The Nicholas County band traveled to Maysville with its "competition face" on and was able to entertain both the crowd and judges yet again with the show "He loves me, he loves me not."

In preliminary competition, the NC band won an award for best color guard and the 1st place trophy. Lexington Christian Academy was awarded best percussion and 2nd place. Bel-

levue was awarded 3rd place and Minford was awarded 4th place.

In class AA, Russell was awarded 1st place. Lewis County was awarded best color guard and 2nd place. Lawrence County was awarded best percussion and 3rd place and Newport was awarded 4th place.

In class AAA, Rowan County was awarded best percussion and 1st place. Boyd County was awarded best color guard and 2nd place and Greenup County was awarded 3rd place.

In class AAAA, Grant County was awarded best color guard, best percussion and 1st place. Paul Blazer was awarded 2nd place.

## Nicholas County High School football breaks top ten in 1A

The Nicholas County BlueJackets who are having a monumental year have achieved yet another milestone as they were announced as being ranked 10th in division 1A football in the latest AP poll. The BlueJackets are in a tie with Frankfort.

Nicholas has so far played a phenomenal season with a 4 win and 1 loss record. Their only loss came to Lewis County who is a division 3A school during the season opener. The Jackets dropped the game with a final score of 33 to 30. Since then they have gone undefeated. The Bluejackets began their run first with a comeback win over Fleming County finishing 46 to 45. The next game found the Jackets against West Carter where they again prevailed 36-20. The BlueJackets picked up both their defense and offense as

the routed Berea 55-8 and then decimated Paris 56-0 at homecoming.

So far Nicholas County has scored 223 points while only allowing 223 points. Nicholas County has dominated in rushing; having so far amassed 1950 yards rushing in just five games while only allowing 450 rushing yards. Nicholas has also put 451 passing yards on the books.

Caleb Pope leads Nicholas with 267 Net yards per game, followed by Fin Britsman with 58 Net yards per game and Austin Allison with 50 Net yards per game.

Austin Allison, Zack Howard, Drake Bussell, John Lee Allison, Caleb Pope, Chris Morgan and Devin Johnson are leading the team in tackles.

Charby Pope is leading the team with 124 net yards per game passing while Zack Howard has been on the receiving end for 95 yards receiving.

That wasn't the only race of the day as a dog show was hosted which included a Weiner dog race. Visitors were treated by a performance from the Town and Village School of Dance Groups.

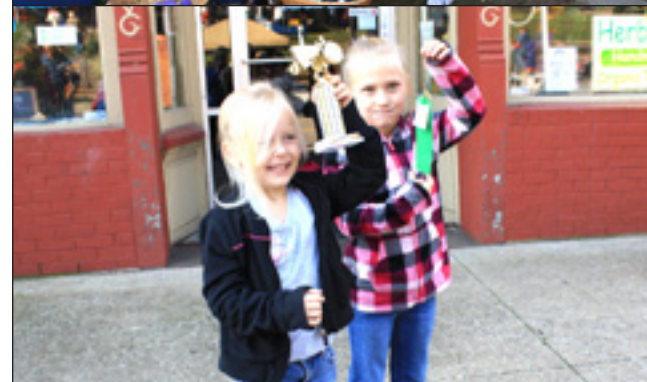
Children's jumping blow-ups and a family petting zoo also intrigued the younger and even some of the older people of the crowd.

## Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

**Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky**

*"Lie still and go to sleep or the Shawnee will catch you!"*

This was a saying passed on from mothers to their children along the Kentucky frontier, particularly in the settlements of northeastern Kentucky, as is recorded by Dr. Daniel Drake in his phenomenal book 'Pioneer Life in Kentucky.' Daniel Drake was a child at Drake's Station (near present-day Mays Lick, Mason County). The station was built less than a decade after the cataclysmic Battle of Blue Licks.

*"All of my troubled dreams included either Indians or snakes. The copper-colored man and the copper-headed snake, then extremely common, happily I never suffered from either except in my dreams; my escape from the later I ascribe to cowardice, or to express it more courteously to a constitutional cautiousness beyond the extreme of which my memory runneth not."*

As I sought to nurture myself during some much awaited time off last week, I once again sought temporary refuge in the woods, dear reader.

With permission from the land owner, my friend and I trudged up Campbell Mountain near Hillsboro, Kentucky in hopes of taking some more photographs of the enigmatic sacred Kettle site. The kettles are huge sandstone boulders, approximately six feet in circumference. They are hewn out to form the shape of bowls, or 'Kettles' as early pioneers called them.

Accompanying six feet circular sandstone lids are lying nearby.

