring (present-day Flemingsburg), and show Ned the wonderful landscape, but there was simply too much Shawnee activity and from the fresh footprints along the river bank, Daniel knew it was simply too risky.

The two men, their two horses and two pack

horses re-crossed the river and moved back southwestward, retracing their steps.

It had been a hard year. The June attack by British and native American forces had destroyed Ruddle's and Martin's Stations along with Grant's Station. Many of their friends had been killed or taken captive during the summer raid.

Others had also perished, including Colonel Richard Callaway, who was killed March 8.

Lt. Pemberton Rawlings was wounded and died later during the same attack. An ugly but seemingly truthful was circulating that Micajah Calloway, who was Colonel Callaway's nephew and who had been captured with Boone and the other salt makers two years earlier, was among the raiders who killed Callaway and Rawlings and had become completely immersed into Shawnee culture.

The rumor ate at Daniel Boone's soul and was an-

other reason he sought refuge in the outpost they built called Boone's Station.

Ned had been fascinated with the wilderness terrain, but he did not understand that the land could be brutally indifferent to the plight of the Kentuckians when the Shawnee were about.

They moved quietly and slowly back away from the Upper Licks and the Licking River and toward Plum Lick, where Daniel wanted to make camp. It was an idyllic surrounding with a small beautiful fresh-water spring bubbling forth near a small creek. Daniel had given the spring the name of plum lick due to a small salt lick being located there. He and a friend had watched the lick for deer one day and had eaten a hat full of wild plums while they waited.

He smiled as he thought of it.

Little did he or Ned know, but death would be waiting for them at Plum Lick.

Lucille Wells Feedback, 102, widow of Robert T. Feedback, passed away Monday, September 20,

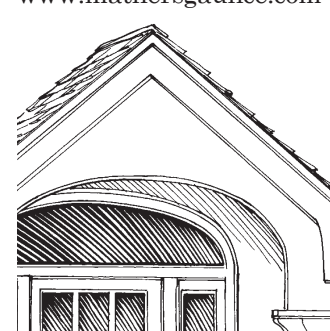

Q: How do I know if I have a Sleep Disorder?

A: Are you always feeling tired during the day? Do you have trouble falling asleep at night? Do you snore loudly when you sleep or wake up frequently during the night? If you answered "Yes" to any of these questions, you may be suffering from a sleep disorder and need to seek medical advice.

Sleep is not a luxury. It is essential to your health and vitality. Most people need between seven and nine hours of restful sleep each night. There's more to not getting enough sleep than just feeling drowsy. The Crazy Horse Lady



Rain – Rain! Where have you gone? I know most of us are thinking “are we ever going to get any rain that will amount to anything”? I’m sure that most of your pastures look just like mine – parched!

In all honesty, my current pasture is not the greatest to begin with. Then you add NO RAIN at all and it has become pretty pathetic. Lucky for me and my horses, none are “hard keepers” and none look like they are lacking. You know I’ve been told that your horses end up mirroring your personalities, etc. so no wonder they are not “hard keepers”. This does not mean that I can pay less attention to making sure that they are still getting enough nutrients daily.

I know that it is VERY early in the year to start feeding extra hay during the day but I’ve really had to. My main concern right now with the pastures being well eaten and no rain in sight is to maintain their current body condition and to somehow supply a normal grazing period for them. As I have explained, their stomachs are very complex and very sensitive to change so they could stress very

easily. I try to encourage “no stressing” out on our farm so I spend a little extra time making sure at different intervals they are having the opportunity to graze a little, drink plenty of fresh water, and just try to keep things moving easily through their delicate systems.

Not only am I paying close attention to their weight, I’m also paying very close attention to their hooves. With the weather having been exceptionally dry this year, it can raise havoc on their hooves. I have been actively maintaining their hooves with Hooflex Liquid Conditioner. You can pick it up at Tractor Supply, Southern States or even order online. I’ve been very happy with this product and I do this regularly throughout the week because you know the old saying “no hoof – no horse”. The fact that I also keep them barefoot has helped out a lot because I think horses with shoes have a tendency to show stress during these dry conditions. (Of course, this is just my little old opinion!)

