

## FEMA tours Nicholas County assessing damage

Nicholas County Judge Executive Kenneth Lyons along with Tom Magnuson from FEMA Public Assistance Grant Program, Steve Stacy from the State Garage, Mike Watkins, County Road Superintendent, Howard Sosby, N.R.S.C. (Natural Resource Soil Conservation) and James Lewis from the Kentucky Emergency Management recently toured Nicholas County assessing damage caused to the local roads do to the recent flooding.

Currently the county is waiting for the President to declare disaster. Once that occurs, funding will be available to help with the road repairs. To meet the criteria a county must have at least \$22,000 in damage and the state must have \$5.2 million. According to

Judge Executive Lyons, the county has well over a half of a million in damage.

Once the President declares the disaster, FEMA will set up meetings followed by a training class. Any relief provided for the county will be by reimbursement. The county will pay for the repairs and then will have to wait for FEMA to pay them back. If approved FEMA will pay up to 75% of the estimated cost to repair the roads. The state Emergency Road fund will contribute another 12-13% from Emergency funds in the road fund. This money is placed by keeping three percent of all road monies held back for emergencies.

To repair the roads rails must be drilled and placed everywhere that the road has slid. These rails come in 42 foot sections and cost

\$27 per linear foot. The ground must be drilled to a point that rock is hit, then an additional ten feet must be drilled into the rock and the rails inserted. A guardrail is then constructed on the rails and the land is back filled.

Nicholas County had five roads severely damaged with four that were temporarily closed. This translates into about 1300-1400 linear feet of damaged roads. The rails must be placed every three feet, making this a costly but necessary repair.

Judge Lyons explained, "I really feel like we need to do a lot of ditching and fixing of culverts this summer. Litter is another problem that we must face. It is filling the culverts and not allowing the water to run off the roads. When the water has nowhere to go we end up with these problems."

## Police nab two during break-in

An alert Carlisle dispatcher working the graveyard shift was instrumental in helping police foil a burglary of a popular downtown restaurant.

Shortly after midnight Sunday, two witnesses — dispatcher Mike Cobb of the Carlisle Police Department and citizen Charles Warner, Jr. — saw two men allegedly sneak into Garrett's Restaurant.

That discovery led to the arrest of Dallas Dean Vaughn III, Upper Lick Road, Carlisle, and Vincent Matthew Rosso McNabb, W. North St., Carlisle.

Restaurant owner George Garrett said he rushed to the restaurant after learning that a burglary was in progress and surprised the suspects, who were taking a commemorative bottle of Maker's Mark, a bag of pennies, a Hershey bar, and half a roll of postage stamps.

McNabb, 18, was arrested without incident, charged with third-degree burglary and jailed at the Bourbon County Detention Center.

Vaughn, 19, didn't go down as easily.

Also known as "Little DD" and "Hero," Vaughn was charged with third-degree burglary, resisting arrest, third-degree assault, second-degree assault on a police service animal, and two counts of second-degree escape.

The escape charges stemmed from Vaughn's attempts to run twice from the Nicholas County Hospital emergency room, where he was being treated for injuries he suffered while fighting with Sgt. Bennie Buckler at the restaurant.

Sgt. Buckler was treated at the hospital for left knee pain and a possible broken right hand.

In his first escape attempt, Vaughn, in the custody of Police Chief Darrell Layne, ran smack into Sgt. Buckler, who threw him to the ground.

On his second attempt to flee, Vaughn was shot with a Taser by Chief Layne. Vaughn fell to the ground and gashed his chin. He was taken to the University of Kentucky Hospital, where he was treated. Hospital records show that Vaughn was discharged Sunday. However, on Monday afternoon the Bourbon County Detention Center web site didn't list him as a prisoner.

Vaughn was charged with assault on a police service animal after he allegedly kicked, punched and choked canine officer Hancock, who flushed Vaughn from his hiding place under a desk in the rear of the restaurant.

Vaughn also fought with restaurant owner George Garrett, whose right wrist was in a cast from the altercation.

Chief Layne said the 5-foot-nine, 150-pound Vaughn struggled so much that he bent the handcuffs he was wearing while in custody.

Chief Layne and Sgt. Buckler wondered whether a recent rash of burglaries would end with the arrest and incarceration of Vaughn and McNabb.