I was first taken to the Kettles by my father during a grouse hunting expedition when I was a youth, not yet a teenager.

I've been back about 25 times, acting as a tour guide for a variety of archaeologists, geologists, anthropologists and friends and neighbors.

I hadn't been to the site since April 27, 2007 when I went as a birthday present to myself and a favor to film producer Lee Pennington.

I returned over the weekend to show the site to a dear friend and fellow Native American studies enthusiast, Danny Belcher.

My knee held up good- I suffered a serious injury three years ago- and the day was beautiful.

The summer foliage was thick and green.

I got us lost.

We ended up on the wrong ridge and we never did get to the right spot.

Talk about embarrassing, I'm still trying to figure out where I made a wrong turn.

There is a timeless and ancient, sacredness to those woods, to that landscape; that is indescribable.

My father felt it and tried to explain it to me and I feel it also when I am there.

I could feel it coursing through my body as I gasped for breath while climbing up the near vertical slope of the mountain.

A handful of warriors

could hold off entire Roman Legions on that hill, with little more than slings and arrows.

Rare and extinct Magyar script has been found engraved on one of the lips of the largest kettle. I've photographed it and sent it through the proper scientific community connections.

Most of the professor types don't show any real interest. Imagine that.

The script originated in northern Africa and was last in use about 1,000 years ago.

I have no idea how it came to be inscribed on that bizarre stone on that wonderful hillside.

And yet, I've seen it with my own eyes.

I suppose that is why I am always fighting an inner call of the wild and a desire to turn once more to the woods with the passing of each day.

We live in a land that has so many ancient secrets they

may never be known.

A writer friend, William Traxell, is convinced the Kettle site was occupied by displaced Welsh knights who many believe lived in the Ohio River Valley in 1200 AD.

He is not alone in his theory and the more I learn about archaeology and Kentucky history, the less it seems I truly know.

James Alexander Thom's book, "Children of First Man" delves into that theory and tells a story of what Kentucky may have been like about 800 years ago.

I don't know if you will believe it or not.

But I do know of the ancient Shawnee and Cherokee legends of the time centuries ago when Kentucky was occupied by a race of powerful white people.

Many scholars think those legends-which coupled with intriguing archaeological evidence-forms the basis for Thom's book. They believe that Welsh Knights, perhaps even former Crusaders and renegade Knights Templar squads, were atop that mountain.

I have seen their Mal-

ttese cross symbol on Native American artifacts aplenty on Native American sites across northeastern Kentucky.

I hope to return to the Kettle site as autumn turns to winter and the jungle-like woods become easier to navigate.

Soaking wet with sweat and dragging myself back down that steep hill, I commented to Danny that the woods seemed to resemble some sort of Cambodian jungle rather than Kentucky woods.

The scriptures are full of people who are called upon to make choices. The choices they made, good or bad, effected forever their relationship with God. God has given us free will and allows us to make choices about our lives. What we decide will reflect what we believe and how strong our faith in God is. Several years ago someone sent me an e-mail with this story about "Mrs. Jones" and what she believed. I want to share this with you this week in the hope that we all will begin from this point forward to make better choices.

**I BELIEVE**  
She is 92 years old, petite, well poised and proud. She is fully dressed each morning by eight o'clock, with her hair fashionably coifed, and her make-up perfectly applied, in spite of the fact that she is legally blind.

Today she has moved to a nursing home. Her husband of 70 years recently passed away, making this move necessary. After many hours of waiting patiently in the lobby of the nursing home, where I am employed, she smiled sweetly when told her room was ready. As she

maneuvered her walker to the elevator, I provided a visual description of her tiny room, including the eyelet curtains that had been hung on her window. "I love it," she stated with the enthusiasm of an eight year old having just been presented with a new puppy. "Mrs. Jones, you haven't seen the room... just wait," I said. Then she spoke these words that I will never forget.

"That does not have anything to do with it," she replied. "Happiness is something you decide on ahead of time. Whether I like my room or not, does not depend on how the furniture is arranged. It is how I arrange my mind. I have already decided to love it. It is a decision I make every morning when I wake up. I have a choice. I can spend the day in bed recounting the difficulty I have with the parts of my body that no longer work, or I can get out of bed and be thankful for the ones that do work. Each day is a gift, and as long as my eyes open, I will focus on the new day and all of the happy memories I have stored away... just for this time in my life. Old age is like a bank account. You can withdraw from it what you have already put in.

