Court discusses Tax Rates

Last Friday the main topic that created a stir in the Nicholas County Fiscal Court meeting was the discussion of the 2012 property tax rates. The tax rate for the 2011-2012

year was the compensat-

ing rates of 13.3%. Nicholas County Judge-Executive Kenny Lyons stated that it would probably drop this coming year due to a reduction in property sales.

A motion was made by Magistrate Jeff Randolph to take the compensating rate of 13.5% for the 2012-2013 fiscal year. Before a second was made, Judge Lyons asked the court to remember that the court is struggling to operate with low revenue.

"I know that we don't want to raise the taxes but I can't sit here and borrow money to tie the court up. We are in a bind right now and we need to do something." Judge Lyons stated.

"I am not against the tax but I think that we need a fair tax." Randolph said. "There are people that don't pay the first tax and it is not right. If we need to sit down and talk about a fair tax I am for it but this is not something that is fair'

"I agree we need the money but if we do it we need to do it in a fair way." Randolph added. If the court raised the

taxes with the 4-tenths % it would be \$4.00 per \$1,000.00. The taxes over the year have ranged from 15.9% in 1976 to 13.1% in 2010.

"We just can't do this to the people with the way the economy is today. People drive to Lexington and having to pay more for gas and make less than what they did years ago." Magistrate Jimmy Wells said.

"In my heart I don't feel like it is right to raise the taxes when there are twothirds of the people that don't pay any tax," Ran-dolph said. "If we need to have a special meeting called to hash out a fair tax then let's do that.'

Judge Lyons replied, "I just can't sit here and watch the county go down the drain."

A motion was made by Randolph to use the compensating rate of 13.5% with Magistrate Mike Webb seconding the motion, all approved.

Approval for Mathers Fund was next on the agenda for the applicants that were eligible for the funds. There wasn't much of a difference from the numbers of last year. This years recipients of Mathers Fund will receive \$150.00 per child. A motion was made by Webb seconded by Magistrate Darvin Mitchell with all approving.

The fire board presented

the court with two names for their recommendation to fill the firefighter positions on the fire board: Steve Minton and Andy Whirles. Johnny Parton resigned from his position on the fire board, and Tracy Brown was appointed as the elected position. A motion was made by Magistrate Jimmy Wells, seconded by Randolph with all approving.

The court approved the bids of Hinkle Contracting to do the blacktopping on Lakeshore and Hickory Ridge roads.

Rescinding the Synthetic Drug Ordinance was recommended by the members of KACO because if the sheriff made a drug arrest with the county ordinance will not match the state ordinance and if the court rescinds the ordinance it will match. Webb made the motion with Randolph seconding and all approved.

The building committee recommended that the court get a bid on the Health Department for the Asbestos removal, but to accept the bid of Tim Layne, who submitted a bid for \$1,500, for removal of the carpet. Another recommendation made to accept the bid from Mark Wade to work on the fire house on fixing the roof, and the bay door.

Sidles Sheriff dressed the court on the decision of being able to help the department out

with the reimbursement on the Sheriff Department Dodge truck so that the department could sell the truck to seek getting a vehicle that is better on

The court asked for more time until the Sept 11 meeting, so that the members of the court could check into this to see what they could give. Sheriff Sidles agreed to wait on the answer for the next meeting.

"I appreciate any help that you can give the department." Sheriff Sidles added.

Under the new business, the court discussed that the nursing home was in need of replacing 16 more windows due to them leaking. The court asked for more bids to be able of what the approximate cost would be so the court members would have a better understanding of the price.

Also Magistrate Darvin Mitchell asked the court to appoint another member to the Animal Board due to the resignation of Carol Powers. Adam Tubbs was recommended to be placed on the Animal Board. A motion was made by Darvin Mitchell and seconded by Jeff Randolph with all approving to place Adam Tubbs on the Animal Board.

The next scheduled meeting will take place on Sept 11 at 6:00 p.m.



New law is making a dent in tax filing burden, lawmakers told

Efforts are underway to create a stanoccupational license tax form for Kentucky businesses and place current forms used by those businesses in one online location as mandated by the 2012 Portal. The Secre-General Assembly, a state legislative committee heard yester-

day. Bill House 277,sponsored by Rep. Jody Richards, D-Bowling Green, and Interim Joint Committee on Local Government Co-Chair Rep. Steve Riggs, D-Louisville, mandates that a standard occupational license tax return form for use by all local taxing districts in Kentucky be in place by mid 2017. The form will replace dozens of forms currently used by local taxing districts across the state, according to Secretary of State Alison Lundergan Grimes, whose office is responsible for im-

Until the standard Counties, small busiform is in use, Grimes said businesses will be able to find their taxing district's current occupational license tax forms on the Secretary of State's tary of State's Office is asking that all local taxing districts in Kentucky send in their current forms by Nov. 1, 2012, along with instructions, to be posted on the web portal at onestop. ky.gov.