I believe it also helps that I keep up regular visits with my farrier – John Yutzky, whom I

think is awesome, reliable and very, very knowledgeable (cell #217-412-1683). He just lives in Paris and shows up when he is scheduled to which makes my life so much easier and enjoyable. I haven’t had to wonder “is he going to show or not”? After dealing with other farriers, I must mention not all are like this so hold onto your rasps, dealing with John has turned out to be a very pleasurable experience. He is always willing and ready to answer any questions I have concerning their feet. He never makes me feel like I have asked a stupid question. This, to me, is a very important part of being MY farrier! I would not hesitate one minute in giving him a reference, so give him a call and try him out. I’m sure that most of you will find that he is truly good, honest and very knowledgeable in doing his job.

Besides, being blessed with having a wonderful farrier, this allows me to spend my extra time playing and riding my horses. So...you can decide for yourself, call him and have the extra time you’re looking for to spend with your horses, or wait

around for your current farrier to show up or not. Most of the time without even bothering to let you know. You make the decision because to me, it is a “no-brainer”.

Just for informational purposes: Kentucky has confirmed three horses that have been found to be infected with WNV. These horses have been reported to not having been vaccinated for this disease. Please remember to follow-up on your vaccinations for your horse’s sake. This is very, very serious!

Remember to get your WEG tickets www.alltechfeigames.com and don’t forget that the Georgetown Equine Expo starts on September 24th. There are many talented and knowledgeable clinicians going to be there and plenty of equine vendors! 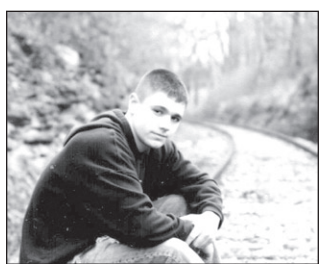

Withrow was indicted on the charges of theft of a controlled substance, second or subsequent offense, burglary, 3rd degree and persistent felony offender, 1st degree, in July by members of Nicholas Grand Jury. Withrow was arrested by Aberdeen police officers following an intense investigation supervised by Carlisle Chief of Police William Denton and spearheaded by Carlisle Police Officers Sgt. Darrell Layne, and CPD Officers Mark Snedegar and Benny Buckler.

Snedegar responded to Soper's Drug Store early on the morning of May 5, within three minutes of an alarm drop notification to Carlisle Dispatch, according to Chief Denton.

Snedegar launched an investigation and was joined by fellow officers Buckler and Layne.

Nicholas County Jailer Jeff Sidles also assisted in various aspects of the investigation, according to police.

Buckler testified to members of the grand jury before they issued the indictments against Withrow.

McCoy was indicted on the charges of complicity to theft of a controlled substance, trafficking in a controlled substance, 1st degree and complicity to commit burglary, 3rd degree by members of the same grand jury.

The indictments against Withrow and McCoy were related to a May 5 incident during which Soper's Family Drug Store in Carlisle was burglarized. The alleged burglary occurred at approximately 3:49 a.m., according to police documents, which along with court documents, further indicates that approximately 9,000 pain pills were stolen.

Approximately 2,000 pills were found during a search of McCoy's location.

McCoy allegedly assisted Withrow in leaving Carlisle, with stolen narcotics soon after the crime; and received payment for his assistance from Withrow in pill payment, according to McCoy's arrest citation.

McCoy also allegedly, "admitted receiving controlled substances from Withrow as payment," according to the arrest citation.

Withrow was arrested by Aberdeen, Ohio police and charged with burglary, third degree and other drug-related charges, according to police sources, who further confirmed that Withrow was taken to Georgetown Jail in Ohio and was airlifted from the jail to a nearby hospital after suffering symptoms indicative of those related to a drug overdose.

Thousands of pills were recovered from the hotel room Withrow was staying in at the time of his arrest.

McCoy entered an "Alford" plea to complicity and other charges Monday and was recommended to receive a sentence of six years imprisonment total with all recommended sentences to run concurrent.

Herrington was charged in connection with the incident after approximately eight pills of various descriptions were found in her purse.

She entered guilty pleas to possession charges Monday and the Commonwealth recommended a diversion with two-year imprisonment if she violates the conditions of the diversion in the next five years.

"I think we helped save lives during this investigation," Officer Snedegar said while expressing his relief that thousands of potentially deadly narcotic pills had been removed from the county. "I think the majority of these stolen pills would have eventually ended up in Nicholas and surrounding county's," he added, while praising the efforts of Denton, County Attorney Dawn Letcher and particularly Sidles and fellow officers Layne and Buckler.

Chief Denton agreed.

"I think this was some very

good leg work and good investigation work on the part of our investigating officers who were assisted by our county attorney," Chief Denton said.