I believe that out background and circumstances may have influenced who

we are, but we are responsible for who we become. I believe that no matter how good a friend is, they're going to hurt you every once in a while and that you must forgive them for that. I believe that just because someone doesn't love you the way you want them to, doesn't mean that they don't love you with all that they have. I believe that true friendship continues to grow, even over the longest distance. Same goes for true love. I believe that it's taking me a long time to become the person I want to be. I believe that you should always leave loved ones with loving words. It may be the last time you see them. I believe that you can keep going, long after you can't. I believe that we are responsible for what we do, no matter how we feel. I believe that either you control your attitude or it controls you. # Graves takes national title

Nathan Graves, 17, of Bourbon County, was named the 2011 Grand American National AIM Youth Trapshooting Champion at the World Shooting Complex in Sparta, Illinois on August 7.

Graves was one of only two shooters in a field of 446 junior participants to break 199 of 200 targets, which resulted in an intense tie-breaker shoot-off against Tyler Merry of Nebraska, for the national championship trophy. In the event of a tie, each contestant shoots targets in increments of 25 until one shooter claims the better score.

Graves and Merry swept the first 25, alternating targets, and continued into the second round. Merry missed his target #50, placing enormous pressure on Graves, as he obliterated his final target to capture the individual title.

Graves is the son of

Clint Graves and Katrina Graves, both of Paris, and the grandson of Irene Graves of Brodhead, Clint Graves and Lynn Graves of Pinnellas Park, Florida and the late Essellen Stewart, of Mt. Vernon.

Graves also competed in team competition with a shooting team based in Flemingsburg, the Kentucky Pigeon Poppers. The Pigeon Poppers, coached by Bill Jolly, consists of Nathan Graves, Laken Calvert, Ross Jolly, Andrew Jolly, and Drew Cropper. The team took first place in Class B competition in Sparta, breaking 967 of 1000 targets, a tremendous score!

Earlier in the summer, in the 2011 U.S. Open, in Sparta, Graves cleaned up as High Overall Champion - A Class, High All-Around Champion - A Class, First Place - Junior Handicap Champion, taking home numerous coveted awards and prizes.

## Neal Center hosts readings, music for benefit, to raise awareness

Carlisle was treated to an afternoon of spoken word and musical performances at the Neal Welcome Center on Sunday, September 18th.

Kentuckians for the Commonwealth, a grassroots community organization dedicated to social justice and environmental issues, celebrated its 30th anniversary by sponsoring a series of readings by Kentucky authors Jim Lally, George Ella Lyon, Erik Reece, and Mary Ann Taylor Hall upstairs in Mozart Hall

David Wagoner, owner of Three Springs Farm in Carlisle, acted as for the event.

Wagoner drew attention to the "reopened but not refurbished" Mozart Hall, which had its doors opened earlier this year, and to the artwork on display, courtesy of the Courthouse Square Arts Guild.

Lyons, celebrated Kentucky children's author, sang and read from her soon-to-be-published book, "Which Side Are You On?", which tells the story of the famous union organizing song.

Reece, a Louisville native and writer in residence at the University of Kentucky, presented a condensed version of an article that will be appearing in *Harper's Magazine*, making a contrast between Massey Energy Corporation, a coal company in West Virginia, and a worker-owned company in Columbus that makes solar panels.

Hall, Kentucky novelist, short story writer, poet, and most recently, ac-

tivist writer, read from her poetry and made an appeal for donations for Kentuckians for the Commonwealth. She said, "They are not just talking about clean, renewable power, they are talking about a new power."

All of the readings drew attention to the earth, the environment, and community and social justice issues, and sought to raise awareness of the destruction wrought by mountaintop coal removal.

The readings were followed by a bluegrass performance by local musicians Billy Dixon, Bill Loyer, Richard Wright and Benny Tyree. This was followed by a jam session with other musicians.

The musical performance was sponsored by the Nicholas County Historical Society as part of its Music Heritage Series, which began taking place earlier this year at Mozart Hall.

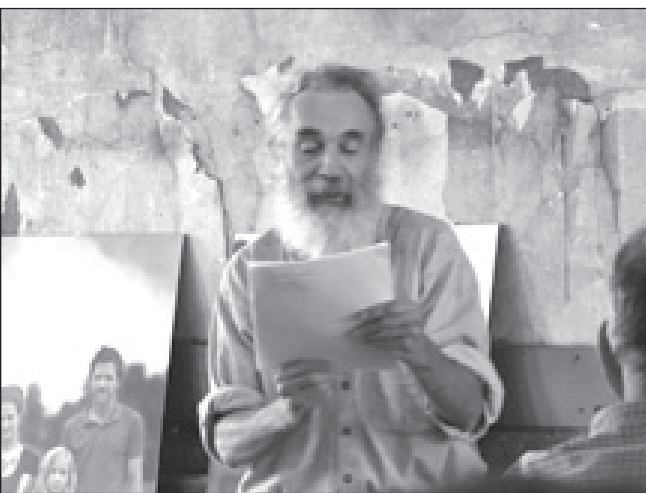

## Local enthusiast places well in national draft horse plowing contest

Labor Day weekend, US Draft Horse Plowing Contest, Carriage Hill, outside of Dayton, Ohio.