"We are getting tremendous feedback," Grimes said. "We are getting these forms into our office on a timely basis." She said she hopes to have received 100 percent of the forms from all taxing districts by January.

Creation of a standard form is now being worked out by the Secretary of State and several entities including the Kentucky League of Cities, Kentucky Association of ness associations and Kentucky Society of CPAS, Grimes said.

Grimes said Kentucky has over 200 taxing jurisdictions, and that HB 277 will One Stop Business reduce the time businesses have to spend communicating with state government.

> Riggs, who chaired meet-Wednesday's ing, said the need to address the occupational license tax form issue was raised by a fellow lawmaker who pushed to get the issue addressed for more than a year. "That is how ideas are born: Just from practical living experience," Riggs said.

The One Stop Business Portal was created with the passage of 2011 Senate Bill 8, sponsored by Sen. David Givens, R-Greensburg, Sen. John Schickel, R-Union. Today, Grimes said, Kentucky has over 10,000 businesses that have registered to operate in the Commonwealth using the web portal. She said her office is now working to streamline the portal to benefit all citizens and not just businesses.

"We appreciate you giving us the ability to do what there is in the statute. We are working our hardest to stretch every dollar you provided for us," Grimes said.

The preacher shared with us the story of Jesus at the well with the Samaritan woman. "Jesus answered and said unto her, Whosoever drinketh this water shall thirst again: But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life." (John 4:13, 14)

After His miraculous feeding of the five thousand, many sought after Jesus not because they believed, but because He had given them bread, saying, "Lord, evermore give us this bread." And Jesus said unto them, "I am the bread of life: he that cometh to me shall never hunger; and he that believeth on me shall never thirst." (John 5:34,35)

What a tremendous promise this is!

But it raises the question: As much as we enjoy eating, or how much we pay attention to satisfying our hunger and quenching our thirst our physical cravings how much attention to we pay to feeding our souls. One day, every one of us will eventually shed our mortal bodies - these shells we pay so much atten-

tion to. But how much care do we put into nourishing our immortal soul – that part of us that makes us who we truly are – the part of us that really mat-Jesus taught, "Man shall not live by bread

alone, but by every

word that proceedeth

out of the mouth of We would never consider going into a buffet, paying for an entire meal and then leaving without eating. But how many of us leave church just as empty as when we walked

in the doors because we slept through the service, or texted with our friends... anything besides "feasting" on God's word?

Every time we sit down to a meal, let it serve as a reminder that we also need to feed our souls. Our Lord and Savior has prepared a buffet becompare; much spiritual food and drink that we will never hunger or thirst again. Let us do more than just sip and nibble here and there. Let us strive to enjoy and to glory in the feast!



Bluejackets fall to Fleming County

The Nicholas County Bluejackets faced a tough road test in Week 1 of the Kentucky high school football season. The Fleming County Panthers enacted some revenge Friday night. In the 2011 season, Nicholas County edged the Panthers 46-45. Surging Fleming County won convincingly in the latest meeting, defeating non-district foe Nicholas County 53-14 Friday night at Panther Field.

The Panthers, who improved to 2-0, remained in the win column after defeating Bath County 33-6 in a season-opener.

With the loss, Nicholas County slipped to 0-1. The Bluejackets dropped into the loss column after doubling up Lewis County 32-16 in a season-opener.

Fleming County, under the guidance of head coach Bill Spencer, scored 19 points in the second quarter en route to the comfortable win.

The Panthers, thriving defensively, held Nicholas County to just over 100 total yards.

Fleming County quarterback Desmond Mc-Adams completed nineof-21 passes for 181 yards and five touch-

downs. On the ground, Fleming County rushed for 117 yards. Austin Hunt led the Fleming County rushing attack, netting 55 yards on nine carries.

Fleming scored first when Mc-Adams hooked up with Chaise Gulley on a 24yard touchdown pass.

Nicholas County, however, managed to answer. Following a 79-yard kickoff return from Carl Hurd, just a few plays later, Austin Allison scored on a two-yard run. After the extra-point kick missed its mark, the game was tied 6-6.


Then, Fleming County proceeded to dominate. The Panthers led 46-6 in the fourth quarter before Nicholas County scored its second and final touchdown.

McAdams hooked up with Maverick Burnett on a 41-yard touchdown pass and Carmelo Puente reached the endzone on a successful two-point conversion attempt as Fleming County moved ahead 14-6 with 56 seconds left in the first period.

Burnett worked his way back into the endzone in the second quarter, returning a Nicholas County punt 45 yards for a touchdown. Kicker Eerik Mikelsoo landed a successful extra-point kick after Burnett's second touchdown.

McAdams passed for a 52-yard touchdown to Aaron James and scored on a three-yard run for Fleming County later in

the second quarter. After intermission, Fleming County ate up nearly seven minutes

Gov. Beshear overhauls Career and Technical Education in Kentucky

In a move to help produce the skilled workforce businesses require today and in the future, Governor Steve Beshear today signed an executive order that will overhaul the state's career and technical education (CTE) system.

The order unites the state's two CTE systems under the guidance of Kentucky's Department of Education. The goal is to create a unified, more relevant and efficient system to educate and prepare students for the world of work in a reallife setting.

"It is our responsibility to prepare students for higher education as well as for the workplace," said Gov. Beshear. "Today's employers require a workforce that is skilled, adaptable and equipped to compete in the global marketplace. Our students need an education system that job-training provides

and learning opportuni-

ties that will put them on a career pathway. Transforming and elevating CTE is essential to this process. We must create a career and technical education system that is a first choice, not a last chance."

The executive order is part of a larger effort to prepare students for a wider range of career options through high-quality CTE programs. Educators, businesses and administrators across the state are working together to make these programs more accessible earlier, more academically rigorous and better aligned with postsecondary requirements and employer needs.

example, the For Kentucky Board of Education has adopted a college and career readiness measure that includes an academic component and a technical skill component. The Kentucky Community and Technical College

System (KCTCS) offers dual credit opportunities so that high school students can earn college credit. Kentucky provides funds from the Carl D. Perkins CTE Basic Grant to encourage secondary and postsecondary institutions to develop innovative career pathways.

In addition, the Governor's Task Force on Transforming Education in Kentucky and the Graduate Kentucky steering committee, led by First Lady Jane Beshear, have both made recommendations to improve career and technical education opportunities and reinforce its role as a critical component of Kentucky's college and career readiness initiative.

"CTE can make the direct connection for students between education and jobs," said Education and Workforce Development Cabinet Secretary Joseph U. Meyer.

"These programs offer learning opportunities that can inspire all students to explore careers and tackle more challenging courses."

Studies show that graduation rates are higher among students who participate in CTE programs as opposed to those who do not. These high school graduates are then more likely to transition to postsecondary education or employment.

Seventy-five percent of Kentucky high school students, more than 150,000 pupils, were enrolled in career and technical education programs last year. Career and technical education - offering hands-on training in areas such as agriscience, machine tool technology, health sciences, electrical technology and business administration - is provided at 323 middle and high schools, area technology

technical centers across the state. "Bringing the Office

of Career and Technical Education into the Kentucky Department of Education is an excellent move," said Kentucky Education Commissioner Terry Holliday. "Career and technical education directly connects learning and jobs for our students and provides them with engaging real-world opportunities so that they can transition to higher education or employment with ease. This move is a key strategy in our efforts to ensure college and career readiness for all stu-

dents." The executive order also establishes a CTE Advisory Committee that will provide guidance in the design and implementation of programs that give all students the best possible opportunity for career preparation in a unified

"By bringing together oversight of career and technical education at the state level we will become much more effective in delivering the training our students need and our employers expect," said Rep. Carl Rollins, of Midway.

The signing ceremony was held at Lexington's newest career and technical high school, Locust Trace Agriscience Farm. In addition to classrooms with adjoining labs, the facility features 6.5 acres for gardening, a stategreenhouse of-the-art and aquaculture area, an auditorium to accommodate livestock and machinery, an equine barn and arena and an on-site veterinary clinic. The school offers courses in plant and land science, biotechnology and environmental science, agriculture power mechanics, equine and vet science, and small and large animal science.

Plans for an upcoming Dental and Health Fair were discussed at a recent meeting at the Nicholas County Health Center on Wednesday, August

The purpose of the fair will be to provide necessary dental and health check-ups for those people in Nicholas County who need $_{
m them.}$

"One of the main reasons that people don't seek proper dental care is the financial burden it places on them," said Lenora Kinney, organizer of the fair. "Money should not get in the way of someone wanting to get medical as-

sistance." Kinney went on to explain why a Dental and Health Fair is needed for Carlisle and Nicholas County and how it could benefit the community.

"Dental health is

rather unfortunate," Kinney explained. "People need to learn how important their teeth are. At a dental fair, we can provide check-ups, cleaning, extraction as well as other services. The fair could also generate a great amount of income for county and attract many visitors."

