Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

RESEARCHING MAJOR HUGH MCGARY

I found a little time last week to continue with my research regarding the Battle of Blue Licks.

A stop at the Robertson County Library, to examine Bennett Young's work on the Battle of Blue Licks, coupled with a stop later in the week at the Fleming County Public Library, to examine microfilm from the Draper Manuscripts, added a little more fuel to my research fire.

A scapegoat for the slaughter at Blue Licks has been Hugh McGary. Mc-Gary was a major in the Lincoln County Militia in August of 1782.

Major McGary has been vilified by Kentucky historians for 200 years as being the source of the defeat at Blue licks, but a close examination of the events, from multiple sources, as well as a study of the man himself, which I continue to do, reveal that is not true.

The Kentucky force of 182 men, were simply defeated by a numerically superior force which had the advantage of intimate terrain knowledge, cover and concealment and advanced hand-to-hand fighting techniques.

It is true that a consultation at the edge of the Licking River by officers leading the Kentucky militia was held, and during that consultation many suggested retreating or waiting for additional support from another militia army led by General Benjamin Logan.

Major McGary's bravery



had been questioned when he had voiced those exact same concerns the morning before as the group left Braynt's Station in pursuit of the British and Indian force.

McGary was accused of being timid at that meeting.

But in reality, McGary was perhaps the bravest and least timid soul among the entire group.

His long history of leadership and dependability as a soldier had been documented and he was one of the primary reasons the settlements of Harrodsburg had not folded.

In an earlier raid on Fort Harrod, McGary had lost his step son William ray to a large Shawnee force outside the fort. Another step son, James Ray, had escaped by outrunning every warrior present and made it safely back in the fort.

McGary, enraged by the death of his son tried to leave the fort but was stopped by his men who said he would be killed. He instead climbed over the fort walls and plunged into the enemy force, where sources say he fought tenaciously in guerilla war style for over two hours, killing many of the enemy and retrieving the remains of his stepson, whom Shawnee warriors had hacked into pieces and tied from trees and bushes.

At Blue Licks he nearly came to blows with Daniel Boone, who preached caution with the enemy force within range.

As both men were held away from one another and were screaming at one another McGary broke free from his men and began a rant, stating they had pursued the enemy for one reason and one reason only-to fight them. The enemy was now within sight and could be attacked. He then said he was going forward and asked all who weren't cowards to follow him.

The Lincoln County men roared their approval and followed; and so did all the rest.

Once the group reached the opposite side of the Licking River another halt was ordered and the Boone was given command of the left wing, Todd command of the center and Trigg command of the right with McGary leading the advance force in the middle.

All officers agreed to continue and all did just that.

And the rest as they say 'is history."

But the defeat cannot be justifiably laid at the feet of Major Hugh McGary.

It should instead be credited with the superior fighting skills of the Native American warriors, particularly the Wyandot warriors.

These warriors-depicted in the movie "The Last of the Mohican" were a fierce group who were prone to firing a single volley from their muskets and then charging wildly into the frontier ranks with war club and tomahawk.

The shock of such a maniacal attack unnerved the Kentucky force, which panicked and fled.

I continue to research Major McGary and all other participant of the battle.

I only learned over the weekend that McGary was the only man on the frontier who was credited with killing an adult black bear without a musket, a knife or other conventional weapon. He tracked the bear, encountered the bear and attacked the bear with nothing more than a wooden club.

Not the actions of a coward, though some historians have labeled him as such in a effort to misguide the serious researcher who must otherwise conclude that the brave and heroic frontiersmen of Kentucky were simply bested by a superior force.

The Licking River and the Blue Licks Springs were held in sacred regard by the Native American Tribes and I have found dozens of instances where they fought with superhuman strength to guard against these places and others in the wilds of Kentucky.

The Battle of Blue Licks has been deemed as "the last battle fought during the Revolutionary War."

It was a disastrous defeat for the Kentuckians and one which saw former Kentuckians who were captured by Native American tribes, fighting against their former family members and friends.

Some historians believe McGary and Boone were adversaries, but my research indicates they were among the closest of companions. McGary was one of the first individuals to accompany Boone into Kentucky, fought by his side in several engagements and even after their disagreement at the Battle of Blue Licks, multiple sources site McGary as being the only man among the force that



The groom is a communications officer of the United States Marine Corps and stationed at Camp Lejeune, NC. The couple currently resides in their new home in Richlands, NC.



Counterfeiters on the loose

Residents of Carlisle and surrounding areas are warned to be on the look out for counterfeit money, after a fake \$100 bill showed up at a local business. If anyone is in doubt about the money they have received, it is advised that they hold it up to the light and see if they can see the security band that runs from top to bottom on any large denomination bill.



Though ceiling fans are most associated with warmweather seasons, most can be effective throughout the winter months as well, helping circulate warm air throughout a room in much the same way they circulate cool air during the warmer weather. Most of today's fans have a switch near the motor housing that alters the direction in which the fan's blades turn. When a ceiling fan is used in the summer, its blades push the air downward, moving cool air around the room. The air blowing around the room is what cools people within the room. When the blades' direction is altered, the blades then push the air upward toward the ceiling. This drives the hot air, which typically rises to the top, down toward the edges of the room. This helps circulate warm air throughout a room, making for more even heating. What's more, this improved heat circulation helps combat window sweating that results from condensation on the glass when hot air is not effectively circulated throughout a home.

next form of equipment was to use the first video recorders, the ones that were big and bulky. She next advanced into using EMF (electromagnetic field) meters; these are devices that measure the energy flow in the room. After the meter calibrates, the device will blink or beep when there is a disturbance. Patti learned how to incorporate these devices into her investigations. Next she discussed devices that respond with words, they are called the PX and Ovilus. The PX gives individual words, and the Ovilus can give back complete sentences. The hunter uses these devices to investigate more information about the ghost and the life they lived before. She mentioned to pay close attention to the words that show up, because sometimes they do not make sense. Patti also discussed the iPhone application for hunting ghosts, and mentioned that it is also a reliable tool to use for ghost hunting. Patti next discussed different findings in ghost hunting; first thing that she talked about was orbs. These are the balls of light that can be seen in picture, and she told some things to look for to help you know if it is real. She also said that if you see one, you can immediately follow your picture by asking it to move, and snap again. She also mentioned if you are with other people, ask one to hold out their hand and ask the spirit to go to them. Generally if it is a real spirit you will see the orb again in another picture next to the person in the photograph. Patti talked about ecto-mists, which are the colored mists that can be captured on the camera. She also stressed the importance of how smokers can trigger false readings, the smoke or flame from a cigarette can show up on the picture. She next talked about if you are taking pictures in the winter, your breath can show up. On digital cameras you can use the screen to look and you can see that there is no breath before you take the picture. High humidity can also give fake readings; it can cause a form of mist because of the moisture. She stressed to be sure of your surroundings and eliminates all possibilities before you show your findings to others. Patti talked about real time EVPs; she said EVPs are the most convincing things that she gets. This is when she records while ghost hunting,


