These two individuals, who have both had prior experience in law enforcement, seem very enthusiastic about serving our community.

**Mark McClure**  
 Officer Mark McClure joined the Carlisle City Police Department on November 21st.

McClure previously served in the United States Marine Corps for four and a half years before joining the Paris City Police Department, where he served for five and a half years. He also worked as a carpenter in Cincinnati prior to coming to Carlisle.

"This is a very friendly community," said McClure. "Everyone has been very welcoming and I haven't met any rude people since I've been here."

Although he is new to the community, McClure seems very enthusiastic about

"Working is a break," he joked. "I really enjoy working because I love every job I've had. When I'm home, my wife keeps me very busy, so I like to be out of the house whenever I can."

## Fiscal Court discusses EMS complaints

The Nicholas County Fiscal Court decided to take action on an issue regarding the Nicholas County EMS at their regular meeting last Friday morning.

The issue in question involved some complaints that the members of the Nicholas County EMS did not respond in a timely fashion to medical emergency calls and a "lack of professionalism," as stated by Magistrate Steve Hamilton, on numerous occasions.

According to Judge-Executive Kenny Lyons, the EMS responded to a medical emergency in rural Nicholas County in which a subject's family requested assistance.

Reason for the extended response time was attributed to the medical personnel not being able to locate the residence due to the lack of familiarity with the area.

Although the time it took to reach the destination was considered sufficient by the members of the Fiscal Court, Steve Hamilton stated, "This is something that we need to be concerned with and address."

The members of the Fiscal Court ultimate-

ly decided that the best course of action would be to send a letter to the EMS, outlining the issue and informing them that disciplinary action will be taken if such behavior persists.

It was decided by the members of the Fiscal Court that a draft of the letter to be sent to the ambulance, as well as an apologetic letter to the members of the families that are upset, will be written and be sent following the next Fiscal Court meeting on December 11.

The next item discussed at the meeting was the current state of the roof on Nicholas County Hospital.

Nicholas County Attorney Dawn Letcher informed the members of the Fiscal Court that there were three ways that the county would

be able to borrow money for the repair of the Hospital roof: Short Term, Bonds Issue and Lease Borrowing.

"With Short Term, the loan has to be paid back within the fiscal year," explained Letcher. "Bonds Issue requires a tremendous amount of legal work and Lease Borrowing is a lease agreement with a loan institution. We can borrow through any of these methods."

Mrs. Letcher went on to explain the interest rate on such a loan and the process of applying for the loan.

"The interest rate on a ten-year loan is approximately 3.25% and the application process for the loan could take six to eight weeks," said Dawn.

The Fiscal Court members decided that

they would bid the job of repairing the roof to the best offer, but they would have to obtain the money for the project first.

"The Court needs to decide and to what extent to do this," stated Letcher.

The court decided that the best course of action would be to gather all of the information for this application and decide how to pursue the matter at the next meeting on December 11.

Also, the enacting of the Affordable Care Act, commonly referred to as ObamaCare, will affect county employees beginning in January.

According to federal law, employees at the Nicholas County Courthouse will be eligible for health insurance within 60 days of becoming employed instead of the previous 90 days.

A motion was made by Steve Hamilton to modify the Nicholas County Health Insurance to accommodate the requirements set forth by the Affordable Care Act, effective January 1, 2013. A second to the motion was made by Mike Webb.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Jimmy Wells with a second by Jeff Randolph. The motion passed and the meeting was adjourned.

## Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

Testimony concluded Friday afternoon Nov. 30 in the double murder trial of Chris Fairchild of Ohio.

Mr. Fairchild, who is facing the death penalty upon conviction, was arrested in May 2011 in connection with the May 2005 murders of Fleming County couple Donald Walker, 43 and Marklene Mauk, 23, of Routt Road, near the Goddard Covered Bridge.

The Walker/Mauk residence, a single-wide mobile home was located about a mile and half away (as the crow flies) from own home.

It is not the first or even the second murder that has occurred, in one way or another, near my home.

