The Carlisle Dairy Cheer Restaurant remains open for business seven days a week.

It's a tough time of the year, in a tough economy, and the business has faltered financially in recent weeks, but spring is in sight and Dairy Cheer Manager Kathy Livingood remains optimistic as the New Year begins.

The service at the restaurant continues to be good and the food is delicious.

"The community needs the business and employees need jobs," Livingood said in a brief but straight-forward conversation Friday, as the 2011 year drew to an end and a new year was waiting to blossom.

Livingood has been working at Dairy Cheer for three years, and has been managing the restaurant more than a year.

"We know most of the customers that come in," Livingood said.

And Livingood, who has worked in the restaurant business for several years before Dairy Cheer opened, is typical of most workers in Nicholas County. She's no stranger to work. "I enjoy what

I do," she said. "My husband farms and we have three daughters and this is close."

Mrs. Lou Compton is the owner of restaurant. Compton was unavailable for contact as The Carlisle Mercury goes to press. We hope to speak with her in the near future.

"I have a good line of communication with Mrs. Compton, and she gave me a job when I didn't have one," Livingood said.

Dairy Cheer has approximately 14 workers, with the majority being residents of Nicholas County. Livingood dispelled some myths floating across the community regarding Dairy Cheer.

"The vendors have been, and are continuing to be paid," Livingood said. "There has been no interruption of vendor services."

The land and the building, which houses Dairy Cheer, are owned by Delmus Murrell.

Murrell has long been an economic friend to Carlisle and Nicholas County, while recently helping on the financial end of the Dairy Cheer business.

"I want the business to succeed," Murrell said Monday. Murrell is hopeful any financial hurdles

can quickly be conquered. So if you're looking to enjoy a down-home catfish meal in a relaxing atmosphere, looking for a great tasting burger that isn't skimpy on the side dishes or the extras piled high and made to order, or you enjoy delicious food on the go, stop by Dairy Cheer any day of the week from 10:30 a.m., to 9 p.m.

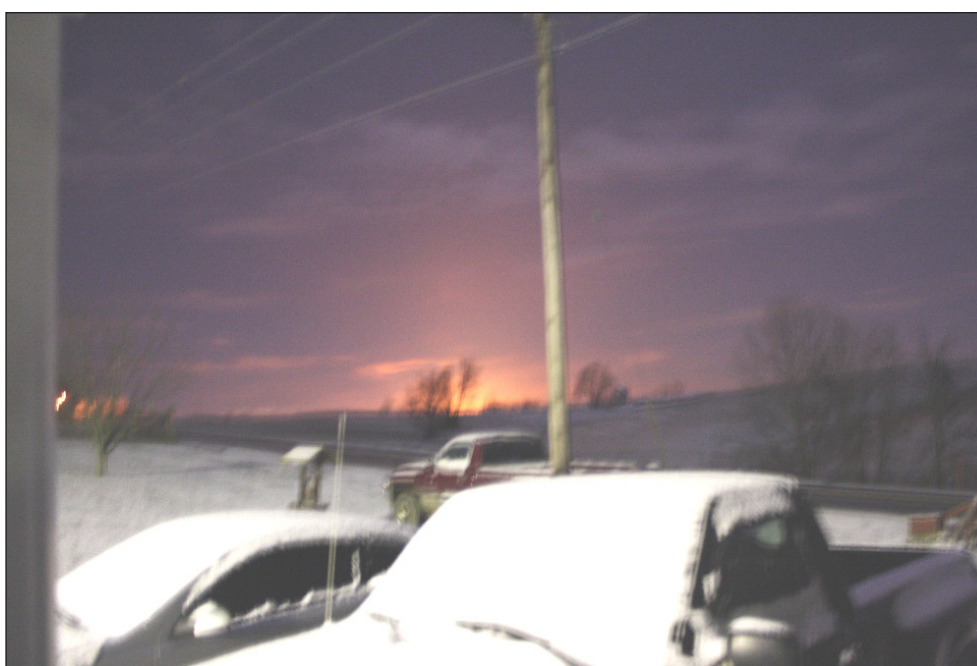
"I recommend the catfish," Livingood said with an easy smile. "You can get it in a sandwich or in a meal with fries, Cole slaw and hush puppies."

Crowd favorites included the Philly Steak sandwich, and Smash Burgers are "still going like crazy." Many of the items on the menu are made from scratch, like the Cole slaw, onion rings, even the hot dog sauce, which compliments the popular foot long.

