## Senior Center to change location, former director retires

There are lots of changes going on involving the Nicholas County Senior Citizens Center.

The Center, located on Main Street, will be involved in physically moving their operations center from their current Main Street location to the Community Action Center on Scrubgrass Road, this week.

The move is expected to take approximately three to four days, according to Judge-Executive Kenny Lyons.

Judge Lyons and members of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court met in special session Saturday, Jan. 8 and heard from Randy Lawson, Aging Program Specialist from the Bluegrass Area Development District (BGADD) regarding federal mandated bid letting procedures the county must

participate in regarding the services provided by the Senior Citizens Center.

"It's a new process but there will still be the same services," Lawson told The Mercury Monday.

Lawson said that the funds in question were part of a somewhat complex formula depending on the number of citizens in the county. He did say that the county has previously "overmatched" its funding mandates.

"They've put in more funding than is required," he said. "And that's always a good thing."

Judge Lyons was in meetings in Lexington Monday to review the bid packets and go over bid procedures with members of the BGADD.

"Right now we have a pre-bid meeting on Jan. 18

Lawson reported at the meeting that other entities had requested the opportunity to bid on the services (provide the services for fees) and thus

the bid process was federally mandated.

This week will also mark the last week that former Center Director and current case worker, Carol Galbraith, will be helping at the Center.

Galbraith will be retiring this week after 15 years of dedicated service.

"I have so many wonderful memories of my time at the Center," Galbraith said Monday.

Galbraith has been a passionate supporter of the Center and all the programs the Center provides for the 'most-valuable' asset the community has, the senior citizens.

"It's been a very rewarding 15 years for me I have always been an advocate for senior citizens and that will continue," Galbraith said.

The county funds \$24,500 each year to the Senior Citizens Center and the city funds \$10,000.

## Man injured at recycling center

A Nicholas man was injured following a fall at the Nicholas

County Recycling Center last week, and the assistance of an unknown 'Good Samaritan' was on hand to aid him.

Officials say William

Plunkett was injured when he fell from his truck bed to the ground Jan. 5 just as the center was closing. Center director Danny Hawkins was completing his daily documentation process and became concerned when he noticed that the Plunkett truck was still near the recycling hopper.

Hawkins said he found Plunkett on the ground and though Plunkett tried to regain his footing Hawkins and an unknown individual prevented him from

further injuring himself until medical help arrived.

Judge-Executive Kenny Lyons praised the attention to detail that Hawkins exhibited in assisting Plunkett.

Hawkins said his conversations with Plunkett previous to the accident indicated he had occasionally had low blood sugar as a result of diabetes.

Though it is not known at this time if a drop in blood sugar from diabetes caused the fall, which sources say

resulted in a broken clavicle and possible injury to the ribs, what is known is that a good Samaritan helped

comfort Plunkett until help was approaching. "I don't know who the gentleman was," Hawkins said of the Good Samaritan. "I told him a gentleman was hurt and I needed to call for help, which I did, after that I returned to where Mr. Plunkett was and the other gentleman had removed his coat and placed it over him to help him stay warm

and to comfort him and was advising him not to move and that help was on the way."

As the ambulance approached the unknown good Samaritan simply got into his vehicle and left, even leaving his coat.

"He was a big help," Hawkins said.

Plunkett was transferred to Nicholas County Hospital and then transferred to the University of Kentucky Medical Center when he remains in stable condition.

## Authority begins eviction process

Members of the Carlisle-Nicholas County Industrial Development Authority met Monday and said hello to two new members while preparing documents to say goodbye, in the form of an eviction, to one of their clients who owes them several thousands of dollars in lease payments.

Authority Chairman Duane Kenney welcomed Carlisle Mayor Kevin Booth and Judge-Executive Kenny Lyons as ex-officio members and later briefed them and other Authority members on the ongoing financial problems associated with collecting the

monthly lease payments of Metavation, LLC., an entity previously known as LC Manufacturing.

The company leases one of the former Jockey buildings and has been delinquent on the last three monthly lease payments of \$5,000 each month.

The Authority continues to hold approximately \$13,000 in a security deposit from the company and discussion by board members Monday indicated they wanted to work with Metavation, but they couldn't continue to lease the building at no cost, and the contract between the Authority and the company was fairly straight-forward.

