

Cynthiana woman arrested, escapes, and is arrested again

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A Cynthiana woman was arrested Oct. 17, escaped and was then re-arrested later that same night. According to police reports, Beverly Craig, of North Locust Street, Carlisle reported to police that she had caught someone stealing her prescription drugs. Tonya Applegate of Cynthiana was visiting her child at the Craig residence, and while leaving, she dropped a pink pill belonging to Ms. Craig, accord-

ing to investigators. After observing this, she counted her pills, noticing she was missing 22 from her medicine bottle and contacted police officers. Later that evening, Carlisle Police were alerted to a possible drunk driver on Lake Road. Harold Florence, also of Cynthiana, was driving very slowly, with his driver side tires over the line. Carlisle Police proceeded to pull over vehicle. A strong odor of alcohol was present and in the vehicle officers discovered an open container of alcohol. The registration for the vehicle expired in August of 2011

and Florence had no proof of insurance. Florence was arrested and charged for operating a motor vehicle under the influence of drugs/alcohol, having no registration plates or receipt and possession of an open container in motor vehicle. His passenger, Applegate was arrested for Alcohol Intoxication in a public place, possession of a controlled substance, having a prescription drug in the wrong container along with possession of drug paraphernalia. She had two used hypodermic needles in her pos-

session along with 18 pills in a Marlboro cigarette pack, according to police. Officers also reported that Applegate's eye to be glassy and her speech slurred. Applegate and Florence were brought to the Carlisle Police Department for processing. During the processing, Applegate escaped through the rear exit of the Police Station. Investigators say Applegate was found an hour later at the VFW drinking beer, and was arrested, adding Escape, 2nd degree to the list of charges. Florence and Applegate were lodged in the Bourbon County Detention Center.

New Beginnings Christian Academy has fire safety day

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Fire Chief James Biddle along with Assistant Chief Jimmy Willoughby, Firefighter Rob Biddle, Emergency Management Director Calvin Denton, Paramedic Kelly Jones, and E.M.T. Scott Allison were on hand for a fire safety demonstration at New Beginnings Christian Academy. Chief Biddle began the demonstration by asking the students what they knew about fire safety. The children gave some good answers, including stay low, feel the door for heat, stop, drop and roll among others. Biddle reminded them to change the batteries in the smoke detectors when the clocks are set forward and back in the spring and fall. Rob Biddle put on the entire uniform to show the students the turn out gear. That included special boots, face masks, hard hat, clothing with reflective stripes to help maintain visibility. He also showed them the S.C.B. apparatus (Self Con-

tained Breathing). Chief Biddle explained that they contained between 20-40 minutes of air depending on how the person wearing it was breathing. The students were also shown the alarms that include low on air, and the alarm that goes off when a fireman isn't moving. The children were informed that the gear weighs about 80 pounds dry and 120 pounds wet and that it generally takes three to four minutes to put on, but has been put on in around two minutes. The children also learned about the Fire School that was to be held in Maysville this past weekend. Different groups of the fire department go on different days so that they can practice their skills. The children asked many questions including about their pets. Paramedic Kelly Jones explained to the kids how they now had an oxygen mask that would fit the pets in case they were exposed to too much smoke. The children were even more excited when they were able to go outside and view, the ambulance, fire truck and rescue vehicles.

"Twas in another lifetime, one of toil and blood. When blackness was a virtue and the road was full of mud I came in from the wilderness, a creature void of form. "Come in," she said, "I'll give you shelter from the storm."

hard enough to understand before his near death experience in the autumn of 1785 when the Shawnee had caught him on his way to this very spot, killed his two companions: Joshua Bennett and Mathias Spahr, and beat him unmercifully; smashing his jaw and cheek bones and

They spoke briefly on the delicate subject before the old Major made his annual theatrical spectacle, by telling the children of Jack who carries the lantern.'

It was a story of an old shrewd Irish blacksmith named Tricky Jack.

Tricky Jack and the Devil met at a pub, and Jack convinced the Devil to turn himself into a coin to pay for their drinks, but instead of using the coin, Jack put it

in his pocket next to a silver cross. This prevented the Devil from changing back into his original form.

