The members of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court met Wednesday evening in a marathon three and a half hour meeting. One of the items that was addressed was the forming of a Board to address the financial needs of the Soil Conservation District. It was decided and put to a vote. The members of the board are Steve Hamilton, Jimmy Wells, and Mike Webb. The members are to get together with the Soil Conservation Board and hatch out an agreement on how much the Fiscal Court members agree is the correct amount for the S.C.D.

cycling center changes. Currently the cardboard is taken to Richmond, then to Maysville. Mills discussed how the county could profit from installing a ramp so that a forklift could directly load the cardboard bails to a trailer and then be taken directly to the Maysville center. Judge Executive Kenny Lyons informed the members of the court that they could pick up portable ramps from Frankfort on surplus. There are currently enough cardboard bails for an entire trailer load and three-fourths of another one. Once this recycle is taken, it will mean income for the county.

The members also accepted a bid from Cheaps Auto for a truck with a dump bed and the set-up for a snow plow. The price was thou-

sands lower than any other bid.

The court listened to the second reading of the 2011 Tax Ordinance, before reappointing the members of the N.C. Library Board.

Steve Hamilton addressed the court about the little league using the Armory. Mike Webb made the motion to allow the little league to continue its use and Jimmy Wells seconded it, with all members voting in favor.

Steve Hamilton spoke for Mr. Alex Kazunas in response to the soccer field. Kazunas stated that he would like to use money not from the county to do improvements on the soccer field, including evening the grade of the land. The court members also discussed the walking trail. A gentleman has agreed to cut the trail in

exchange for the top soil that is removed. The members of the court agreed to both of the requests with all members in agreement.

Monthly bills, Treasurer's Monthly reports and Treasurers Transfers were all approved by the members of the court.

A notice was also given stating that the regular

scheduled meeting for November 8 had been changed to November 9 at 6:00 p.m. due to the fact that Election Day is on November 8.

Committee reports were given for the Nicholas County Public Library, the Sheriff's Department, the Dog Warden Report, the Jailer's Report, the Nicholas County

Water District Board Meeting Minutes, and the Nicholas County Conservation District Report.

In new business, there was discussion of rules to be imposed regarding off leash hunting dogs on county property during business hours. There will be a motion published in the paper soon regarding this situation.

The band traveled to Union, Ky., Saturday to compete in a MSBA sanctioned contest and for its fifth contest in a row; they were able to capture top class honors.

In preliminary competition, five bands were competing in class A. New Albany, IN was awarded 5th place, Pleasure Ridge Park was awarded 4th, Rising Sun, IN was awarded 3rd, Lexington Christian Academy was awarded best percussion, best visual and 2nd place and Nicholas County was awarded best music, best effect, best guard and 1st place.

Color guard instructor Jeremy Owens said he is very proud of the guard and the way they were able to work through the elements.

"The wind was very blustery, which made the [guard] equipment a little hard to control," Owens said. "However, they went out and tried their best to control themselves and do the best job possible. I am proud of them and can't wait to see the outcome of them and the whole band here in a couple weeks."

In class AA preliminaries, Evansville Bosse, IN was awarded 4th place, Silver Creek, IN was awarded 3rd place, Danville, IN was awarded a spirit award, best guard and 2nd place and Perry Meridian, IN was awarded best percussion, best visual, best music, best effect and 1st place.

In class AAA, Conner High School was awarded all caption awards, best guard, best percussion, best music, best effect, best visual and 1st place.

In class AAAA Beechwood High School was awarded all caption awards, best guard, best percussion, best music, best effect, best visual and 1st place.

In Open Class, Hamilton SE, IN was awarded all caption awards, best guard, best percussion, best music, best effect, best visual and 1st place.

The top 8 band advanced to the finals competition held later that evening. They were: Hamilton SE, IN, Lexington Christian Academy, Conner High School, Nicholas County, Beechwood High School, Perry Meridian, IN, Silver Creek, IN and Danville, IN.

"It was the first time we performed the whole show for a contest crowd," Hale said. "Our goal is to be in the top 4 in the next two weeks."

Next weekend the band travels to Madison Southern High School in Berea, for the KMEA Class A East Regional Competition. The top 8 bands from here will meet up with the top 8 bands from the Class A West Regional Competition on Oct. 29 at KMEA State Semi-Finals at Warren Central High School in Bowling Green.

From there, the top 4 bands will move on to state finals held later that night at Western Kentucky University's L.T. Smith Stadium.