Kenney reported that

previous attempts to contact company personnel about the delinquent lease payments had been unsuccessful and no phone calls had been returned.

A certified letter was sent and still the lease payment for January 2011, which was supposed to be paid on the first of the month, has not been received, nor has the payments for November or December of 2010, according to discussion and a copy of the previous month's meeting of the Authority.

"They entered into a contract," Kenney said while making it clear the contractual obligations had not been met.

## Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

### THE SINGING GOURD



Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

*"We had nothing to begin life in Kentucky with; No horse, dog, cat or even a mouse... Mother had six children and we had to paddle the best we knew how."*

Barry Allen on life on the Kentucky frontier following the death of his father.

*"Father caught up his gun and mine and was running along with me in front of him. The Indians were within 30 steps behind us. They raised a yell, like wolves howling... Three Indians fired and father was almost to the top of the bank when he fell."*

Barry Allen on the death of his father near the present-day community of Salt Lick, Bath County, from his deposition located in the Draper Manuscripts volume 11CC page 67.

January, 1790 along the Licking River, not far from present-day Salt Lick, in northeastern Bath County.

16-year-old Barry Allen awoke to see that ice had formed on the Calico shirt the Shawnee Indians had given him and he was so cold, so very, very cold.

The four Shawnee warriors were still awake and they were singing while the oldest one shook a gourd filled with lead shot.

The fire crackled and the voices of the four warriors rose and fell in unison and seemed to make the flames dance as they sang their ancient song to their Gods.

The leader, the one with the silver bobs in his ears and the silver crescent attached to his scalp lock, was carrying his father's

scalp. He closed his eyes and in his half-frozen, half-sleeping state thought back to the events that had unfurled in the past few days. And it was all a fog and he was still in shock. And though it took all he could muster to maintain his sanity, he knew he must not act impulsively or else he would be killed immediately.

He and his father had joined several other men from the Stephen Biles Settlement, located two miles from present-day Winchester, on a winter hunt. Austin Webb became very sick about the time they reached the Mud Lick Spring (near present Olympia) and Jerry Wilson returned to the settlement with Webb.

He and his father took down one side of Mud Lick Branch and Frank Wyatt took the other with the three of them to meet up at the forks of Mud Lick and Salt Lick, near

the Licking River.

They met Peter Harper there, who was hunting his bear dogs.

Barry had killed a fat turkey with his shotgun and he and his father were eating it for breakfast when the Indians approached.

He saw his father shot just as they began to run and when he stopped, a quarter of a mile later, the one Shawnee Warrior with the silver bobs in his ears had raised his tomahawk in his left hand and reached out with his right and beckoned Barry to him.

Barry complied and the two returned to camp where he watched the one warrior strike his father twice with a tomahawk and take his scalp.

The Indians tied him with leather straps made from buffalo hides.

The next day they kept him tied and went along the river, returning with a white man named Watson.

They made him strip off

his clothing and then one of the warriors approached him from behind and struck him with a tomahawk.

The warriors took his scalp and all of his belongings, including several beaver pelts and beaver traps.

Barry thought of how the Indians had killed buffalo and that night they had boiled some buffalo fat and rolled it in cooked cornmeal. Perhaps it was because he was so hungry and upset, but he thought it was the most elegant meal he had ever eaten.

He sat up and shuffled closer to the fire, he had been tied with two of the warriors holding each end of the buffalo tug he was tied too, but he could still move somewhat and he tried to ease closer to the fire to melt some of the ice from the calico shirt and the piece of blanket they had tied around his head.

In the course of that morning he learned that three of the four Shawnee warriors could speak English.

Three of the warriors continued chanting their

ancient Shawnee song to the rhythm of the singing gourd, but the tall warrior; the one with the silver in his ears and hair approached him and placed two silver rings, one on a finger of each of Barry's hands and asked Barry if he would go home with him.

Barry had almost begun to weep then, but he caught himself.

"I... Don't know where my home is," he had said softly as the singing gourd shook a little more furiously in the background and the chanting intensified.

The Indian then removed a powder horn from around his waist and gave it to Barry, saying "good."