Those burglaries include one at the VFW club, two at Hometown Videos, one at Susie's Flowers, and three at residences in Carlisle.

Items taken in the burglaries, police said, were those that could easily be sold, pawned or traded.

## City wants to unload Jockey 'white elephant'

The Carlisle City Council on Friday voted unanimously to have the financially burdensome Jockey International Inc., building appraised in anticipation of selling it.

"It's a white elephant and a burden to taxpayers," said Mayor Kevin Booth.

Last year, the city bought the 176,000-square-foot building and

accompanying 38 acres for \$1. Since then, the city has spent \$82,892.63 to maintain it, said City Clerk Mary L. Stewart.

The breakdown of expenditures:

- \$2,784.57 to get the building ready to sell
- \$17,240.08 gas bill
- \$21,070.72 property taxes
- \$34,718.08 electric
- \$7,079.18 insurance

"A lot of citizens want

to get rid of it," said Councilperson Betty Jo Booth.

Jockey International closed its knitting plant in 2009, eliminating 137 jobs, as textile companies throughout the nation moved production to other countries where labor costs were lower or consolidated operations at other U.S. plants.

Booth, who said he inherited the building from the previous administration, said

the city would like to reinvest the proceeds from the sale into economic development.

In other business at the called meeting, the council repealed one-way status for Locust Street and Sugar Tree Alley, returning them to two-way streets.

The council also passed a resolution authorizing Booth and Stewart as legal representatives for the city for the purpose of acquiring surplus property from the state.

## Carlisle pair helps storm-ravaged Tuscaloosa

Adam Tubbs and Nelson Sewell traveled to tornado-ravaged Tuscaloosa, Ala., last week to help victims recover from the horrific storms that devastated the area, killing more than 200 people.

A massive tornado — some estimates put it as a mile wide — tore through the city Wednesday, April 27.

"It was literally a complete disaster area," Nelson said earlier this week. "It was awful."

"One woman described seeing tornadoes coming toward her as 'the gates of hell opening up,'" Adam said.

The two volunteers left Carlisle Thursday, the day after the devastation occurred, and returned the following Sunday night.

Nelson, a Nicholas County constable and deputy coroner, helped with law enforcement, while Adam, an EMS worker and part-time firefighter, worked with search and recovery and also helped residents salvage furniture and

other possessions.

"They were the most welcoming people I've ever met in my life," Adam said. "I've never been thanked so much in my life. One of the residents I helped move was named Rosie. She was wonderful. Helping her was worth everything."

"I just feel very blessed.

It was a very rewarding experience to be able to volunteer to help those people," Adam said.

Nelson, who went to New Orleans in 2005 to help the victims of Hurricane Katrina, advised people to "appreciate what you've got, because it could be gone in a matter of seconds."

Clark Funeral Home helped with funding that enabled Nelson and Adam to make the relief trip.

Adam said he wants to return to Alabama in a year or so to see how much the citizens there have recovered.

"It'll take them at least that long," he said.

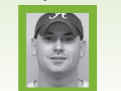

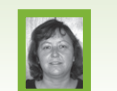

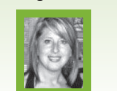

Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

### AN ORPHAN'S RETURN TO JONESBORO

Eighteen hundred and sixty-one: There in the echo of Sumter's gun Marches the host of the Orphan Brigade, Lit by their banners, in hope's best arrayed. Five thousand strong, never legion hath borne Might as this bears it forth in that morn: Hastings and Crecy, Naseby, Dunbar, Cowpens and Yorktown, Thousand Years' War, Is writ on their hearts as onward afar They shout to the roar of their drums.

Eighteen hundred and sixty-two: Well have they paid to the earth its due. Close up, steady! The half are yet here and all of the might, for the living bear the dead in their hearts over Shiloh's field - Rich, O God, is thy harvest's yield! Where faith swings the sickle, trust binds the sheaves, to the roll of the surging drums.

Eighteen hundred and sixty-three: Barring Sherman's march to the sea - shorn to a thousand; face to the foe back, ever back, but stubborn and slow.

Nineteen hundred wounds they take in that service of Hell, yet the hills they shake with the roar of their charge as onward they go to the roar of their throbbing drums.

