matches, candles and first aid supplies. Should a catastrophic event occur, officials are now encouraging citizens to have a five-day emergency supply. Have a plan. Every home, every business and every organization should have an emergency plan for situations such as power outages, evacuations, and severe weather. Make an emergency kit. Something as simple as having a flashlight, radio and extra batteries available during a power outage can make you and your family more comfortable during these times.

Arrest made in rare money theft

Carlisle Police Sgt. Benny Buckler has made one arrest and continues to investigate the theft of approximately \$40,000 in rare and collectible coins and paper money, which was taken from a Carlisle resident. Buckler arrested Lowell Allen Gaunce II, 24, in connection with the crime and charged Gaunce with multiple felony counts of theft by unlawful taking, more than \$10,000. Gaunce, formerly of Cas-sidy Creek community, was an acquaintance of a family member of the victim. Sgt. Buckler began investigating the thefts at

the end of August. He charged Gaunce on Sunday, Sept. 3. Gaunce's arrest came after he purchased gas from a local gas station and paid for the gas in part with two \$2-dollar bills that were in sequential order. The bills had been among the collectible money allegedly stolen, according to Buckler who stated that he got a confession from Gaunce, though it was not a full confession. Gaunce remains lodged in the Bourbon County Detention Center. Gaunce will be arraigned on five counts of theft by unlawful taking \$10,000 or more in front of the honorable Judge Bill Kuster, Sept. 7, in Nicholas County District Court.

Terrell pre-trial scheduled for Thursday

Samuel Terrell is scheduled for a pre-trial conference on Thursday September 8 at 9:02 a.m. Terrell is charged with murder, criminal mischief 3rd degree and terroristic threatening 3rd degree. The murder charge is a Class A felony, criminal mischief is a Class B misdemeanor, and the terroristic threatening charge is a Class A misdemeanor. According to legal-dictionary.com a pretrial con-

ference is a meeting of the parties to a case conducted prior to trial. The conference is held before the trial judge or a magistrate, a judicial officer who possesses fewer judicial powers than a judge. A pretrial conference may be held prior to trial in both civil and criminal cases. A pretrial conference may be requested by a party to a case, or it may be ordered by the court. Generally, the term pretrial conference is used interchangeably with the term pretrial hearing. A pretrial conference may be conducted for several rea-

sons: (1) expedite disposition of the case, (2) help the court establish managerial control over the case, (3) discourage wasteful pretrial activities, (4) improve the quality of the trial with thorough preparation, and (5) facilitate a settlement of the case. Pretrial conferences are conducted in criminal cases to decide matters that do not inquire into the defendant's guilt or innocence. Under rule 17.1 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure, pretrial conferences for criminal cases may be conducted to promote a fair and expeditious trial. In

practice, federal and state courts use the pretrial conference in criminal cases to decide such preliminary matters as what evidence will be excluded from trial and what witnesses will be allowed to testify. In a civil pretrial conference, the judge or magistrate, with the help of the attorneys, may (1) formulate and simplify the issues in the case, (2) eliminate frivolous claims or defenses, (3) obtain admissions of fact and documents to avoid unnecessary proof, (4) identify witnesses and documents, (5) make schedules

for the submission of pre-trial briefs and motions, (6) make rulings on motions submitted before the conference, (7) set dates for further conferences, (8) discuss the possibility of a settlement, and (9) discuss the consolidation or management of large, complex cases. After the conference, the judge or magistrate issues an order reflecting the results of the conference, and the order controls the future course of the case. Generally, the substance of a pretrial conference for a criminal case is the same as that for a civil case. At the

conference the judge or magistrate may make rulings on motions, eliminate repetitive evidence, and set schedules. If a preliminary issue arises after the pretrial conference, a party may request a special pretrial hearing with the court to address the issue. (This special hearing marks the distinction between pretrial hearing and pretrial conference, when such a distinction is made.) In the alternative, the parties may address such an issue in court on the first day of trial, out of the presence of the jury. See Terrell Page 12

iber machine gun as the ME 109 Messerschmitt German fighters darted toward his plane, silhouetted against an otherwise beautiful sky.
 Wright was a gunner aboard a B-24 Liberator, a heavy bomber which was assigned to the 449th Bomb Group, 716 Squadron.