Although dental health was the primary discussion point, several other ailments and aspects of health were discussed, especially the growing diabetes epidemic.

"Diabetes is another important health risk that people need to become more aware about," Kinney said. "The health fair will provide adequate testing methods and facilities that will allow people to make more healthy decisions that would prevent them from contracting diabetes."

Regarding the planning of the fair, the suggestion was made to have the involvement of the University of Kentucky. It was said that their involvement would entice people to attend the health fair and become more health conscious citizens.

As for the date, with proper planning, a Dental and Health Fair could come as soon as next year, providing that the cause gains enough medical officials and health equipment.

Hundreds of cattle farmers and markets lost millions of dollars when Eastern Livestock, a cattle brokerage company, filed for bankruptcy and failed to pay for east. These groups yards. livestock and ser-

challenges throughout the year, from tornadoes, flooding, winter storms to man-made hazards,' Gov. Beshear said. "During my term alone, Kentucky has endured 11 presidentially declared disasters. Every household should be prepared to face these challenges at any given time, which is why I have proclaimed September as Commonwealth of Kentucky Preparedness Month. The severe weather and tornadoes

struck Kentucky in early spring destroyed parts of West Liberty and inflicted severe damage on Salversville, London and dozens of communities across the Commonwealth. Those storms were also responsible for the deaths of 25 Kentuckians and scores of injuries. Hundreds of homes, businesses and public buildings were damaged or destroyed.

'We urge Kentuckians to be prepared for any unforeseen emergency or disaster," said Gene Kiser, executive director the Kentucky Office of Homeland Security. "Supplies such as water, non-perishable food, flashlights and batteries, radios, and first-aid kits are easy to store and can be lifesavers when a crisis occurs. A communications plan with family, friends and neighbors is also an important part in being prepared. As we have all witnessed in the past few years, emergency situations can happen any time, any place, so it is wise to be prepared."

Although state and local governments are ready to assist the public during times of emergencies and disasters, preparedness starts at home, said John Heltzel, director of Kentucky Emergency Management.

"In the event of large scale disasters, it may take time to respond immediately," Heltzel said. "The flooding of 2011 and and March of this year have taught us many valuable lessons. One of the most important is the value of individual and family preparedness."

Heltzel said educating and preparing citizens is important, which is why Gov. Beshear, Kentucky Homeland Security and Kentucky Emergency Management are joining together to offer preparedness tips.

CRP Participants May Request Authorization to Conduct Emergency Haying or Grazing of CRP Acres

The USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) announces the opportunity for Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) participants to request authorization to conduct emergency haying or grazing on specific CRP acres. Eligible producers who are interested in applying for approval to conduct Emergency Haying or Grazing of CRP land located in Kentucky must request and obtain individual written approval from FSA before any haying or grazing starts. Participants will be assessed a 10 percent payment reduction on their annual rental payment for the acres actually hayed or grazed. Interested CRP participants are required to submit a request to FSA and obtain a modified conservation plan to hay and/or

graze under emergency provisions. The same acres may not be hayed and grazed under the same emergency designation. Emergency haying or grazing is not allowed within 120 feet of any stream or water body. Specified portions of each field or contiguous fields must be left or grazed with limited stock for wildlife purposes. Emergency haying or grazing is restricted to specific practices that are 12 months past being determined as fully established by

the agency. Participants shall not start any having or grazing activity until individual written approval is received for the CRP contract request. Approved haying authorization will end not later than August 31st. Approved grazing authorization will end not later than September 30th. To take advantage of the emergency haying and grazing provisions, approved participants can use the CRP acreage for their

own livestock or may grant another livestock producer use of the CRP acreage for the purpose of haying or grazing. For more information and to request approval for emergency having or grazing of CRP acres, contact the local FSA Service

Center that administers the CRP contract. Opportunity for Continuous CRP Enrollment of Highly Erodible Cropland The USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) announced that continuous sign-up for the Highly Erodible Land (HEL) Initiative under

the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) started on July 23, 2012. Kentucky received a total allocation of 39,400 acres to

enroll in the HELI CRP program. Offers will be accepted until either the state acreage allocation limit is reached or September 30, 2012 whichever occurs first This initiative will accept offers with an erosion rate of at least 20 tons per acre per year for new cropland or CRP acres that expire on September 30, 2012; however, existing grass stands that are not considered expiring CRP will not be considered eligible for enrollment. Eligible cropland must also have a history of being cropped 4 out of 6 years, 2002 through 2007.

Eligible CRP contracts set to expire on September 30, 2012, may be offered for consideration and approved contracts will become effective October 1, 2012. The contract duration is also 10 years.