Sometimes the old ways are better.

To a number of enthusiasts across the country, using horse-drawn plows and farm equipment from before the age of the internal combustion engine provides an interesting hobby and a

viable alternative to soaring gas and diesel prices for farm work.

The growing presence of Amish and Mennonite communities in the region has also piqued public interest in farming with only human and animal labor.

Jeff Becker, Moorefield, has been interested in draft horses and using antique farm implements, and he recently placed second in the U. S. Draft Horse Plowing Contest held at Carriage Hill Metropark Farm in Ohio over this past Labor Day weekend.

Becker has participated in the national contest for the last three years. The first time around, he placed fourth in the nation. This marks the second times he's gotten second.

"I usually plow with an antique walking plow, made around 1890. I used a different plow this year, made several years later."

Becker uses a team of Belgian draft horses to pull his plow. Belgians can weigh as much as 2000 pounds and are able to pull tremendous loads

Becker explained that

Carriage Hill Farm "actually belongs to the city of Dayton and is a living history site. The land for it was donated to the city about fifty years ago, and people dress in period clothes. It's set in the 1880s. It's a working farm, and events take place there all the time." This is the seventh year that the contest has been held at Carriage Hill.

Every state has its own horse plowing competition in the spring. For the past few years, the statewide draft horse plowing contest in Kentucky has been held at Mike Down's farm in southern Bath County (Downs is another draft horse enthusiast). Because of the rainy weather this year, there was no statewide contest.

Becker said, "We had to have a meeting to decide who would go to the national contest. The contest was during tobacco housing time, and Mike and I were the only ones from Kentucky who went."

Saturday is traditionally a day of practice and for socializing. On the night before the contest, the participants draw lots to determine their order the next day. There are three independent judges, and the horses are judged in 10 different

categories, with 10 points in each category, with a total of 300 points possible.

Despite a whopping 4 inches of rain Saturday night, the contest went ahead the next day. The previous two

years, drought conditions prevailed.

Overall, Becker placed second in the antique walking plow category, with 272 points, just three points shy of the first place winner.

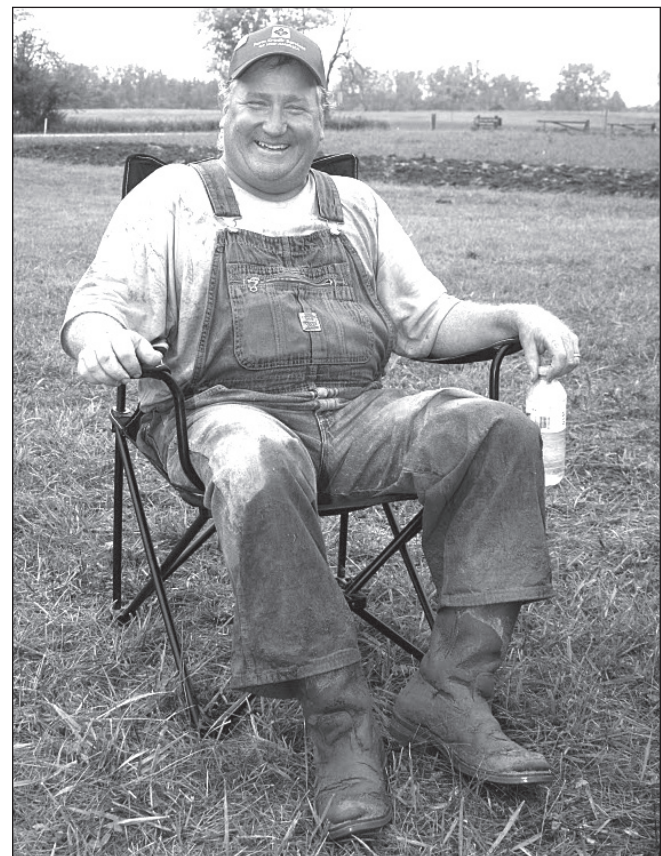

# Singer Craig Campbell to headline Hoedown in the Holler this weekend

The 2nd annual Hoedown in the Holler, presented by Hinton Mills, will be held Sept. 30 and Oct. 1 at Mandolin Farm in central Fleming County and will feature lots of wonderful entertainment, including top 20 country sensation Craig Campbell.
