## Buckler to enter plea Garrett to be formally sentenced

Former Nicholas County Deputy Sheriff Benny Buckler is scheduled to appear in Nicholas Circuit Court this week and enter a

Garrett was facing a possible maximum 15-year prison sentence if found guilty. In exchange for his guilty plea, which included an agreement, to never again run for public office, pay restitution totaling \$38,000 and provide testimony against Buckler, the Commonwealth recommends that Garrett be placed on diversion.

Buckler will also receive a recommendation of diversion, according to those close to the case, including Buckler's attorney Amanda Mullins.

Mullins, like others close to the case, discussed the monumental stress a person under indictment and facing years in prison can be subjected to. "A diversion offer is just

so much more predictable than a jury," she said. "A diversion is the next best thing to an acquittal. Mr. Buckler's health was deteriorating and that was also a factor in his decision."

Buckler was indicted on April 4 by members of a Nicholas County Grand Jury on the charges of theft by unlawful taking and receiving stolen property.

## Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

### AN ANCIENT **HOME**

We live in an interesting place, dear reader.

A friend, who shares an interest in history and the outdoors, came over this past weekend to fix the leak in my porch roof.

It's a porch roof I built myself, which probably explains why it leaks.

The leak is now fixed and I sure can't take any credit. I'm still as leery of ladders, as I have always been, and I know in my heart that the best way to keep from falling off a ladder is to never get on one.

You live, you learn. It's a

Anyway, my friend Tommy P' is fairly handy with a tool belt and wrench; and paint brush and putty knife, so he felt sorry for me and came over and helped

We settled up afterward and did some trading, to

He'd been eye-balling my one and only Morgan silver dollar for a while and I finally traded it to him for a couple of arrowheads that I had picked out of a small container of them he sometimes carries when he's in the mood to trade.

I think he also carries them for inspiration; as he is an artifact hunter, like I

I love holding flint projectile points in my hand, marveling at the craftsmanship and design that went into each of them.

I've found thousands of them in my career as an artifact hunter. Becoming familiar with specific projectile points that are styled in a certain manner and found in the same area, is pretty special.

I still love finding arrowheads along The Licking River and its tributaries. It's a direct connection between me and the individuals who handled those artifacts hundreds, often times thousands, of years ago; on the very same ground as I call my home.

Sometimes, just as I'm slowly easing one out of the dirt, I'll get a special tingle

down my spine. To see the vibrant streaks of color that emanates from many of the projectiles, only made possible by heat-treating 'carter' flint, is to better understand the mind of the hunter who made the lethal tool, and to see the artistic mind at work, as well.

Projectile point styles have been studied by enthusiasts near and far for several centuries and much is known about the people who used distinctive projectile point styles.

Other artifacts induce similar euphoric responses upon their discovery.

Few finds equal that of a bear-tooth pendant.

Bear teeth were collected and worn in significant numbers by members of a group of Native Americans who inhabited our portion of Kentucky from around 875 AD to 1600 AD and were an extension of the Mississippian Culture of Native Americans known in the Ohio River Valley today as Fort Ancient.

Archaeological evidence

tells us that Fort Ancient people were very resourceful. They were intimate with the landscape and all the plants and animals that made up their world. They were master gar-

deners and hunters.

There was a very strong and close relationship between the people and certain local mammals; chiefly eastern Kentucky and was away on the Maryland Meramong these were whitetail deer, wild turkey and black All three of these animals

still inhabit our home coun-An ancient Native Ameri-

can footpath, known among later indigenous people like the Shawnee and Cherokee, was called the "Athiamiowee" or a variation. It means 'Path of the Armed Ones'. Early settles called it The Warrior's Path or simply The War Road. It was an County. ancient path that traversed landscape in north-

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





# High school sports seasons

Participation in high school sports programs is a favorite activity among many high school students. In many instances, scholastic sports seasons mirror the schedules of professional sports leagues, although the school seasons are often shorter.

Thousands of students participate in the different athletic programs offered by schools every year. The following scholastic sports schedule applies to most school districts, but athletes in waiting might want to consult their local school

just to be sure.
Football:Just like the NFL, football tends to be a fall/winter sport. The season may begin shortly after the start of school and last through November.

Baseball: This is a spring sport that will start around late March or early April and continue through the rest of the school year. Some teams play even after school

is out for the year.

Basketball: This is another fall into winter sport.

It could start in October

It could start in October and stretch to February if the school makes it into the playoffs.

Outdoor track and Field:

Outdoor track and field seasons traditionally start in the early spring, such as March. The season will run into May or the end of the school year.

Hockey: This is a winter sport, which usually begins around November and may run through March of the following year.

Many other scholastic sports are scheduled according to the school and may not have designated seasons. These include volleyball, swimming and cheerleading. In general, these sports will be coordinated based on when funding is

available.

These sports seasons are approximate. It's best to check with athletic departments for clarification.



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

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) encourages moderation if you enjoy snacking on the old fashioned favorite.

This financial statement is the responsibility of the former Sheriff. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on this financial statement based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the Audit Guide for County Fee Officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free of material misstatement. An audit also includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, the Sheriff's office prepares the financial statement on a regulatory basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the laws of Kentucky, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In our opinion, the financial statement referred to above presents fairly, in all material respects, the revenues, expenditures, and excess fees of the former Sheriff for the year ended December 31, 2010, in conformity with the regulatory basis of accounting described in

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated September 20, 2011 on our consideration of the former Nicholas County Sheriff's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit. Based on the results of our audit, we have presented the accompanying comments and recommendations, included herein, which discusses the following report comments:
