Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

DOWN THE MOUNTAIN

"Lie still and go to sleep or the Shawnee will catch

This was a saying passed on from mothers to their children along the Kentucky frontier, particularly in the settlements of northeastern Kentucky, as is recorded by Dr. Daniel Drake in his phenomenal book Pioneer Life in Kentucky.' Daniel Drake was a child at Drake's Station (near present-day Mays Lick, Mason County). The station was built less than a decade after the cataclysmic Battle of Blue Licks.

"All of my troubled dreams included either Indians or snakes. The coppercolored man and the copper headed snake, then extremely common, happily I never suffered from either except in my dreams; my escape from the later I ascribe to cowardice, or to express it more courteously to a constitutional cautiousness beyond the extreme of which my memory runneth not."

As I sought to nurture myself during some much awaited time off last week, I once again sought temporary refuge in the woods, dear reader.

With permission from the land owner, my friend and I trudged up Campbell Mountain near Hillsboro, Kentucky in hopes of taking some more photographs of the enigmatic sacred Kettle site. The kettles are huge sandstone boulders, approximately six feet in circumference. They are hewn out to form the shape of bowls, or 'Kettles' as early pioneers called them.

Accompanying six feet circular sandstone lids are lying nearby.

I was first taken to the Kettles by my father during a grouse hunting expedition when I was a youth, not yet a teenager.

I've been back about 25 times, acting as a tour guide for a variety of archaeologists, geologists, anthropologists and friends and neigh-

I hadn't been to the site since April 27, 2007 when I went as a birthday present to myself and a favor to film producer Lee Pennington.

I returned over the weekend to show the site to a dear friend and fellow Native American studies enthusiast, Danny Belcher.

My knee held up good-I suffered a serious injury three years ago- and the day was beautiful.

The summer foliage was thick and green.

I got us lost.

We ended up on the wrong ridge and we never did get to the right spot.

Talk about embarrassing, I'm still trying to figure out where I made a wrong turn.

There is a timeless and ancient, sacredness to those woods, to that landscape; that is indescribable.

My father felt it and tried to explain it to me and I feel it also when I am there.

I could feel it coursing through my body as I gasped for breath while climbing up the near vertical slope of the mountain.

It is how I arrange my mind. I have already decided to love it. It is a decision I make every morning when I wake up. I have a choice. I can spend the day in bed recounting the difficulty I have with the parts of my body that no longer work, or I can get out of bed and be thankful for the ones that do work. Each day is a gift, and as long as my eyes open, I will focus on the new day and all of the happy memories I have stored way... just for this time in my life. Old age is like a bank account. 


ommend.