Treadway to appear in court

A Carlisle woman who drove her vehicle into a school bus loaded with students in October is scheduled to return to Nicholas District Court on Jan. 11 for a preliminary hearing.

Angela J. Treadway, 39, of Carlisle, was charged with 31 counts of wanton endangerment, 1st degree, driving under the influence, controlled substance prescription not in original container, disregarding stop sign and possession of drug paraphernalia, after her vehicle collided with a school bus at the intersection of Sycamore and West Main on Oct. 7 at approximately 7:23 a.m.

Treadway was transported by ambulance to Nicholas County Hospital where local lawmen

interviewed her.

On Treadway's arrest citation officers wrote that Treadway's speech was slurred and "she could not stay awake."

Treadway also allegedly told a nurse that she was not driving the vehicle but "was a passenger" in the vehicle that struck the bus, according to court documents.

Treadway was found to be in possession of the drugs ativan, tramadol and proethazimne.

Treadway was arrested and taken to the Bourbon County Regional Jail later that same day. She posted bond the next day and remains free on bond pending the conclusion of her court case.

Treadway is being represented by Attorney Matt Perdue of the Public Defender's Office.

All persons are to be considered innocent until proven guilty or pleading guilty.

Carlisle woman charged after incident involving police

A Carlisle woman was arrested and charged with two counts of wanton endangerment, 1st degree, with one of the counts stemming from a confrontation with a Carlisle Police Officer.

Latonya W. Jackson, 25, of West Main Street, Carlisle, was arrested on Dec. 27, by Carlisle Police Officer Mark Snedegar.

Officer Snedegar charged Jackson with wanton endangerment, menacing, disorderly conduct, 2nd degree, and terroristic threatening, 2nd degree.

According to the arrest citation, Jackson was at the home of her ex-boyfriend James Tincher where she was "crying uncontrollably" and making

threats.

Officer Snedegar wrote on the citation that Jackson stated that she didn't want to live without Tincher and that if she couldn't have him then no one else would.

Jackson allegedly had a butcher knife in her hand when she passed by Officer Snedegar at one point

during the incident.

Officer Snedegar wrote on the citation that Jackson stated that "she heard voices in her head."

Jackson was charged and taken to Eastern State Hospital for observation. She is scheduled to appear in Nicholas District Court on Jan. 25 for a preliminary hearing.

Alleged purse snatcher jailed

A Carlisle man remains lodged in the Bourbon County Jail following an investigation into an alleged "purse snatching crime."

Aaron Nesbitt, 22, of Carlisle was charged with robbery, 1st degree and non payment of fines in connection with the in-

cident.

He remains jailed on \$7,000 bond as the Mercury goes to print.

Nesbitt was arraigned on the charges in Nicholas District Court on Dec. 27, following his Dec. 16 arrest.

He is scheduled to appear again in Nicholas District Court on Jan. 4 for a preliminary hearing.

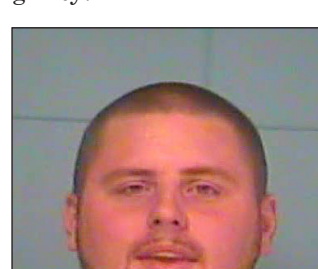
According to court doc-

uments, Nesbitt allegedly ran by a lady in Carlisle on July 17 of this year and attempted to grab the lady's purse.

"While doing so, defendant (Nesbitt) dragged the victim to the ground and she suffered an injury to her arm," an arrest warrant filed by Carlisle Police Officer George Ballard, states.

Court sources say a witness identified Nesbitt.

Learning about our history has always been my life's passion in one form or another; whether I'm walking across a

plowed field searching for Native American artifacts; in an abandoned dump digging for historic bottles or sitting patiently in a local library viewing microfilm, I am pursuing my passion.

Researching history keeps me going when the cold winds and the reality of hard news otherwise chills my soul.

I consider myself a lucky man to have this job.