He was part of a 10-man crew that had flown 12 successful combat missions.
 This would be their last.
 They had delivered their payload on target to Regensburg, on the last day of what would come to be called "Big Week"; a relentless series of day time bombing missions to destroy aircraft factories across Germany.
 Wright's plane "Wolf Shack" or "Shack Wolf," was hit over and over by fire from the German fighter pilots and flames swept across the fuselage.
 The Wolf Shack was not

their original plane but a replacement the crew received after their original "Dumbo III" was scrapped.
 At their altitude of 24,000 feet, temperatures reached 40 degrees below zero inside the plane.
 The B-24 Liberator was a strong and tough plane, but even the steady hand of the pilot, 2nd Lt. Earnie Johnson, couldn't save her.
 Johnson gave the order to bail out as The Wolf Shack began to spin out of control and come apart.
 Some crew members were dead from the continu-

ous fire from attacking ME 109s.
 The ship's navigator, Lt. Walter Kaess; Staff Sgt. Cornelius "Neil" Noriarty, who was the ball gunner, and Staff Sgt. Daniel Buda, who was the tail gunner, were not seriously injured and secured their parachutes to their bulky insulated coveralls as they scrambled for any opening they could find.
 "I still don't know how I got out of the plane," Johnson would later tell reporters. "I must have been blown out when it exploded."
 Daniel Buda assisted his

best friend and fellow machine gunner, Staff Sgt. Lloyd Wright.
 Wright was barely conscious and injured.
 His parachute had been partially destroyed.
 There were no others.
 Daniel Buda held his friend as tightly as possible and exited The Wolf Shack only moments before the explosion occurred.
 It is not known how long he clung to his best friend before deploying the parachute. It is known that when