According to Snedegar, Withrow allegedly gained entrance into the business by going through an adjacent closet that is part of a nearby apartment complex.

Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler commented briefly following his testimony to grand jury members earlier this summer.

"It was a lengthy investigation with officers working many hours," Buckler said. "Sgt. Layne and officers Snedegar and myself, worked tirelessly on this particular case, and our force continues to work tirelessly to keep illegal pain pills off the

street and put those responsible in jail."

Herrington was also indicted by members of the July Nicholas Grand Jury on the charges of possession of a controlled substance (oxycodone), 1st degree, second or subsequent offense; possession of a controlled substance (clonazepam) 3rd degree, second or subsequent offense and possession of a controlled substance (alprazolom) 3rd degree, second or subsequent offense.

Officer Buckler also testified to members of the grand jury prior to the issuance of indictments against McCoy and Herrington.

Judge Delaney ordered a presentence investigation report to be completed before he rendered a final sentencing for the trio on Oct. 18.

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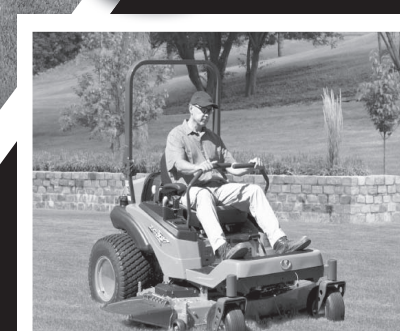
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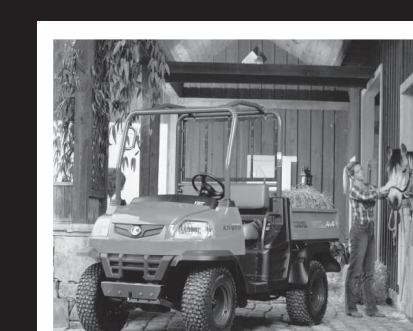

Davis said he strongly opposed raising taxes and recognized that the regional abuse of prescription pain pills was "a huge problem." Davis said he supported programs like drug court and hoped that part of the solution could be found in a 'community of faith' He also said he thought a portion of the problem was a result in 'the breakdown in the family structure.'

"We must have economic policies in place that reinforce structure to the family," he said. "This is not an easy walk."

Davis, a former Army Ranger Officer, praised the efforts of the military in Afghanistan

Davis also said he believed their were economic opportunities in Nicholas County from local resources.