Jack made a deal and freed the Devil, under the condition that he would not bother him for one year. If Jack died during the year, the Devil would not claim his soul.

Jack tricked the Devil again when the Devil climbed into a tree for fruit. While he was in the tree, Jack carved the cross into the tree's trunk and the Devil could not come down. Once again, Jack made

a deal with the Devil. He would free the Devil from the tree if he promised not to bother Jack for ten more years. And if Jack died in that decade, the Devil would not claim his soul. The Devil again agreed to these terms and not long after this, Jack died. But because of his trickery, God would not allow him into Heaven. In keeping his word not to take his soul, the Devil also would not allow Jack into Hell. Instead, the Devil sent Jack out into the darkness of the world between worlds, amid

Halloween at 'The Homestead', 1812

The bonfire roared in the otherwise cool, evening air, and the laughter of his 10 children mingled with the laughter of the others gathered nearby.

Michael Cassidy was a grand host at each year's Halloween festivities in central Fleming County, and this year would be no exception.

He had much to celebrate and be thankful for. His youngest son, Samuel, was only a few months old, and his wife Mary held him close in her arms as she moved in stationary dance. Autumn's golden gown had descended upon the landscape, and Mary's tall, slender form, was silhouetted in the glow of the fire.

His oldest son, William, was 17, and 'the apple of his eye' was Nancy Darnell. She and William would soon begin a family of their own on this land; land he had fought to keep.

His large brick house was built on one of 13 different, 1,000-acre land titles, he owned. This place he had called The Homestead, and he had fallen in love with this very land when he first stumbled upon the beautiful ancient pool, located at the head of a small stream that would mark the spot where he would later build his fort.

It was a good Halloween, and the fiddler was good, though not as good as his old friend Colonel John Fleming who'd passed on to the other side of The Veil of Life, two decades earlier. He paused to think of John's friendship and other memories. Halloween was a time to look back and prepare for what lay ahead.

He came to America at the age of 14, a stow-away onboard the ship The Maryland Merchant, and he always held his Irish roots close to his heart. The Veil between the living and the dead was at it's thinnest during Halloween and he hired the finest fiddler each year in order to please the spirit of John Fleming.

The Halloween Festival was marked by many special events and traditions, and he and his wife Mary had placed clean copper pennies inside the potatoes for the children to find as they ate. He never tired of seeing their surprised expressions.

"Wed boat com fur," he said to Fleming's half-brother, Major George Stockton, his old woods companion and best friend, as he slapped his leg and raised the whiskey jug.

Major Stockton understood the words as, "We've both come far."

Cassidy's Irish accent, slurred by liquor, had been

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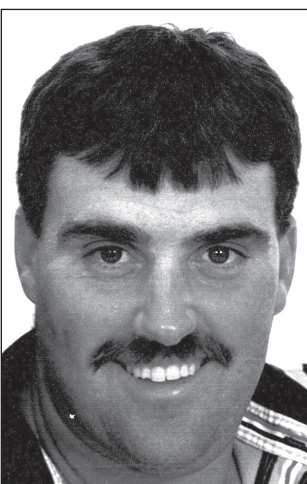

"Lazarus is Us"
When we read this story of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead we get a kinda uncomfortable feeling. Several questions come up about the entire episode as reported in John. When Jesus is told of a loved one being ill he doesn't seem upset at the time and he actually delays his departure to Bethany. Jesus seems so confident that he says that the illness will not end in death and the whole thing will be for the Glory of the Son of Man. Yet when he arrives he weeps, and is obviously upset by the mourning and crying and the guilt trip that both Martha and Mary lay on him for not getting there in time. And is there a significance in the four days that Lazarus lay in the tomb? And we aren't given much information about Lazarus, all we know is that Jesus loved him, he got sick, and he died.

We are to see ourselves in Lazarus, he represents all those whom Jesus Loves, which includes you and me and all humankind. This story then is the story of our coming to life from death in this present moment and in the future in the Kingdom of God. Here in chapter 11 the restoration of physical life is a metaphor for breaking the bonds of spiritual death into the gift of eternal life the Jesus brings. Jesus is the resurrection and the life (Jn, 11: 25-26 " I am the resurrection and the life.

Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who

lives and believes in me will never die.") With Jesus' response to the news of Lazarus illness the disciples again, much as we do, don't get the real meaning of what he says, when he says he is asleep they don't understand he means he is dead, so he has to be blunt and say, He's dead. So the disciples question his judgement in going back to Judea where they are in danger of persecution and death. If he is just sleeping then he'll be alright and we don't have to put ourselves in danger. But Thomas gets it, he gets that that Jesus' raising of Lazarus from the dead will speed his own death, and he says " Let us go also, so that we may die with him." What faith and conviction that would take, to follow Jesus into the fire. And Jesus tells them that this will be for you even though you say you believe you will truly see for yourself that death will no longer be the end. That should spur them on, " hey we may be killed going back there but that's okay, we will have eternal life." That is meant to spur us on now too, Sure here in Carlisle I don't think anyone is going to kill us for our beliefs but in parts of the world we could be and are killed for being a Christian. Yet many still have the faith to go to these places and spread the word, would you? If you base your answer on how much you weren't listening to the previous lessons.

When Jesus enters Bethany the sisters come out separately to meet him and lay a guilt trip on him, If you had only been here sooner you could have saved him, surely if this man that healed a blind man can save Lazarus

they believed, showing they believed in him but this raising of the dead thing is new. Jesus assures them " Your brother will rise again". Sounds like things said at every funeral then and now to comfort the family but Jesus is assuring them not only of the resurrection of the last day, but spiritual and real resurrection here and now. So what about the four days? That is meant to underscore that Lazarus was beyond resuscitation. The rabbis believed that the soul hovered over the body for three days and after that there was no hope of reviving him. We are Lazarus, so no matter what you have done, where you have been, no matter how stinky with sin you have become or were, it's never too late. I told you last week about my friend that took in and old friend that was dieing of cancer and had led a terrible, sinful, life of sheer debauchery. Yet he found Jesus through the love and toughness of my friend. And on his deathbed he not only knew he was saved and was going to heaven, his teenage son seeing this transformation, confessed his sins and took Jesus as his savior. He was Lazarus, he was given eternal life though physically he died, spiritually he was born.

There is some foreshad-

owing of the coming passion of Christ.

When Jesus cried out "Take away the stone" we can't help but be reminded of Jesus' coming resurrection. Then Jesus cries out in a loud voice, Lazarus come out! In the original Greek Bible it is the verb, kraugazein, which is also used four times for the shouts of the crowd to crucify Jesus. So the crowd's shout that brings death to Jesus, Jesus shouts to bring life to Lazarus and to us. Lazarus is us, bound by death in our current lives, called to life by Jesus who is the light and life of the world. Jesus stands today on the edge of your tomb, shouting "Come out!" Substitute your name for that of Lazarus, hear his command, and walk into the light of Jesus, pulling free of our grave clothes as we go.

If constantly unplugging these devices sounds like a challenge, look for "smart" power strips that will cut energy supply to "vampire" sources but provide continuous power to electric devices, like a DVR, that require regular digital system updates.

- Unplug your chargers: Cell phone chargers, camera chargers, battery chargers or power adapters are drawing energy even when not in use (and even when not connected to an end-use product.)

- Look for home appliances, such as microwaves and cordless phones, with low standby-power ratings. The Federal Emergency Management Agency's Standby Power Data Center provides estimates on how much energy a device uses when it's idle.

Customers don't have to spend much money to slay energy vampires, or on improving a home's general energy efficiency. The first step is to discover what areas of your home use the most energy. And, with colder temperatures quickly approaching, now is the time to take more energy-efficient steps. Some traditional low to no-cost steps to reduce energy use and save money include:

- Perform an online energy audit to better pinpoint how your home uses energy and where potential savings exist. Simply register your KU account at my.lgeku.com, then click on "Online Energy Audit." After keying in some basic information about your home, you'll receive a 19-page report with energy-saving recommendations based on your home and your actual energy use.