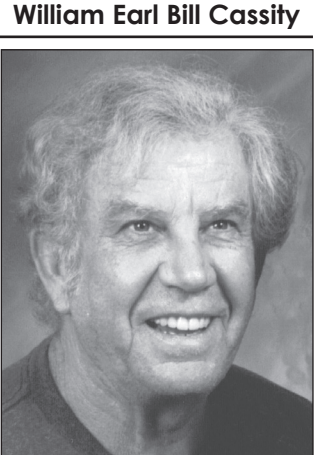

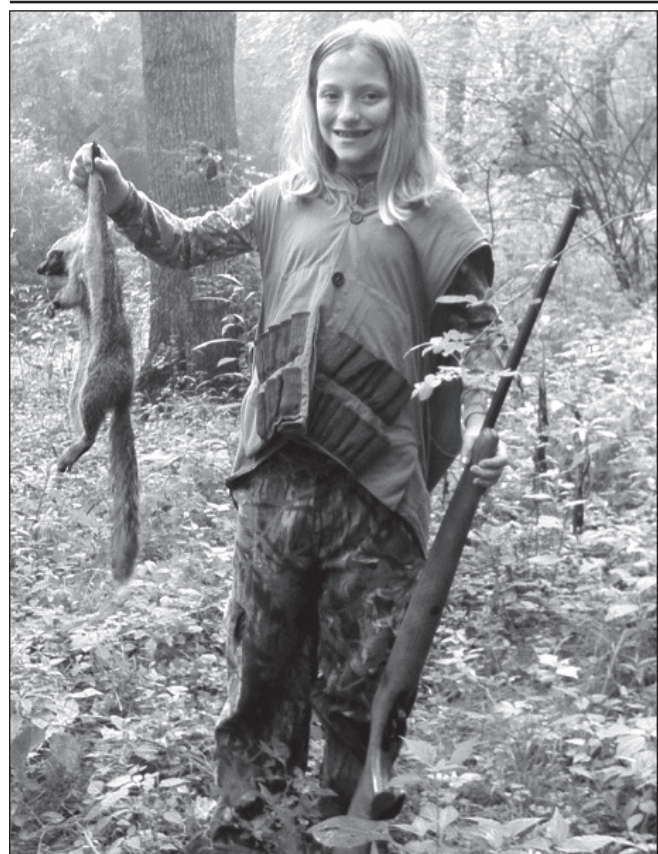

KEES and other Kentucky student aid programs are administered by the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). KEES awards are funded by net Kentucky lottery proceeds and may be used at most colleges and universities in Kentucky. In some cases, the award may be used at out-of-state schools if the major the student is pursuing is not available in Kentucky. No application is necessary for KEES awards, and students may access their KEES account information on www.kheaa.com by setting up a KHEAA account through Zip Access.

Jackets shut down Comets

The Nicholas County Bluejackets played the role of spoiler on Friday with a 36-20 win over West Carter, giving the Comets little reason to celebrate during homecoming festivities.

Nicholas Co. scored the game's first 22 points on three first-quarter touchdowns and was in control the rest of the way. Caleb Pope led the way with a season-best 319 yards to go with four touchdowns for the Bluejackets, while Austin Allison totaled 110 yards and a touchdown. Finn Brutsman also contributed 61 yards on six carries for an offense that tallied over 500 rushing yards on the night.

But it was not a pretty game for the Bluejackets, who were whistled for no fewer than 13 penalties, more than they had combined in the first two weeks of the season. A holding call early in the fourth quarter erased a 24-yard touchdown run by Caleb Pope, and numerous other penalties stalled Nicholas Co. drives.

Nicholas Co. Coach Robert Hopkins, who was pleased with the way his team played other than the penalties, puts much of the blame on his team's lack of mental focus.

"We're just undisciplined," Hopkins said. "They get tired and their brains leave them. We're just not as mentally tough as we need to be right now."

Other than that, it was all positive for the Bluejackets, who escaped the game without any further injuries to a squad already missing some key players, including John Lee Allison and Ethan Smith.

Nicholas Co. wasted no

time in showing off its explosiveness when the Bluejackets covered 65 yards on the first two plays of the game, cumulating in a 41-yard score by Caleb Pope 39 seconds into the game. Nicholas Co. then converted the 2-point conversion on a pass from Charby Pope to Zack Howard to give the Bluejackets an 8-0 lead.

After being forced to punt on its next possession, Nicholas Co. appeared to be losing its momentum when a West Carter punt backed the Bluejackets up to the 1-yard line. But Caleb Pope made easy work of the situation when he busted loose for a 98-yard touchdown run on the second play from scrimmage to extend his team's lead to 14-0 with 1:49 left in the quarter.

And Nicholas Co. wasn't done, either. After forcing West Carter to punt on its next possession, the Bluejackets were at it again when Austin Allison took the ball on the first play from scrimmage and deposited it into the end zone 82 yards later. Charby Pope connected with Devin Johnson on the two-point conversion attempt to stake the Bluejackets to a 22-0 first-quarter advantage.

That's when penalties began to take their toll on the Bluejackets, who were whistled for five infractions in the second quarter alone.

West Carter took advantage and was able to get back in the game on a pair of long touchdown passes from quarterback Caleb Whitt to Cody Stamper, one covering 53 yards and the other going for 22 yards.

"We knew he (Stamper) was the best receiver they had and we put our best athlete over there to cover him and he gets torched for two," said Hopkins, who has watched his team struggle against the pass all season long. "We've still got a long way to go in that area."

The score would remain the same until the third quarter when Nicholas Co. began to pull away from the Comets on a 40-yard touchdown run by Caleb Pope, which was followed by a successful two-point conversion pass from Charby Pope to J. D. Wagoner to give the Bluejackets a 30-14 lead.

After West Carter scored on a six-yard run by Stamper, Nicholas Co. put the final score on the board on an 18-yard touchdown run by Caleb Pope with 6:45 left in the game.

