Have a plan. Every home, every business and every organization should have an emergency plan for situations such as power outages, evacuations, and severe weather.

Arrest made in rare money theft

Carlisle Police Sgt. Benny Buckler has made one arrest and continues to investigate the theft of approximately \$40,000 in rare and collectable coins and paper money, which was taken from a Carlisle resident.

Buckler arrested Lowell Allen Gaunce II, 24, in connection with the crime and charged Gaunce with multiple felony counts of theft by unlawful taking, more than \$10,000.

Gaunce, formerly of Cassidy Creek community, was an acquaintance of a family member of the victim.

Sgt. Buckler began investigating the thefts at ty District Court.

the end of August. He charged Gaunce on Sunday, Sept. 3.

Gaunce's arrest came after he purchased gas from a local gas station and paid for the gas in part with two \$2-dollar bills that were in sequential order.

The bills had been among the collectable money allegedly stolen, according to Buckler who stated that he got a confession from Gaunce, though it was not a full confession.

Gaunce remains lodged in the Bourbon County Detention Center.

Gaunce will be arraigned on five counts of theft by unlawful taking \$10,000 or more in front of the honorable Judge Bill Kuster, Sept. 7, in Nicholas Coun-

In a civil pretrial conference, the judge or magistrate, with the help of the attorneys, may (1) formulate and simplify the issues in the case, (2) eliminate frivolous claims or defenses, (3) obtain admissions of fact and documents to avoid unnecessary proof, (4) identify witnesses and documents, (5) make schedules

Generally, the substance of a pretrial conference for a criminal case is the same as that for a civil case. At the

"As we milled around in the briefing room and found seats to drop into, we tried to ignore the curtain that hung over the blackboard at the front of the room. It covered the target for the day, and I'm sure that we were each silently praying for a milk run. Some targets were so heavily defended that we sometimes had nightmares about them. Others, by comparison, were walks in the park. The only clue we had that this would be a serious mission was that it had been described as a "maximum effort;" the high command only did that when they had someplace important they wanted removed from the map. If our commanders thought it was important, so would the German commanders, so a milk run was definitely out of the question. The briefing officer pulled aside the curtain and 320 guys involuntarily sucked in a breath and quietly muttered "Oh, my God!" Our guts constricted with fear when we saw the target. The red string ran from our Italian bases to the Prufening Aircraft Factory, one of several major plants manufacturing the ME 109 and it was just outside Regensburg. Regensburg! Just hearing the name told us we were virtually guaranteed a very tough mission with a high likelihood of heavy casualties. Published 8-4-06 in "Flight Journal" by Roger McCollester. The B-24 Liberator was a strong and tough plane, but even the steady hand of the pilot, 2nd Lt. Earnie Johnson, couldn't save her.

Johnson gave the order to bail out as The Wolf Shack began to spin out of control and come apart.

"I still don't know how I got out of the plane," Johnson would later tell reporters. "I must have been blown chute. It is known that when out when it exploded."

Natasha Cox has been named to the Scholar's List of the College of Education and Human Services at Northern Kentucky University. Natasha was named on the Scholar's List for her outstanding grade point average for the summer semester.

Jared Napier of Nicholas County High School has been named a Senator Jeff Green Scholar. Students earn this designation by achieving a 4.0 grade point average all four years of high school and scoring at least a 28 composite on the ACT.

Jared has also earned \$2,500 a year in Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES) awards. The award may be renewed each year of college if the student continues high scholastic achievement, making the total value of the KEES award worth \$10,000.

The title honors the late state Sen. Jeff Green of Mayfield, who served in the Kentucky General Assembly from 1992 to 1997.

KEES and other Kentucky student aid programs are administered by the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). KEES awards are funded by net Kentucky lottery proceeds and may be used at most colleges and universities in Kentucky. In some cases, the award may be used at out-of-state schools if the major the student is pursuing is not available in Kentucky. No application is necessary for KEES awards, and students may access their KEES account information on www.kheaa.com by setting up a KHEAA account through Zip Access.

The Carlisle Mercury SPORTS Jackets shut down Comets

The Nicholas County Bluejackets played the role of spoiler on Friday with a 36-20 win over West Carter, giving the Comets little reason to celebrate during homecoming festivities.

Nicholas Co. scored the game's first 22 points on three first-quarter touchdowns and was in control the rest of the way. Caleb Pope led the way with a season-best 319 yards to go with four touchdowns for the Bluejackets, while Austin Allison totaled 110 yards and a touchdown. Finn Brutsman also contributed 61 yards on six carries for an offense that tallied over 500 rushing vards on the night.

But it was not a pretty game for the Bluejackets, who were whistled for no fewer than 13 penalties, more than they had combined in the first two weeks of the season. A holding call early in the fourth quarter erased a 24-yard touchdown run by Caleb Pope, and numerous other penalties stalled Nicholas Co. drives.