The following weekend, Nov. 5h, the band will travel to Norwood High School in Norwood, Ohio to compete in the MSBA Championships.

Regional performance time is set for 7 p.m. Sat., Oct. 22 with state semi-finalist announcements to be made at 10 p.m.

Ghost Hunter Patti Starr visits Carlisle

Last Thursday, evening was a night of ghostly knowledge and encounters, Patti Starr, certified Ghost Hunter paid a visit to Carlisle to the Nicholas County Public Library. She moved to Kentucky in 1995 and was living in Bardstown, and she immediately let people know that she was a ghost hunter. She was voted one of the 10 top Ghost Hunter Paranormal Investigator in America in 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010, and 2011. She has been a ghost hunter for 30 years, and has done her work in 3 different countries and 26 states. She is the also the owner of Ghost Hunter Shop, located at 835 Porter Place, in Lexington.

Patti began the evening with a sample of an EVP, or also known as an Electronic Voice Phenomenon. She captured it while she was doing one of her investigations earlier this week. She was asking for the spirits to talk to her, and when she asked if anyone was there, a reply came to her. She was not expecting the reply that she received. She asked, "Are there any ghosts here?" and a voice is caught on playback saying, "Yep, you bet". This was an amazing thing to hear. After a brief introduction about her background, we were invited into seeing a sample of her world and what she does for a living.

ice with the audience, Patti asked for a show of hands to see who had seen, heard, or felt a ghost in their presence before. There were a variety of hands that went up in the crowd, including my own on a few. Experiencing the paranormal is something that we can all relate to at some point in our lives, and there are times that people may not want to admit it to others or themselves. As the faces looked around at one another, you could almost see a relief on their faces, like they knew they weren't alone.

Patti talked about many different tools that ghost hunters use to look for evidence of paranormal activity.

When she began ghost hunting in the 1970's she went to hunt abroad in Europe, and she talked about how she didn't use any equipment. She just went on her own instincts about if she felt someone there, but she realized the importance of having proof was. The first instrument that she used was a 35mm camera, and she would ask the ghost to appear, but the downside was that she had to wait around 2 weeks for the film to come back. Next, she used a recorder at work to record duties that needed to be done by other employees, and one day on play back she heard a voice say, "Help me". Her

RESEARCHING MAJOR HUGH MCGARY



Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

I found a little time last week to continue with my research regarding the Battle of Blue Licks.

A stop at the Robertson County Library, to examine Bennett Young's work on the Battle of Blue Licks, coupled with a stop later in the week at the Fleming County Public Library, to examine microfilm from the Draper Manuscripts, added a little more fuel to my research fire.

A scapegoat for the slaughter at Blue Licks has been Hugh McGary. McGary was a major in the Lincoln County Militia in August of 1782.

Major McGary has been vilified by Kentucky historians for 200 years as being the source of the defeat at Blue Licks, but a close examination of the events, from multiple sources, as well as a study of the man himself, which I continue to do, reveal that is not true.

The Kentucky force of 182 men, were simply defeated by a numerically superior force which had the advantage of intimate terrain knowledge, cover and concealment and advanced hand-to-hand fighting techniques.

It is true that a consultation at the edge of the Licking River by officers leading the Kentucky militia was held, and during that consultation many suggested retreating or waiting for additional support from another militia army led by General Benjamin Logan.

Major McGary's bravery

had been questioned when he had voiced those exact same concerns the morning before as the group left Braynt's Station in pursuit of the British and Indian force.

McGary was accused of being timid at that meeting.

But in reality, McGary was perhaps the bravest and least timid soul among the entire group.

His long history of leadership and dependability as a soldier had been documented and he was one of the primary reasons the settlements of Harrodsburg had not folded.

In an earlier raid on Fort Harrod, McGary had lost his step son William ray to a large Shawnee force outside the fort. Another step son, James Ray, had escaped by outrunning every warrior present and made it safely back in the fort.

McGary, enraged by the death of his son tried to leave the fort but was stopped by his men who said he would be killed. He instead climbed over the fort walls and plunged into the enemy force, where sources say he fought tenaciously in guerilla war style for over two hours, killing many of the enemy and retrieving the remains of his stepson, whom Shawnee warriors had hacked into pieces and tied from trees and bushes.

At Blue Licks he nearly came to blows with Daniel Boone, who preached cau-

tion with the enemy force within range.

As both men were held away from one another and were screaming at one another McGary broke free from his men and began a rant, stating they had pursued the enemy for one reason and one reason only-to fight them. The enemy was now within sight and could be attacked. He then said he was going forward and asked all who weren't cowards to follow him.