While Caleb Pope and Austin Allison did nearly all the scoring, several others played vital roles in Nicholas Co.'s success, including J.D. Wagoner, who came up with an interception for the second consecutive week.

"J.D.'s getting better every week," said Hopkins. "He'll

still make a bone-headed play from time to time, but he's getting better and stepping his game up."

Caleb Becraft is another who deserves praise after filling in at center for the injured John Lee Allison and Ethan Smith, the only two players on the team with any real experience at the position. And then there is Austin Hedges.

"My hat's off to Austin," said Hopkins. "He's a guy who shows up every day, works hard, and while he's not got to play a lot so far, he came out there tonight during crucial times and got the job done. That's what a team is all about."

"Right there's your winners, too," said Hopkins, referring to his younger players who get more action during the week than they do on Friday. "Everyone thinks this is the Caleb Pope and Austin Allison Show. But it's not. If everyone else, mainly our scout team guys, if they didn't do their job it wouldn't happen for guys like Caleb and Austin."

Jackets looking to sink Pirates

On the surface, Nicholas County appears to be heavy favorites going into its game with Berea, a team it beat 55-12 a year ago. But Bluejackets' Coach Robert Hopkins warns that to overlook the host Pirates could be a huge mistake.

While Nicholas Co. did have its way with the Pirates last season, that had more to do with the Bluejackets having a great game than it did with Berea being a bad team, according to Hopkins.

"That was probably the best game we played last year was against Berea," said the Nicholas Co. coach. "We were hitting on all cyl-

inders. We played extremely well.

"But it's going to be a battle this year," Hopkins added. "Anytime you go play at Berea, it's going to be a battle. They've got a very hostile crowd there. They've got a new coach. And they always play hard. I'm telling you, we're not going to have an easy week."

Nicholas Co. enters the match up this weekend as a battle-tested group after three games against Class 3A opponents to begin the season. But the Bluejackets are not exactly a healthy team, with John Lee Allison and Ethan Smith currently missing action with injuries.

"We've got a couple out already, and who knows what

we'll find out between now and Monday," Hopkins said immediately after a 36-20 win over West Carter last week. "We could show up Monday with some injuries that we don't know about right now."

Historically, Nicholas Co. has dominated Berea, winning 10 of the last 12 meetings with the majority of the scores being blowouts, including last year's romp. But Berea is a team on the rise and the past is the past, which is evident by Berea's back-to-back wins against Nicholas Co. in 2008 and 2009, the only two wins for the Pirates in the series since at least 1997.

Nicholas Co. lost a 36-24 heart-breaker on its last trip to Berea. The previous

meeting in Berea was a 52-0 blowout by the Bluejackets.

Nicholas Co. enters this year's contest with the Pirates as the 4th highest scoring team in Class A with an average of 38 points per game. The Bluejackets are one of only six teams in Class A with more than 100 points through three games. On the flip side, Nicholas Co.'s defense currently ranks among the bottom 10 in points allowed, giving up 29 points per game.

Berea, which is currently 1-2 on the season, comes into the game averaging 29 points per game while allowing 31 points per game defensively. The Pirates have lost their last two games.

Game time is set for 7:30 p.m. Friday in Berea.