- Request an on-site energy audit and for \$25 a trained energy specialist will examine your home and use specialized equipment to help identify air leaks and other areas where you could improve your home's energy efficiency. After the audit, you'll receive energy-saving products such as compact fluorescent light bulbs and water restrictors to help get you started, as well as a customized report detailing suggested energy-saving measures and the estimated costs for making those improvements.

- Use a programmable thermostat and gain better control over your energy usage. According to ENERGY STAR, if used properly,

a programmable thermostat can save up to \$180 a year.

- Adjust your thermostat down two degrees in the winter and up two degrees in the summer and save up to \$45 a year.

- Turn off all unnecessary lights and use compact fluorescent light bulbs, which use about 75% less energy than standard incandescent bulbs.

Seal and save. As much as 20 percent of air flow is lost through leaks in your ductwork. Sealing leaks around the house with caulk, spray foam, and weather-stripping can improve home comfort while reducing overall energy costs.

- Check your HVAC system's air filter regularly and replace as necessary according to the manufacturer's recommendations. A dirty filter will slow air flow, making your system work harder to keep you warm in winter.

Safety first on Halloween

For kids, few holidays are more anticipated than Halloween. The chance to dress up in costume and patrol the neighborhood with friends while collecting treats is the highlight of many a child's autumn.

For parents, anticipation is replaced by anxiety. While kids are out trick-or-treating, parents may be home or at work hoping their kids are safe and sound. Because Halloween is so popular among kids, it's hard for parents to forbid trick-or-treating. But parents should instruct kids on the following tips to ensure this Halloween is as safe as it is fun.

* Strangers' homes are off limits. Make sure kids know they should never enter the home of a stranger, no matter how friendly or welcoming that stranger may

seem.
 * There's no going it alone. Kids should not be permitted to go out alone. When trick-or-treating, kids should always be accompanied not only by their friends, but there must be at least one adult chaperone present at all times. Parents should get together several weeks before Halloween to determine who will chaperone, where kids will be trick-or-treating and during what hours.
 * Stay close to home. Kids should stay in their own neighborhood and only visit homes of neighbors they know. Advise kids to steer clear of homes whose doors are hidden from street view. Chaperones should accompany kids to the front door if visibility from the street is poor.
 * Choose safe costumes.

Kids should wear costumes made of light colored material. If a child insists on a favorite costume that uses largely dark material, attach reflective tape to the costume so your favorite reveler is easily visible to motorists during twilight and nighttime hours when it's not always easy for drivers to see.
 * No toy guns. Toy guns are just asking for trouble, as many of today's replicas are easily confused with the real thing. Play it safe and choose costumes that aren't accessorized with toy guns.
 * Bring a flashlight along. Night falls quickly in late October, so kids and chaperones alike should carry a flashlight to improve their visibility and make them more visible to passing motorists.

* Stick to the sidewalks. Trick-or-treaters should stick to the sidewalks and always cross the street at corners. Don't walk in the street, and never walk between parked cars when crossing the street, as it's especially difficult for motorists to anticipate pedestrians walking or running from behind parked cars into the street.
 * Be wary of masks. Many masks restrict a child's vision, so look for one that provides sufficient visibility. If a child's favorite mask is low on visibility, make children agree to remove their mask when crossing the street.
 Parents understandably worry when kids go trick-or-treating. But a few simple safety lessons shared with children can ensure everyone gets home safe.

Protect skin from the worst weather has to offer

Either ask participants to contribute their signature salad, side dish or dessert, or plan a meal along a particular theme and give guests choices from among a list of menu items.