The Lincoln County men roared their approval and followed; and so did all the rest.

Once the group reached the opposite side of the Licking River another halt was ordered and the Boone was given command of the left wing, Todd command of the center and Trigg command of the right with McGary leading the advance force in the middle.

All officers agreed to continue and all did just that.

And the rest as they say 'is history.'

But the defeat cannot be justifiably laid at the feet of Major Hugh McGary.

It should instead be credited with the superior fighting skills of the Native American warriors, particularly the Wyandot warriors.

These warriors-depicted in the movie "The Last of the Mohican" were a fierce group who were prone to firing a single volley from their muskets and then charging wildly into the frontier ranks with war club and tomahawk.

The shock of such a maniacal attack unnerved the Kentucky force, which panicked and fled.

I continue to research Major McGary and all other participant of the battle.

I only learned over the weekend that McGary was the only man on the frontier who was credited with killing an adult black bear without a musket, a knife or other conventional weapon. He tracked the bear, encountered the bear and attacked the bear with nothing more than a wooden club.

Not the actions of a coward, though some historians have labeled him as such in an effort to misguide the serious researcher who must otherwise conclude that the brave and heroic frontiersmen of Kentucky were simply bested by a superior force.

The Licking River and the Blue Licks Springs were held in sacred regard by the Native American Tribes and I have found dozens of instances where they fought with superhuman strength to guard against these places and others in the wilds of Kentucky.

The Battle of Blue Licks has been deemed as "the last battle fought during the Revolutionary War."

It was a disastrous defeat for the Kentuckians and one which saw former Kentuckians who were captured by Native American tribes, fighting against their former family members and friends.

Some historians believe McGary and Boone were adversaries, but my research indicates they were among the closest of companions. McGary was one of the first individuals to accompany Boone into Kentucky, fought by his side in several engagements and even after their disagreement at the Battle of Blue Licks, multiple sources site McGary as being the only man among the force that

rode through enemy forces during the battle specifically to warn Boone that the Kentucky force was retreating and he and his

men were being surrounded.

I Don't think that is the action of a coward.

I continue my research.

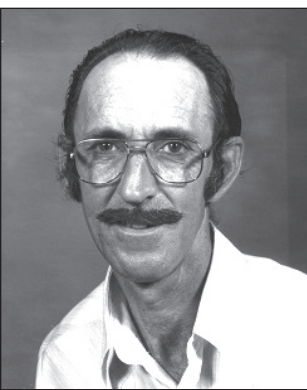

Chamber discusses Millersburg resurgence

Lorain Smoot was the guest speaker at Friday's Chamber of Commerce Brown Bag Lunch Forum. Smoot grew up in Carlisle but moved to Millersburg in 1970. She stated that when she first came there, there were many clubs including the 20th Century club, the Garden Club and the Homemakers Club, just to name a few. Those clubs are but just a memory now as is the case in many small towns.

Smoot explained, people became complacent, and the clubs just disappeared. Smoot and the group Millersburg Positive Impact want to change that. She stated that they have been "cheating" by looking to Carlisle to see what they are doing and then implementing many of the things in Millersburg. Many of the projects have been helped out by USAC U.S. Army Cadet Corps, which purchased the property in 2009.

Another prominent person who has made lots of positive impacts is Robert Barker. He opened 5th Street Café. To discover what they needed to do to revitalize they created a board, and made a list of the positive and negative things that were in the community.

They discovered that U.S. 68 is one of the most important roads in Kentucky, also it is a historical town that was founded in 1798. They have some beautiful architecture and historical significances such as the old fence that was from the Lexington Court House when it burned.

They discovered that their liabilities were that there were very few businesses and no one stopping by as they drove through, another problem was that there was almost no money. Take that into consideration with the fact that there is nothing for young people to do and they discovered what they needed to work on.

Smoot stated that the biggest challenge was to get people to stay involved. They placed a large banner up for a week asking what people

wanted. They started the farmers market and had 11 vendors in the first two years. They developed a logo that consisted of the Old Firehouse Bell and Millersburg Pride around it.

The group is trying to stay involved in the community. Smoot said they are trying to make more of a festival of Chataqua Days instead of just a large flea market, including old-fashioned games and speakers.

The USAC every April brings people in, from 47 states and 57 countries. The group decided to capitalize on the event by offering a pancake breakfast.

The group has also copied Carlisle's Map trail. Smoot also discussed the different themes the group uses to keep people involved. January is the new year and with new beginnings they write down failures and figure out what is needed to fix them, February is Valentines Day, March

is spring clean up, April is the USAC, May is the Derby, still working on an idea for June, July is a patriotic theme, August is campaign local businesses, September is Labor Day, with a potluck, October is fall decorations, November is Veteran's month and December is cookie swap.

DAR announces American History and Christopher Columbus essay contest

The Jemima Johnson Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution is sponsoring its annual American History Essay contest. All 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th grade students in a public, private or parochial school or who are home schooled are eligible to participate. First, second and third place winners per grade will be chosen.

The topic of this year's American History essay contest is "Young America Takes a Stand: The War of 1812." Students are asked to pretend they were alive during the War of 1812 and had a friend who has become famous in history because of standing up for America during that exciting but dangerous time. Describe the person and how he or she stood up for America. Explain

why it is important to honor such heroes when we celebrate the 200th Anniversary of the War of 1812.

The essay is to be handwritten in ink, typed or prepared on a computer or word processor using black type in a non-script font no smaller than 12 point no larger than 14 point. A limited vision student may use Braille, a tape recorder or very large type. A written transcript must be included, as well as a teacher's or physician's letter attesting to the student's special need. All of the essays must be the student's original work, and the essay must have a bibliography listing all references used.

Since 1996, The NSDAR has joined with the National Italian American Foundation sponsor an annu-

al national essay contest on Christopher Columbus. The contest is open to all students in grades 9 through 12 in public, private or parochial school or those who are home schooled. The topic for this essay is Christopher Columbus: In his own time, in history, and today. Describe Christopher Columbus as he was understood in three different time periods. What did 15th century people think about his accomplishments? How did 19th century historians view him? How did Columbus, who had primitive ships and no computers and no modern navigational equipment, affect our lives?

The judging for both contests will be based on historical accuracy, adherence to topic, organization of material, interest, originality,

spelling, grammar, punctuation and neatness.

One essay at each grade level will be selected as the chapter winner for the American History contest and one essay overall will be selected as the chapter winner for the Christopher Columbus essay. Each first-place winning essay will be forwarded to the state competition.

The winners will receive a certificate, medal, and monetary award from the Jemima Johnson Chapter.

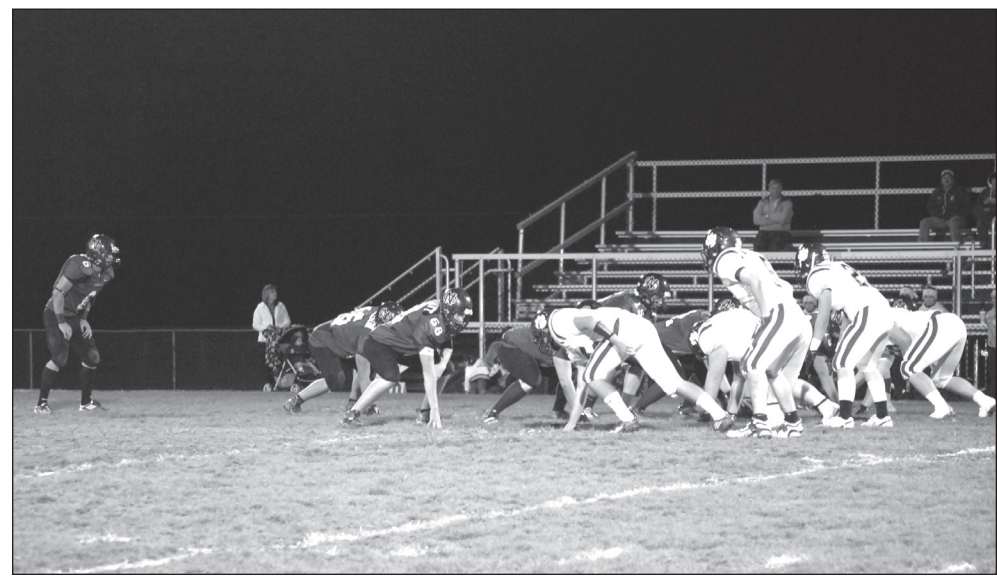

If anyone is in doubt about the money they have received, it is advised that they hold it up to the light and see if they can see the security band that runs from top to bottom on any large denomination bill.

Did You Know???

Though ceiling fans are most associated with warm-weather seasons, most can be effective throughout the winter months as well, helping circulate warm air throughout a room in much the same way they circulate cool air during the warmer weather. Most of today's fans have a switch near the motor housing that alters the direction in which the fan's blades turn. When a ceiling fan is used in the summer, its blades push the air downward, moving cool air around the room. The air blowing around the room is what cools people within the room. When the blades' direction is altered, the blades then push the air upward toward the ceiling. This drives the hot air, which typically rises to the top, down toward the edges of the room. This helps circulate warm air throughout a room, making for more even heating. What's more, this improved heat circulation helps combat window sweating that results from condensation on the glass when hot air is not effectively circulated throughout a home.

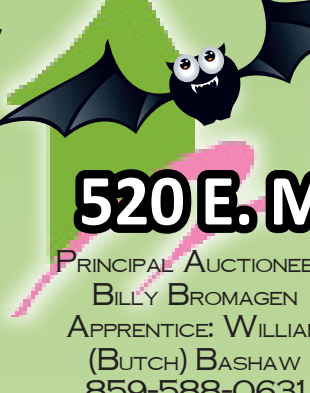

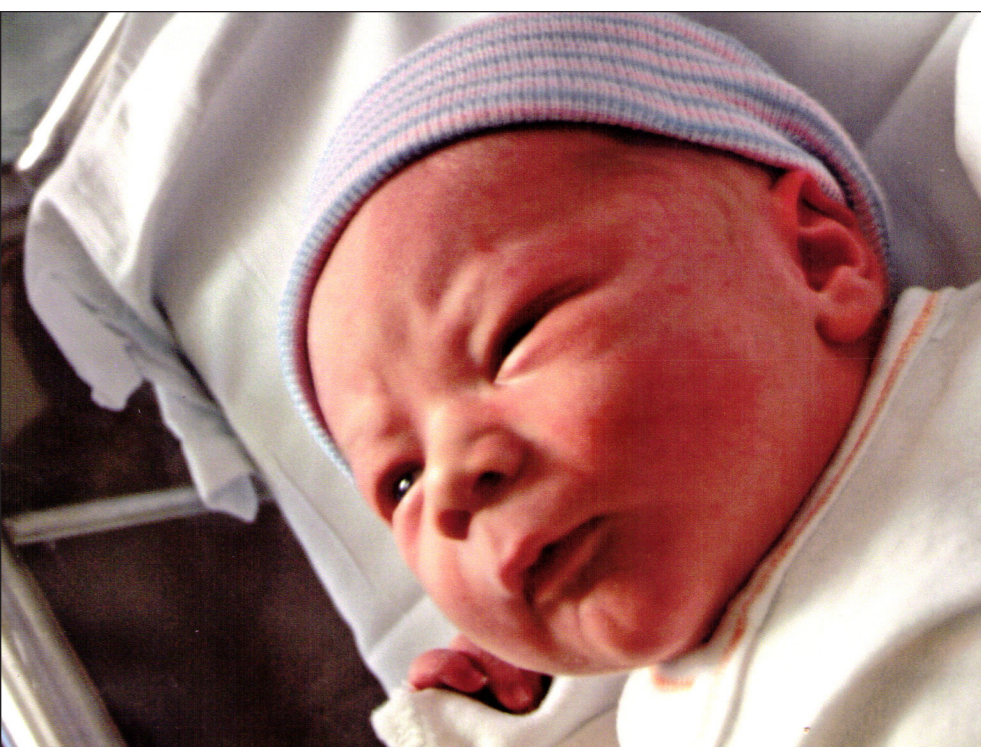

Next form of equipment was to use the first video recorders, the ones that were big and bulky. She next advanced into using EMF (electromagnetic field) meters; these are devices that measure the energy flow in the room. After the meter calibrates, the device will blink or beep when there is a disturbance. Patti learned how to incorporate these devices into her investigations. Next she discussed devices that respond with words, they are called the PX and Ovilus. The PX gives individual words, and the Ovilus can give back complete sentences. The hunter uses these devices to investigate more information about the ghost and the life they lived before. She mentioned to pay close attention to the words that show up, because sometimes they do not make sense. Patti also discussed the iPhone application for hunting ghosts, and mentioned that it is also a reliable tool to use for ghost hunting.

Patti next discussed different findings in ghost hunting; first thing that she talked about was orbs. These are the balls of light that can be seen in picture, and she told some things to look for to help you know if it is real. She also said that if you see one, you can immediately follow your picture by asking it to move, and snap again. She also mentioned if you are with other people, ask one to hold out their hand and ask the spirit to go to them. Generally if it is a real spirit you will see the orb again in another picture next to the person in the photograph. Patti talked about ecto-mists, which are the colored mists that can be captured on the camera. She also stressed the importance of how smokers can trigger false readings, the smoke or flame from a cigarette can show up on the picture. She next talked about if you are taking pictures in the winter, your breath can show up. On digital cameras as you can use the screen to look and you can see that there is no breath before you take the picture. High humidity can also give fake readings; it can cause a form of mist because of the moisture. She stressed to be sure of your surroundings and eliminates all possibilities before you show your findings to others. Patti talked about real time EVPs; she said EVPs are the most convincing things that she gets. This is when she records while ghost hunting,

and asks questions to the ghost. An EVP is an Electronic Voice Phenomenon, keep that in mind, this is when you hear the ghost on playback of your device. She played some samples of EVPs captured on her investigations, and they were very interesting. To hear these voices on the other side, it is amazing! Patti noted that 80% of her ghost hunting is done during the day, this helped to reinforce the idea that ghosts are out all the time.

Patti talked about Maple Hill Manor, it is located in Springfield, Kentucky, and this is one area where she was the first ghost hunter to ever investigate it. She told us the history of the manor, and in it there was the tragedy of a child's death here. It was very sad, and then she showed us a video of when she was standing where he fell and died a few days later, and she had an interaction with a spirit. Her EMF meter began to beep, and through asking yes and no answers she found out that she was talking to the little boy who died. Her video, which was shot by her husband, showed a light of energy that emerged from around her, and flew towards the camera.

She then talked about the well known, Waverly Hills Sanatorium in Louisville, Kentucky. She didn't talk about it long, because as she noted many ghost hunters, even those on television have been there. That has helped hype the haunting of it, but Patti noted that there are places that are more haunted than it is, like the Old Tabor Tavern in Berea. She talked to family members of the orderly who cut down the hanged nurse, and they told her how the truth of what happened was hidden. This is one of the many stories that she included in her books, she noted that all her stories come first hand and that she does not use the internet for gathering the information.

Patti then talked about another famous haunted place right in our backyard, the Paris TB Hospital. She also stressed that if you drive up on the property you will be arrested on the spot, and this is no joke. She told us some background about how the doctors would have their TB patients sit outside to get some fresh air as part of their treatment. The awesome story she shared with us is an EVP of a child that she has. As she was answering some questions of her group, there is a voice on playback that says, "I been sitting here all day". The voice belonged to a small girl, and it was very sweet

sounding. As she listened to the playback, she was so excited and saved it on her computer. Then she talked about how the voice that she heard was there on her PowerPoint, and then she went to put in the girl's voice she was astonished by what happened. The girl went in and changed her EVP on the computer, Patti's voice was garbled on playback, and very clearly the girl says, "Did you get it in the camera?" The girl's voice was very clear when she said this. What shocked Patti about this was that when she first listened to the recording, which was not what the girl said. Then after she puts it in her presentation, she heard that the girl changed her EVP. She figured out that the girl was talking about her video camera, so she ran to check it. After talking to us about this, Patti talked about when she has been interviewed by newspapers, radio, and magazines they always ask her, "What's the most horrifying and scary thing that has happened to you as a ghost hunter?" Patti answers this by saying, "Well, I don't have any horrifying or scary, I always have fantastic, amazing, and wonderful, and blow your mind, and these is my fantastic, wonderful, and blow your mind experience. And it's not scary, so a lot of places don't really think that what I have is really worthy of a TV show, because it's just not scary it's too sweet." Patti made this statement as she smiles back at us in the crowd; it is easy to see that she loves doing this. She likes to go out and try to find proof of those who stayed behind, and for whatever reason did not pass on.

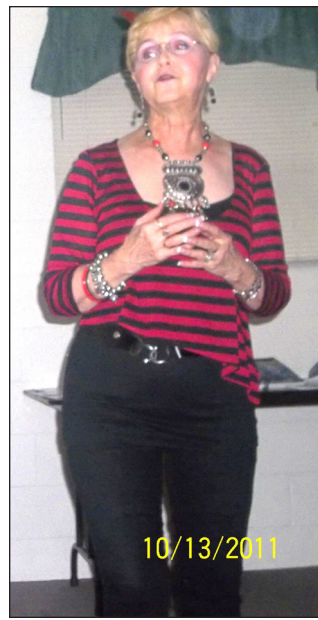