I'm fairly certain it won't be the last.

I got to the scene quickly that day on Routt Road when the bodies were discovered and I've followed the investigation fairly closely since then.

All murders are disturbing. This one was more disturbing than most I've studied.

I have to give a lot of credit to Dawn Mauk, Marlene's mother. She never quit calling and asking investigators about who killed her daughter and why.

The four Kentucky State Police Detectives who led the investigation, at different times over the past seven years, had to wade through a mountain of misinformation to finally make their arrests.

And the lies haven't stopped since those arrests were made.

Two other Ohio men, Jason Jackson, 34, and Rodney Dodson, 38, were also charged with the murders of Walker and Mauk.

Jackson was living close to Walker at the time of the murders.

Dodson's sister and Jackson were husband and wife at the time.

Jackson and Dodson cut a deal with the Commonwealth Attorney's Office in exchange for their lives being spared.

Dodson will serve 18 years in prison before he can be eligible for parole, according to court documents and court testimony.

Jackson will die in prison without ever having the possibility of being paroled, according to his plea agreement

Jackson and Dodson said Fairchild killed Walker and Mauk with Jackson's 9mm pistol.

Fairchild said he wasn't even there when the murders took place.

Somebody is lying.

The jury is still discussing the case as I write this Monday afternoon, dear reader.

Lots of folks have lied to police during this investigation, but some haven't. Some have taken the stand and stood by their story and at their own peril from retribution by those involved in criminal activity across the region, because it was the truth as they understood it and they were doing their civic duty.

I watched a friend testify in the trial and he did not even want to be involved in any way, shape or form with the investigation, but he came forward with what little information he had and he testified to it in court.

Good for him.

I was watching him

and I was proud of him.

Others became so caught up in the lies they told investigators they literally couldn't remember what they told them and denied making statement all together.

Such is the nature of a murder investigation.

I have, historically been a lone and vocal critic of the Kentucky State Police (KSP) in this neck of the woods. There have been times, in particular with the unsolved Blue Licks Triangle murders of Nicholas County men: Donnie Dixon, David Sadler and Roger Scotty Fulton, where I thought KSP investigators weren't putting forth much of an effort.

The Blue Licks Triangle murders are still unsolved.

Donnie Dixon was murdered at his property in Oct. 1999, near the intersection of Headquarter's Road and US 68.

David Sadler was murdered at his home on Abner's Mills Road in March 2003.

Roger Scotty Fulton was living on Crooked Creek Road, near the rural community of Barterville, in either late 2003 or early 2004.

His partially decomposed remains were discovered in Feb. 2004 near the

Johnson Creek Covered Bridge, near the confluence of Johnson Creek and one of its tributaries.

If you take a map and plotted an "X" where Donnie Dixon lived and was murdered, then place another "X" on the map where David Sadler lived and was murdered, and then place an "X" where Roger Scotty Fulton lived (and where he may have been murdered) and you draw a straight line and connect the Xs, you will have drawn a near-perfect triangle; A triangle in rural Nicholas County that designated where three men-all very good friends-best friends by many accounts-lived and most-likely died. (Fulton's body was found just a couple of miles from his last home of record.)

I drew such a map and sent it to KSP detectives earlier this year when they found disarticulated skeletal remains of two individuals near the Blue Licks Triangle.

Unsolved murders are a blight on any community and the unsolved murders of three good friends all living in a section of rural Nicholas County that contains no more than a 250 citizens, is a disturbing scenario to even the

most callous of us.

I believe we should all lobby our elected representatives and insist they provide more funding and man-power for our overworked Kentucky State Police Officers.

It is astounding to me when I examine the case load that these officers and detectives are forced to manipulate simultaneously while filing reports, conducting interviews, making court appearances and trying to have some sort of family life.

I don't know how they do it.

I am glad they do.

I think they need some help.

I hope you will join me in voicing your concerns to your county-state and nationally-elected officials in providing our state police with more manpower and support in all the KSP posts across our commonwealth.