Eighteen hundred and sixty-four: Their banners are tattered, and scarce twelve score, battered and wearied and seared and old, stay by the staves where the Orphans hold firm as a rock when the surges break shield of a land where men die for His sake. For the sake of the brothers whom they have laid low, to the roll of their muffled drums. Eighteen hundred and sixty-five: The Devil is dead and the Lord is alive, in the earth that springs where the heroes sleep, and in love new born where the stricken weep. That legion hath marched past the setting of sun: Beaten? Nay, victors: the realms they have won are the hearts of men who forever shall hear the throb of their far-off drums.

### THE ORPHAN BRIGADE

By Harvard geology professor and Kentucky native, Nathaniel S. Shaler. Prof. Shaler fought on the side of the Union Army during the American Civil War. Like many Union soldiers Shaler came to admire and respect his dreaded Kentucky Confederate foes that made up The Orphan Brigade.

Nicholas County native and Confederate officer of the 4th Regiment, of the Orphan Brigade, Lot D. Young, used the poem as his introduction to his book "Reminiscences of a soldier of the Orphan Brigade."

"Three hundred thousand Yankees lay stiff in Southern dust yeah we got three hundred thousand before they conquered us. They died of Southern fever and Southern steel and shot. I wish we got three million more instead of what we got." 5th stanza in the song, "I'm a good old Rebel", written by Major James Randolph, an officer, who served under General Jeb Stuart CSA. Randolph wrote the song in 1865 and it was localized by confederate veterans across the nation, particularly in Kentucky.

"I stand on this historic spot where 48 years ago the unequal, almost suicidal conflict raged with destruction and fury and see, in my mind's eye, the raging conflict and hear the cannon's mighty roar, the screaming shot and shell and the ping and whistle of the deadly Minnie, the shouts and yells of the combatants as they grappled in the deadly conflict."

Lt. Lot Dudley Young, officer of Company H, 4th Regiment, of the 1st Kentucky Infantry Brigade, Confederate States of America, on his May 1912 return to Jonesboro.

He had been a young man the first time he beheld the landscape around the town of Jonesboro, Georgia, and now he had returned as an old man. He felt that almost forgotten tightening in the pit of his stomach that had nearly paralyzed him that day here, so long ago when he and his companions in the infamous Orphan Brigade were nearly annihilated as one. The grievous wound he had miraculously

survived had led to his capture and six months of being an invalid as he was shuffled from one Union hospital to another before simply leaving his last place of convalescence to reunite with the remnants of the Orphan Brigade before their surrender. But there were only a handful left when he found them again amid the oblivion of Georgia, so few in fact they had been disbanded as an infantry unit and were now given the mission of mounted cavalry. And so Nicholas County native, Lot Dudley Young, made his way up past the old stone train depot there at Jonesboro on that calm May afternoon in 1912, and simply stared at the old depot that had looked so majestically during that battle nearly a half century before, and he looked upon the prominent hill above it, which had been occupied by General Sherman's Union Army. He had ventured forth early on the morning of August 31, 1864 as part of Lt. Heck Burdon's small but deadly unit of Kentucky Sharpshooters and with his special English-made Kerr rifle he had

found and dropped a Union target atop of that knoll before returning to his own company and the slaughter that would confront him and his fellow soldiers hours later. Though he had been reduced to tears following his nearly deadly wound as he lay beside his best friend Robert Lindsey in a Confederate ambulance, he had never trembled. He was trembling now as he found that fateful spot where he had paused during the charge to assist a companion, and then a heavy Minnie Ball had struck him and nearly tore him in half and he was carried to the Confederate ambulance where he saw his best friend, Robert Lindsey, lay fatally wounded. He and Lindsey had become such fast friends and looked acted so much alike that they were often called twins. They had eaten that last meal together and spoke of death earlier that day at Jonesboro. And now he was back on that hallowed ground all these years later. And try as he might he could not stop trembling.

This week, in honor of National Teacher Appreciation Week, May 2-6, I have chosen to research an old school house and its background in our community.

Located in the northern, rural portion of Nicholas County, there is a one room school house that goes by the name of Hildreth School. This school house was used from the 1880's until about 1941 and was not only used as a school

but also as a religious gathering place.

What makes Hildreth School famous is that according to the website, www.carlisle-nicholascounty.org, it was used by The Public Broadcasting Services during their filming of the movie Huckleberry

Finn.