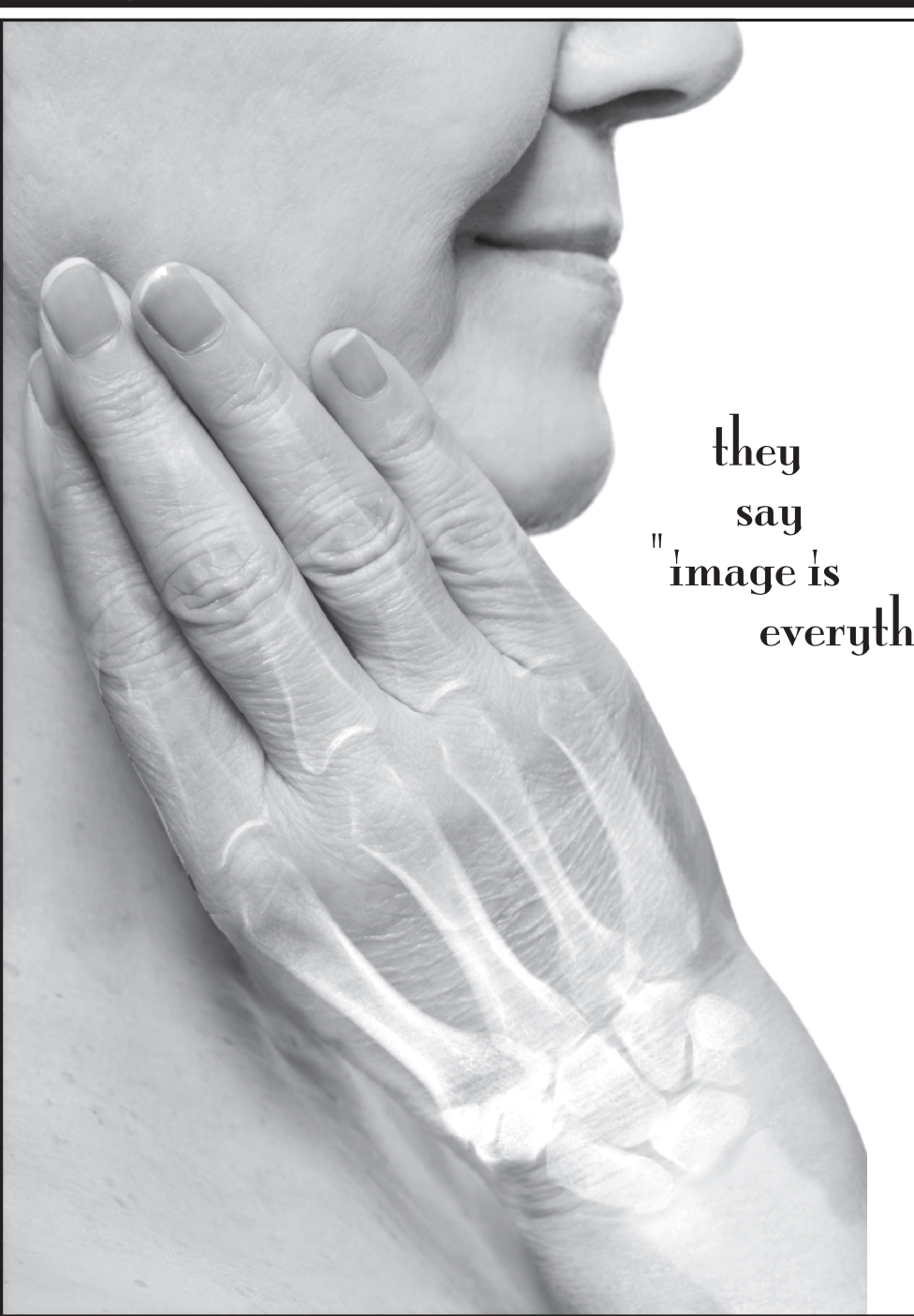
"We can create jobs and give our young people a future here," he said.

Farm Safety for Kids

Farm Safety for Kids

Farms are fun places-with all that fresh air, sunshine, and room to run around. But they're also places where real work gets done. And some of that work involves equipment that can be dangerous if someone doesn't know to be safe.

Kids who live on farms really need to know what it takes to be safe. They probably help out on the farm and need to know the safety rules that can prevent injuries. According to the National Safety Council, farming is one of America's most hazardous jobs. Kids ages 10 to 14 are at high risk for injury, often because they take on a job or task that they aren't ready to handle.

If you do work on a farm, listen to parents or other supervisors. Be careful where you play and don't go out to work on the farm on your own. If you're helping out, don't try to use equipment or tackle big projects if you haven't been properly trained. If there's a job you really want to do, such as driving a tractor, you'll probably have to wait until you get a little older.

Safety Around Equipment

Take a look around any farm. How many different pieces of equipment do you see? And how many are bigger than you are? These machines may look pretty cool, but the bottom line is that kids should not operate farm machinery.

Pickup trucks, tractors, threshers, lawn mowers and all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) are powerful machines. But these machines and all other types of farm equipment are not safe for kids to ride on (even with an adult present), play on, or even be around, no matter whether they are in use or not. It's really easy to get thrown from a tractor, thresher, or riding mower.

Here are some more tips to remember around equipment:

Never ride in the back of a pickup truck or on the fender of a tractor.

Never get on a tractor as an extra rider.

Stay out of the path of moving equipment

Don't use electric power tools without adult supervision and always use protective equipment like gloves and goggles.

Safety Around Animals

One of the greatest things about farms is how many different kinds of animals are there like pigs, cows, horses, sheep

and chickens. But these animals are different from dogs, cats, or other house pets. Farm animals are often bigger (horses and cows, for instance). And whether they are big or small, they may not be treated with respect and care.

When you are around farm animals, be calm, move slowly, avoid making sudden jerks or movements, and always approach them from the front so they can see what you are doing. Don't scream or run around them because it will upset them.

Here's some more advice to follow when you're around animals:

A mother with her young will be protective and she may attack anyone who comes close.

Always wear a helmet and other protective gear when riding a horse.

If you want to approach an animal, ask someone who knows the animal to approach it with you. The animal will be less nervous and less likely to become upset.

And after you've been around farm animals, be sure to wash your hands with warm water and soap. Animals can carry germs that cause infections. If you get those germs on your hands and then your mouth or eyes, you might get sick.