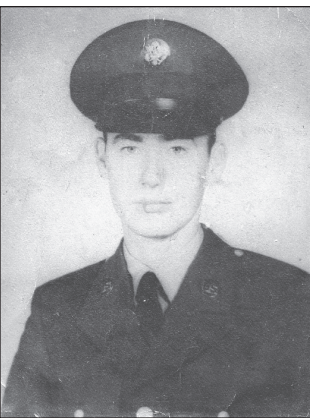

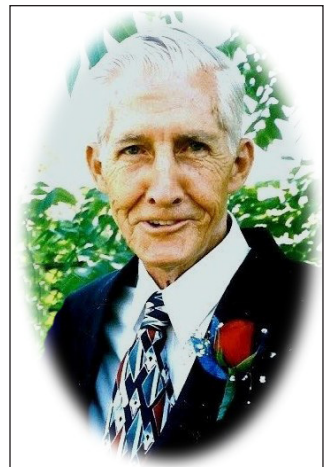

James retired from Lee Clay Products Company in Clearfield, Kentucky, and was of the Christian faith.

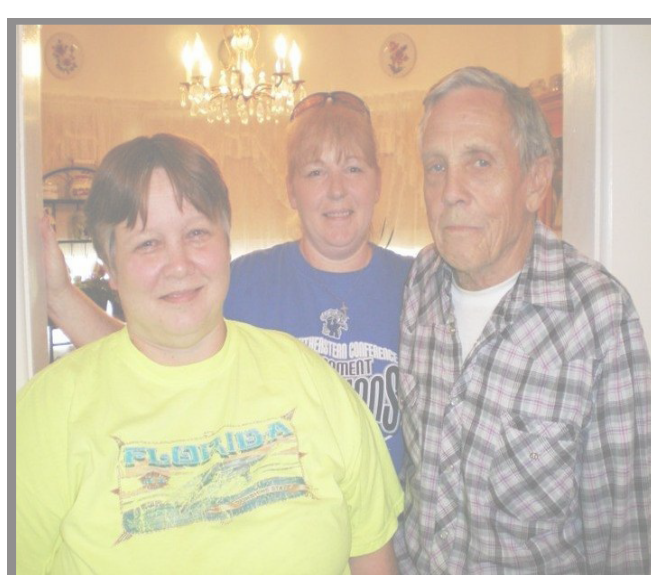

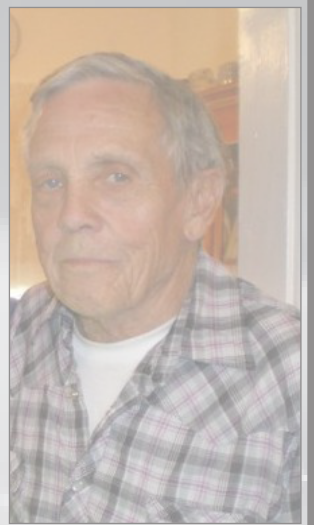
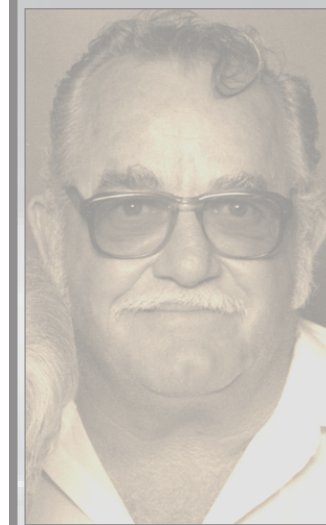
Linda Sue Butler, 52, died Friday Dec. 30, 2011 at her home after a long illness.