Back in the late 1800's and early 1900's there were many of these one room school houses scattered about Nicholas County. According to the book "History of Nicholas County," these one room schools were known as Field schools, and they were one of the first public buildings to be constructed after a community was settled.

"Such structures were of hewn log with half

chined cracks, earthen floors, clapboard doors and windows and latter usually without door frames or window panes. Desks were made of crude puncheon split logs with the hewn side up."

The book goes on to say that in 1924 there were as many as 45 of these Field schools in Nicholas County alone! It says, "Each district controlled its own educational operations and facilities,

thus making degree of standardization within the county impossible."

Can you imagine! That would make 45 different schools with 45 different teachers and different aged children learning all kinds of different things at the same time! Shew! Kind of makes us a little more thankful for the organized and standardized learning that goes on today in Nicholas County.

Thanks to Hildreth

School and all of the other one room school houses that once existed like it, we now have a much more advanced educational system in place in Nicholas County. Therefore, I deem Hildreth School a point of interest in our community.

Thoughts from the Pastor's Study

Love Your Enemies: One Pastor's Thoughts On The Death Of Osama bin Laden

It was about 10:50pm on Sunday night when I first heard the news. I had been flipping through channels, landing on CNN when I heard that the President had called for a late news conference. Knowing how rare it is for the President to speak to the nation after 11pm EST, on a Sunday night nonetheless, I decided to wait and hear this major announcement concerning national security. About 10:50, John King of CNN reported that Osama bin Laden had been killed.

Like millions of Americans, I had been waiting for nearly 10 years to hear the news of his capture. So what was my reaction when the news broke? The truth is, I really don't know. Part of me wanted to grab the stars and stripes and wave it in celebration. Part of me wanted to be with the crowds gathering outside the White House or around Ground Zero in New York. Part of my wanted to burst out in song, singing The Star Spangled Banner or at least Toby Keith's The Angry American.

But there was another part of me that wouldn't let me do any of these things. There was a part of me that stopped me in my tracks every time I wanted to grab a flag, join a flash mob,

or burst out in song. There was a part of me that would not let me celebrate the death of Osama bin Laden. For, you see, every time I began to celebrate I heard these words: Love your enemies.

Make no mistake, Osama bin Laden has been an enemy. He has been an enemy of this country, declaring open war on the United States of America. He has been an enemy of freedom, openly opposing it and taking violent action to prevent it. He has been an enemy of peace, claiming responsibility for various acts of war that have happened across the globe. He has been an enemy of life itself, causing the death of countless innocent people.

However, Osama bin Laden's actions do not

change these words of Jesus: Love your enemies.

Although these words were first spoken thousands of years ago, they were also spoken in the face of real enemies. They were spoken in the face of the Roman Empire, which had taken over Israel by force. They had brought an end to countless innocent lives. They had held Israel under the firm control of an oppressive thumb for centuries. We can also never forget that they were (at least in part) responsible for the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. And, unlike our situation with bin Laden, the people of Israel had to deal with the Romans every single day. Yet Jesus still told the people of Israel: Love your enemies.

Even after his death,

my feelings for Osama bin Laden are anything but love. Which makes me wonder, if I cannot love any enemy who has been killed, is there any chance I could ever love an enemy who is still alive? This is just one more way that I fall short of the example of Jesus.

Although I will never love this enemy, and even though I cannot celebrate the death of any person, I continue to pray that the ways of God will find a way to come through this situation. I pray that the world is a safer place today than it was yesterday. I pray that this death may lead to an end to our ongoing war in Afghanistan and Iraq. I pray that this death will end the plague that radical Islam has been to an

otherwise peaceful religion. I pray that this death with lead to the reconciliation of both political and personal relationships that have been severed because of terrorism. I pray that peace will finally come.

No, as a Christian, I feel I cannot celebrate the death of Osama

bin Laden; but, as an American, I cannot mourn his passing either. I know that I am commanded to love my enemy but, in this case, I cannot bring myself to do it. But I will not allow myself to feel hatred for this man, for I firmly believe that hatred is never the way of God - love always is.