Safety Around Poisons, Chemicals, and

Fertilizers

Kids shouldn't be in contact with poisons, chemicals, or fertilizers. But how do you know if something is dangerous to touch or smell? The label may say "Caution," "poison," "danger," or "poison" some of these chemicals are toxic or poisonous.

Stay away from areas where these dangerous substances are stored and never open the containers. If you have younger brothers and sisters, be sure they don't touch these items either. If they have easy access to them, you might want to ask your parents to store them somewhere else, where little hands cant reach them.

Manure (the excrement, or poop, of livestock) is often used on farms as fertilizer for the soil. Although many people consider it to be safer than chemical fertilizers, in large quantities and in enclosed spaces manure can produce deadly gases. Kids shouldn't work with manure or be around manure pits or storage areas.

Safety around storage areas

In addition to all the temptations of equipment and animals, farms may have a barn or storage areas separate from the house. They may seem like great places to explore-but you need to

be careful there, too. It's easy to fall from ladders and lofts in barns and storage areas. Storage areas should be locked to keep out kids and other people who shouldn't be there. Never ride on a grain wagon or enter a silo or grain bin. It's easy to be trapped by flowing grain, and the closed storage areas can fill in seconds and lead to suffocation.

What to do in an Emergency

Sometimes, even if you follow all the rules, there can be an accident. Knowing what to do in an emergency can save someone's life. Ask your parent about learning CPR. If CPR classes for kids are available in your community, you should be sure to learn these life-saving skills.

If someone gets hurt while using equipment:

Turn off the equipment right away (if it is safe to do so) and call for help.

Call 911 or your local emergency number to get

assistance. Be ready to tell the person who answers what the problem is and exactly where the accident happened.

Stay on the line until the operator tells you it is ok to hang up.

Don't move the person by yourself unless he or she is in danger and you wont get hurt doing so. The person might have a head or neck injury, and moving him or her can make these injuries worse.

If someone is hurt while

around an animals: Don't approach the angry animal. Call out for help right away.

Don't move the person by yourself unless he or she is in danger and you wont get hurt while moving the person.

If a chemical or other substance hurts someone, ask an adult to call the poison control center or 911, if necessary. By knowing farm safety rules, you can protect yourself, your friends, and family on the farm.