And then demand they solve, or at least provide some sort of evidence they are actually trying to solve, our as-of-yet unsolved murders.

Particularly the unsolved Blue Licks Triangle murders.

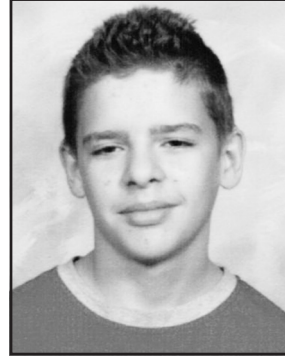

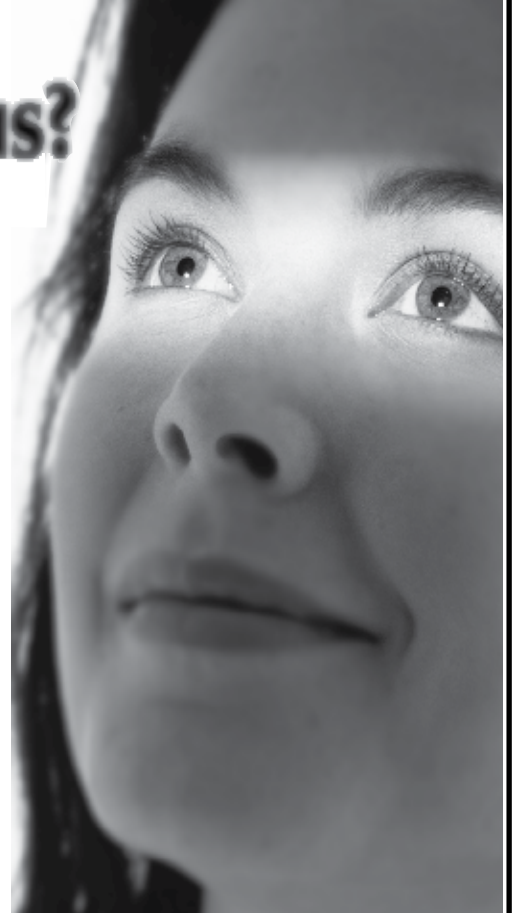

Many readers in the five-county, Kentucky News Group (KNG), area of Robertson, Nicholas, Fleming, Bath and Menifee County, love to deer hunt and this has been a great year for it.

As of Monday, Dec. 3, there have been 2,992 deer checked into the state's Fish and Wildlife authorities from across the five county area of KNG.

Fleming County leads the way thus far in 2012 deer season with 777 deer harvested. That total includes 478 bucks and 299 does. 689 deer were taken with a typical firearm while 37 were taken with a muzzleloader, 45 taken using archery and six taken with a crossbow.

Robertson County came in next with a total of 681 deer taken, with 386 bucks and 295 does. 560 deer were taken with typical firearms with 56 taken with a muzzleloader, 58 taken using archery, and seven taken with a crossbow.

Nicholas County deer

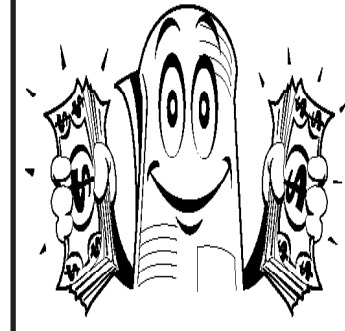
hunters harvested 623 deer with 364 bucks and 259 does. 506 deer were taken with typical firearms while 53 were taken with a muzzleloader. 59 deer were taken with archery while five were taken with a crossbow.

Bath County comes in next with 551 deer harvested with 334 bucks being taken along with 217 does. 465 deer were taken with typical firearms while 25 were taken with muzzleloaders, 51 using archery and 10 were taken with a crossbow.

Menifee County deer hunters' harvested 360 deer with 228 of them being bucks and 132 being does. 291 deer were taken with typical firearms and 31 taken with a muzzleloader. 31 deer were taken using archery with seven being taken with crossbow.