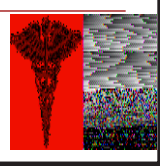

Thoughts from the Pastor's Study

In the footsteps of Thomas Have you ever imagined what it would have been like to have been one of those original disciples, chosen by Jesus to continue His work when He was gone. They were certainly a diverse group: fishermen, tax collectors, common ordinary people. One of that group has been labeled since that time for one incident, doubting Thomas. John 20:24-29 One of the disciples, Thomas (nicknamed the Twin), was not with the others when Jesus came. 25 They told him, "We have seen the Lord!" but he replied, "I won't believe it unless I see the nail wounds in his hands, put my fingers into them, and place my hand into the wound in his side." 26 Eight days later the disciples were together again, and this time Thomas was with them. The doors were locked; but suddenly, as before, Jesus was standing among them. He said, "Pease be with you." 27 Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger there and see my hands. Put your hand into the

wound in my side. Don't be faithless any longer. Believe!" 28 "My Lord and my God!" Thomas exclaimed. 29 Then Jesus told him, "You believe because you have seen me. Blessed are those who haven't seen me and believe anyway." I am sure that you all remember the famous story of doubting Thomas. Thomas gets a bad rap here, we have to understand what was going on before. The first thing we need to understand is that on that first resurrection Sunday, Mary said that Jesus appeared to her. None of the disciples believed her. If they had, they would have not been in the room gathered together hiding in fear. When they were together Thomas was not there Even as they cowered behind locked doors Jesus appeared to them. Jesus showed those present His hands and His side. They were overjoyed to see the Lord they thought wasa dead. He was alive! Where was Thomas? The Bible does not say. Thomas did not want to blindly accept what his

fellow disciples said. He wanted to make sure that everything was correct. So, the Lord showed up one week later and showed him. Thomas makes one of the most overlooked statements in the Bible. "My Lord and my God." This statement is amazing, for a Jew to make that statement is incredible. To call an human associate "My Lord and My God" could be considered blasphemy and punishable by death. Thomas was willing to believe and to risk everything to declare who Jesus was. What can we gain from this story? First of all understand that doubt is not sin. It is not sin to doubt. If it were Jesus would have said, "Why are you sinning against me?" he did not say that. We all wrestle with doubt from time to time. Notice something here, he never doubted Jesus, he doubted his fellow disciples. Once Jesus showed him, he believed and admitted it. Unbelief and doubt are not the same. Unbelief is deliberate denial,

disobedience, rebellion, resistance, and is always condemned. Doubt is the sincere question; unbelief is the unwillingness to hear the answer. Todoubttheresurrection is not hat uncommon. Dead people rarely get up and are alive again. When you ignore the possibility of the supernatural and miracles you limit truth, science is not able to explain everything. Thomas had just lost his friend Jesus (So he thought) with dashed hopes. It is hard to make faith fit in with the painful realities of life. This occurs when: a loved one dies, children in this world are starving, we lose our job, our marriage falls apart. What is funny is we often doubt that miracles can happen, but our desire for them is even stronger. The writer of Psalms sometimes express much anger and sing about doubts and disappointments. However, they always seem to realize in the end that God is God, God cares for them, and God listens to them. We will all have times

when we question but we must be willing by faith to listen for God's answer and believed. Hebrews 11:1 states, "now faith is begin sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see. (NIV) Jesus told Thomas that he saw and believed. He also said the greater blessing would be for those who have not seen and yet believed. No matter what our circumstances in life, and life can be really hard at time, we must always believe that God is still in control and that He loves us.

Cameron Mills was born on December 10, 1975 in Ft. Walton, Florida. Two years later his family moved to Somerset, KY, where his father, who had played at the University of Kentucky in the late sixties, took a coaching job.

Cameron grew up participating in church activities in various denominations and at age seven he asked Jesus into his heart. He played soccer and baseball but showed early promise at basketball. The summer after seventh grade his family including his younger brother, Collier, moved to Lexington. That

summer, also, the family welcomed two sisters into the family by adoption, Meredith and Melinda. In 1990 Cameron was part of the freshman class of a brand new high school, Paul Laurence Dunbar. He made the varsity basketball team that year and went on to the final game of the state basketball tournament both his junior and senior years. Recruited by many Division 1 schools he chose to walk on at his father's alma mater and play for Coach Rick Pitino at the University of Kentucky. He was part of UK's 1996 NCAA championship team and was awarded a scholarship for the next two years. During UK's run back to the final game in 1997 Cameron played a major role hitting 61% from the field (63% from the three-point line).