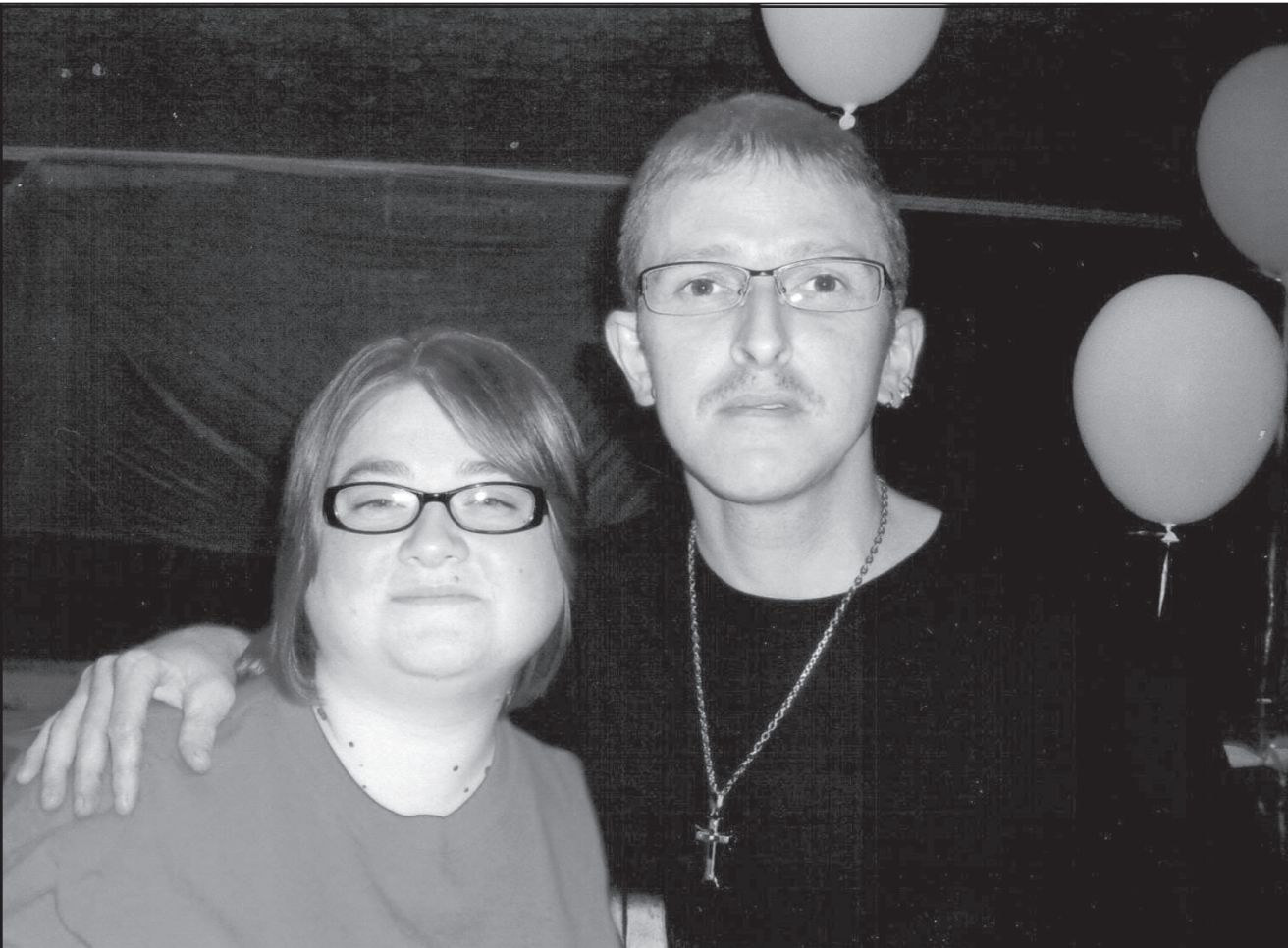

There will be an open house on Oct. 9 from 9 a.m., to 1 p.m., at the Senior Citizens Center in downtown Carlisle. Director Shawna

Hatton invites everyone to stop in and asks that everyone write a 'Letter of Support' to the center to assist officials with ensuring that a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) will be granted to the center

for construction of a new facility.

On a motion by Magistrate Mike Webb, seconded by Magistrate Avery Thornsburg, members of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court passed a resolution authorizing Judge-Executive Larry Tincher to sign all the necessary documents to make the application for the HUD CDBG grant during the meeting of the fiscal court on Sept. 14..

The grant, which totals approximately \$500,000 is a matching grant with the county using a portion of property known locally as Jockey park to house the proposed new facility.

Hatton and former Center Director Carol Galbraith say the current facility is in need of repair, has health risks,

and has structural weaknesses.

Both are asking all citizens to be sure and send their letters of support to the center or drop them off personally at the center.

The construction of a new facility will ensure that existing programs, which benefit senior citizens, are continued and new programs implemented.

Student charged with assault, family speaks out

Family members of a male juvenile arrested at Nicholas County High School (NCHS) last week and charged with assault; say he was the one who was assaulted.

NCHS principal Marty Feltner and School Resource Officer Ron Allison confirmed an incident involving a male juvenile occurred, which led to the juvenile being taken into custody, but due to the nature of laws regarding juveniles and their role in protecting them they declined additional comment.

Feltner did add that he "was pleased" with Allison's actions that day.

"He handled it correctly," Feltner said of Officer Allison's actions that day.

But the parents of the juvenile in question say after listening to their son they disagree.

"I know what he did wasn't right," one of the family members said. "But I don't think what they did was right either."

According to family

members, the juvenile was in school detention (ISS) for being tardy to class. They say he was tardy because a fight in the hallway between classes prevented him from obtaining needed classroom materials from his locker and that was the reason for his tardiness.

After being in ISS the juvenile had headphones on, which is not allowed. When asked to take them off the juvenile refused and was taken to the office by School Resource Officer Ron Allison.

Family members say they believe their son when he tells them once in the office he was assaulted while the headphones were physically removed from him and he was restrained.

They say their son did refuse to take his headphones off and that although he did not make any threatening gestures toward either Allison or Feltner it may have been perceived that he did. Regardless they add that when their son was brought home after the incident he had 'carpet burns, bruises and abrasions' on him as a result of the incident.

They also say he was charged with assault, 3rd degree and received ten days suspension from school.

"He's devastated and so are we," one of the juvenile's parent's said Monday. "And he's afraid, since he's trying to press charges, that the cops will beat him up."