**2002**

## Filing FAFSA early gives students better chance at state grants

Kentucky students planning to attend an in-state college or university beginning in fall 2013 should file the 2013-2014 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible after Jan. 1. Filing early increases a student's chance of receiving a state need-based grant administered by the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA).

The FAFSA is available at [www.fafsa.gov](http://www.fafsa.gov). Students attending Kentucky colleges and universities may qualify for College Access Program (CAP) Grants. To qualify, a student must show financial need and be enrolled for at least half-time toward an associate's or bachelor's degree. The maximum CAP Grant award is \$1,900 per year. Students attending

most of Kentucky's private colleges and universities may qualify for a Kentucky Tuition Grant (KTG) in addition to a CAP Grant. To qualify for KTG, a student must show financial need and be enrolled full-time. The maximum KTG award is \$3,000 per year. Funding for CAP and KTG is limited, with awards made to qualifying students on a first-

come, first-served basis. Award amounts may change based on available funding. ## Toy Safety Tips for Holiday Shoppers

**Safety Measures**  
As the holiday season approaches, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) urges gift-givers to keep safety in mind when choosing toys for young children. The CPSC estimates that more than 120,000 children are treated in hospital emergency rooms for toy-related injuries each year.

By always reading labels and being safety conscious, parents and caregivers can help prevent toy-related injuries. CPSC requires labels to be on all toys marketed for children from three to six years old if the toys pose a choking hazard to children under age three. These labels tell consumers two critical things: that a toy is not safe for younger children and why it is not safe. Before CPSC issued these labeling requirements, it was more difficult for consumers to know that certain toys they bought for older children could be a danger to younger kids. CPSC has the most stringent toy-safety standards in the world, and toys on store shelves are safer because of the day-to-day compliance work by CPSC.

**Choosing Appropriate Toys**

Parents and gift-givers can help prevent toy-related injuries and deaths by always reading labels and being safety conscious. The following tips will help you choose appropriate toys this holiday season -- and all year round:

- Select toys to suit the age, abilities, skills, and interest level of the intended

child. Toys too advanced may pose safety hazards to younger children.

- For infants, toddlers, and all children who still mouth objects, avoid toys with small parts, which could pose a fatal choking hazard.

- For all children under age eight, avoid toys that have sharp edges and points.

- Do not purchase electric toys with heating elements for children under age eight.

- Be a label reader. Look for labels that give age recommendations and use that information as a guide.

- Look for sturdy construction, such as tightly secured eyes, noses, and other potential small parts.

- Check instructions for clarity. They should be clear to you, and when appropriate, to the child.

- Discard plastic wrappings on toys immediately, which can cause suffocation, before they become deadly playthings.

By using common sense and these safety suggestions, holiday shoppers can make informed decisions when purchasing toys for children.

Clark Middle School was named the Overall Middle School Champions for having the highest overall score in the Middle School Division. The trophy was in honor of former Nicholas County cheerleader,



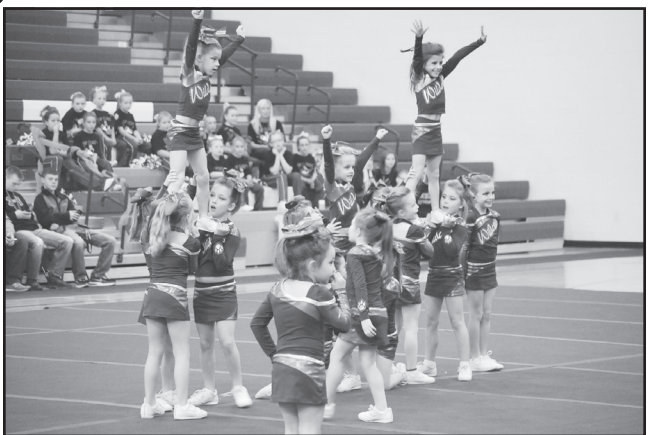
er, Jane Ann Bradley Wells. It was presented by Beth Blair Mercer, also a former Nicholas County Cheerleader.

