He had a middling long nose and a wide mouth and good set of teeth. He was a man of remarkably pleasant temper. Nothing ever appeared to ruffle his mind or make him uneasy."

When he and Ned crossed Vaughn's Ford Daniel paused before leading his pack horse up the steep bank along the buffalo road. The area was used extensively by Shawnee hunters and had been the place he'd been taken to on the first night of his captivity two years earlier.

Many of the trees had the bark peeled away and etchings of geometrical shapes, turtles and deer were visible on the peeled areas of the trees.

He had wanted to farther northward, go George Stockton's to (present-day Spring Flemingsburg), and show Ned the wonderful landscape, but there was simply too much Shawnee activity and from the fresh footprints along the river bank, Daniel knew it was simply too risky.

Lt. Pemberton Rawlings was wounded and died later during the same attack. An ugly but seemingly truthful was circulating that Micajah Calloway, who was Colonel Callaway's nephew and who had been captured with Boone and the other salt makers two years earlier, was among the raiders who killed Callaway and Rawlings and had become completely immersed into Shawnee culture.


Ned had been fascinated with the wilderness terrain, but he did not understand that the land could be brutally indifferent to the plight of the Kentuckians when the Shawnee were about.

It was an idyllic surrounding with a small beautiful fresh-water spring bubbling forth near a small creek. Daniel had given the spring the name of plum lick due to a small salt lick being located there. He and a friend had watched the lick for deer one day and had eaten a hat full of wild plums while they waited.

He smiled as he thought of it.

Little did he or Ned know, but death would be waiting for them at Plum Lick.





How do I know if I have a Sleep **Disorder**?



Are you always feeling tired during the day? Do you have trouble falling asleep at night? Do you snore loudly when you sleep or wake up frequently during the night? If you answered "Yes" to any of these questions, you may be suffering from a sleep disorder and need to seek medical advice.

Sleep is not a luxury. It is essential to your health and vitality. Most people need between seven and nine hours of restful sleep each night. There's more to not getting enough sleep than just feeling drowsy. The lack of restful sleep can lead to a number of medical conditions, including diabetes, heart disease, high blood pressure, stroke, obesity and even depression.

Public Defender Matthew Perdue represented Withrow, who appeared calm before Judge Delaney.

Withrow was indicted on the charges of theft of a controlled substance, second or subsequent offense, burglary, 3rd degree and persistent felony offender, 1st degree, in July by members of Nicholas Grand Jury. Withrow was arrested by Aberdeen police officers following an intense investigation supervised by Carlisle Chief of Police William Denton and spearheaded by Carlisle Police Officers Sgt. Darrell Layne, and CPD Officers Mark Snedegar and Benny Buckler.

Snedegar responded to Soper's Drug Store early on the morning of May 5, within three minutes of an alarm drop notification to Carlisle Dispatch, according to Chief Denton.

Snedegar launched an investigation and was joined by fellow officers Buckler and Layne.

Nicholas County Jailer Jeff Sidles also assisted in various aspects of the investigation, according to police.

Buckler testified to members of the grand jury before they issued the indictments against Withrow.

McCoy was indicted on the charges of complicity to theft of a controlled substance, trafficking in a controlled substance, 1st degree and complicity to commit burglary, 3rd degree by members of the same grand jury.

The indictments against Withrow and McCoy were related to a May 5 incident during which Soper's Family Drug Store in Carlisle was burglarized. The alleged burglary occurred at approximately 3:49 a.m., according to police documents, which along with court documents, further indicates that approximately 9,000 pain pills were stolen.

Approximately 2,000 pills were found during a search of McCoy's location.

McCoy allegedly assisted Withrow in leaving Carlisle, with stolen narcotics soon after the crime; and received payment for his assistance from Withrow in pill payment, according to McCoy's arrest citation.

McCoy also allegedly, "ad-

McCov entered an "Alford" plea to complicity and other charges Monday and was recommended to receive a sentence of six years imprisonment total with all recommended sentences to run concurrent.

Herrington was charged in connection with the incident after approximately eight pills of various descriptions were found in her purse.

She entered guilty pleas to possession charges Monday and the Commonwealth recommended a diversion with twoyear imprisonment if she violates the conditions of the diversion in the next five years.

"I think we helped save lives during this investigation," Officer Snedegar said while expressing his relief that thousands of potentially deadly narcotic pills had been removed from the county. "I think the majority of these stolen pills would have eventually ended up in Nicholas and surrounding county's," he added, while praising the efforts of Denton, County Attorney Dawn Letcher and particularly Sidles and fellow officers Layne and Buckler.

Chief Denton agreed.

"I think this was some very

good leg work and good investigation work on the part of our investigating officers who were assisted by our county attorney," Chief Denton said.

Snedegar, According to Withrow allegedly gained entrance into the business by going through an adjacent closet that is part of a nearby apartment complex.

Carlisle Police Officer Benny Buckler commented briefly following his testimony to grand jury members earlier this summer

"It was a lengthy investigation with officers working many hours," Buckler said. "Sgt. Layne and officers Snedegar and myself, worked tirelessly on this particular case, and our force continues to work tirelessly to keep illegal pain pills off the

street and put those responsible in jail."

Herrington was also indicted by members of the July Nicholas Grand Jury on the charges of possession of a controlled substance (oxycodone), 1st degree, second or subsequent offense; possession of a controlled substance (clonazepam) 3rd degree, second or subsequent offense and possession of a controlled substance (alprazalom) 3rd degree, second or subsequent offense.

Officer Buckler also testified to members of the grand jury prior to the issuance of indictments against McCoy and Herrington.

Judge Delaney ordered a presentence investigation report to be completed before he rendered a final sentencing for the trio on Oct. 18.

mitted receiving controlled substances from Withrow as payment," according to the arrest citation.

Withrow was arrested by Aberdeen, Ohio police and charged with burglary, third degree and other drug-related charges, according to police sources, who further confirmed that Withrow was taken to Georgetown Jail in Ohio and was airlifted from the jail to a nearby hospital after suffering symptoms indicative of those related to a drug overdose.

Thousands of pills were recovered from the hotel room Withrow was staying in at the time of his arrest.

Important Information About your Drinking Water

The Carlisle Water Department has levels of THM and HAAS above Drinking Water Standard. Our water system recently violated a drinking water standard. Although this incident was not an emergency, as our customers you have a right to know what happened and what we are doing to correct this situation.

We routinely monitor for the presence of drinking water contaminants. Testing results we received from April 1st, 2010 thru June 30, 2010 that our system exceeds the standard for maximum contaminant level (MCL) for trihalomcthanes (THM) and Haloacetic Acid (HAAs). The standard for THM is 0.080; the standard for HAAs is

0.060. The results for THM were 0.105 and HAAs was 0.072 at our system for April 1, 2010 to June 30, 2010. What should I Do? There is nothing you need to do unless you have a severely compromised immune system. have an infant, or are elderly. These people may be at increased risk and should seek advice about drinking water from their health care provider.

You do not need to boil your water or take other corrective sections. If a situation arises where the water is no longer safe to drink you will be notified within 24 hours. We will announce any emergenices on WLEX-TV Channel 18 news.

What does this mean?

This is not an emergency. If it had been an emergency, you would have been notified within 24 hours.

People who drink water containing trihalomethanes (THMs) in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer

What is being done?

We are working with the Division of Water to evaluate the water supply and researching optons to correct the problem