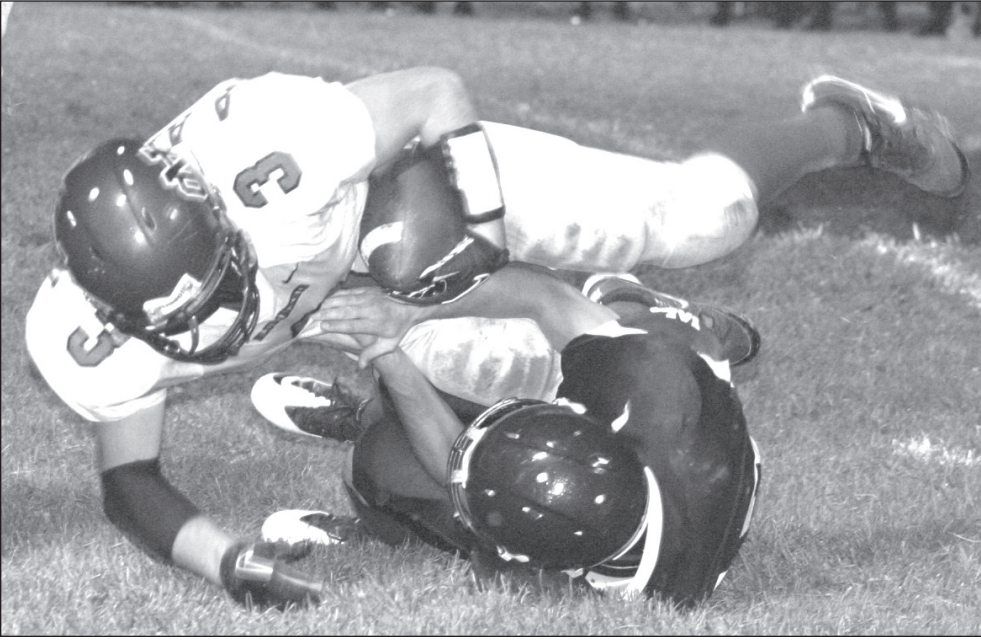

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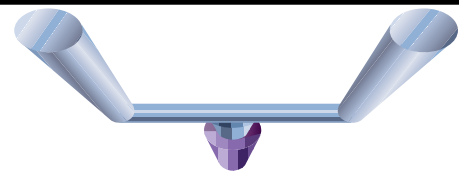

Letter to the Editor

To Whom It May Concern:

The following is a first hand account of the events that transpired on July 6, 2011 when the dog warden responded to a call about two dogs in the Stoney Creek area of Nicholas Co. The complainant was a tenant, not the property owner, who had moved into a home on Stoney Creek that week.

Before the tenant moved into the home he was informed about the dogs and to whom they belonged. One of the dogs belonged to a seven-year-old girl; the other belonged to the tenant's new neighbor.

The day before the tenant had remarked, "I think the dogs have adopted me, they are good company". The dog warden, nonetheless, was called to remove them. That tenant also later told me that when the dogs were seized he was informed that the Nicholas Co. animal shelter was a "No Kill" shelter, and had he known the dogs were going to be euthanized he never would have had them removed.

Unaware the county had removed the dogs, the dog owners started to become concerned after a couple of days.

The concern was not im-

mediate because the two dogs were males and prone to roam the 400+ acre farm where they resided, and from time to time the little girl's dog would ride in the back of other family members trucks.

The tenant was asked about one of the dogs belonging to the little girl, and told us he hadn't seen the dog in a while. After a little more time the dog warden was called and he told us he responded to a call, seized the neighbor's dog but did not seize the little girl's dog.

We continued to look for the child's dog to no avail.

Therefore, we contacted the dog warden again and this time he informed us that he had in fact seized the little girl's dog, and it was taken to an animal "rescue." We began to call animal rescues in the surrounding counties looking for the dogs. After coming up empty, we again called the dog warden and asked him at which rescue we might be able to locate the missing dogs. This time the warden said he did NOT take the dogs to a "rescue". Instead he said he took them to a local shelter volunteer's house also known as NCAWS an acronym for Nicholas County Animal Welfare Society, Inc. An NCAWS represen-

tative was contacted.

The following is a transcript of a voicemail left by the NCAWS coordinator. "Hi this is the animal welfare society returning your call. ummm... about a lost ummm... bulldog, and we don't have anything like that now. We had a couple of weeks ago a couple of white boxers and then another big white dog and that might have been a bulldog although it's kinda big to be a bulldog, ummm... but that dog got loose and escaped and ummm... so he's not you know he didn't get sent out to rescue or adopted or anything like that or put down which is the better I think hu huh ummm... but that was like ten days ago maybe or something ummm... I don't know if we're talking about the same dog or not, but it was a big white dog, but he was fine when he left the farm hu huh ummm... and I don't think the shelter has had anymore come in yet, but we'll certainly ummm... I have your number written down if we get a dog at the shelter, or if anyone calls us directly about it, a dog that you know, sounds like it might fit that description. I'll certainly give you a call ummm... and hopefully he'll turn up as lots of times dogs wander off for a while