stating that holiday dinners have to be fancy, so don't be afraid to plan a menu that has fewer and less costly components. 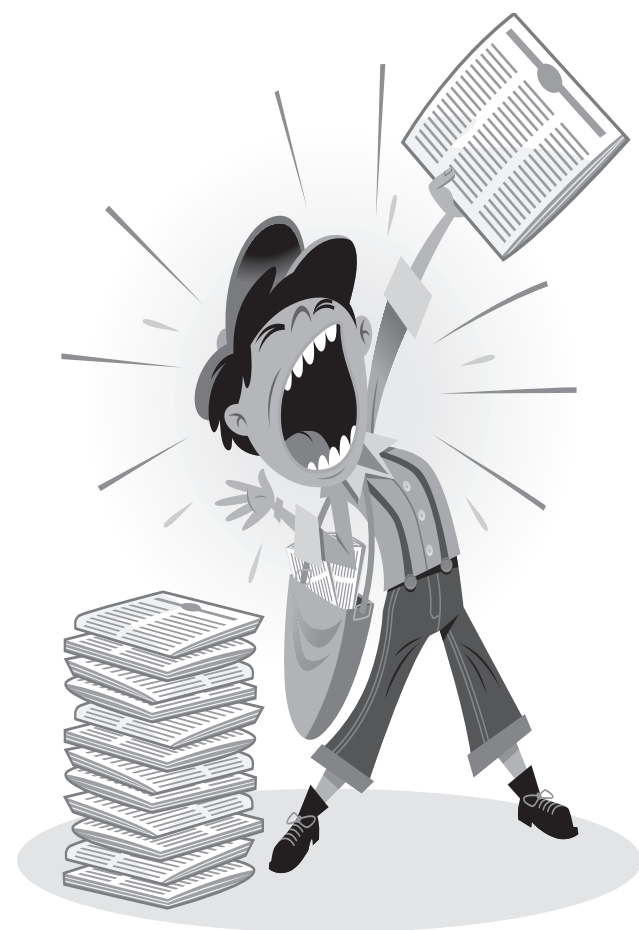

Fall lawn care

Warm-weather days will soon be a thing of the past and that means prepping the home and landscape for the arrival of winter weather. Even though it may be blanketed first by leaves and snow, lawns need treatment now to be sure they overwinter successfully. In fact, lawn experts say there is significant root growth that takes place during the winter -- growth homeowners won't necessarily see. People should continue to water their lawns throughout the autumn if there isn't significant rain and to aerate it as well. Applying a fertilizer that is high in nitrogen can help foster strong root growth. Also, keep up on removing leaves that have fallen. Not only will they stifle the lawn, but they may cause excessive moisture and mold to grow while inhibiting sunlight from reaching the grass as well. Before winter arrives, take the time to sow some grass seeds into

the bald patches, if any. By taking up nutrients in preparation for winter. late fall the lawn will stop



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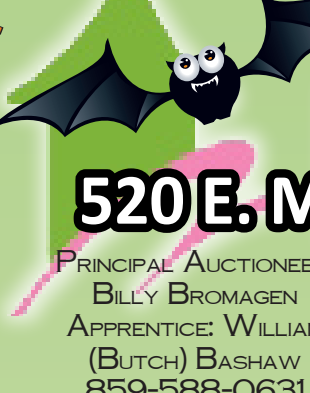

The Veil of Life and Death, with nothing but a burning piece of coal. Jack placed the coal into a carved out turnip he used for a lantern and he has been roaming the Earth ever since.

Cassidy laughed at the Halloween story. The children found the story fearful, but he knew from the memories that lay chained in the darker corridors of his own soul, that the most fearful things in this world weren't things to be imagined at all, but rather, the very real and dangerous encounters in day-to-day life.

Valley Forge and the horrors of The Revolution had taught him that. As the war ended in the east, he had been active in the siege of Yorktown and was presented with a British sword with a solid brass handle when British General Cornwallis surrendered. He initially kept the sword so he would never forget that horrible war, but three dozen years on the Kentucky frontier which followed, and all the conflicts he'd been in the midst of as a Kentucky militia officer, had ensured he would not, nor even could not, forget his past and the nature of the violent times and violent country he had lived in. Thus, much later that same night, he kept to his annual ritual.

Soon enough he would journey to the other side, everyone did, and he knew

he should have rightly been on the other side a long time ago.

He took the old British sword and scabbard and tied it to his waist. With tomahawk in one hand and his war knife in the other he crept into the dark. The wild sounds of the Kentucky night filled the air. He would stand guard this night; this night when The Veil of Life was the thinnest, and his earthly enemies and those from the other side, were roaming the woods.

The storms of life had raged around him from his earliest memories, but even in the darkest of hours he had continued to carry the fire, so he was not afraid. He had known for many years now that his duty was to provide shelter from the storm.