# Millersburg Garden Club decorates Wallis House in "della Robbia" style

Several members of the Millersburg Garden Club gathered on November 25 and 26, 2012, to decorate the front (inside and outside) of the Wallis House on Pleasant Street in Paris. Led by member Betty Overly, a new look was given to the front porch and doors this year: two wreaths and a transom plaque, laden with fresh apples, pineapples and greenery in the "della Robbia" style. Luca della Robbia, an Italian sculptor from Florence, was noted for his terra-cotta roundels. He developed a pottery glaze that made his creations more durable in the outdoors and thus suitable for use on the exterior of buildings. His work is noted for its charm rather than the drama of the work of some of his contemporaries. Two of his famous works are The Nativity, circa 1460 and Madonna and Child, circa 1475. Over the years, the della Robbia style

has been seen in many different forms and is now closely associated with Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia. 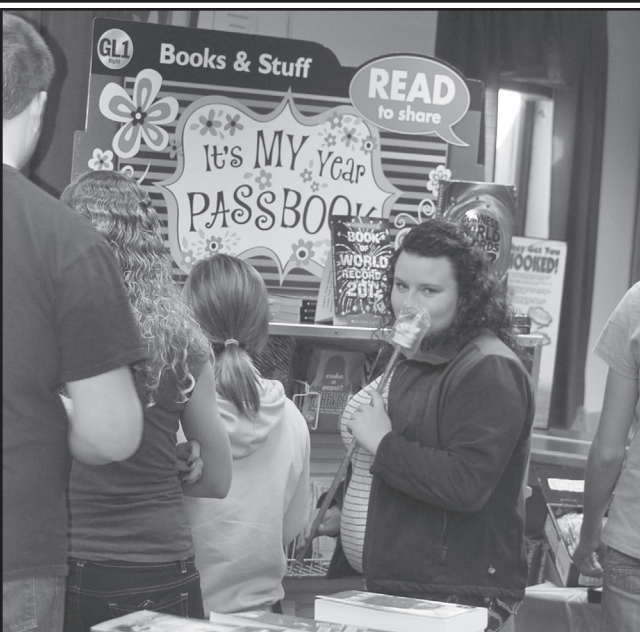

## CANCER, the #1 Disease KILLER of our Children

Cancer is the number 1 disease killer in children younger than 15 years old and the second leading cause of death (following accidents). This year alone, more than 12,000 children in the United States are expected to be diagnosed with cancer and 1/4 of them will not survive. The causes of pediatric cancers are still largely unknown and although new discoveries are resulting in new treatments, this horrific disease continues to scar families and communities everywhere.

While incidence of childhood cancer hasn't changed much since 1970 (increase from 1.4 per 100k to 14.8 per 100k) the overall survival rate has increased tremendously. Today, the overall 5 year survival rate for childhood cancer is about 80%, compared to 60% in the 1970's. However, survival comes with a "cost." Since children are receiving treatment regimens at a time of life when their bodies are growing and their brains are developing, two-thirds of those who survive will face at least one chronic health condition. One quarter of survivors face a late-effect from treatment that's classified as severe or life-threatening. Late-effects of treatment can include heart damage, second cancers, lung damage, infertility, cognitive impairment, growth deficits, hearing loss, and many more. It is vital that all survivors of childhood cancer receive on-going monitoring and continued physical and psychosocial care throughout their adult lives, making it more and more obvious that childhood cancer "is for life".