Nicholas Co. Coach Robert Hopkins, who was pleased with the way his team played other than the penalties, puts much of the blame on his team's lack of mental focus.

"We're just undisciplined," Hopkins said. "They get tired and their brains leave them. We're just not as mentally tough as we need to be right now."

Other than that, it was all positive for the Bluejackets, who escaped the game without any further injuries to a squad already missing some key players, including John Lee Allison and Ethan Smith.

Nicholas Co. wasted no

siveness when the Bluejackets covered 65 yards on the first two plays of the game, cumulating in a 41-yard score by Caleb Pope 39 seconds into the game. Nicholas Co. then converted the 2-point conversion on a pass from Charby Pope to Zack Howard to give the Bluejackets an 8-0 lead.

After being forced to punt on its next possession, Nicholas Co. appeared to be losing it's momentum when a West Carter punt backed the Bluejackets up to the 1yard line. But Caleb Pope made easy work of the situation when he busted loose for a 98-yard touchdown run on the second play from scrimmage to extend his team's lead to 14-0 with 1:49 left in the quarter.

And Nicholas Co. wasn't done, either. After forcing West Carter to punt on its next possession, the Bluejackets were at it again when on a six-yard run by Stamp-Austin Allison took the ball on the first play from scrimmage and deposited it into the end zone 82 yards later. Charby Pope connected with Devin Johnson on the two-point conversion attempt to stake the Bluejackets to a 22-0 first-quarter advantage.

After West Carter scored er, Nicholas Co. put the final score on the board on an 18yard touchdown run by Caleb Pope with 6:45 left in the game.

While Caleb Pope and Austin Allison did nearly all the scoring, several others played vital roles in Nicholas Co.'s success, including That's when penalties be- J.D. Wagoner, who came up with an interception for the second consecutive week.





OPINION Letter to the Editor

To Whom It May Concern

The following is a first hand account of the events that transpired on July 6, 2011 when the dog warden responded to a call about two dogs in the Stoney Creek area of Nicholas Co. The complainant was a tenant, not the property owner, who had moved into a home on Stoney Creek that week.

Before the tenant moved into the home he was informed about the dogs and to whom they belonged. One of the dogs belonged to a seven-year-old girl; the other belonged to the tenant's new neighbor.

The day before the tenant had remarked, "I think the dogs have adopted me, they are good company". The dog warden, nonetheless, was called to remove them. That tenant also later told me that when the dogs were seized he was informed that the Nicholas Co. animal shelter was a "No Kill" shelter, and had he known the dogs were going to be euthanized he never would have had them removed.

Unaware the county had removed the dogs, the dog owners started to become concerned after a couple of days.

The concern was not im-

mediate because the two dogs were males and prone to roam the 400+ acre farm where they resided, and from time to time the little girl's dog would ride in the back of other family members trucks.

The tenant was asked about one of the dogs belonging to the little girl, and told us he hadn't seen the dog in a while. After a little more time the dog warden was called and he told us he responded to a call, seized the neighbor's dog but did not seize the little girl's dog.

We continued to look for the child's dog to no avail.

Therefore, we contacted the dog warden again and this time he informed us that he had in fact seized the little girl's dog, and it was taken to an animal "rescue." We began to call animal rescues in the surrounding counties looking for the dogs. After coming up empty, we again called the dog warden and asked him at which rescue we might be able to locate the missing dogs. This time the warden said he did NOT take the dogs to a "rescue". Instead he said he took them to a local shelter volunteer's house also known as NCAWS an acronym for Nicholas County Animal Welfare Society, Inc. An NCAWS represen-

tative was contacted.

The following is a transcript of a voicemail left by the NCAWS coordinator. "Hi this is the animal welfare society returning your call. ummm... about a lost ummm... bulldog, and we don't have anything like that now. We had a couple of weeks ago a couple of white boxers and then another big white dog and that might have been a bulldog although it's kinda big to be a bulldog, ummm., but that dog got loose and escaped and ummm... so he's not you know he didn't get sent out to rescue or adopted or anything like that or put down which is the better I think hu huh ummm... but that was like ten days ago maybe or something ummm... I don't know if we're talking about the same dog or not, but it was a big white dog, but he was fine when he left the farm hu huh ummm... and I don't think the shelter has had anymore come in yet, but we'll certainly ummm... I have your number written down if we get a dog at the shelter, or if anyone calls us directly about it, a dog that you know, sounds like it might fit that description. I'll certainly give you a call ummm... and hopefully he'll turn up as lots of times dogs wander off for a while

and some people keep them for a few weeks sometimes they'll call us. I just had a call this morning like that, that somebody found a little black dog they had it for a month and now they want to give it up, so it may be that someone took your dog in and ummm... you know and they'll, we'll hear from them in a couple weeks. So anyway I do have your number written down and the dog ummm... in our lost dog log and ummm... we'll certainly get in touch with you if we have any dogs that fit that description at all so uhhh... 473-2714 thank you, bye bye."

