Michael and David were crying, and that was ok. He would be the strong one today just as he had been for these last horrible six months since they had buried their mother and father and other family members and friends.

The Shawnee had killed them and had broken their family in more ways than any of them would ever want to acknowledge.

None of the Stucker children could read nor write.

They barely spoke English, and the few Dutch families that lived in this section of what they called Kentucky were caught up in their own problems; caught up in their own struggle for survival amid the harsh winter wilderness paradise.

Jacob Stucker Sr., and his brother George, their wives, and their combined total of 14 children, were

County on the night of Spencer's murder.

Barnett arrived at Spencer's home, made threatening statement, attempted to gain entry into the home and fired at least four shots from his .357 handgun at the rear and front of the Spencer home, according to Jascoviak's testimony.

Barnett shot the lock off of the rear door and then ran to the front of the home

among the 30 inhabitants who had once occupied John Grant's Station, having moved there from Bryant's Station.

The Stuckers were of Swedish descent. Young Jacob's grandfather had immigrated to Pennsylvania from Sweden. The Pennsylvania Dutch craftsmen were wonderful gunsmiths who perfected the accuracy of the Kentucky Long Rifle.

Jacob's father and uncle had arrived in Kentucky in January of 1780 at Bryant's Station. They immediately found their dreams in the Kentucky wilderness around the fields of the John Grant's fort, a haven for many Pennsylvania Dutch, including their kinsman Michael Stoner. The Grants had inter-married into the Boone clan and they along with other families had begun to carve out a home in the wilderness.

There had been so many dreams they had hoped to realize, but those dreams were all gone now, not even one year later. The British invasion of Kentucky in the summer of 1780 had destroyed those dreams with the same methodical violence with which it had destroyed Isaac Ruddle's and John Martin's Station. 

olas County. Witnesses at the scene identified Barnett as the man who fired shots into the home and Det. Jascoviak and other KSP officers arrested Barnett at his Nicholas County home later that same day.

They recovered spent casings and a .357 Rugar Blackhawk revolver handgun from Barnett's home.

Police also recovered one of the projectiles Barnett allegedly fired into the home.

We believe it was the projectile that entered Mrs. Spencer's chest and exited her back and then lodged in the bedroom door frame," Jascoviak testified amid the silence of the courtroom.

Jascoviak said additional charges were likely to be filed against Barnett and evidence indicated that Barnett had even went to Gallenstein's home earlier in the night, before going to Spencer's home.

When Jascoviak and other lawmen arrested Barnett they first read him his rights and he made no statement other than "I want to talk to my attorney," according to Jascoviak's testimony.

Jaskoviak also testified that Barnett "was drinking (alcohol) upon our arrival at his house.'

Judge Kuster listened intently during Jascoviak's testimony.

Pollard called no witnesses on Barnett's behalf and Judge Kuster quickly ruled that probable cause on Barnett's murder charge had been established and bound that charge over to a future Robertson County Grand Jury. Barnett remains lodged in the Bourbon County Regional Jail.

All persons are considered innocent until proven guilty or pleading guilty.