and some people keep them for a few weeks sometimes they'll call us. I just had a call this morning like that, that somebody found a little black dog they had it for a month and now they want to give it up, so it may be that someone took your dog in and ummm... you know and they'll, we'll hear from them in a couple weeks. So anyway I do have your number written down and the dog ummm... in our lost dog log and ummm... we'll certainly get in touch with you if we have any dogs that fit that description at all so uh-hh... 473-2714 thank you, bye bye."

After receiving this information we began to scour the countryside in search of the dogs. We spoke with residents, property owners, and farmers to get permission to search on their land and ask if they would keep watch for the lost dogs.

After three days of searching, we received yet another call from the dog warden who, this time informed us that the dogs were euthanized the day he picked them up. He was deeply remorseful and told us he "had to do what his boss told him to do."

The following Monday we were contacted by the Judge-Executive and asked to come

into his office for a meeting. In that meeting we were told by the Judge-Executive that he had no prior knowledge of the events that had transpired until the night before our meeting nor did he condone such actions.

The Judge-Executive also apologized for what had happened and ensured us this matter would be addressed. Under no circumstances should it be acceptable procedure to euthanize a pure bred American Bulldog (Tuff) and a neutered family pet (Jasper), or any other non vicious animal, within a few hours of seizure.

Nor should it be acceptable to deceive the pub-

lic. Euthanization in the back of the warden's pickup truck should never have been even a consideration at the point in time when it occurred. The actions that followed the seizure of the two dogs appear to be an egregious error in judgment, a crime against the state of Kentucky, and an enormous breach of ethics and morality.

We hope that the county will continue to take the appropriate measures to ensure that no other citizen, child or adult, is hurt in this manner again.