After receiving this information we began to scour the countryside in search of the dogs. We spoke with residents, property owners, and farmers to get permission to search on their land and ask if they would keep watch for the lost dogs.

After three days of searching, we received yet another call from the dog warden who, this time informed us that the dogs were euthanized the day he picked them up. He was deeply remorseful and told us he "had to do what his boss told him to do."

The following Monday we were contacted by the Judge-Executive and asked to come into his office for a meeting. In that meeting we were told by the Judge-Executive that he had no prior knowledge of the events that had transpired until the night before our meeting nor did he condone such actions.

The Judge-Executive also apologized for what had happened and ensured us this matter would be addressed. Under no circumstances should it be acceptable procedure to euthanize a pure bred American Bulldog (Tuff) and a neutered family pet (Jasper), or any other non vicious animal, within a few hours of seizure.

Nor should it be acceptable to deceive the pub-

lic. Euthanization in the back of the warden's pick up truck should never have been even a consideration at the point in time when it occurred. The actions that followed the seizure of the two dogs appear to be an egregious error in judgment, a crime against the state of Kentucky, and an enormous breech of ethics and morality

We hope that the county will continue to take the appropriate measures to ensure that no other citizen, child or adult, is hurt in this manner again.

All cases are guided by procedural rules that allow parties to obtain relevant evidence from other parties. The process of turning over evidence is called discovery, and the rules that apply to obtaining evidence are called discovery rules. In civil cases, discovery refers to the right of either party to obtain evidence from the other, but in a criminal case, discovery generally refers to the right of the defendant's attorney to have access to information necessary to prepare a defense. Discovery issues are a common topic in pretrial conferences. Discovery orders that were issued prior to a pretrial conference may be reviewed for compliance at a pretrial conference, and new discovery orders may be issued after a pretrial conference.

Criminal defendants enjoy more procedural protections than do civil defendants, and the judge or magistrate must be careful to protect those rights. Generally,

has requested assistance of counsel may be required to attend a pretrial conference without an attorney. No admissions made by the defendant or the defendant's lawyer during the conference may be used against the defendant in a trial unless the admissions are written and signed by the defendant and the defendant's attorney.

The judge or magistrate assigned to the case can choose to hold a pretrial conference, but the denial of a pretrial conference may be an unconstitutional denial of due process rights. For example, in a criminal case, a defendant has a due process right to a pretrial hearing when the defendant intention to use certain eviclaims that a prosecutor has breached a plea agreement

Criminal defendants must raise some issues before trial in a pretrial motion. Pretrial motions are from a confession, admisspecific requests for favorable orders from the court on particular issues. opportunity to raise the following issues if they are not raised prior to trial: defenses and objections based on defects in the indictment or formal charging instrument; requests regarding discovery, or disclosure of evidence; requests to suppress or exclude from trial potential testimony or other evidence; requests for severing the trial in cases involving codefendants; requests for the dismissal of the case; and requests for transfer of the case to another jurisdiction.

Similar requirements are imposed on prosecutors. The prosecution must tell the defendant prior to trial of its dence, such as evidence obtained as a result of a search or seizure, wiretap, or other Electronic Surveillance mechanism; evidence culled sion, or statement made by the defendant; and evidence cation of the defendant.

Pretrial proceedings vary from jurisdiction to jurisdiction. In some jurisdictions no criminal defendant who a defendant should lose the courts have bifurcated the

pretrial conference into dispositional conferences and trialmanagement conferences. The courts also schedule a dispositional conference in which the parties may discuss the possibility of a plea bargain or settlement. If no agreement between the parties is forthcoming at the dispositional conference, the case proceeds to trial, and the court schedules no further meetings between the parties until trial. The parties are, nonetheless, free to continue negotiating, and they also may request a special pretrial hearing if an issue arises after the conference but prior to trial.

the chute caught the wind Daniel couldn't hold onto Lloyd, whom he and the other crew members always had lovingly called "Farm Boy". Wright indeed lived on the family farm near Mt. Carmel, in rural Fleming County and had graduated from Fleming County High School two years earlier. He left a loving mother, several siblings and his engaged sweetheart.

Wright was the youngest among them. Most of the crew had been drafted. He had volunteered.

In the countryside below, 14-year-old Andres Seehuber, watched in fascination as the crew and plane fell from the sky.

Buda, Noriarty, Johnson and Kaess, were captured by a German patrol and subsequently survived the war. Officers with the German patrol ordered the rural residents to bury five crew members who perished, and place them in a single, common and unmarked grave. But the villagers decid-

ed otherwise when the patrol left and buried the six men in individual marked graves in a nearby church cemetery. Wright's body was buried separately in the adjacent community of Traunstein, and was later exhumed and re-interred in the American Military Cemetery in Lorraine, France.

Staff Sgt. Lloyd Wright was part of an entire generation of Americans who gave a "maximum effort."