"Our son is willing to take a lie detector test," the parent said.

Local police sources indicate an investigation has been undertaken due to the allegations of the assault on the student. The parent of the juvenile said she has spoken with an attorney and officials with the Kentucky State Police who may also become involved in the investigation, according to the parent.

"I know he was in the wrong for not taking his headphones off but ten days suspension, plus a felony charge, plus the physical marks on his body, I don't know, but it seems very harsh to me," the parent said. "It's a double or triple punishment."

No charges have been filed against any school employee as the Mercury goes to print.

We routinely monitor for the presence of drinking water contaminants. Testing results we received from April 1st, 2010 thru June 30, 2010 that our system exceeds the standard for maximum contaminant level (MCL) for trihalomethanes (THM) and Haloacetic Acid (HAAs). The standard for THM is 0.080; the standard for HAAs is 0.060. The results for THM were 0.105 and HAAs was 0.072 at our system for April 1, 2010 to June 30, 2010.

What should I do? There is nothing you need to do unless you have a severely compromised immune system, have an infant, or are elderly. These people may be at increased risk and should seek advice about drinking water from their health care provider.

You do not need to boil your water or take other corrective sections. If a situation arises where the water is no longer safe to drink you will be notified within 24 hours. We will announce any emergencies on WLEX-TV Channel 18 news.

What does this mean?
This is not an emergency. If it had been an emergency, you would have been notified within 24 hours. People who drink water containing trihalomethanes (THMs) in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

What is being done?
We are working with the Division of Water to evaluate the water supply and researching options to correct the problem.

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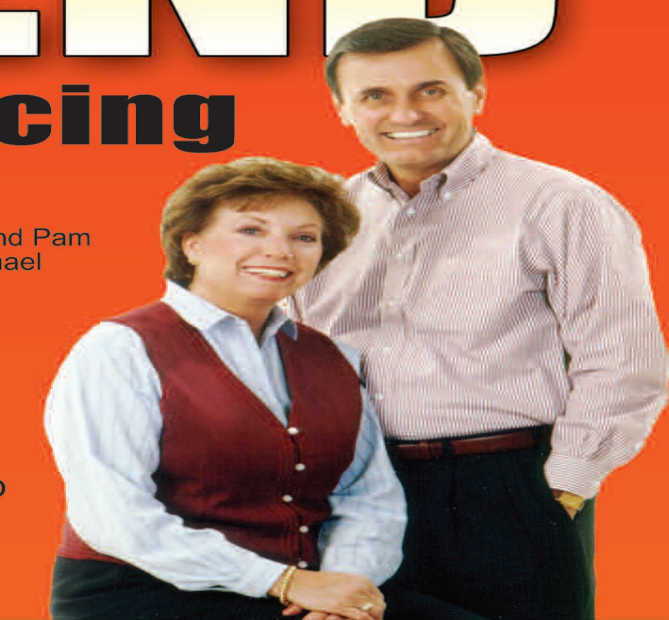

Nicholas County Judge-Executive Larry Tincher signed a "Declaration of State of Emergency Due to Drought Conditions in Nicholas County" document Monday. "It's dry," Judge Tincher said as he dis-

cussed his attempts to continue to assist Nicholas Countians, this time through possible state and federal assistance for farmers and others who have been adversely effected by the extreme dry conditions that have descended upon the county this summer and early autumn. "We need rain,"

Tincher said. "The drought puts farmers and others in hardship due to the loss of crops and livestock." The declaration reads as follows: "Whereas beginning the last of July, 2010, due to extreme heat and dry conditions occurring in Nicholas County, and Whereas, the situation creates a consid-

erable hardship on the farmers and citizens of Nicholas County, and Whereas, local government has the responsibility to protect the public health, safety, welfare, and lifestyle and to mitigate such events, and Now Therefore, I Larry Tincher, Nicholas County Judge Executive, by the authority vested in me by

KRS (Kentucky Revised Statute) 39A.100 (2), do hereby declare that a state of emergency exists in Nicholas County due to said drought as long as needed: "1. Under this State of Emergency, as provided in KRS 39A.100 (2) and 45A.380 (10 (7) County Judge/Executive can waive formalities otherwise required by law

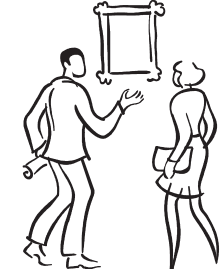