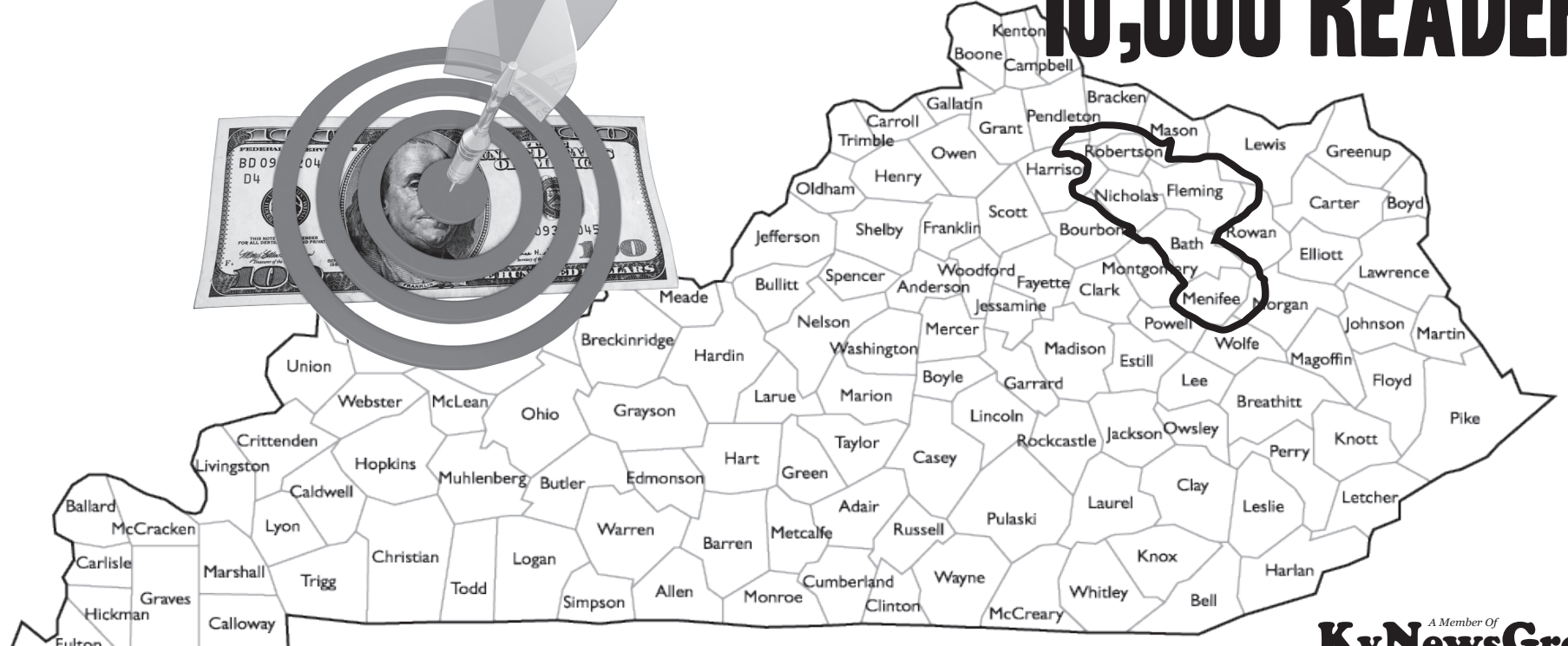

Well, I guess I have to take that back, besides her mother who was attempting to perform this inhumane act on her 4-year-old offspring.

If you think that yelling was bad, just close your eyes and envision with me for a moment, how Sadie might have reacted when Bath says, "Sadie, do you want me to get a needle and get it out of there real quick?"

We changed tactics, alternately threatening some form of bodily harm to her if she didn't comply.

It was then I peered through the crack in the curtains and saw lights coming up the street.

I was panic stricken. I was absolutely sure someone had heard the wild, uncontrolled screams of Sadie, and had become convinced she was in some sort of mortal danger, and phoned the local police or yet worse called 911 and reported some dastardly crime.

Fortunately for us the car turned down the street before our house and I felt we had been saved of the jaws of handcuffs.

It took nearly half an hour for Sadie to give in and allow her mom to work on her finger.

Part of the large delay came because in addition to our acrobatics in attempting to convince Sadie to let us at her finger, we were laughing so hard we would have to stop, shake and recover from the tears of our own before Beth could go back to work.

When she finally stood still for more than 10 seconds Beth clipped the dead skin, squeezed her finger. And in the blink of an eye and quick swipe of a fingernail the splinter was gone.

It was a great mental and physical relief for us. I can't explain just how challeng-

ing this is.

When Beth was a child she managed a splinter a week and at times we would have to let it get sore before she would allow us close enough to even touch her and then shake hysterically as we had to squeeze it out because it had become infected.

Beth has never been a big fan of needles or other medical devices.

She could contort her body in more positions to avoid medical treatment than any human I have ever encountered in my life.

Michael on the other hand, he'd take a shot or let the doctor stick his finger, and not even flinch. It was kind of amazing in its own way.

Carol didn't like doctors much but she didn't tend to resist them either. It was just a matter of fact with Carol, she would go, sit there, let them do whatever

and it was over.

Amy Jo I have to say was a pretty good trooper. Amy's issues have many times involved her eyes. At her young age she has encountered many medical maladies with her eyes, along with many other childhood things and has held up extremely well.

I wanted to take a few moments and share the fun and excitement we had this past week, when Sadie encountered the dreaded splinter for the first time.

The worse part of this story is, I doubt this will be the last splinter she will ever have.---

Next time it happens, I hope to have my video camera close so we can find a way to record this for her children and grandchildren to watch.

And so, for another week, thanks and thirty.

All cases are guided by procedural rules that allow parties to obtain relevant evidence from other parties. The process of turning over evidence is called discovery, and the rules that apply to obtaining evidence are called discovery rules. In civil cases, discovery refers to the right of either party to obtain evidence from the other, but in a criminal case, discovery generally refers to the right of the defendant's attorney to have access to information necessary to prepare a defense. Discovery issues are a common topic in pretrial conferences. Discovery orders that were issued prior to a pretrial conference may be reviewed for compliance at a pretrial conference, and new discovery orders may be issued after a pretrial conference.