Be an advocate for your child. Signs and symptoms to watch for: Continued unexpected weight loss; Headaches, often with early morning vomiting; Increased swelling or persistent pain in bones, joints, back or legs; Lump or mass especially in the abdomen, neck, chest, pelvis or armpits; Development of excessive bruising, bleeding or rash; Constant infections; A whitish color behind the pupils; Nausea which persists or



vomiting without nausea; Constant tiredness or noticeable paleness; Eye or vision changes that occur suddenly or persists; Recurrent or persistent fevers of unknown origin

Cancer begins when cells in a part of the body start to grow out of control. There are many types of cancer, but they all start because of out-of-control growth of abnormal cells. In most cases the cancer cells form a tumor, or occupy the blood and blood forming organs and circulate through other tissues where they grow. No matter where a cancer may spread, it is always named for the place where it started. The most common types of childhood cancers are Leukemia, brain and other nervous system tumors, Neuroblastoma, Wilms tumor, Lymphoma, Rhabdomyosarcoma, Retinoblastoma, and Bone cancer. Other types of cancer are rare in children, but they do happen.

Childhood cancer has really hit home with the Buffalo Trace District Health Department. Shelly Allison's daughter Alex, isn't just talking the talk, but is walking the walk. Here is Shelly's first hand account of the past 21 1/2 months.

Alex was diagnosed with Pre-B Cell Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia (ALL) on February 22, 2011. She was at the tender age of nine and just two weeks shy of her tenth birthday. Alex's journey with cancer began about 8 weeks prior to her diagnosis. Alex was a vibrant young lady who loved school, karate, dancing, shopping, and being with her family. Alex's first complaint was back pain. She attended Karate twice a week and had started complaining of her back pain one evening after her class was over. The pain persisted for a few days and her mom took her to the doctor. An x-ray of her back

was done and determined that she had scoliosis. Other symptoms began to develop; Alex lost interest in school and started to struggle with completing her homework. She also lost her appetite. About one week before her diagnosis she was taken to her pediatrician for nausea, headache, weight loss, sore throat, and low grade fever. Tests for the flu, mono, and strep were completed and negative. Alex's mom requested the doctor do blood work.

The blood work was completed and shortly after the phone call came. Alex's blood work was terrible and she was referred to a hematologist at Cincinnati Children's Hospital. She was admitted to Children's Hospital and diagnosed with ALL four days later.

A whirlwind of events unfolded before her family. Treatment needed to start immediately and would continue for 2 1/2 years. Alex is a sixth

grader now at Mason County Middle School. She has been in remission for one year but continues to take chemotherapy daily at home and goes to Children's Hospital once a month for chemotherapy. Alex's journey has consisted of countless admissions to Children's Hospital for extended periods of time. She has received a dozen different chemotherapy agents, all of which can impact her as she grows into an adult. Childhood cancer must be eradicated. Childhood cancer stole her childhood and steals the childhood of many other children in the Buffalo Trace area.

As a parent of a child with cancer, I challenge each person to fight back against childhood cancer and all cancers, so no one will fight cancer alone. Alex has formed a team for the Mason County Relay for Life. Her team is called "Alex's Golden Angels" and anyone can register to be a participant of the Mason County Relay for Life. Relay for Life will be held at the Maysville-Mason County Recreational Park on Friday, May 17 -18, 2013 at 7 pm. All proceeds from the Mason County Relay for Life are used to support the American Cancer Society. The American Cancer Society

pioneered the research to support chemotherapy and radiation to treat leukemia and has increased the survival rate of leukemia to more than 90%. \$5.058 billion dollars a year in federal funding goes to cancer research, 4% of that is allocated for pediatric cancer. \$197 million a year, may sound like a large sum. However, it cost \$802 million for 1 NEW DRUG to be researched and approved. How can you help? Drop money in a bucket when you see one, donate to charities that support childhood cancer, raise awareness of the fact that childhood cancer remains the number one disease killer of America's children, and the need for greater research funding. Like breast cancer, childhood cancer has an international symbol, "the GOLD ribbon."

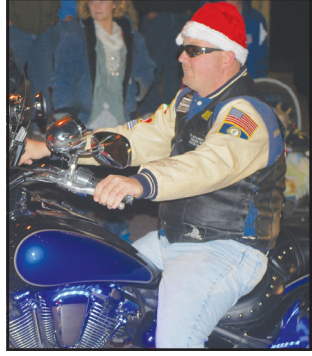