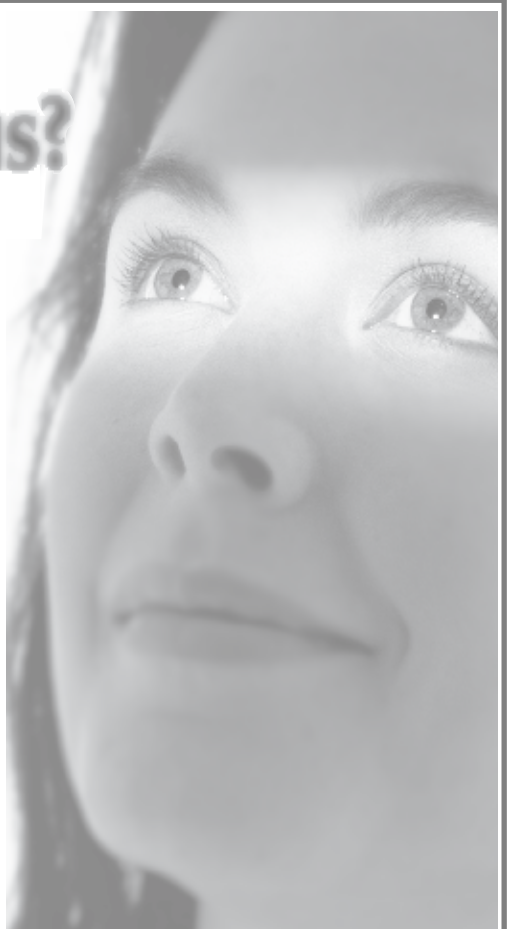

Jackets down Deming in Bracken tourney

BROOKSVILLE — Freshman guard Landon Sexton scored 18 points and sophomore forward Logan Fryman tossed in 12 as Nicholas County held off 38th District rival Deming 56-53 for a hard-fought win Wednesday in the FNB Classic at Bracken County.

Nicholas County, under the guidance of first-year head coach Kevin Reinhardt, improved to 2-9 after posting the win. The Bluejackets, thanks to the win, halted an eight-game losing streak.

Deming fell to 4-9 following the loss.

Fryman, active throughout the tournament matchup, led Nicholas County on the boards, grabbing a team-high seven rebounds.

Junior forward Ethan Smith aided the Nicholas County offensive effort with eight points.

"We came out very flat, spotting them a 10-point lead, but we fought back and played very good, very hard man to man team defense," Reinhardt confided. "This helped us get a lead. The second half we took care of the ball very well and Landon Sexton and Logan

Fryman took over. Logan seemed to get every rebound or get his hand on the ball every time it came off the rim. He also had a couple blocked shots and altered a lot more. He gave us a big spark inside. This was a game that we really wanted after Deming came into our place and beat us. We felt we did not play very well that game at all, so we wanted to get this one pretty bad."

Deming, under the direction of first-year head coach John Brown, a Nicholas County native, lost despite draining nine

3-point field goals.

Ben Duncan tossed in five points, Austin Allison added four and Jacob Fryman contributed three for Nicholas County in the victory.

Both teams enjoyed multiple leads. Nicholas County edged Deming 13-11 in the opening quarter following to an 11-0 run. The Jackets, however, faced a four-point deficit at intermission after Deming enjoyed a 19-13 run in the second period.

Nicholas County managed to double up Deming 18-9 in the third quarter, securing a lead and hold-

ing off the Devils in the final stanza.

Junior guard Dalton Schalch paced Deming with a game-high 20 points. Schalch hit five 3-pointers for the Devils.

Senior guard Calvin Schalch also reached double figures, adding 15 points for Deming in the loss.

Narrowly missing double figures, senior guard/forward Johnathan Pilosky netted nine points for the Devils.

Sophomore Darren Edwards added six points, freshman Dawson Cooper two and senior Jor-

dan Earlywine one for Deming in the setback.

Home Safety Tips: Generator Safety

Many households run generators during a power outage and homeowners should take extra precautions to avoid injury. Gasoline or diesel fuel powered generators can produce potentially deadly levels of carbon monoxide and should be operated only in well-ventilated, covered, unheated areas - never inside. You should always practice extreme caution when using a generator to power your home:

• Make sure the generator is listed by an independent testing organization, such as Underwriter's Laboratory (UL).

• Protect the generator from exposure to rain, but under no circumstances should generators be used indoors, including a garage. Do not operate the generator near any open windows or doorways.

• Before using a generator, make sure you have installed a carbon monoxide (CO) alarm near sleeping areas to alert you in the event of increased levels of CO in your home.

• Never connect a generator to the home's electrical system; instead, plug what you want to power directly into the generator.

• Always follow the manufacturer's guidelines and maintenance schedule.

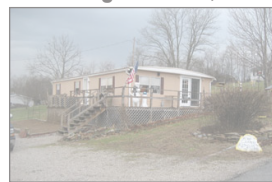

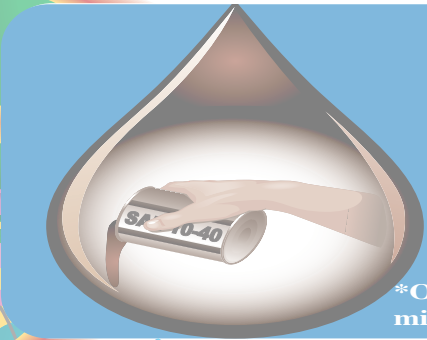