Criminal defendants enjoy more procedural protections than do civil defendants, and the judge or magistrate must be careful to protect those rights. Generally, no criminal defendant who

has requested assistance of counsel may be required to attend a pretrial conference without an attorney. No admissions made by the defendant or the defendant's lawyer during the conference may be used against the defendant in a trial unless the admissions are written and signed by the defendant and the defendant's attorney.

The judge or magistrate assigned to the case can choose to hold a pretrial conference, but the denial of a pretrial conference may be an unconstitutional denial of due process rights. For example, in a criminal case, a defendant has a due process right to a pretrial hearing when the defendant claims that a prosecutor has breached a plea agreement.

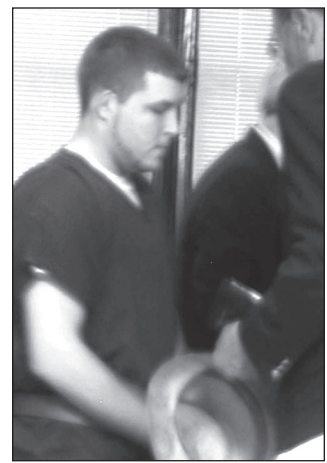
Criminal defendants must raise some issues before trial in a pretrial motion. Pretrial motions are specific requests for favorable orders from the court on particular issues. Under the Uniform Rules of Criminal Procedure, a set of model rules written by the American Law Institute and adopted by many jurisdictions, a defendant should lose the

opportunity to raise the following issues if they are not raised prior to trial: defenses and objections based on defects in the indictment or formal charging instrument; requests regarding discovery, or disclosure of evidence; requests to suppress or exclude from trial potential testimony or other evidence; requests for severing the trial in cases involving codefendants; requests for the dismissal of the case; and requests for transfer of the case to another jurisdiction.

Similar requirements are imposed on prosecutors. The prosecution must tell the defendant prior to trial of its intention to use certain evidence, such as evidence obtained as a result of a search or seizure, wiretap, or other Electronic Surveillance mechanism; evidence culled from a confession, admission, or statement made by the defendant; and evidence relating to a lineup, show-up, picture, or voice identification of the defendant.

Pretrial proceedings vary from jurisdiction to jurisdiction. In some jurisdictions courts have bifurcated the

pretrial conference into dispositional conferences and trial management conferences. The courts also schedule a dispositional conference in which the parties may discuss the possibility of a plea bargain or settlement. If no agreement between the parties is forthcoming at the dispositional conference, the case proceeds to trial, and the court schedules no further meetings between the parties until trial. The parties are, nonetheless, free to continue negotiating, and they also may request a special pretrial hearing if an issue arises after the conference but prior to trial.

the chute caught the wind Daniel couldn't hold on to Lloyd, whom he and the other crew members always had lovingly called "Farm Boy". Wright indeed lived on the family farm near Mt. Carmel, in rural Fleming County and had graduated from Fleming County High School two years earlier. He left a loving mother, several siblings and his engaged sweetheart.

Wright was the youngest among them. Most of the crew had been drafted. He had volunteered.

In the countryside below, 14-year-old Andres Seehuber, watched in fascination as the crew and plane fell from the sky.

Buda, Noriarty, Johnson and Kaess, were captured by a German patrol and subsequently survived the war. Officers with the German patrol ordered the rural residents to bury five crew members who perished, and place them in a single, common and unmarked grave.

But the villagers decid-

ed otherwise when the patrol left and buried the six men in individual marked graves in a nearby church cemetery. Wright's body was buried separately in the adjacent community of Traunstein, and was later exhumed and re-interred in the American Military Cemetery in Lorraine, France.

Staff Sgt. Lloyd Wright was part of an entire generation of Americans who gave a "maximum effort."