He cut the thongs binding his hands together and as the other three Indians rose to their feet, the tall one, the one who now owned Barry, pointed northward and said simple "go" and so they began trotting at a slow pace northward, toward where Barry Allen knew was the Ohio River and an uncertain fate.

# SENATE WEEK IN REVIEW

FRANKFORT — The Kentucky General Assembly convened its 2011 Regular Session last week, with hundreds of bills already filed and ready for consideration. Ordinarily, the first week of the session would be spent on formalities like electing leaders and appointing committees, with the real work beginning in February. With only 30 days to accomplish so much, however, we went right to work holding committee meetings and passing legislation.

We did begin our first day with the traditional ceremonies, swearing in five new members

along with re-elected colleagues. Seven of our eight chamber leaders were re-elected, and I was elected by the Democrat Caucus as Floor Leader in place of my good friend, Ed Worley who retired at the end of 2010. I am honored to have been selected by my Democrat colleagues and will work with all the members of the Senate, the House and Governor Beshear in a bipartisan fashion so that all Kentuckians benefit.

On Day Two, though, the real work began with committee hearings. By the end of the week, we had passed several bills and sent them to the House. One of the bills we passed was Senate

Bill 8, which would create an online one-stop portal for businesses in Kentucky. The website, run through the Secretary of State's office, would allow businesses to do everything from filling out permits to accessing information on grants and incentives to paying their unemployment taxes. Saving time and paperwork will allow companies, particularly small businesses, to

focus on their products and services. In the end, that means more money and more jobs for Kentuckians.

In addition to helping small business, we took steps to make government more accessible to the public. Senate Bill 7 would create searchable online databases of government spending for all three branches, allowing taxpayers to see how their money is spent. In

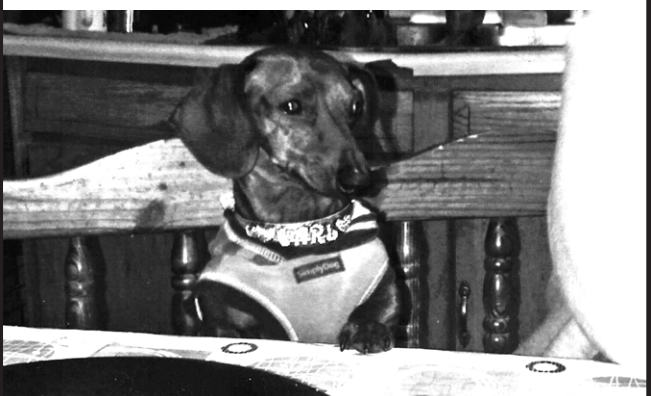
Members of a Nicholas County Grand Jury returned an indictment against Jason Callahan on Jan. 3. Callahan was the only individual indicted by

## Nicholas man enters Alford plea

A Nicholas man entered an Alford plea last week and avoided a jury trial this week on a charge of trafficking in marijuana more than eight ounces but less than five pounds.

Dwayne Conken, 60, appeared in Nicholas District Court Jan. 3 for a pre-trial hearing one week before a scheduled jury trial was to occur regarding Conken's Feb. 8, 2010 trafficking charge.

Conken and his attorney Roger Michael signed documentation, along with Circuit Judge, Honorable Jay Delaney, in which Conken entered an Alford plea to the charge.

Conken and Connie Gardner

were arrested by Kentucky State Police Detective Keith Hensley of the Cannabis Suppression Division executed a search warrant at Conken's residence and found processed marijuana.

Conken has been described by several sources in law enforcement as otherwise law abiding and having been a hard-working model citizen.

Judge Delaney signed a diversion order regarding Conken's Alford plea. An Alford plea is not the same as a guilty plea but does stipulate that if a trial were forthcoming evidence might be found which might lead to a guilty verdict being rendered.

Judge Delaney's diversion order, signed Jan. 3 stipulates

that for a period of three years Conken must participate in supervised probationary meetings, must not be engaged in any additional criminal activity and must participate in drug and alcohol counseling at his own expense as well as pay other fees and fines.

If Conken violates any of his diversionary conditions he will face three years imprisonment. If he satisfactorily completes his diversion the criminal offense will be stricken from his record.

Gardner's charges of trafficking in marijuana and endangering the welfare of a minor remain unresolved in the court system with a pre-trial conference scheduled for next month.