In 1998, under Coach Tubby Smith, he hit a pivotal shot against archrival Duke to send UK back to the Final Four for the third straight year. He hit two clutch three-pointers during the second half of the championship win against Utah. Cameron is still UK's all-time leader in three-point percentage for a season at 53.2% and for a career at 47.4%. Though basketball has been a big part of Cameron's life, his calling since he was twelve has been ministry. In June of 1998, he began Cameron Mills Ministries, Inc. Since then Cameron has been speaking to schools, youth groups, and churches. He has held revivals and spoken at Christian music festivals, and college chapels. Representing Compassion International and Christianspeakers.com Cameron is available to speak throughout the year.

Cameron does ministry because he wants to make a difference and he knows that a relationship with Jesus makes the ultimate difference. Called at 12 Cameron had various opportunities to speak during high school and while at the University of Kentucky. His calling was confirmed

during his freshman year at UK when after speaking on sexual purity a young girl came up to him and said she wished she had heard his message two weeks earlier. Although interest is piqued by his affiliation with the winningest college basketball program in the country Cameron holds his audience's attention by delivering a high energy, strong, thought provoking, Bible based message. Because he wants to be available to speak to anyone Cameron is not affiliated with any one denomination (read his core beliefs in the Beliefs section.) He does not charge a set amount but depends on the generosity of those hearing him and monthly donors to the ministry. In the past ten years a wide diversity of experiences has broadened Cameron's appeal. He can be effective in reaching all ages and a variety of milieus including but not limited to: leadership conferences, festivals, revivals, camps, chapels, Sunday morning and evening church services, club meetings, mission trips and corporate events. He also speaks at corporate events.

According to Shawna Hatton, Director of the Nicholas County Senior Citizens Center, the goal is to do something different and give back to the community. Hatton said, "We are hoping that this is going to bring awareness and bridge the gap between old and young. No matter what age you are, you are important."

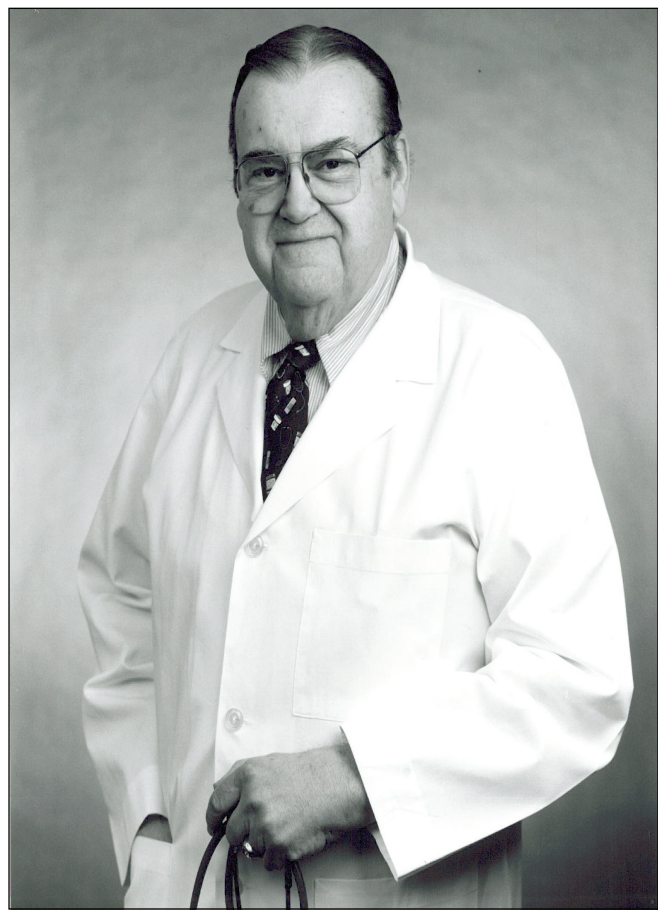
# Dr. Joe A. Nichols retires after 45 years of service

## INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Nicholas County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 2 through May 16, 2011. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 2011, assessment on which state, county, and school taxes for 2011 will be due about September 15, 2011.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:30 and 4:30.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

A taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Revenue, Office of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110
- (4) The final decision of the Department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.
